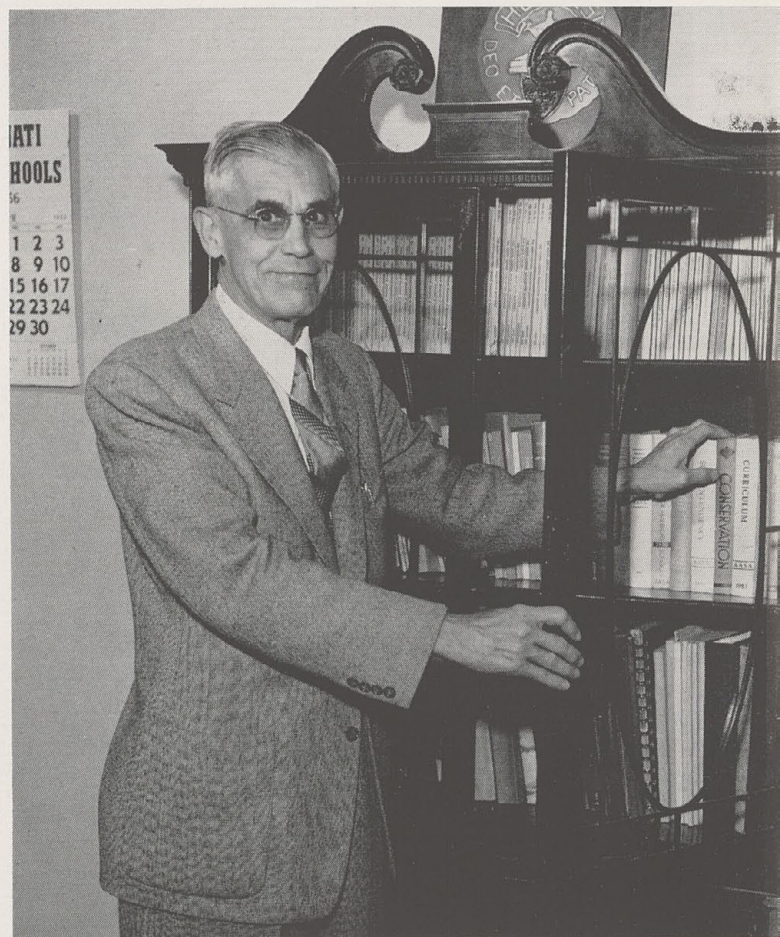
Promptly at 7:15 every morning, Mr. Kizer starts his day at Hughes, a routine he has followed for 28 years. Back in 1919, Mr. Kizer began his career at Hughes as a math teacher, but after four years, he became assistant principal, and held this position until he went to Hartwell High School in 1940 as principal. In 1945 he returned to Hughes, as principal, to renew his inspirational leadership and his unceasing efforts to make better citizens of Hughes students. His greatest gift, perhaps, is that of patience bestowed upon those who are stubborn about learning. His great love for Hughes makes him beloved by all at Hughes.

My story begins at any time during the year 1937-38, a year similar to every other year in that it possessed its full share of joys and anxieties. The children born that year are the characters of my story, and they are important because without them, the story could not be written.

In 1942 or 1943, they came face to face with a new environment, for around the corner stood the school house. Here they met other boys and girls, and with them struggled with the ABC's and with the recognition of numbers.

During the years 1943 through 1949, my characters acquired not only the fundamentals of reading, writing, and arithmetic, but also began to use this knowledge in solving new problems. Now, with the completion of that all-important interval from 1950-56, the junior and senior high school years, my story comes to an end, for my characters are graduating in June, 1956.

As you may have guessed, this is your life. Your present feeling of accomplishment is directly commensurate with the degree of effort you have expended. If you have not short-changed yourselves in laying a firm foundation for your many goals, future success is rightfully yours . . . and may you achieve it! Whether or not you do, only time can tell.

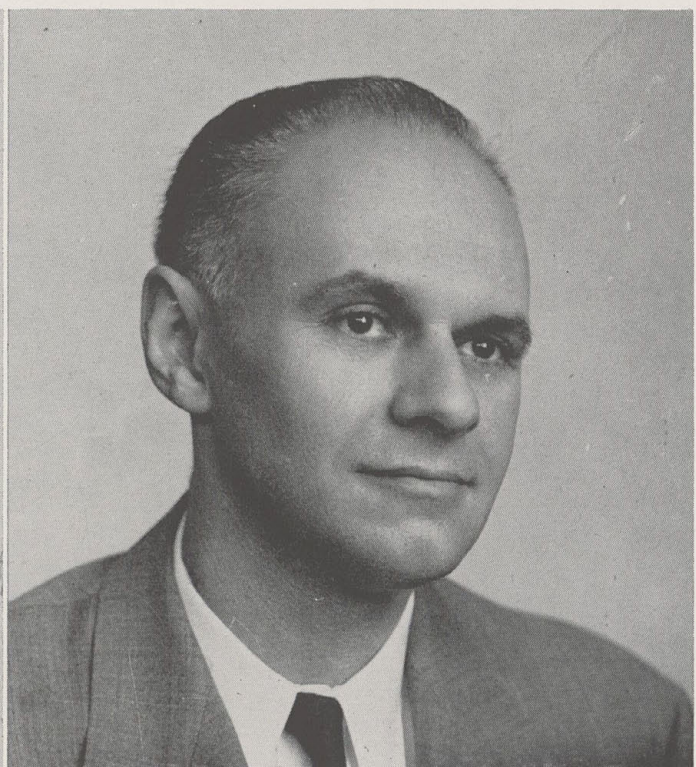

Business courses teach trade tricks



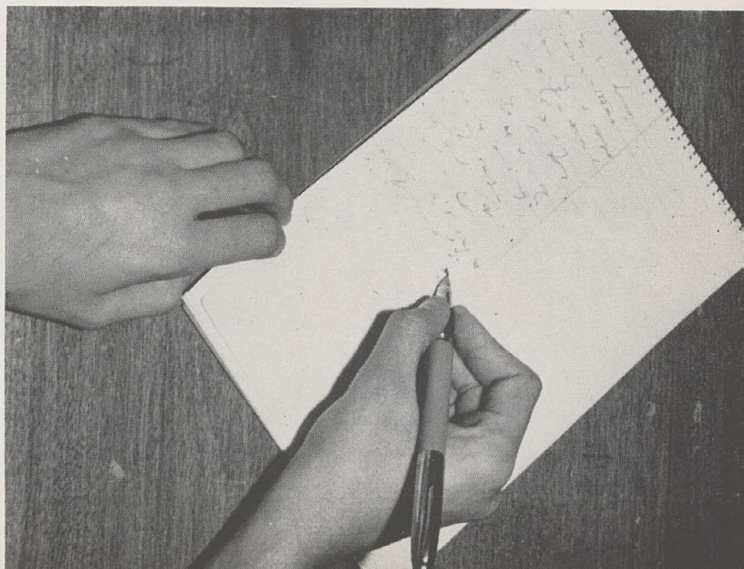

Typing, Shorthand, Secretarial Practice, Office Practice, General Business, Merchandising, and Salesmanship are courses offered to prepare Hughes students to take office jobs after graduation. Many students take typing because they know that typed manuscript reports are required in college.

