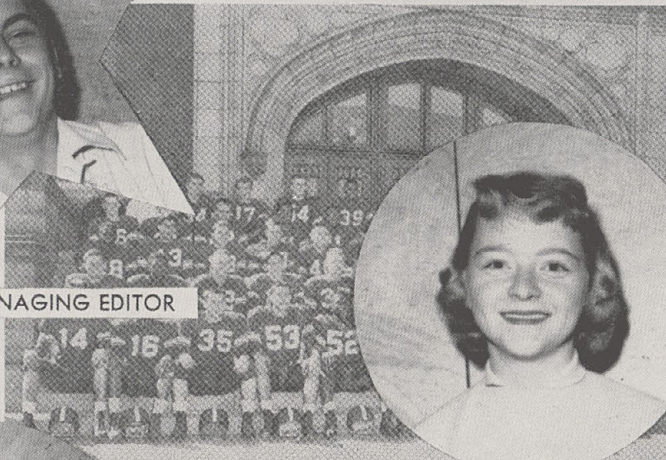
Each Spring, Mr. Ben Fulks, Assistant Principal, selects upperclassmen to help him with daily tasks.

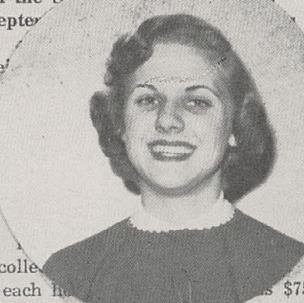

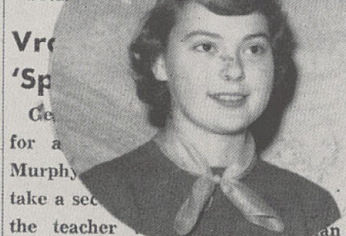
