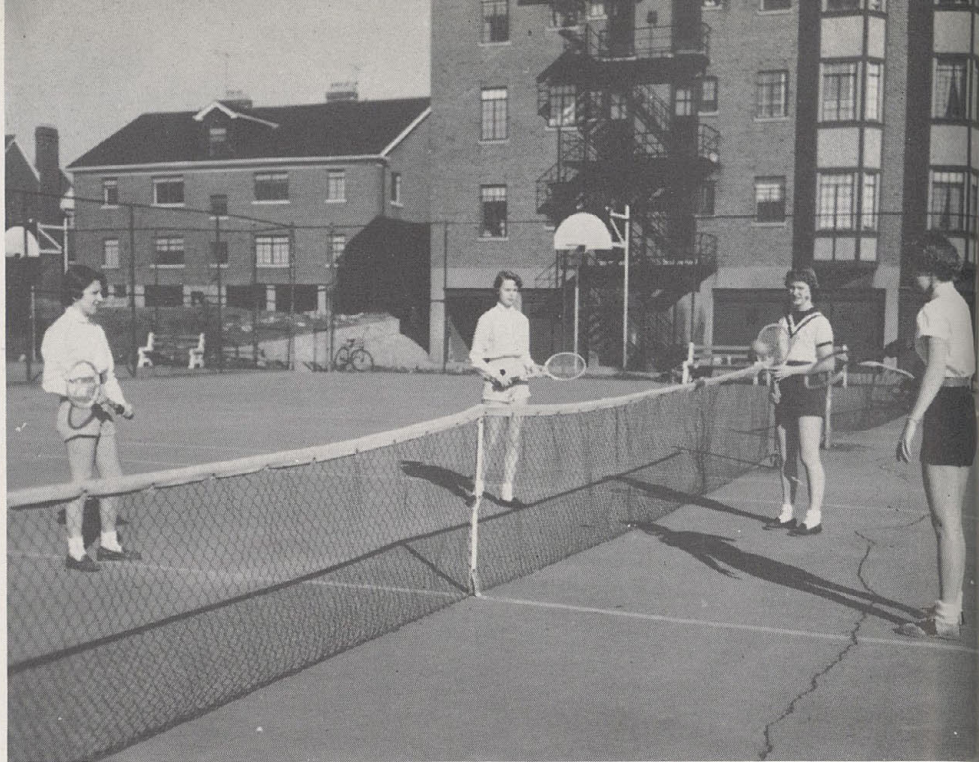


"Courting" Days Are Here Again

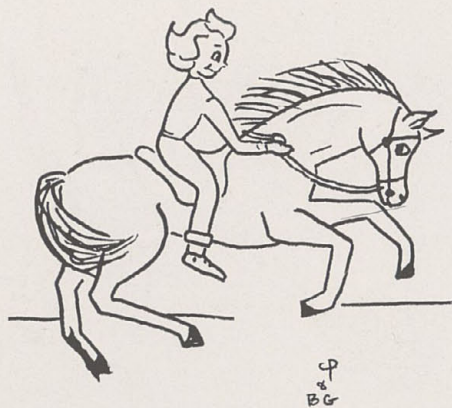