Special instruction is given by Miss Skinner in her Office Practice group to familiarize students with all types of office machines such as the adding-listing, calculator, transcription, and duplication machines. A volunteer staff of students known as Miss Levine's Production Staff, turns out many typing and duplicating jobs for the school files, as well as for special school events and records.

Students accepted for Merchandising do part-time work in downtown stores four afternoons a week.

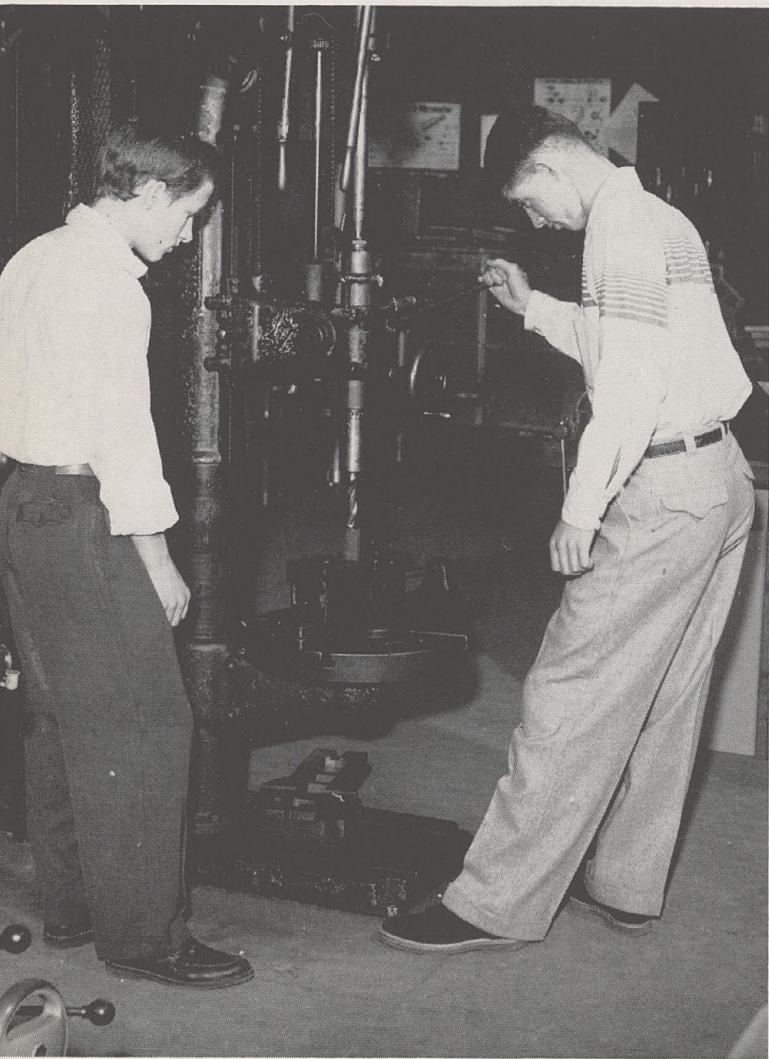
The Industrial Arts courses rightfully begin with a study of Mechanical Drawing in which the problems of industrial design are taught. Using straight rules, T-squares, compasses, drawing ink, and pens, beginning draftsmen spend hours in perfecting the complicated blueprints of a house.

In the Department of Graphic Arts, the boys begin their apprenticeships in master printing by learning how to set type, to handle engraving cuts, and to clean and operate the printing press. This department has more than ample practical experience, for it prints many school forms, as well as tickets, programs, covers, and posters for every school function. Printing students also make silk screen and linoleum block prints.

Clock-like precision and accuracy are required in Mechanical Drawing.

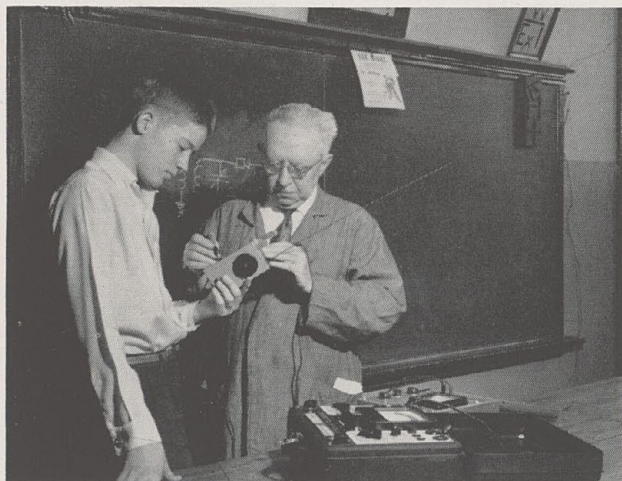

Learning by doing

Hughes operates four shops—Printing, Woodworking, Metalworking, and Electricity. Here students not planning to go to college can obtain practical experience in learning a trade.

From the ground floor of the southwest end of the building can be heard the loud roar of the bandsaw or the rhythmic beat of a hammer as a piece of plain lumber is fashioned into a beautiful end table in the Woodworking Shop. And after the table is made, it must be stained and varnished, and rubbed down to a fine finish. Students pay a minimum fee for their materials and are then allowed to take home the products of their labor.

Nearby, in the Metalworking Shop, a metal lathe is trimming down a steel rod faster than the human eye can follow, while an electric saw cuts a piece of copper to exact size.

Not far away, watts and ohms, negative and positive currents, voltage meters, and the precision ticking of the school's electric clocks are under discussion in the Electricity Shop. Learning the practical applications of the science of electronics is a must in this age of public address systems, radio, and television.

