## Delta Beta

Chi Omega Sigma fraternity was started in 1923 by a minister as a Sunday School group. After functioning for a few years, it was decided to adopt a constitution as a fraternity and become the Alpha Chapter, having its home at Hughes.

At the completion of newly built schools, 1932 saw the beginning of a chapter at Western Hills High School, later another branch at Withrow. This concluded the expanding until a chapter was established at the recently built New Woodward.

Some of the activities in which the club participates are the sending of two underprivileged boys to summer camp, and social events to promote good feeling among its members.

Delta Beta, the oldest fraternity in the city, was founded at Hughes in 1889. As the years progressed, Delta Beta prospered at Hughes. The fraternity also spread to a number of other high schools in the city. Today there are chapters at Wyoming and Walnut Hills High Schools. This year the Hughes Chapter has thirteen members, one senior, eight juniors, and four sophomores.

The fraternity name Delta Beta means much to her members. The boys strive to develop character and a fraternal spirit, and to exert a wholesome influence in school and community life. Thus, the Delta Betas acquire a feeling of true brotherhood, which is the purpose of the fraternity.
