The aim of the Hughes art department is to help students better understand and appreciate fine art and to be creative themselves. The art department faculty consists of four very capable teachers, Mr. John Michael, Miss Marcella Schroth, Miss Frances Adomeit, and Mr. Paul Craft. Mr. Craft, who began teaching at Hughes this year, is a well-known Cincinnati water-color artist. His fine works have been exhibited locally numerous times. Each Christmas the art department combines to decorate the building. Featured this year were three-dimensional letters wishing the school a "Merry Christmas" and a huge papier-mache Santa Claus, which was constructed by two art students. The lovely stage decorations can be credited to Miss Marcella Schroth who is also in charge of designing the sets for such Hughes productions as the Merry-Go-Round and the two plays. The programs and posters for these productions are a job well-done by Mr. Michael who is also in charge of the permanent art exhibition opposite the library. The entire art faculty cooperates in the selection of works of merit to be entered in the annual Scholastic exhibition which is held each year at Shillito's.

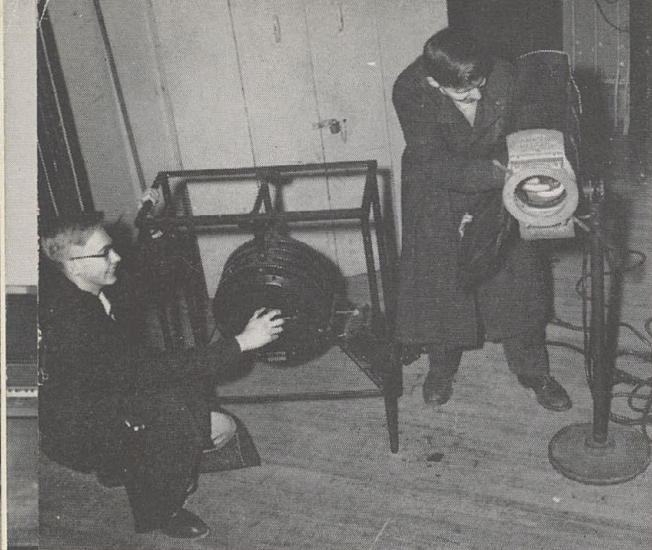

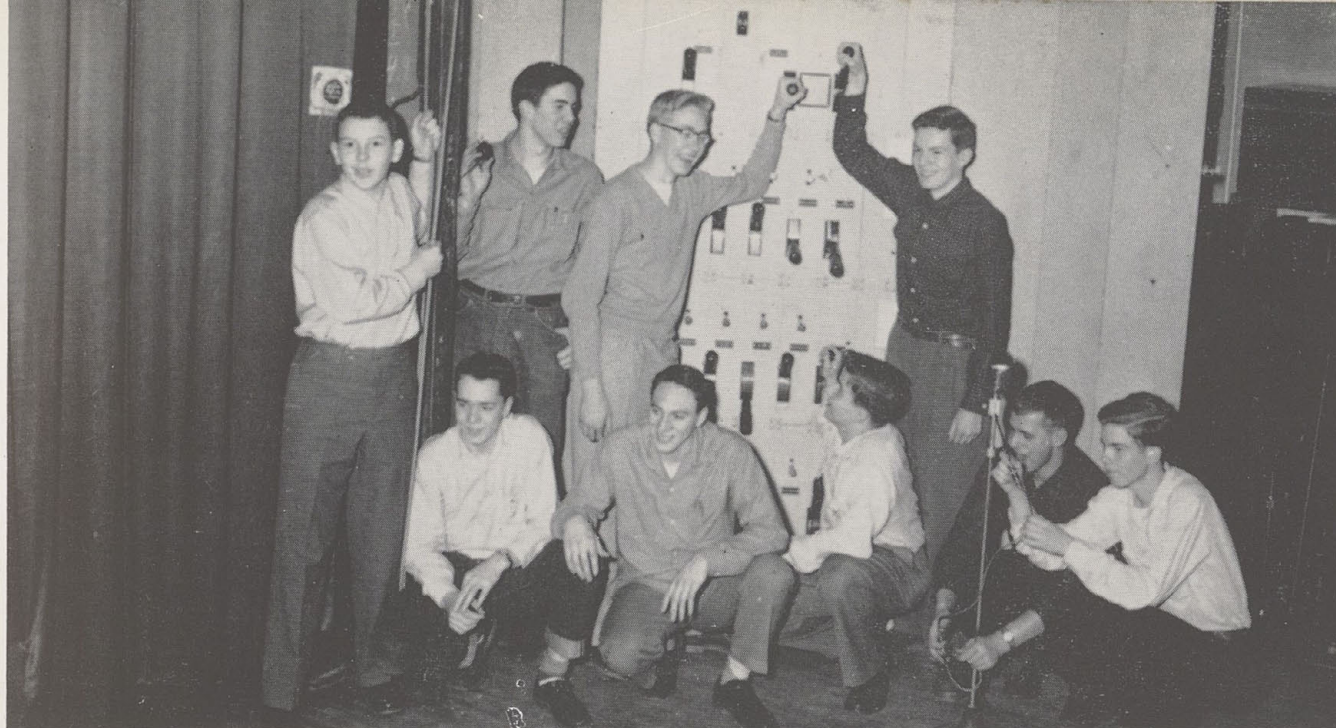

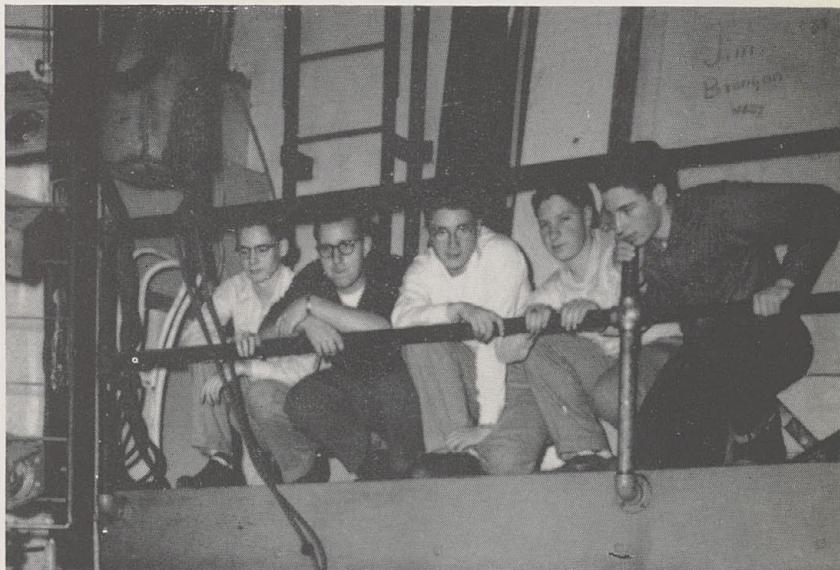

This year marked the sixth performance in the history of the Hughes *Merry-Go-Round*. For five of these six years the script has been written by gifted Hughes graduate and teacher, Mr. Robert Portune. Besides writing *Merry-Go-Round* scripts Mr. Portune has contributed his literary talents to several University of Cincinnati presentations, among these *Scamp of the Campus*, *Khaki Wacky*, and *Quiet Please*. This year he also provided the script for the Walnut Hills High School production, the *Walnuts*. The rewriting of *Red Mill* for the Evansville Opera Company may also be credited to Mr. Portune.

This year's *Merry-Go-Round* was set in the Sunset Valley Hotel which is presided over by Mr. and Mrs. Humphrey Higgins, portrayed by Tom Minnich and Martha Runck. Norma May as Gracie, a snake-loving scullery maid, "brought the house down" by merely appearing on stage. The sarcasm of Winnie, Beverly Bates in everyday life, and the antics of Peg Pounds, who played the part of the stage-struck Southern belle, Dixie, were high points in the *Merry-Go-Round*.

The *Merry-Go-Round* boasted three separate chorus lines, all of which were directed by Miss Virginia Garrett. The short and tall pony choruses and the tap chorus interrupted the action often enough to provide even more pleasure for the audience.

Other characters in the *Merry-Go-Round* included Sandra Wulff and Jim Dietz as the two beautiful but obnoxiously conceited specimens of the human race, Shelley Summers and Apollo Casanova. Dick Junker in the part of Sour-dough Johnny, an ancient uranium prospector, and Ed Crawford as the rabbit-like Dr. Ellsworth Pennywhistle further enhanced the riotously funny plot.

Students taking part in the *Merry-Go-Round* gave their time after school almost every day for two months in order to perfect their roles. Rehearsals in the morning before school often made it necessary for the actors and actresses to be at school at seven-thirty.

Bert Bramkamp in the role of the wealthy Mrs. Smedley O. Smedley, Frank Hermann as Smedley's German Director Van Schlacter, and Bill Thompson as the precacious juvenile delinquent, Courtney, did their parts to bring the counter-plots and plots together for a happy ending.

Mr. Herman Slayman's delightful musical arrangements and the orchestra under his direction provided a fitting musical background for "Shoot the Works". The intricate backdrops were designed and executed under the direction of Miss Marcella Schroth.