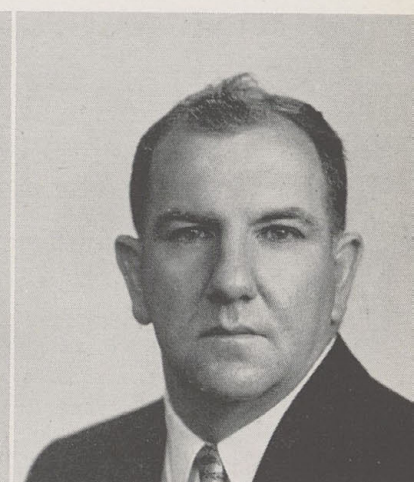

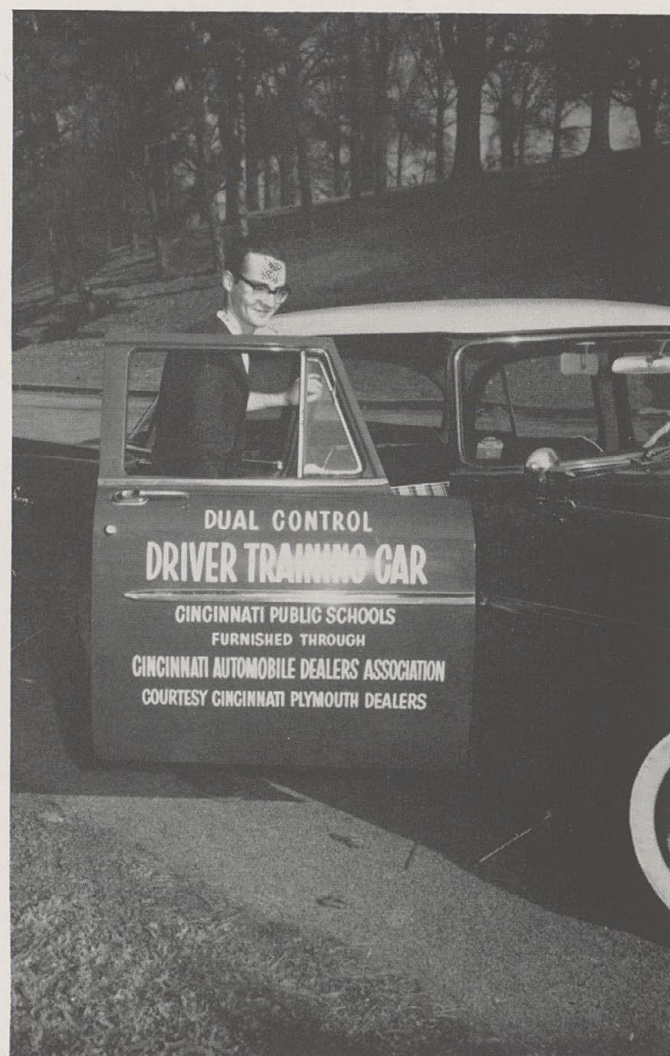

Health and Safety taught

Every senior must spend two and a half periods a week in Senior Health, a subject which includes First Aid, Home Nursing, and Social and Mental Health. The Red Cross requires twenty hours of study before granting a certificate which qualifies the student to practice First Aid. Home Nursing, which deals with the care of the sick at home, must be completed by mid-term. The study of Mental and Social Health is enriched by the use of excellent sound movies.

Driver Education, a requirement for graduation, acquaints the students with the rules of the road, the nature of the automobile, and the fundamentals of good driving. The Ohio Driver's Manual, published by the Department of Highway Safety, is studied, and tests are given on the rules for passing and stopping, speed limits, required hand signals, and brake performance. Driver Training, a fifteen-hour course separated from Driver Education, gives valuable behind-the-wheel practice. Mr. Ralph Sensel uses a dual-operated Plymouth in giving instruction necessary for passing the Ohio driver's license test.

Foreign tenses tantalize our tongues

In these times the need for understanding among the peoples of the world is essential if peace is to be preserved and our civilization is to continue.

In effecting this understanding, the knowledge of foreign languages plays a key role. Moreover, the world becomes comparatively smaller because of our improved systems of communication and transportation, trade becomes more international, making it increasingly important that language barriers be eliminated.

Hughes students may get a basic language foundation by studying Latin, or they may begin with a modern language—French, German, or Spanish.

But running is only one exercise by which Hughes students help to keep their bodies trim and healthy. Necessary calisthenics are always part of the body-developing routine, while games of basketball, baseball, and volleyball teach good sportsmanship and co-operation, and aid in exhausting excessive energy. The girls' gym classes are handled in much the same way, with emphasis on participation in many games. Every Hughes student, according to the present system, is required to take three years of physical education, and one year of Health and First Aid. Swimming is offered as an elective in the fourth year.

With these hopefuls in 1956, Hughes can once more expect a winning season.

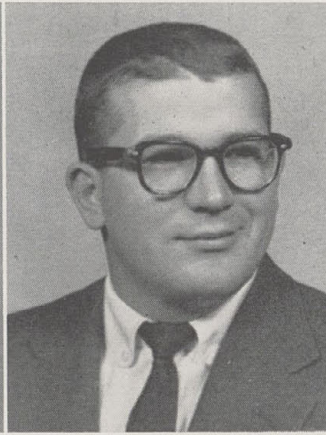




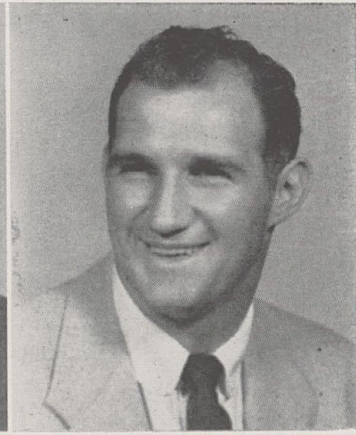

Fred Macklin drew the first Big Red score on a four yard run following Bob Houser's recovery of a Dunbar fumble. Bill Bentley, Dayton back, broke loose with a 70-yard jaunt to tie the score. Again Macklin and Bentley scored on dashes of 17 and 11 yards, respectively. During the third quarter, Bentley swept the end for 78 yards and the winning touchdown.

The Roger Bacon contest was a thriller as the Spartans edged the Big Reds 7-6.

