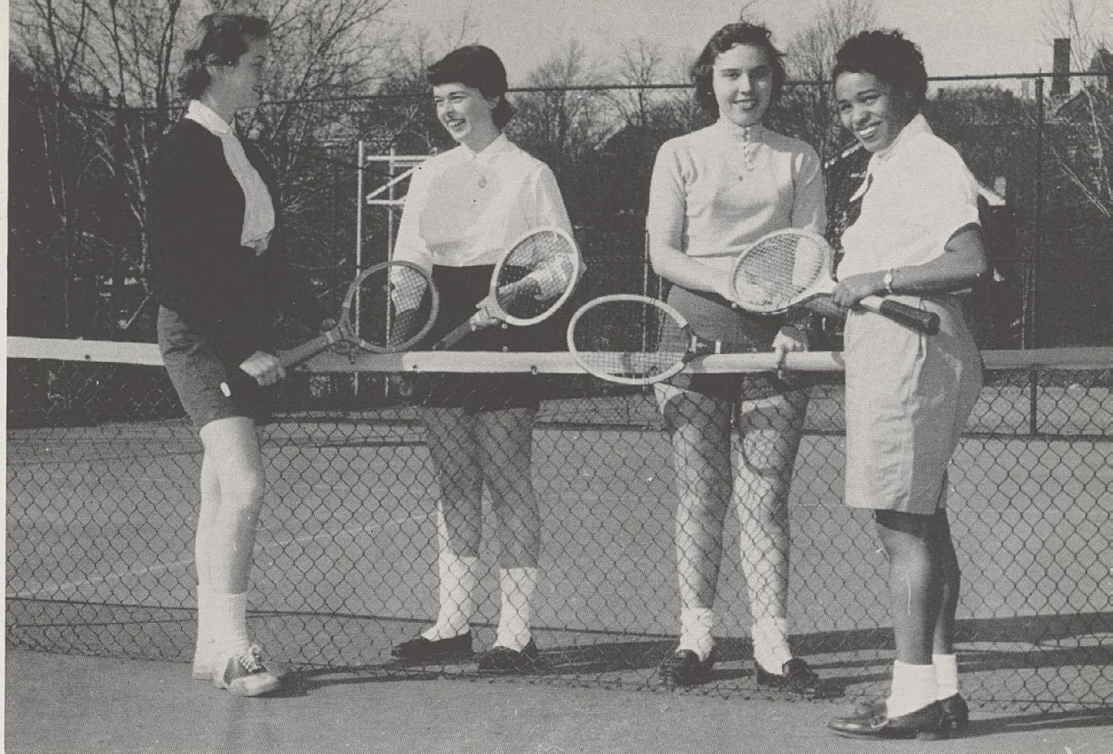


Tennis, Love go together