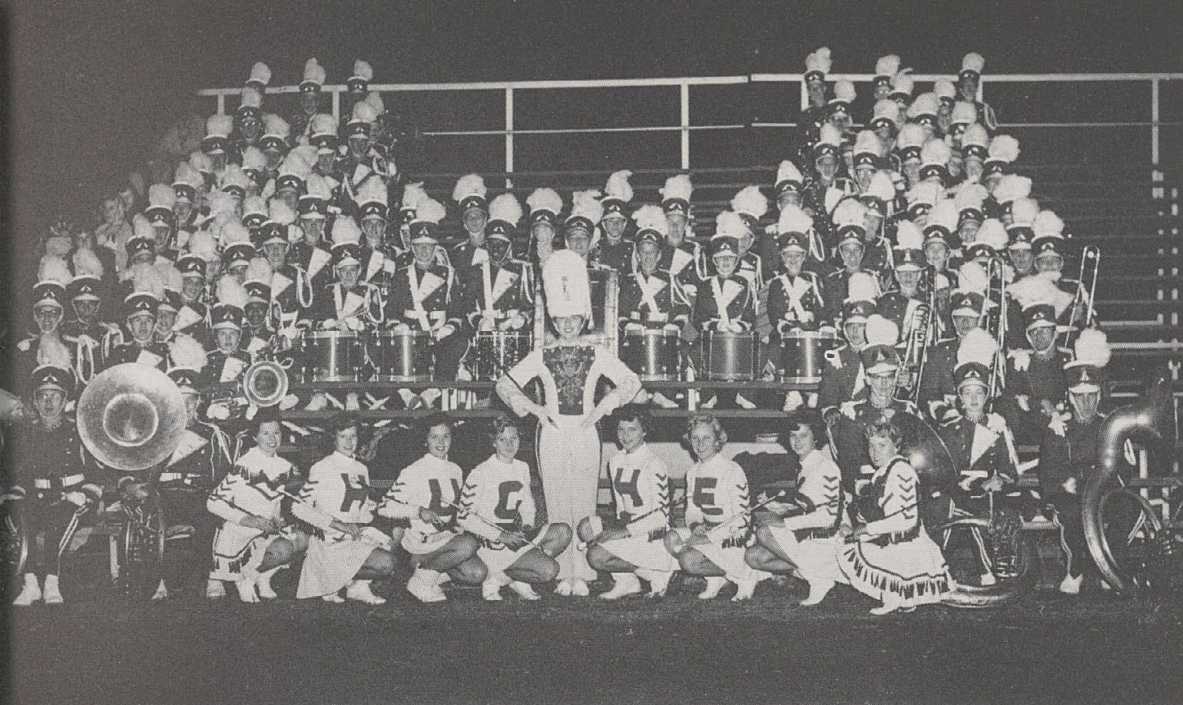

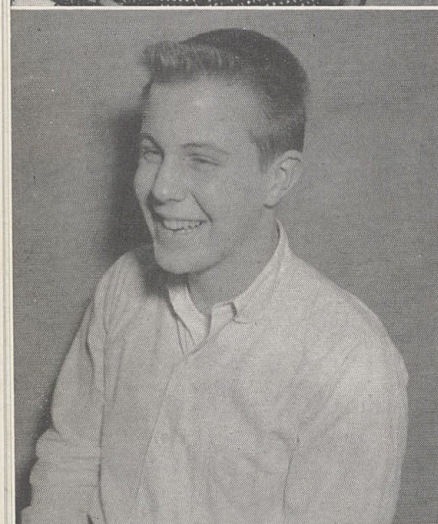

The athletic teams at Hughes are not the only ones who bring home honors. Students have a right to be proud of their weekly newspaper, the *Gargoyle*, a paper that's proud of meeting its deadline. For the past two years the *Gargoyle* has received the top ranking as Medalist Class in the Scholastic Press Association of Columbia University contest. The Columbia Medalist award is presented to those papers whose overall makeup and publication procedure rank them as an outstanding student activity. The *Gargoyle* was awarded Medalist, a top award in a class of 1400 other student publications. For the first time in 30 years the *Gargoyle* received the exclusive All-Columbian award for creative writing.

Reporters from the *Gargoyle* have been hired as correspondents for "Dateline," a teenage column in *Good Housekeeping*, for which they received a regular correspondent's salary.

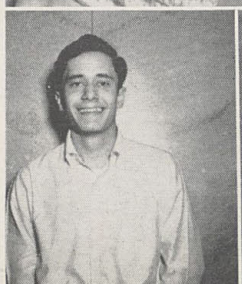

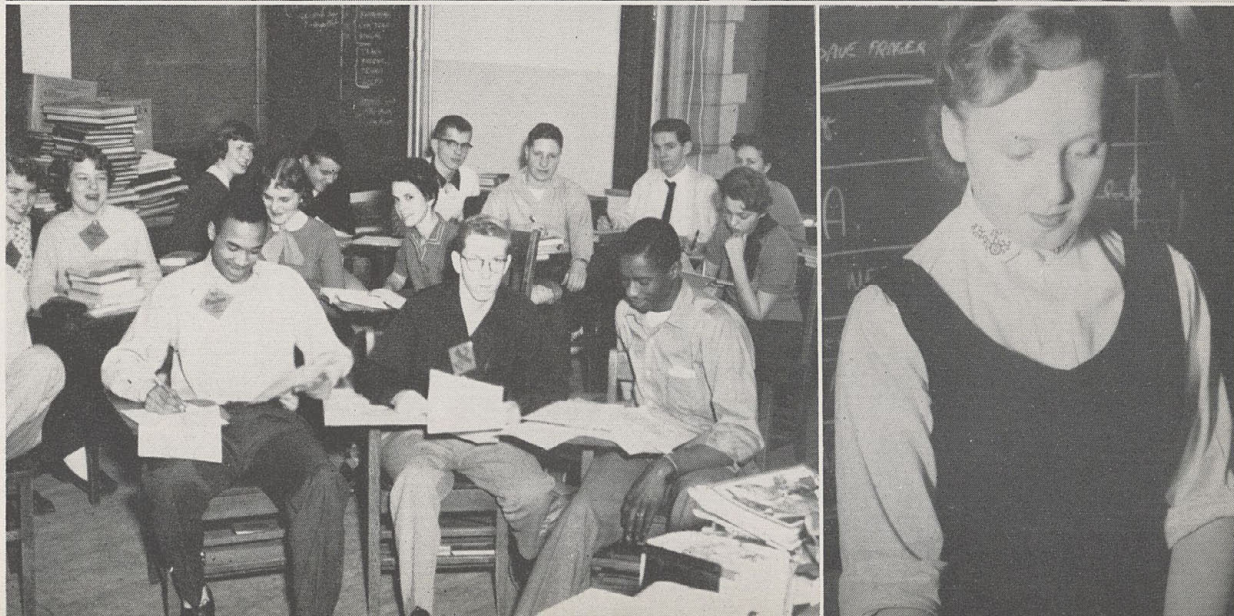

Time and ingenuity are combined to make the *Gargoyle* a record of the school's life.



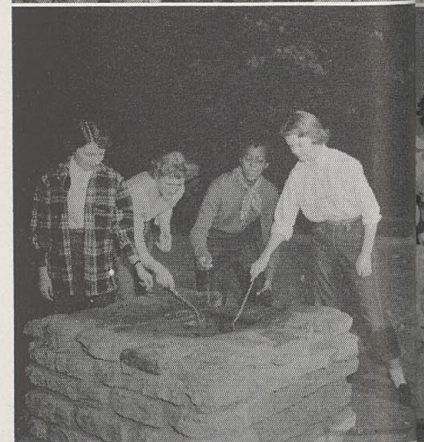

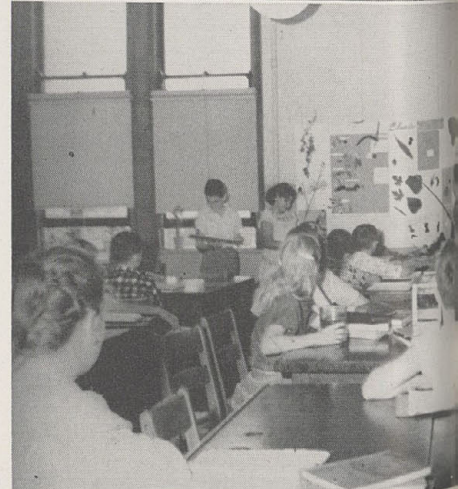
the various branches of the Disciples of Christ.

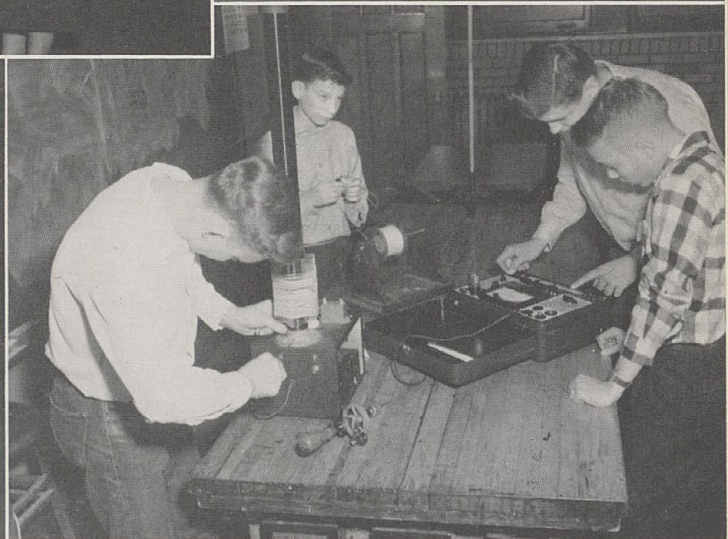

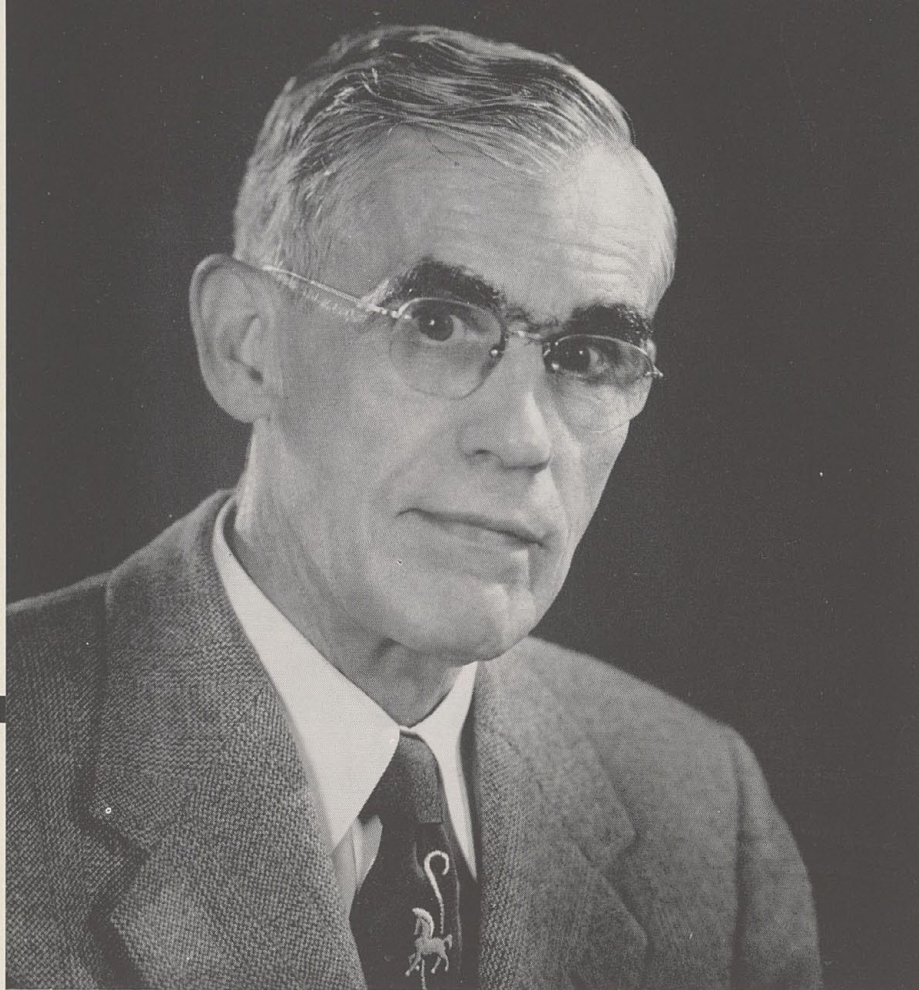

You are about to pass through an Open Door into a building not made with hands, the architect and maker of which has planned for you a mansion of many rooms.