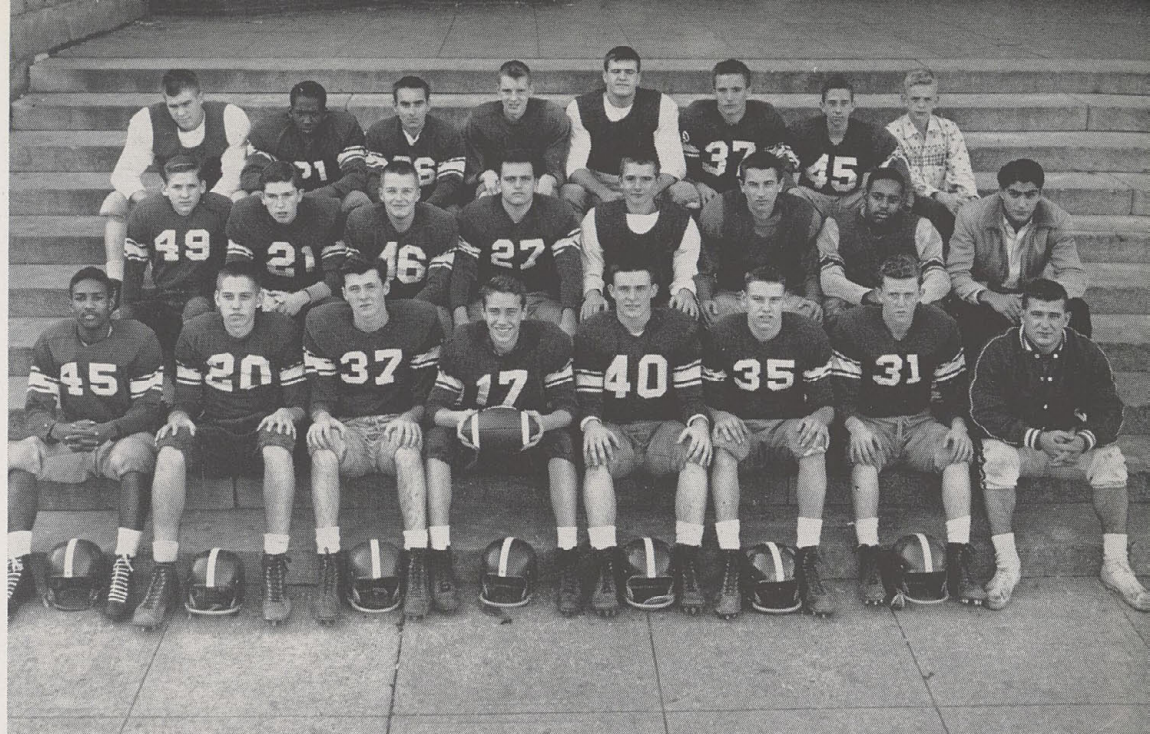
Walnut Hills handed Hughes its sixth loss in seven games by the score of 20-6.

