

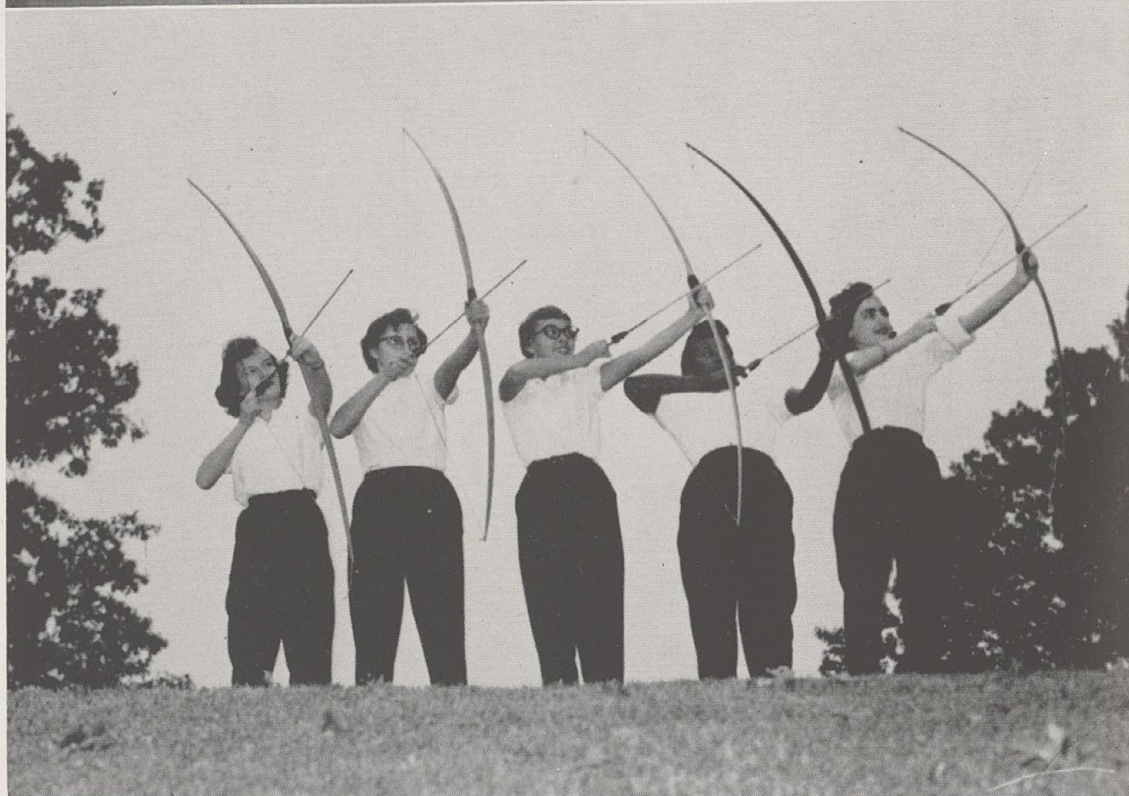
## Modern dancing interprets moods