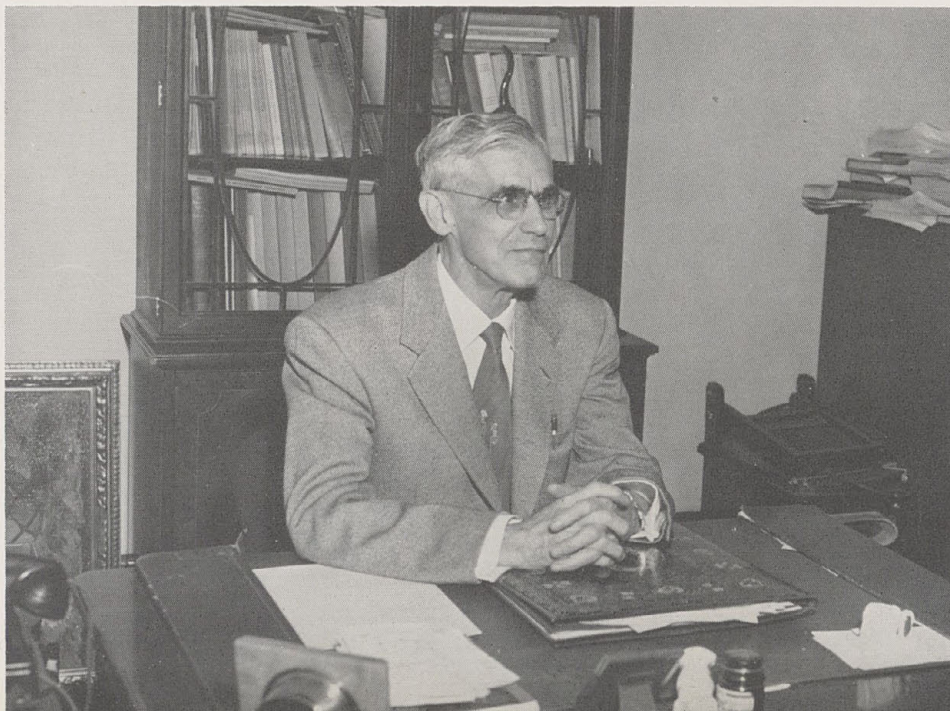

Your ambitions to succeed seem assured. You faint not because the room seems filled with promise.

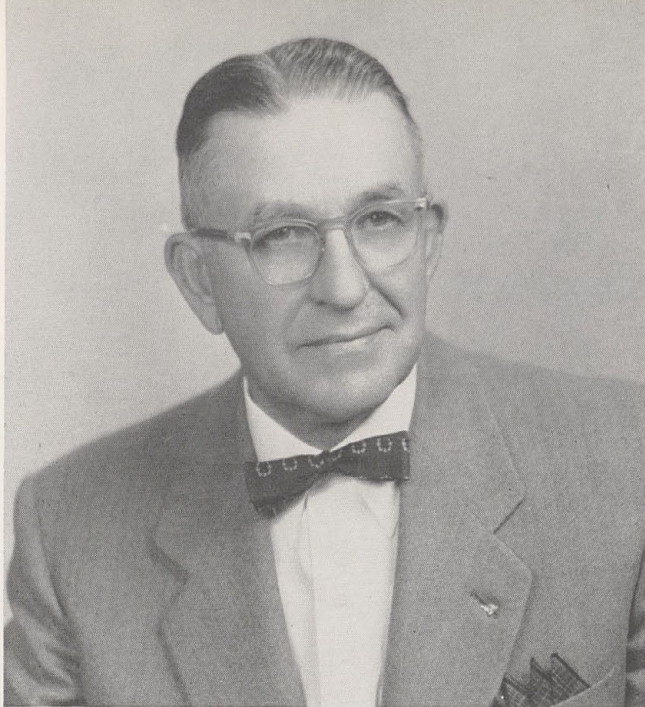

Each year the Hughes Bands send representatives to the musical competition at Oxford, Ohio. Students have returned with numerous honors, increasing the distinction associated with this department.

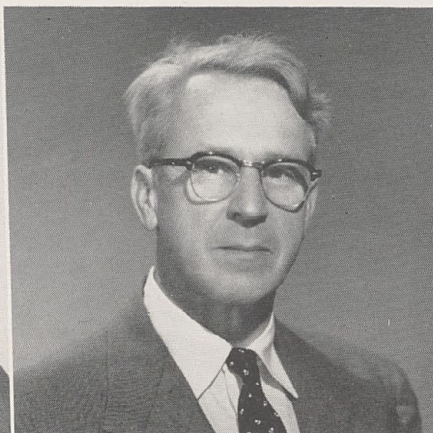

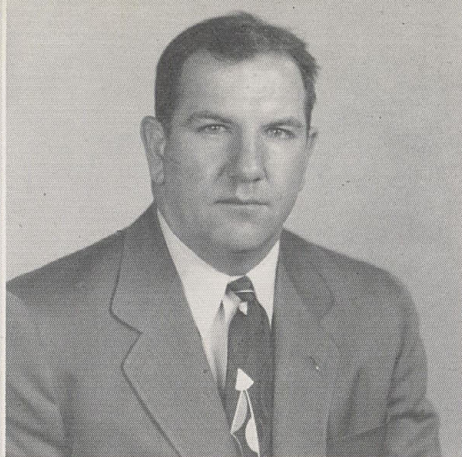
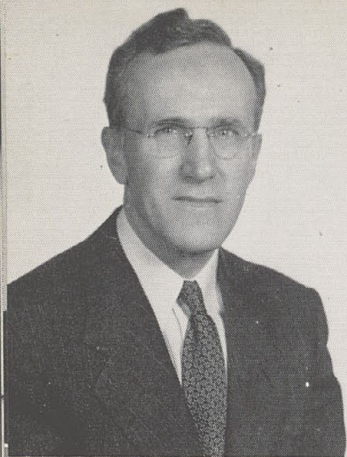
In 1924, John Dempsey, President of the Hughes' Alumni Association, appointed a committee to devise a suitable memorial for Clara B. Jordan, a former Hughes Latin teacher. Charles M. Merry, principal at the time, received the committee's report, which designated the decorating of a library with a beautiful central window. 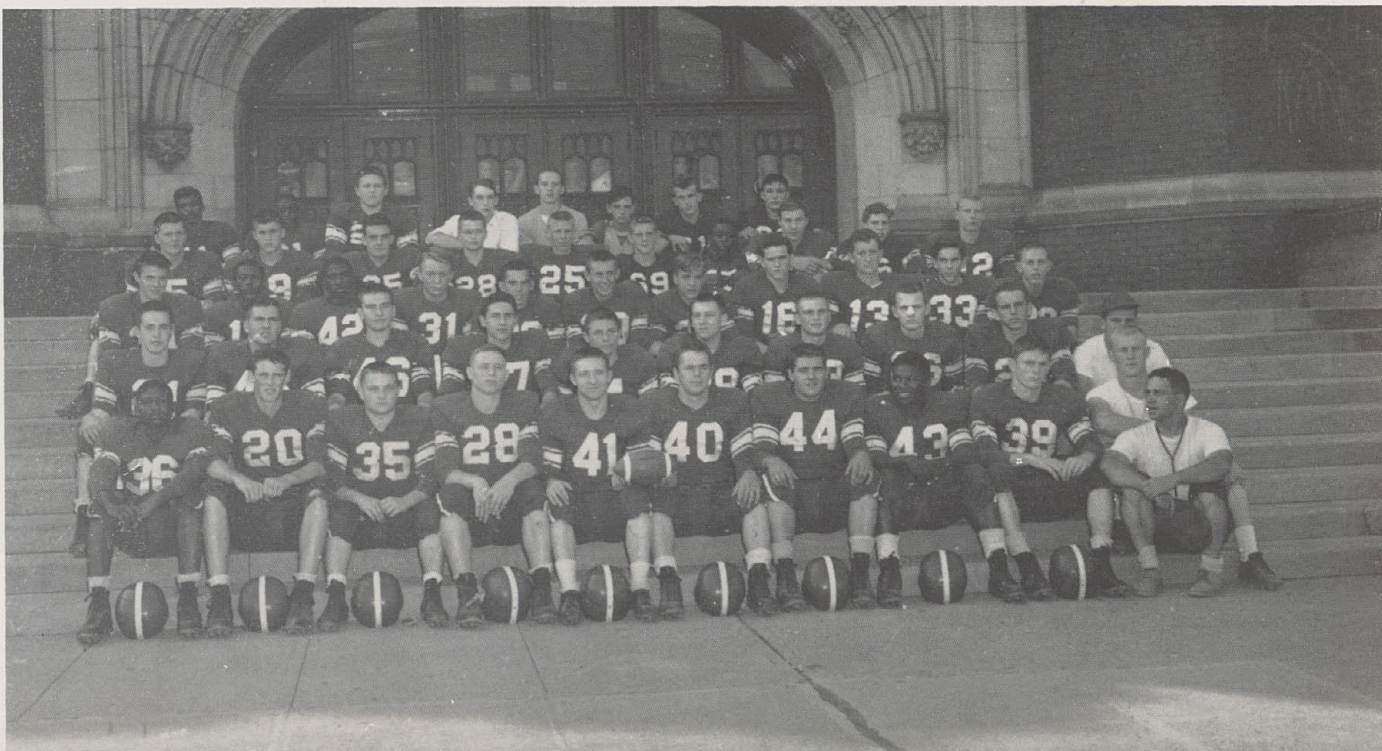

