

Delta Chi Delta sorority began in 1924 at Hughes High School through the efforts of a group of girls with high ideals of truth and honesty, loyalty, and friendship. Today with an increased membership the Delts practice the same ideals through such projects as caroling at the County Home, distributing Muscular Dystrophy canisters, and donating to the fund for Thanksgiving baskets.

The sorority's colors, black and gold, and pin of twenty-four pearls can be recognized at all the events in which the members participate. Highlights of the year have been the fall dance, Christmas formal, bake sale, initiating new members, hayride, and Mother and Daughter Tea. In conducting these events, the Delts plan the pattern for their future.

"Lift Every Girl To Her Best" is the theme of Ivyettes. Their purpose is to encourage girls planning for higher education, to stimulate interest groups, to help girls in leadership, development, and community participation and use of leisure time.

In the Spring of 1945, Ivyette Sorority was founded by two sorors of Omicron and Sigma Omega Chapters of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority in the home of the Soror of Sigma Omega, the graduate chapter of A.K.A., who are Ivyette sponsors.

Ivyettes, not a chapter sorority, is composed of 28 girls from Walnut Hills, Withrow, Old Woodward, and Hughes. The two biggest projects of the year are adopting a needy family and the annual Variety Show and Dance. Green and gold are sorority colors.
