In 1950, the Hughes chapter broke away to become independent, thus allowing vacancies for new members. The constitution was then rewritten to limit the number of eligible rushees to be pledged.

Their annual "Mr. Popularity" dance has thus far been a huge success in building up the treasury and in providing a friendly competitive spirit in other sororities.

Blue and gold beanies along with matching emblomed sweat shirts are worn regularly by active Phi Sig members. Still another aspect of Phi Sigma Delta's specialness is the tradition of giving jewelry to the graduating class.