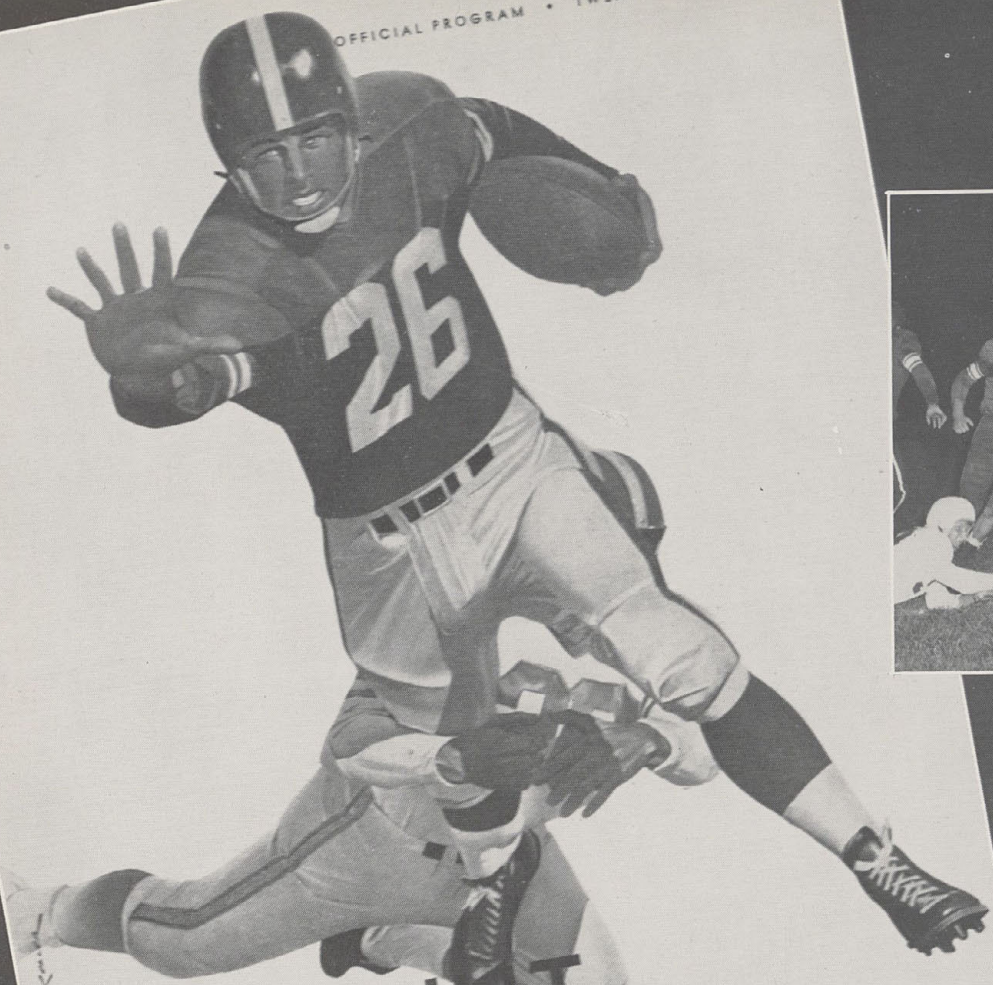

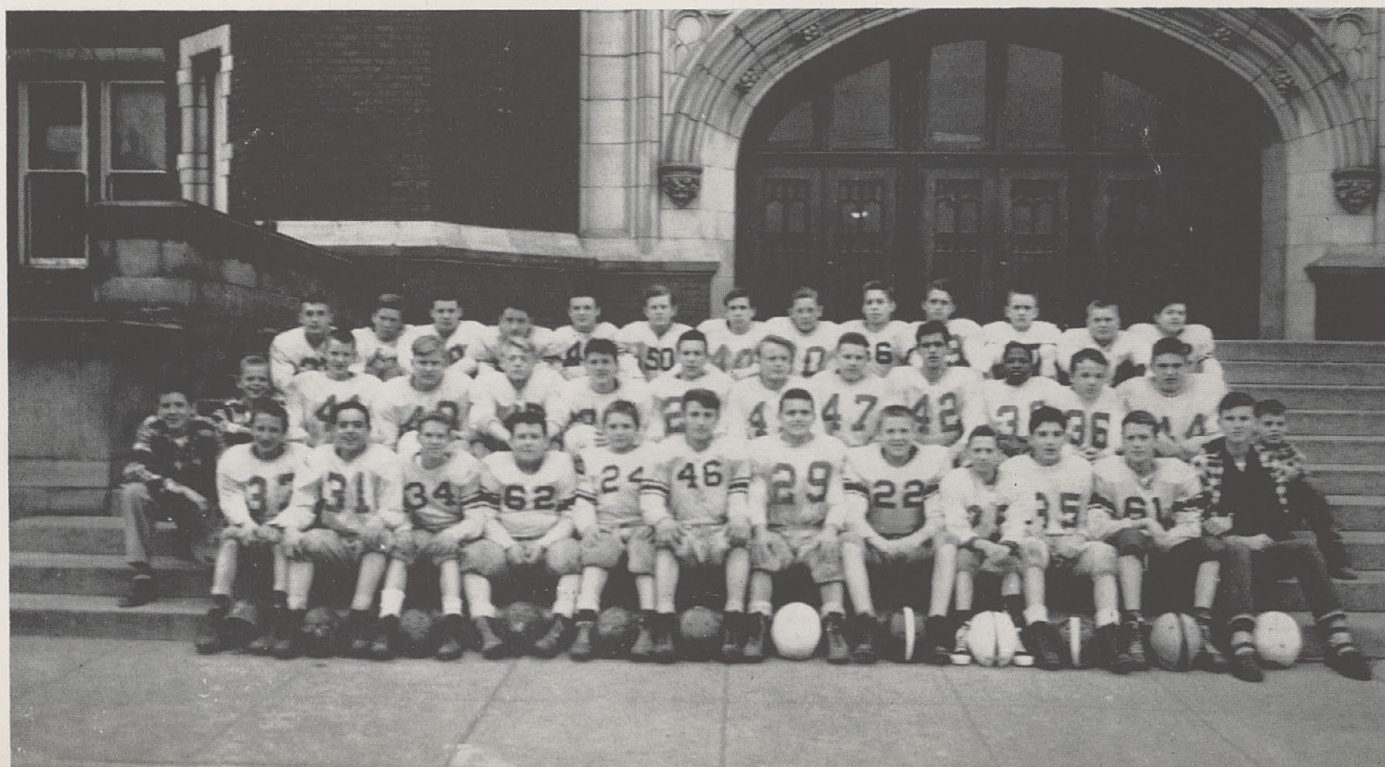
The Hughes defense proved invulnerable for three periods, but fell apart in the fourth as Central made two quick T.D.'s.

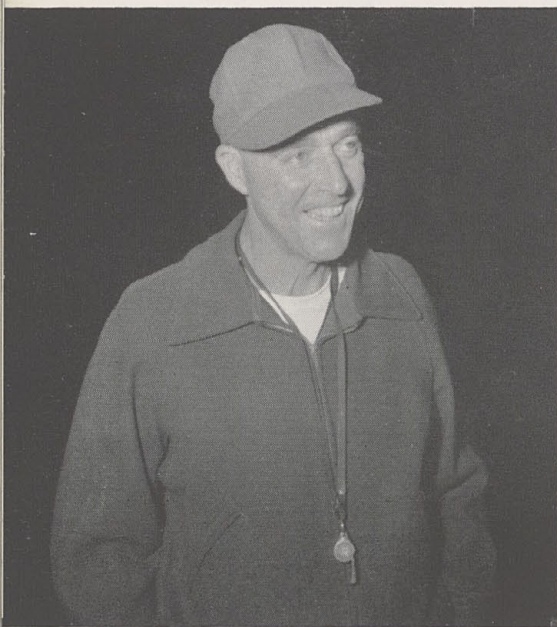
Withrow's only bright spot was an electrifying 86-yard run by Alan Manzlar.

Hughes Harriers won the P.H.S.L. and District titles and placed sixth in the State. Hard work, good coaching, and a desire to win brought success to the team.

Cross Country is a sport in which a lot of confidence and endurance is needed. The races are two miles long and are usually run at Avon Field. There are seven boys on a team, and all boys from all teams run at the same time.

Scoring is made by places of the runners. First place is one point; second place, two points; and so on. The first five boys from each team take a place. The team with the lowest total is the winner.

Hughes won all three meets to take the P.H.S.L. title. The team total was 29 for the first meet, in which Errol Bradford, Bill Whitaker, Bill Edwards, Neal Tidwell, and Ray Apple took second, fifth, sixth, seventh, and ninth places respectively.

The second meet was even lower with a total of 24. Bill Edwards won, with Bill Whitaker, fourth; Errol Bradford, fifth; Ron Walker, sixth; and Neil Tidwell, eighth.

A 25 total for the third meet was provided by a first place by Errol Bradford, followed by third, fifth, sixth, and tenth places by Bill Edwards, Bill Whitaker, Neil Tidwell, and Ron Walker in that order. The three-meet total for Hughes was 78, followed by Central's 189 and third-place Walnut Hills' 257.

Eleven teams took the field in the district meet, with Hughes winning by a wide margin. # Winners of District, Regional, and P.H.S.L.

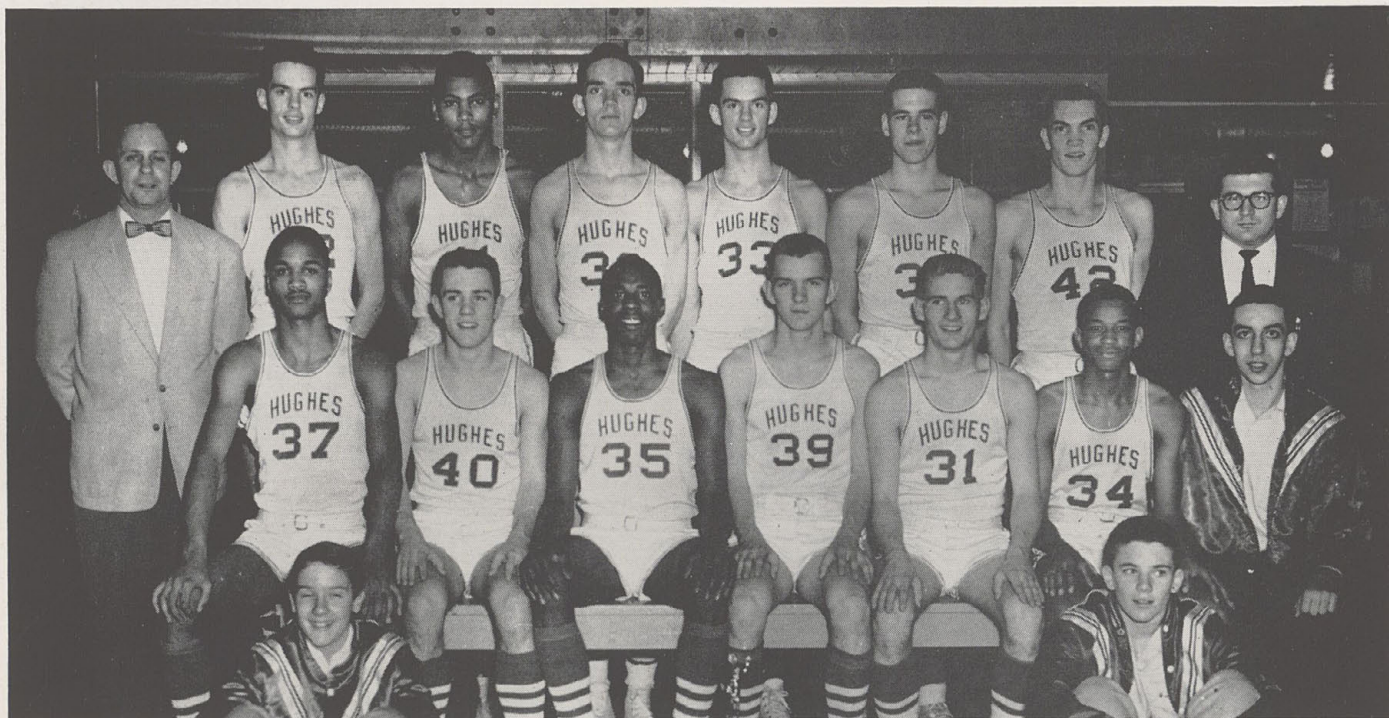

a winning percentage of 93. The three juniors who played a big role were Ray Apple, Ron Blackstone, and Jim Grimes.