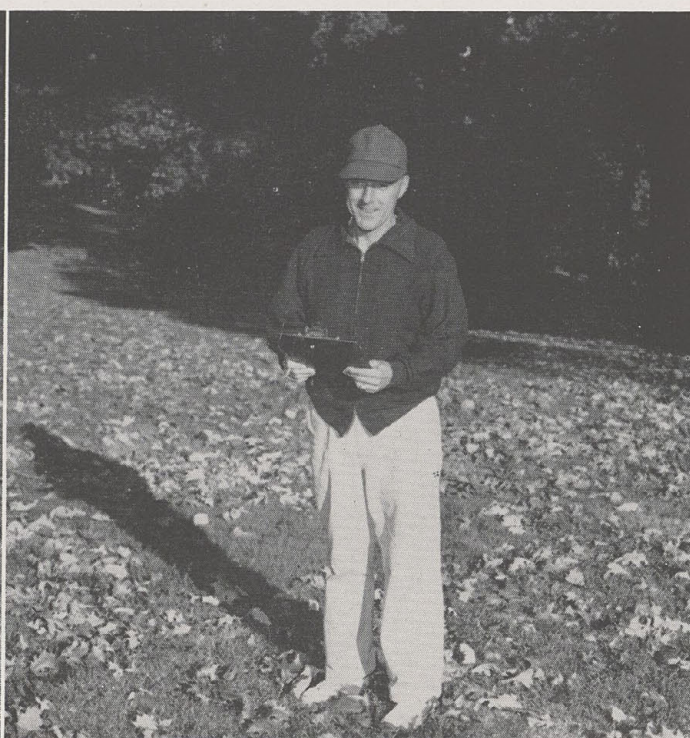

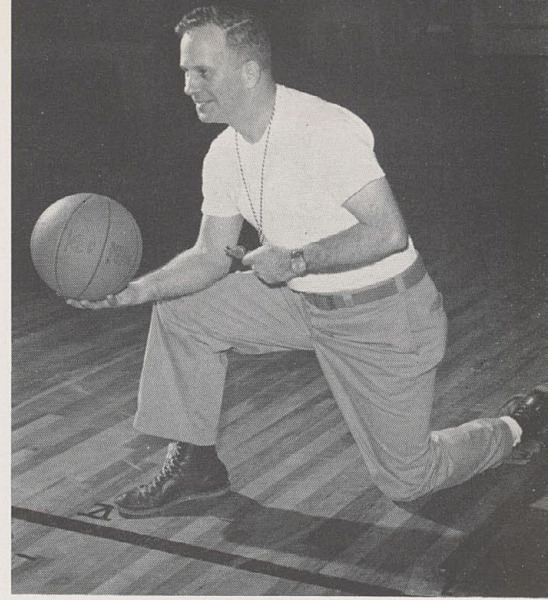

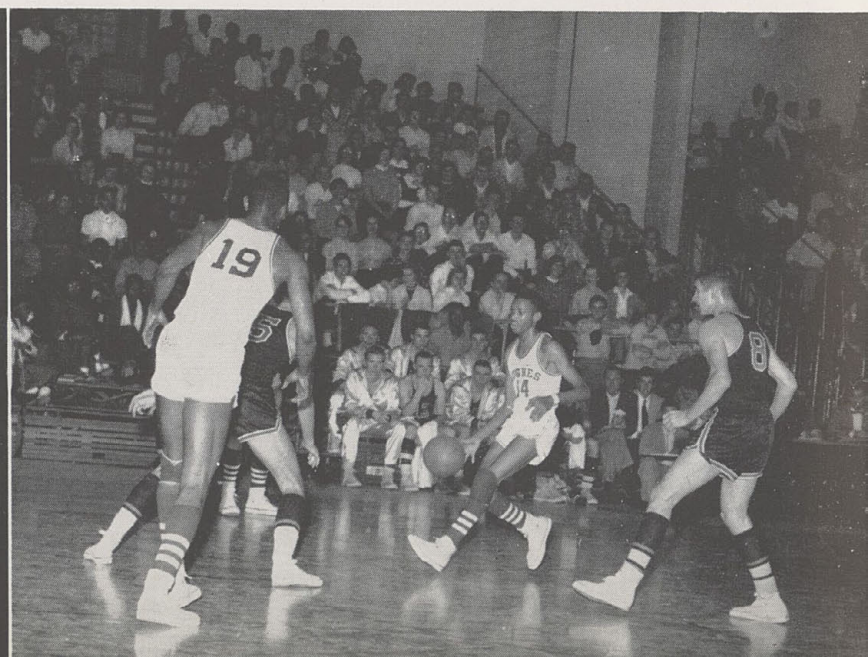

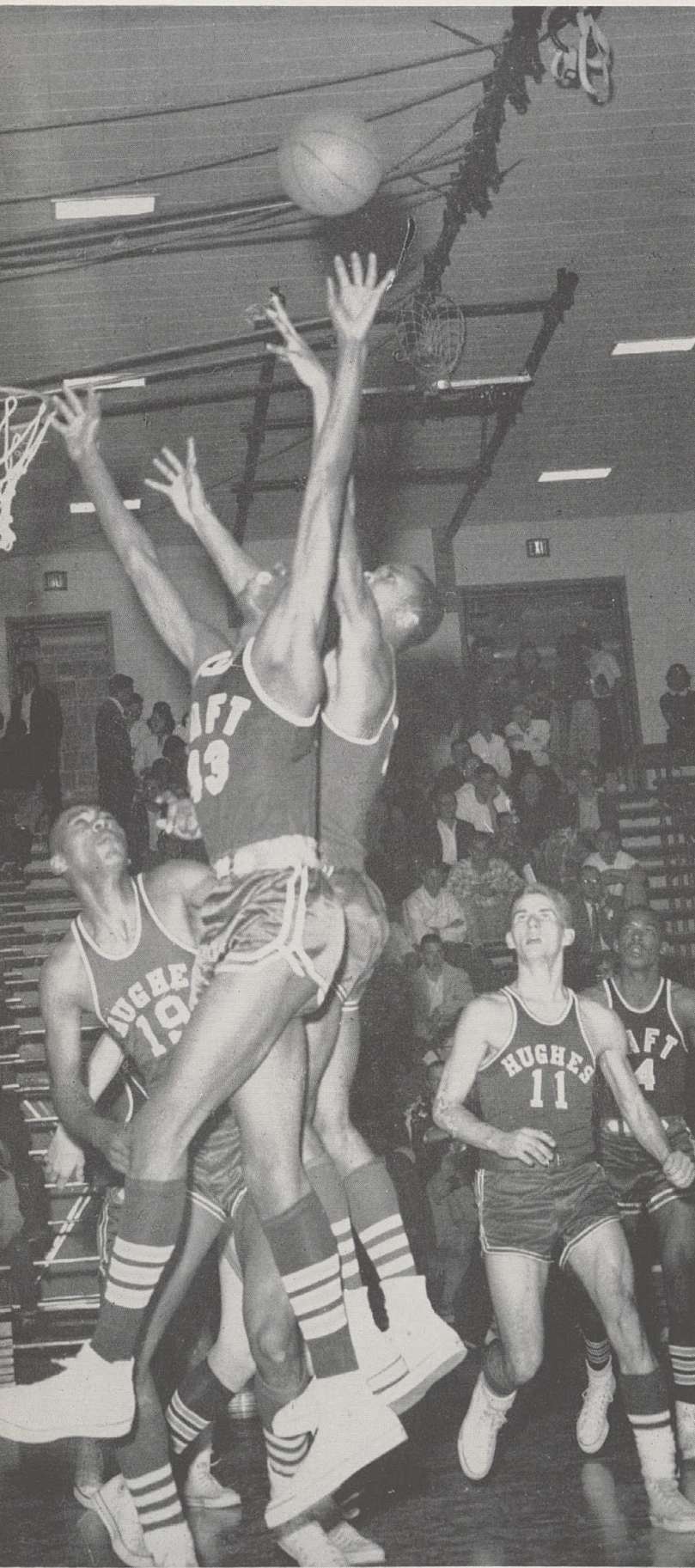

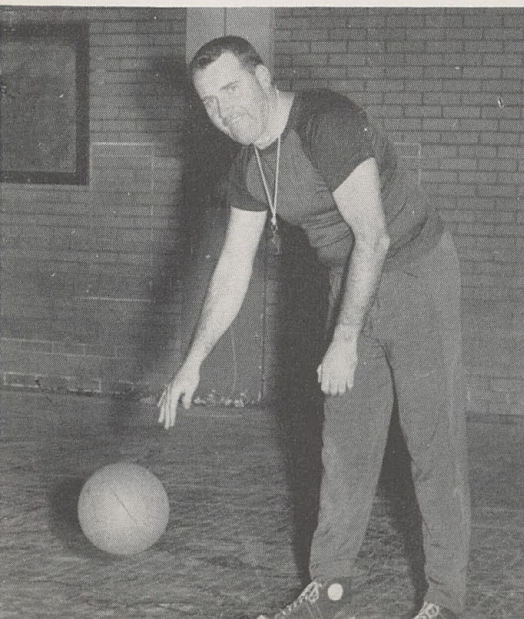

Playing top-notch basketball were Tom Whitaker, Les Hoskins, Al Huetcher, and Jim Addler.