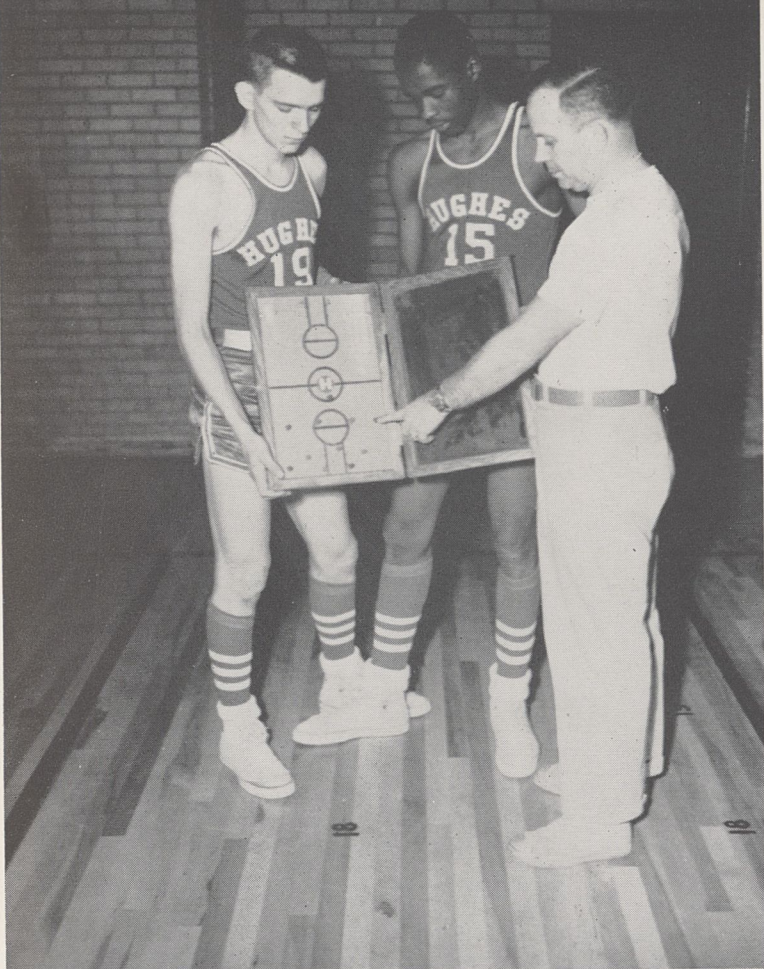

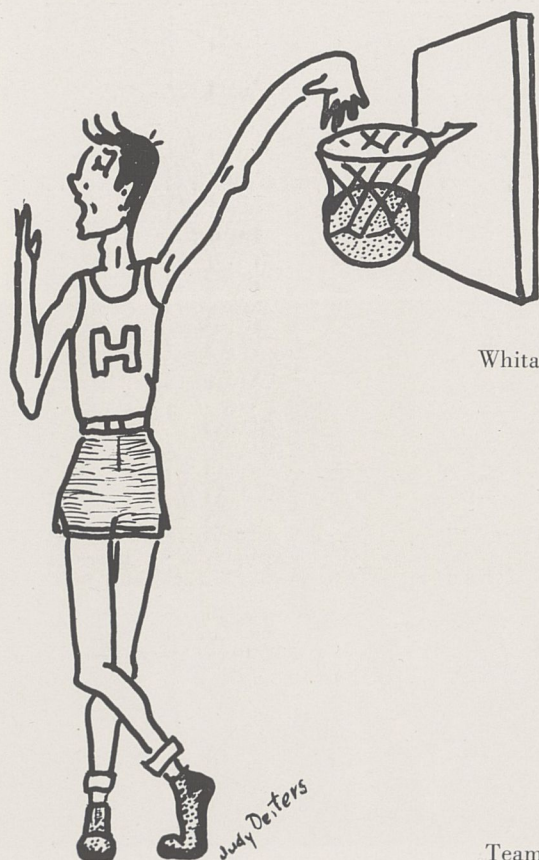

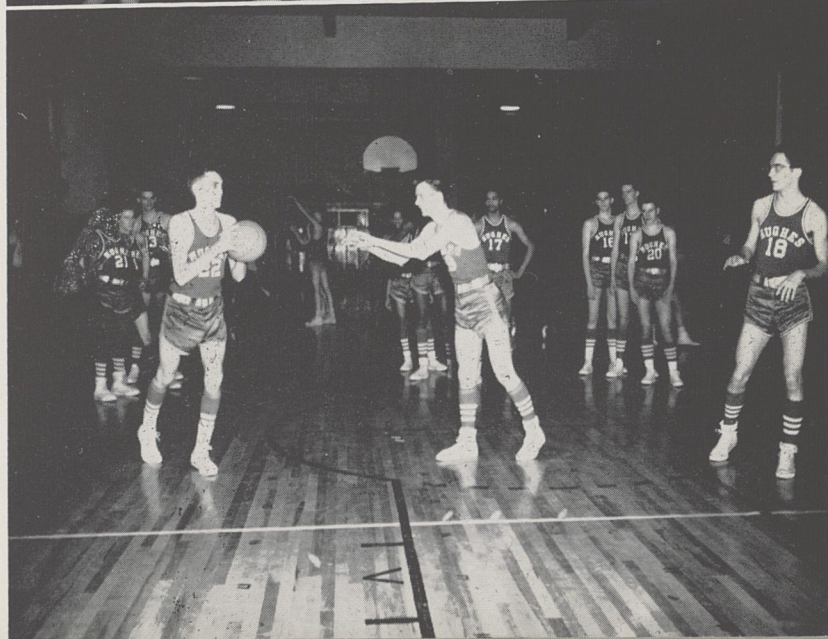




Coach Grimes plans strategy with Co-Captains Whitaker and Edwards.

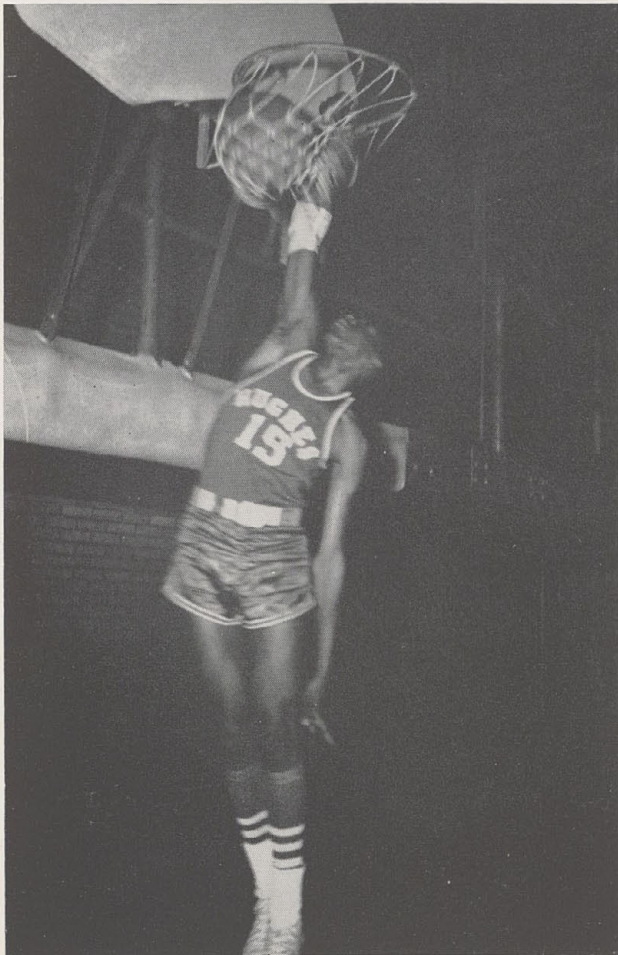

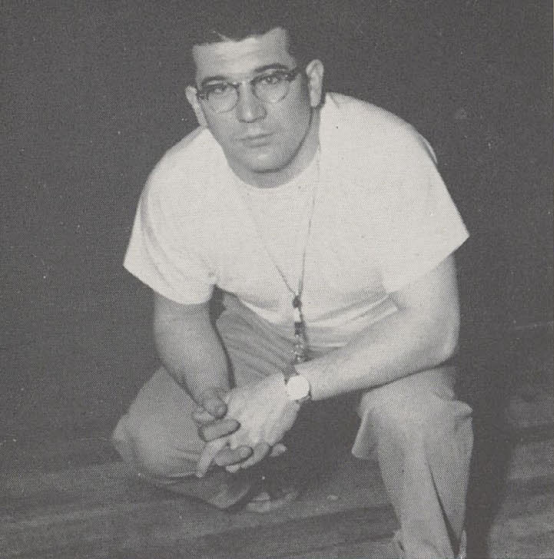

Coach Lloyd Williams, in his initial appearance at Hughes, surely showed a great asset for the coaching of the future "Big Reds."



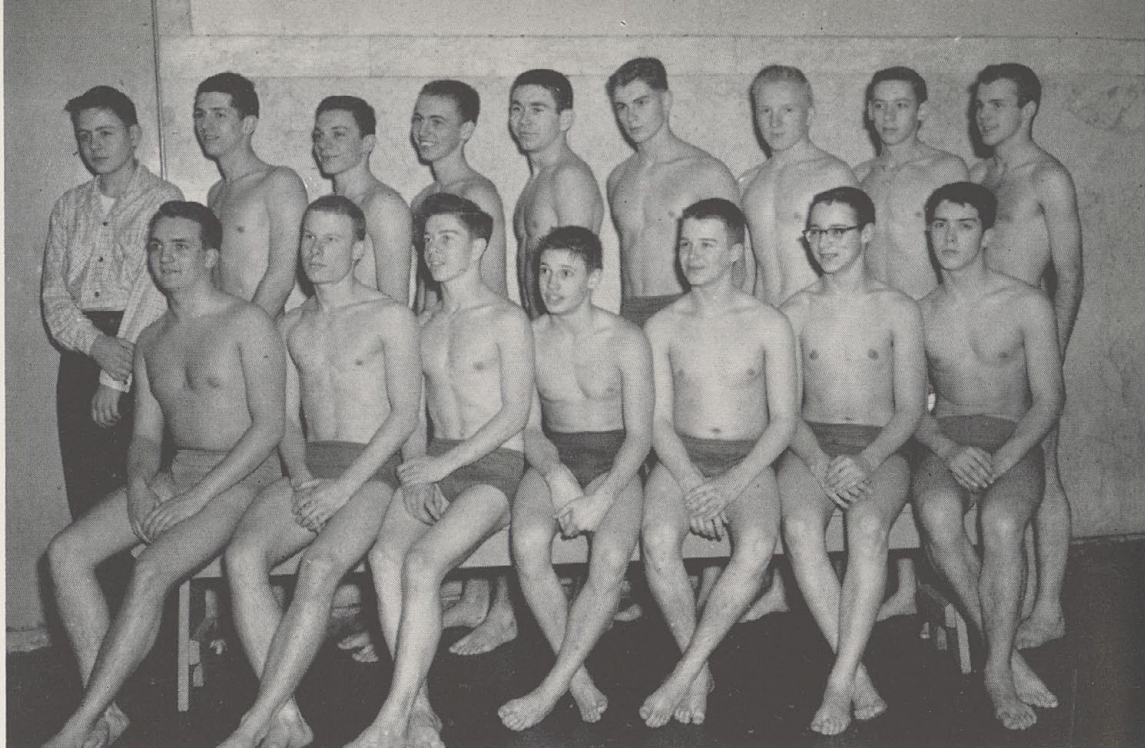

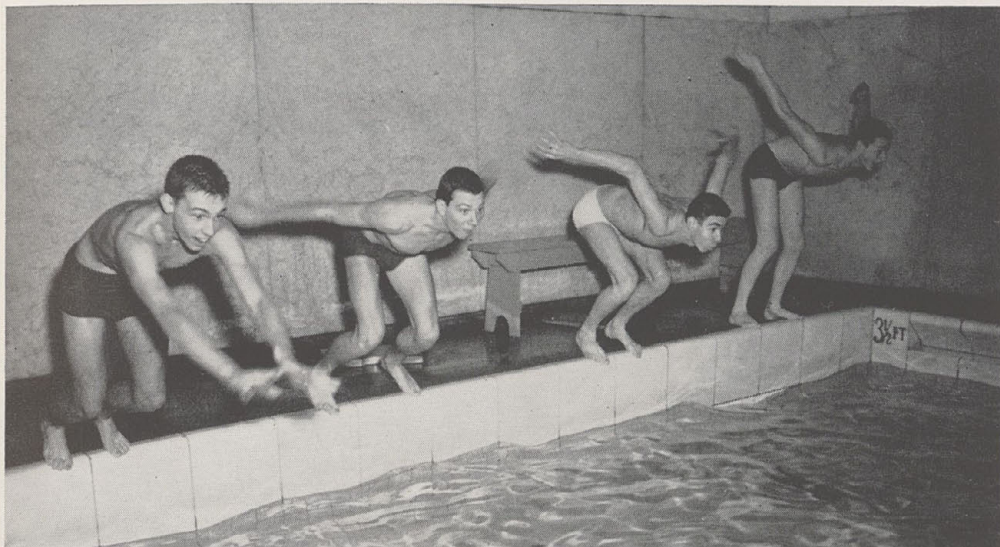

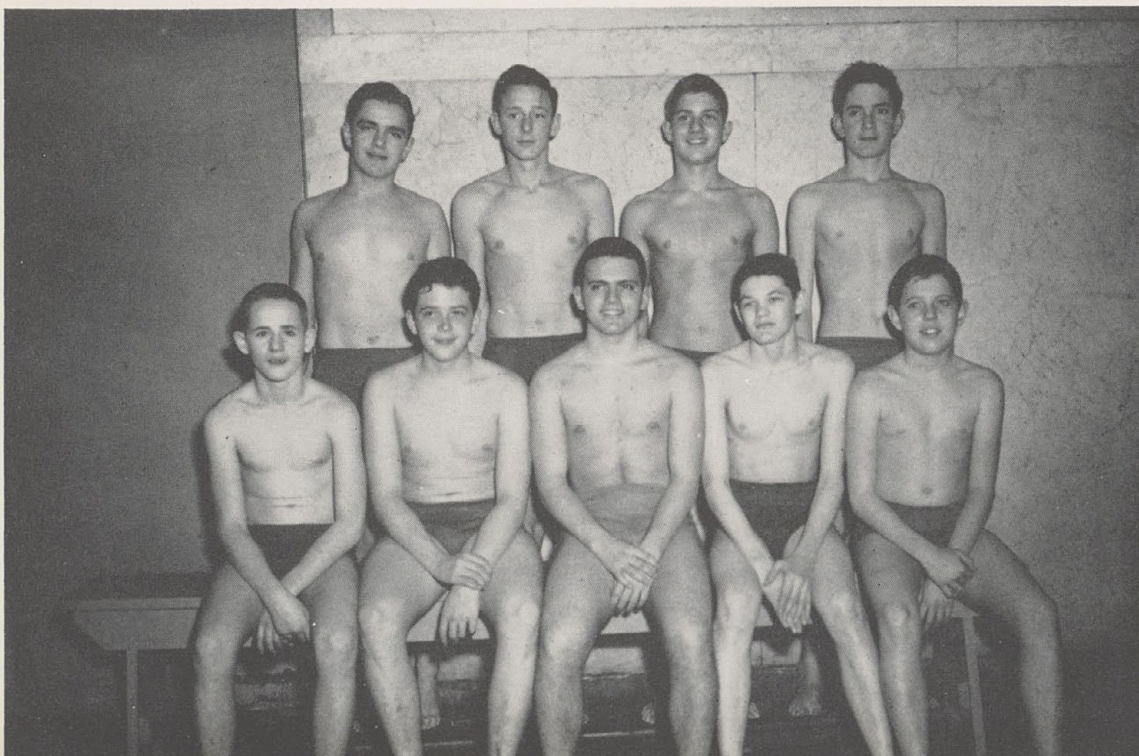
style, 50-yd. free-style, and 150-yd. individual. The 150-yd. medley took fourth place while the 200-yd. senior relay placed third.