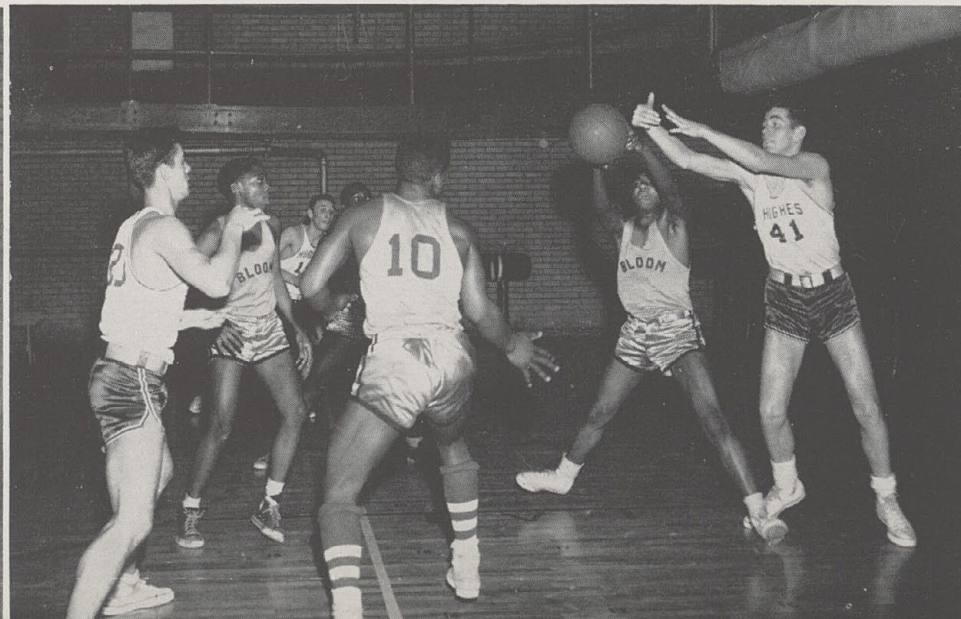

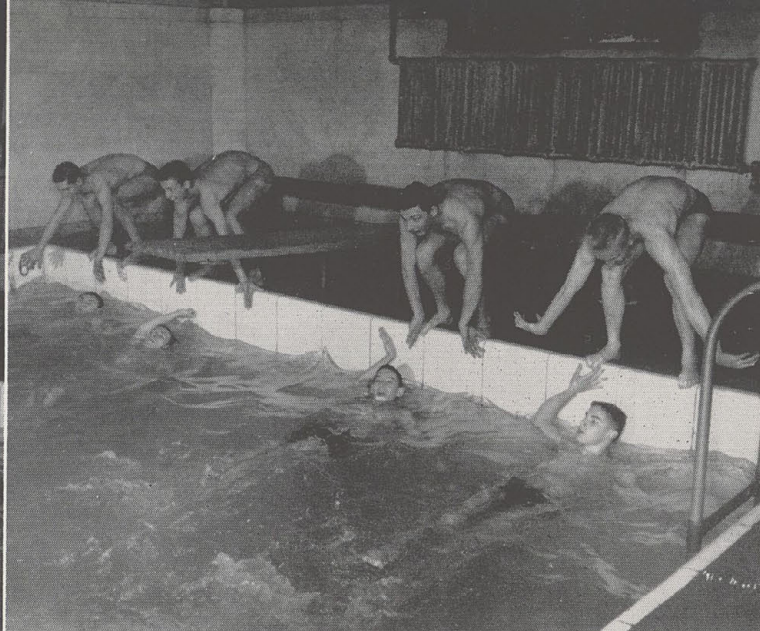


A Bloom cager intercepts a pass from Les Hoskins to Jim Addler. Pete Georgetown, in the background, prepares for defensive action.