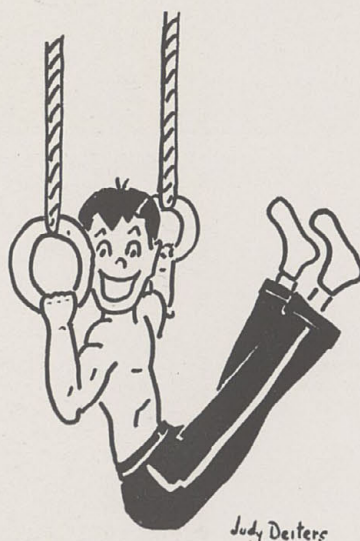

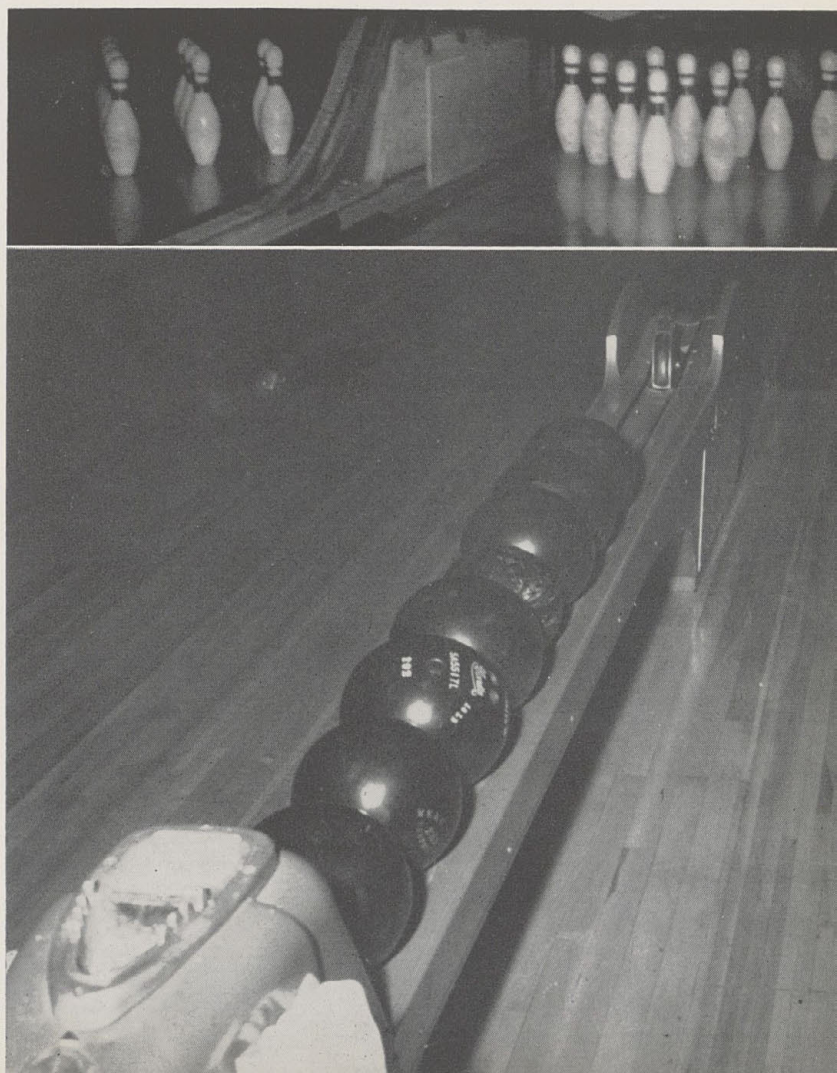

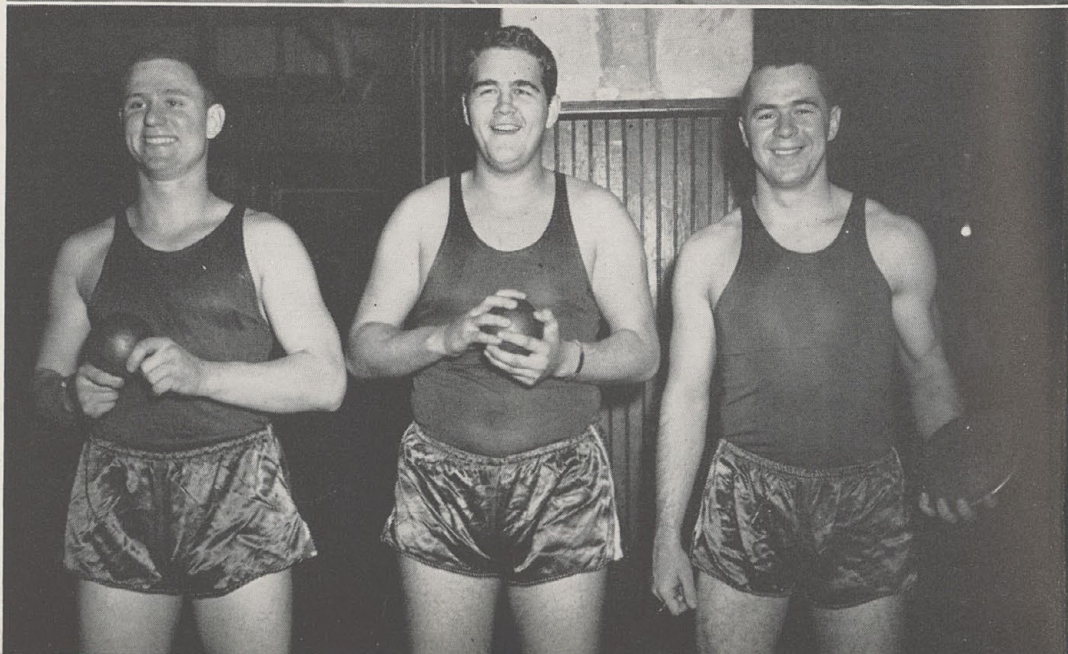

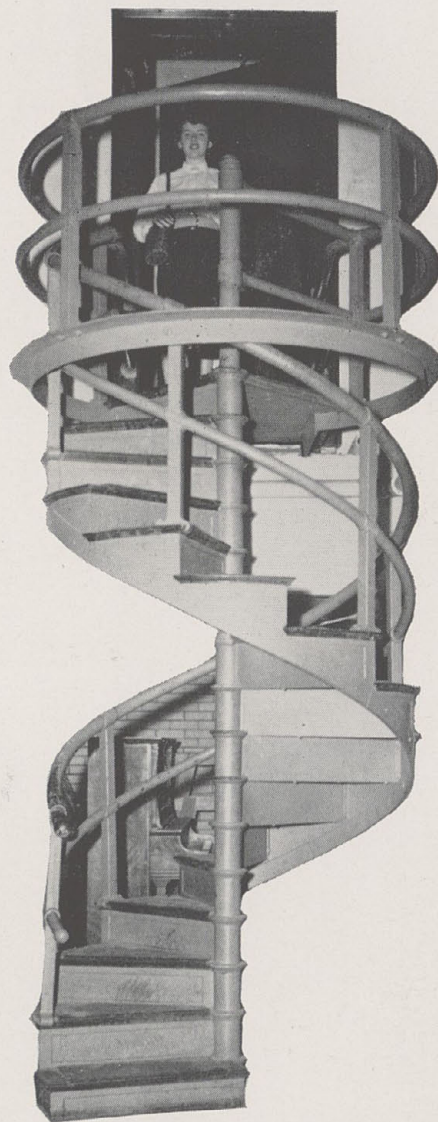

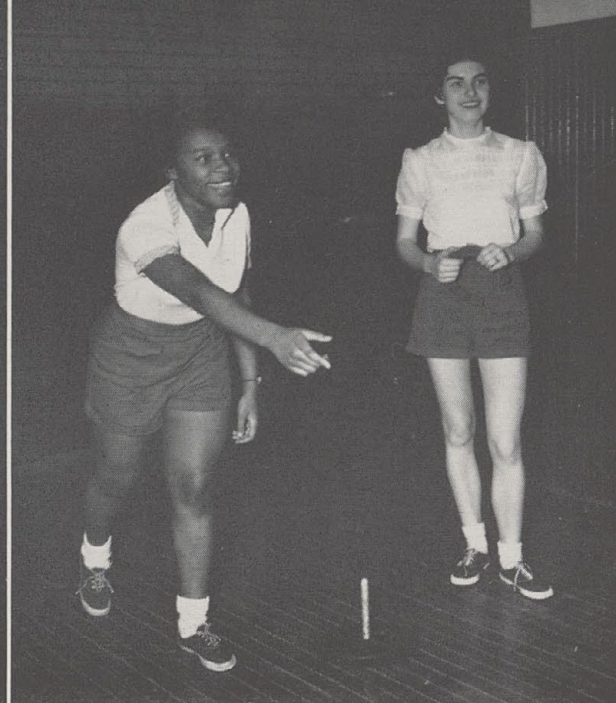

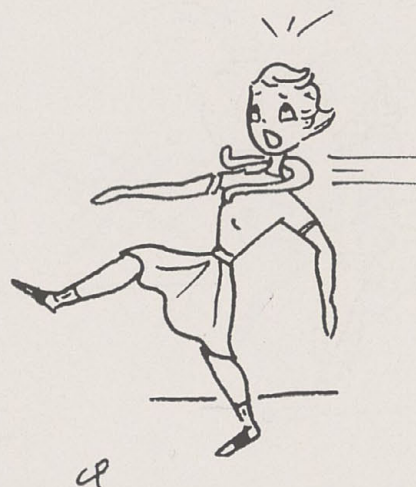
## Individual Sports Offer Variety, Relaxation

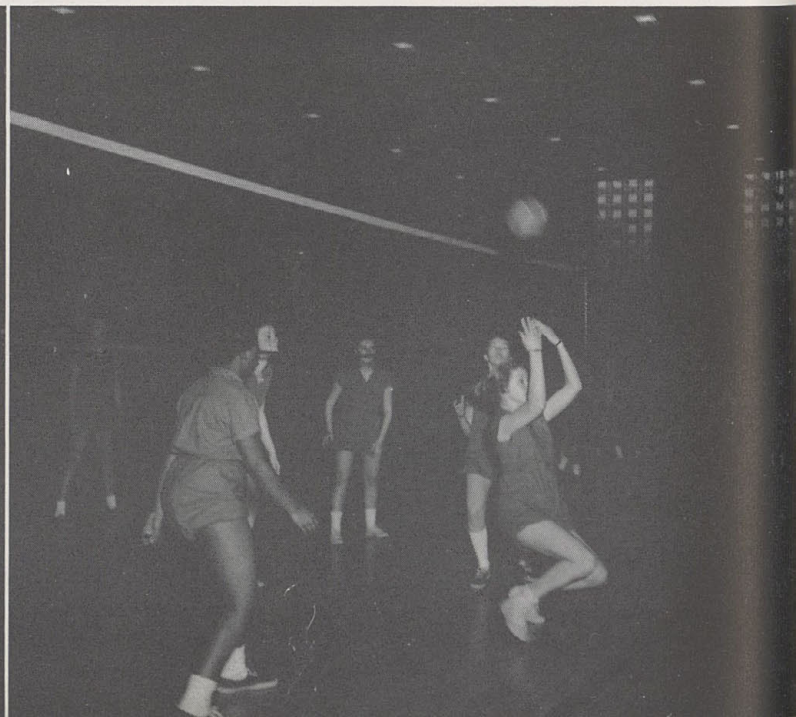
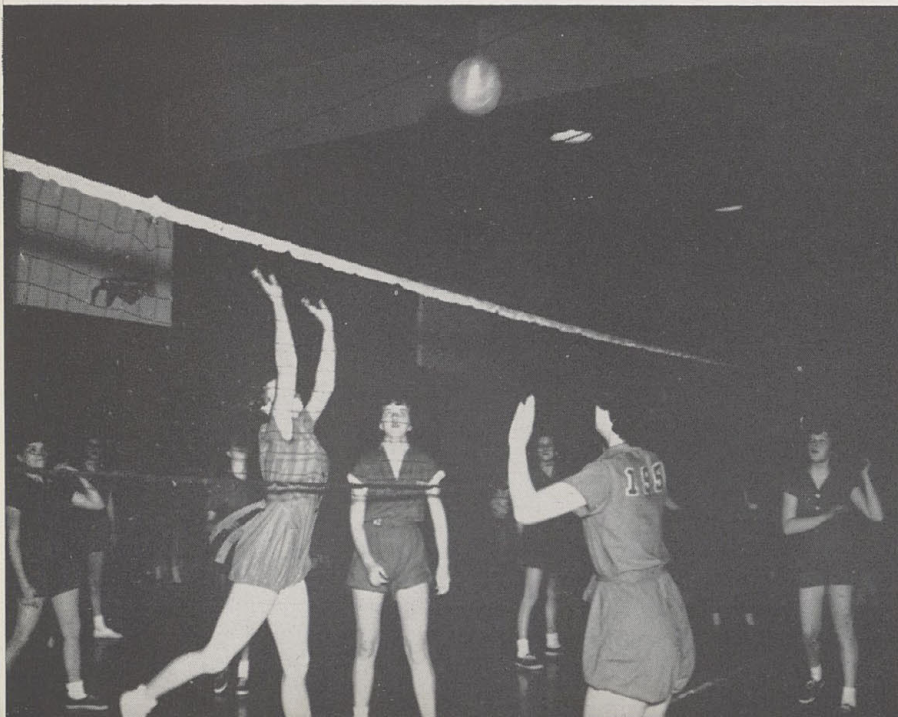

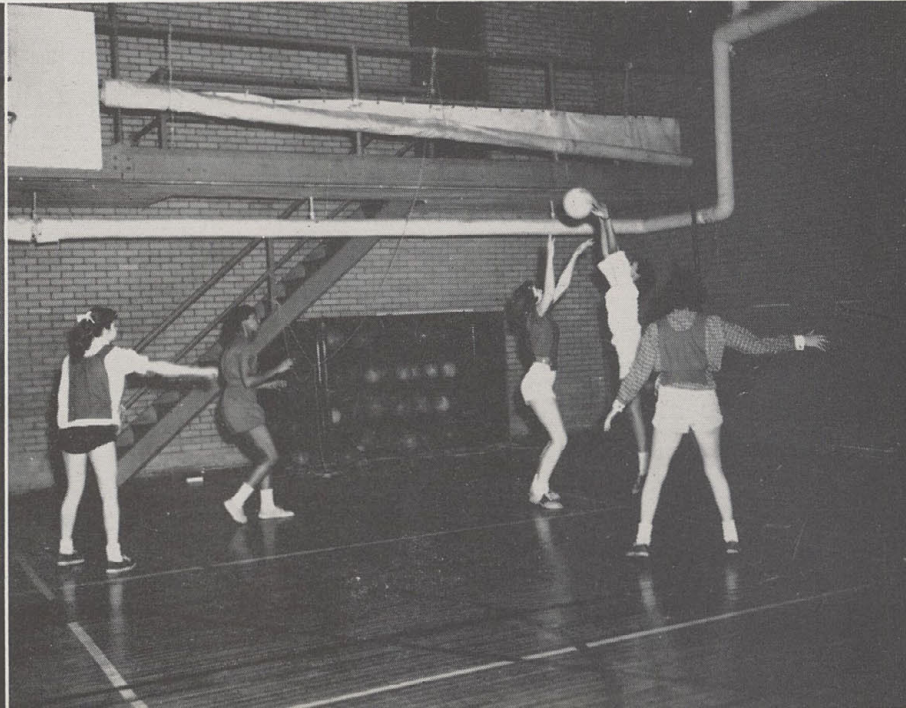
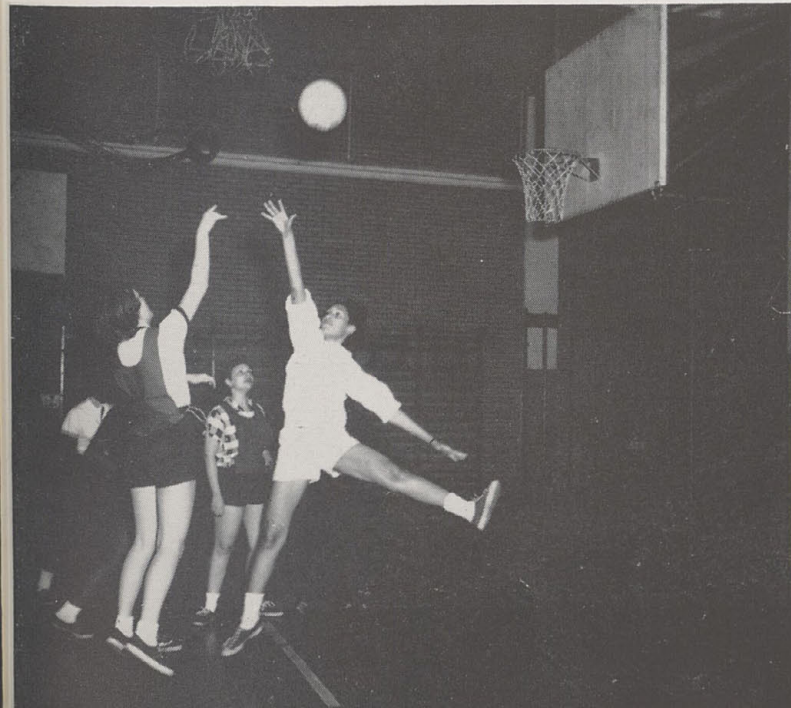
The annual game with Western Hills constitutes a friendly rivalry; and, although the results were not available at the time the Annual was printed, the girls from Hughes looked forward to a victory.

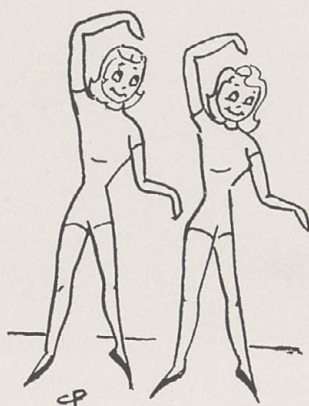

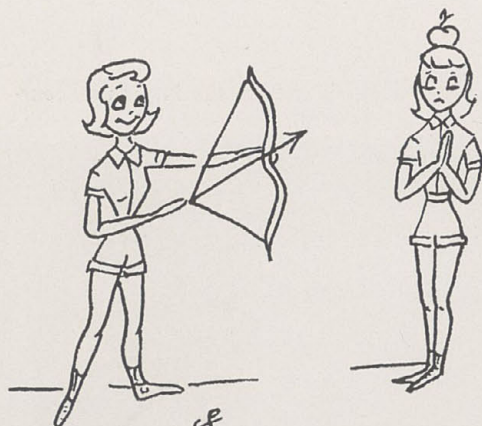

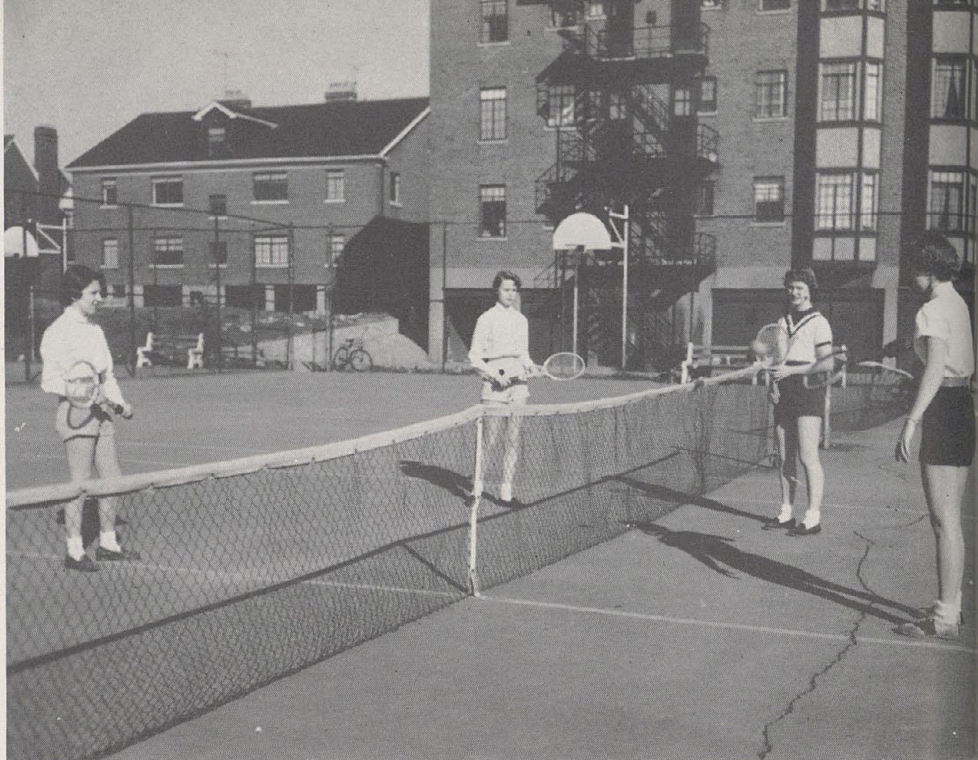

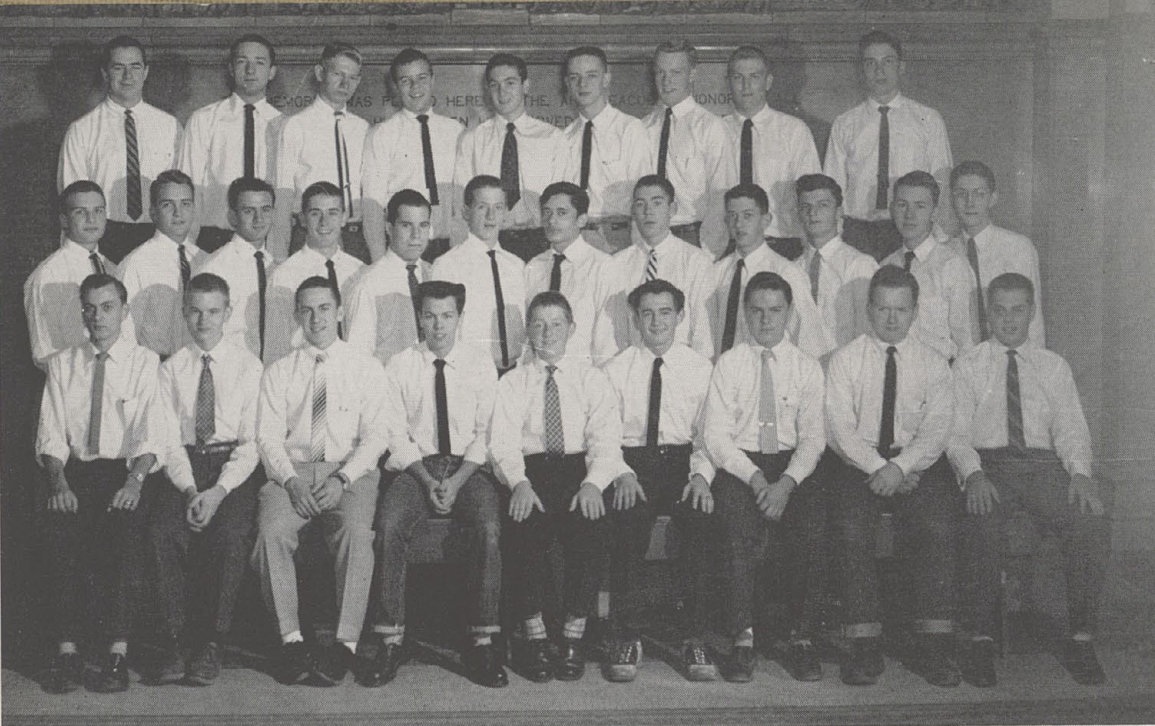

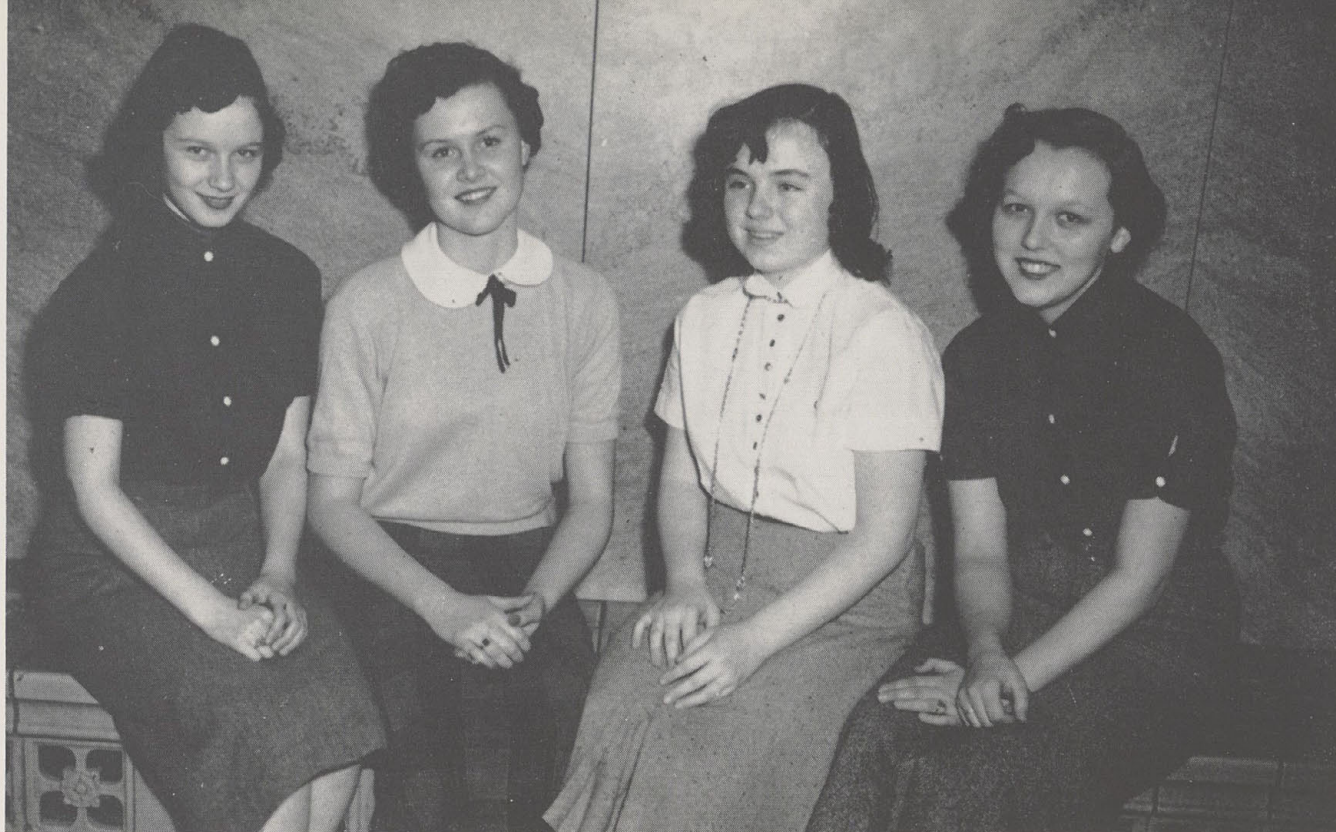

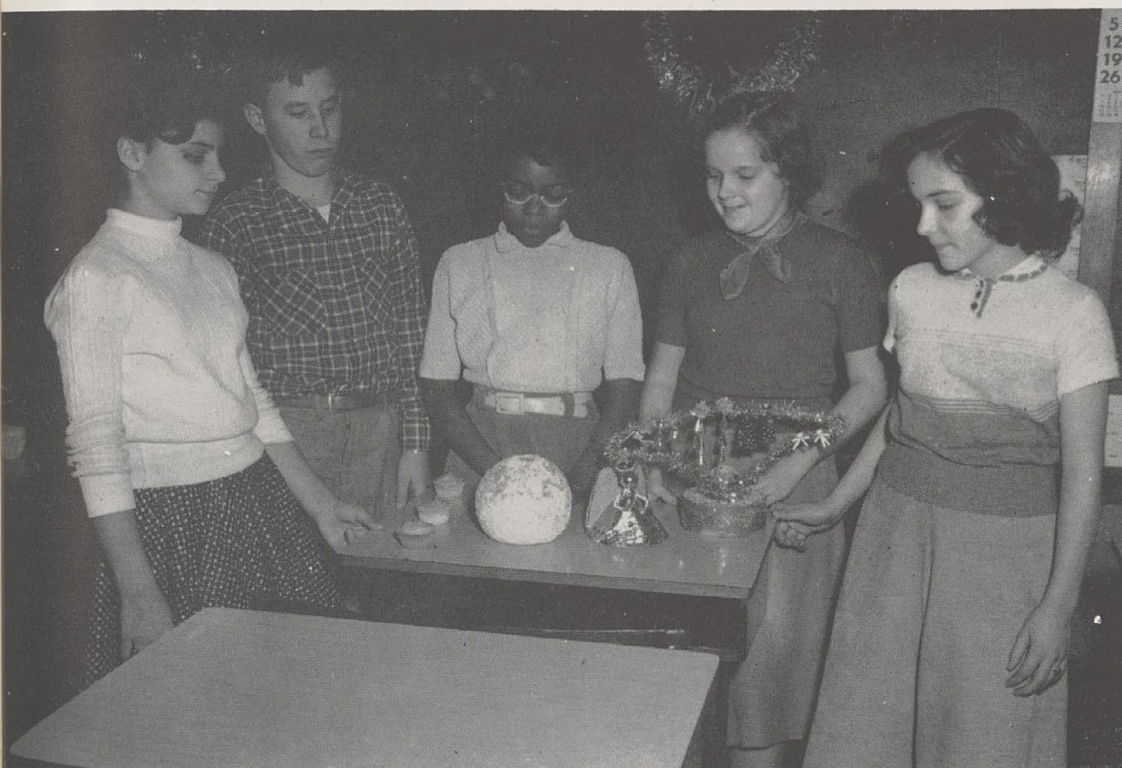
The Junior Science Club was started in December of 1953, the first year for the seventh and eighth-graders at Hughes.