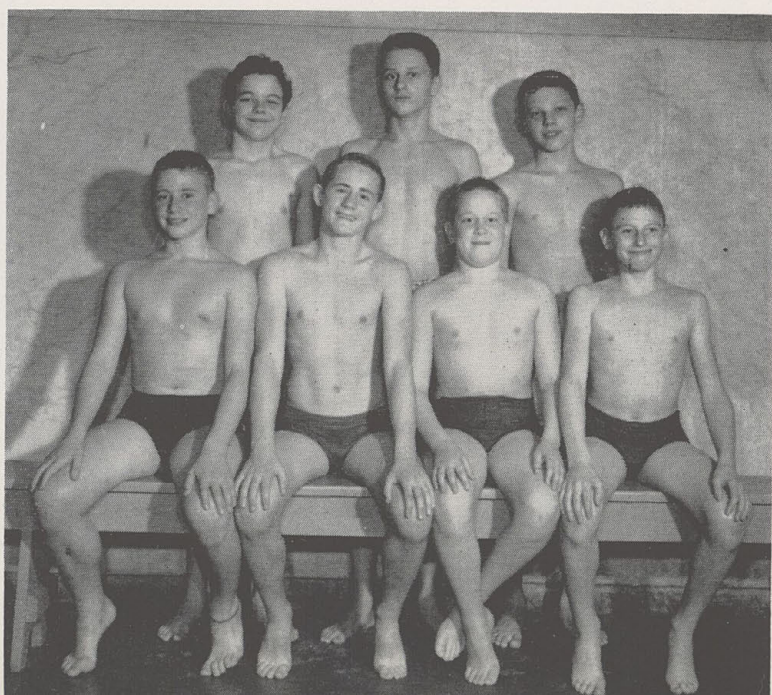

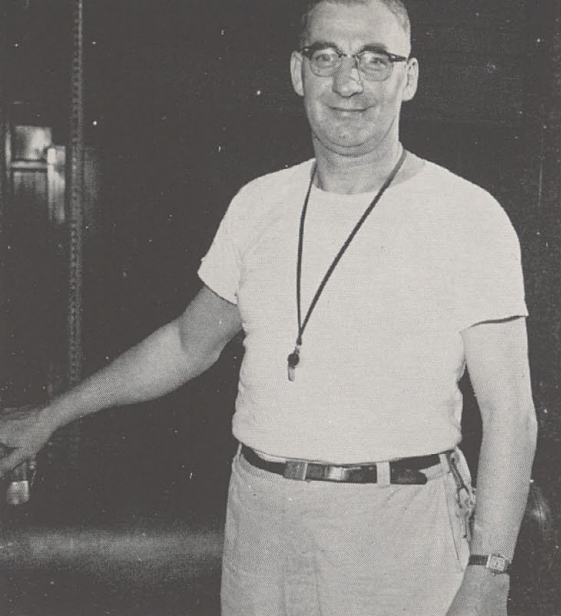

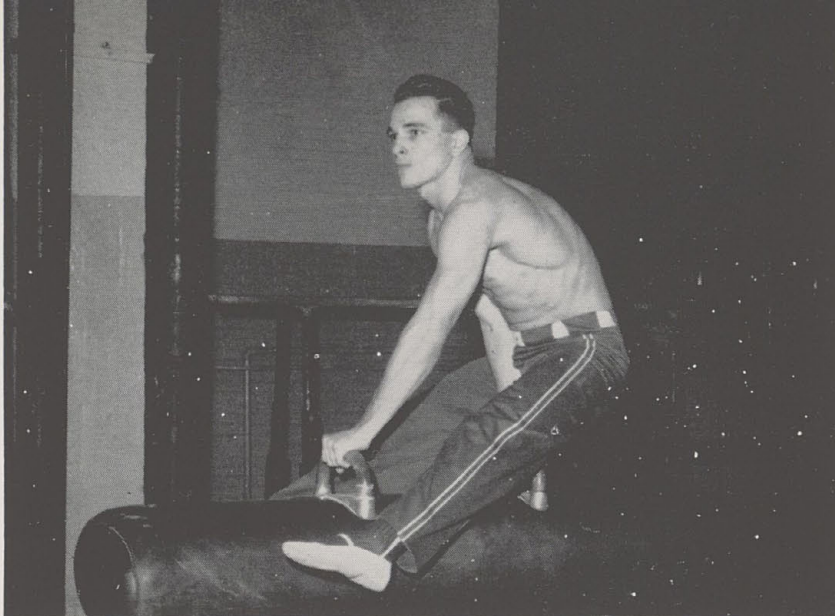

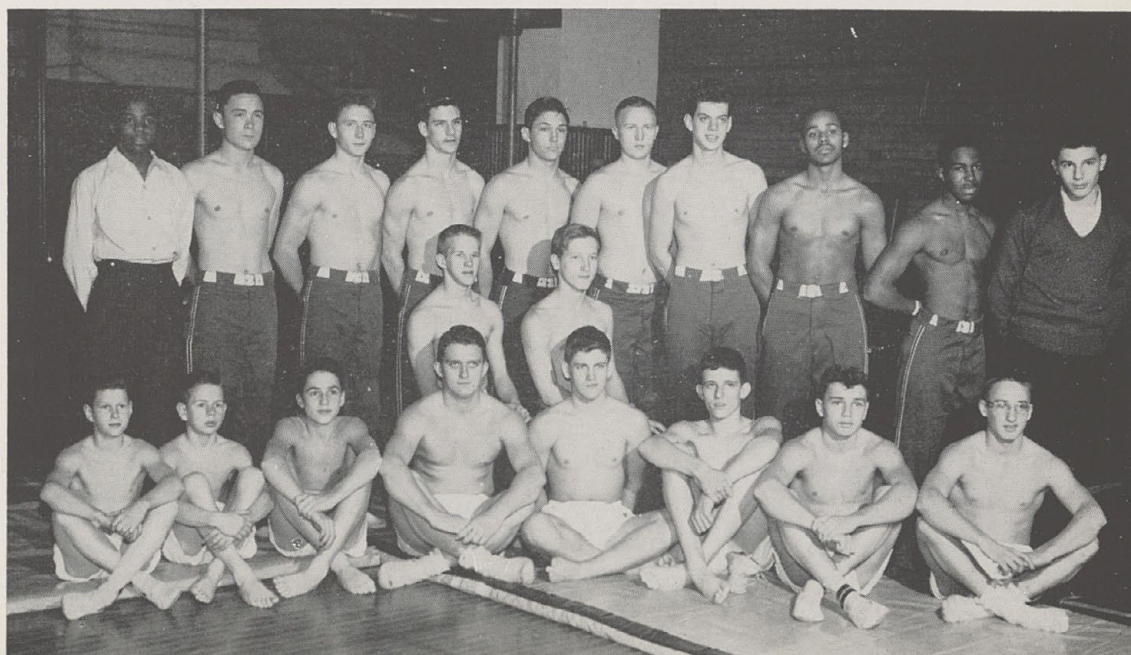

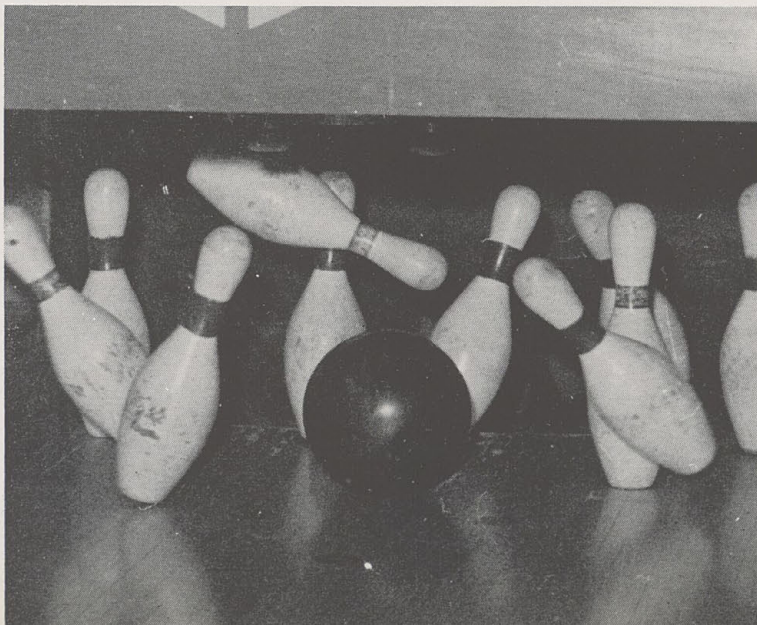

Leroy Nash won the top average of the Intramural League with a tally of 179. The "Lucky Strikes" had the highest game total with a 761 score.

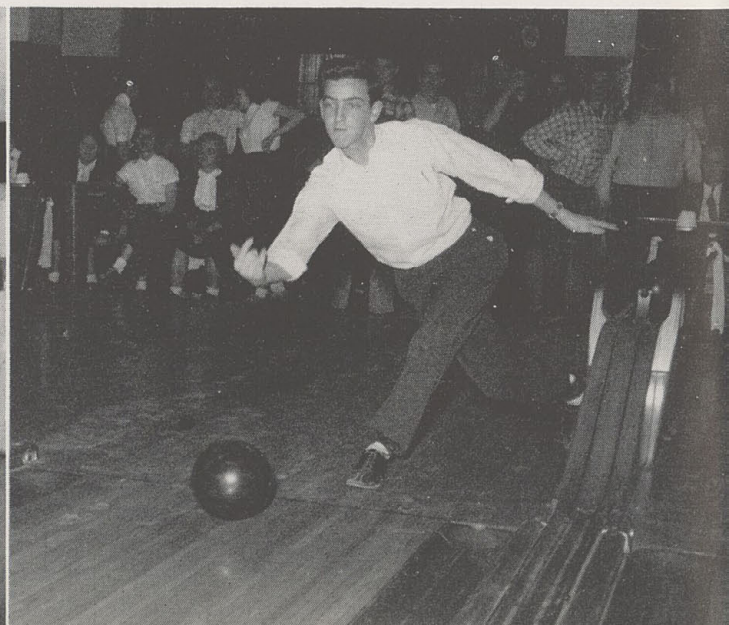

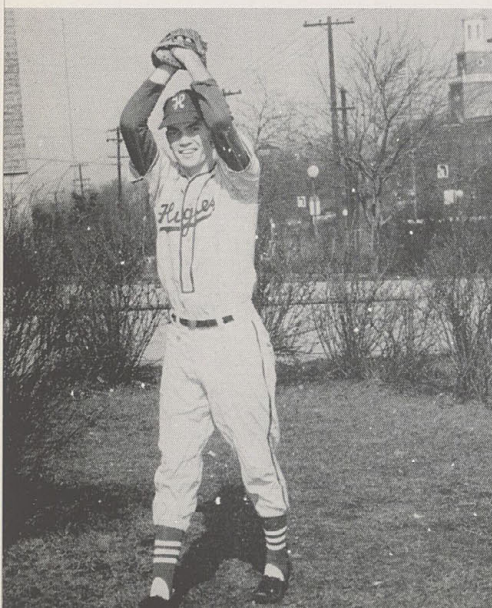

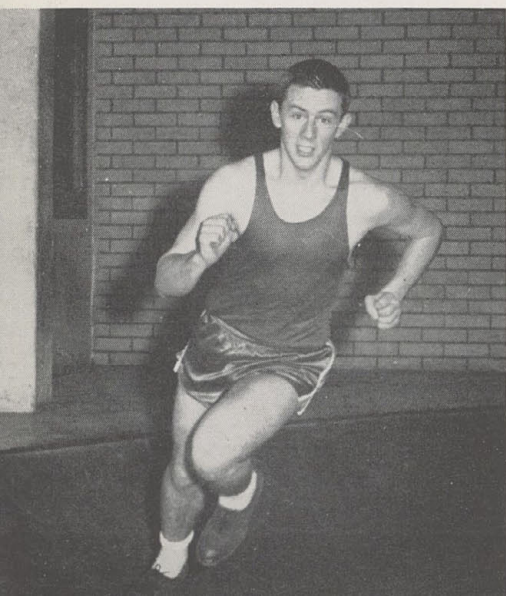

The junior "Cindermen" finished fifth in the city track meets last year. However, these younger track men show great promise for future years.



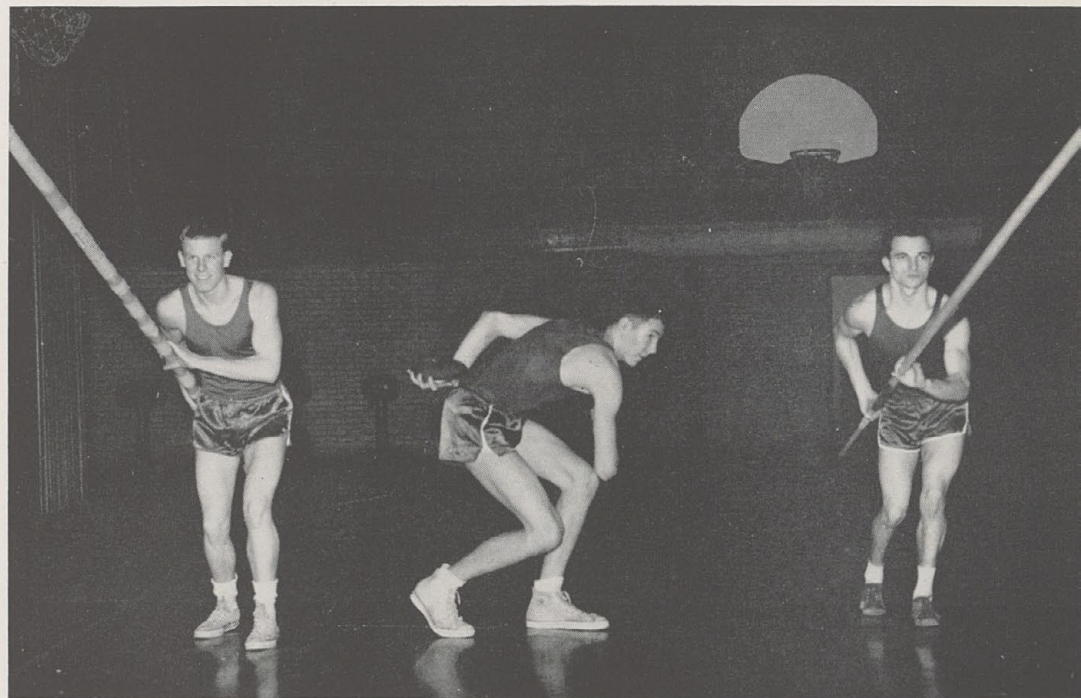

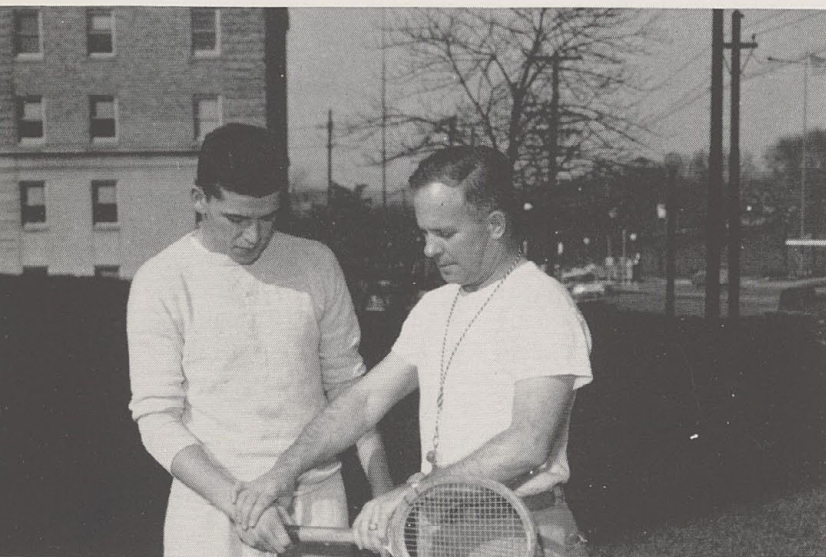

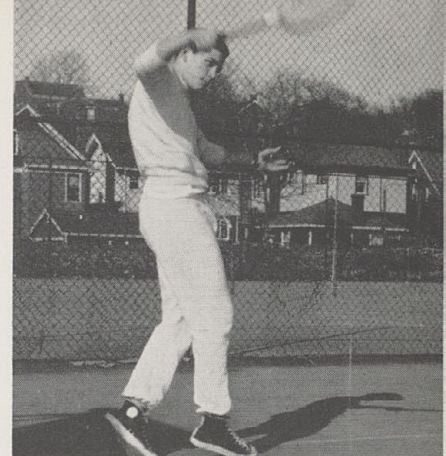
Tom Bepler and Bob Harrison show form in the pole-vaulting event, while Ray Eisenschmidt prepares for the shot-put competition.

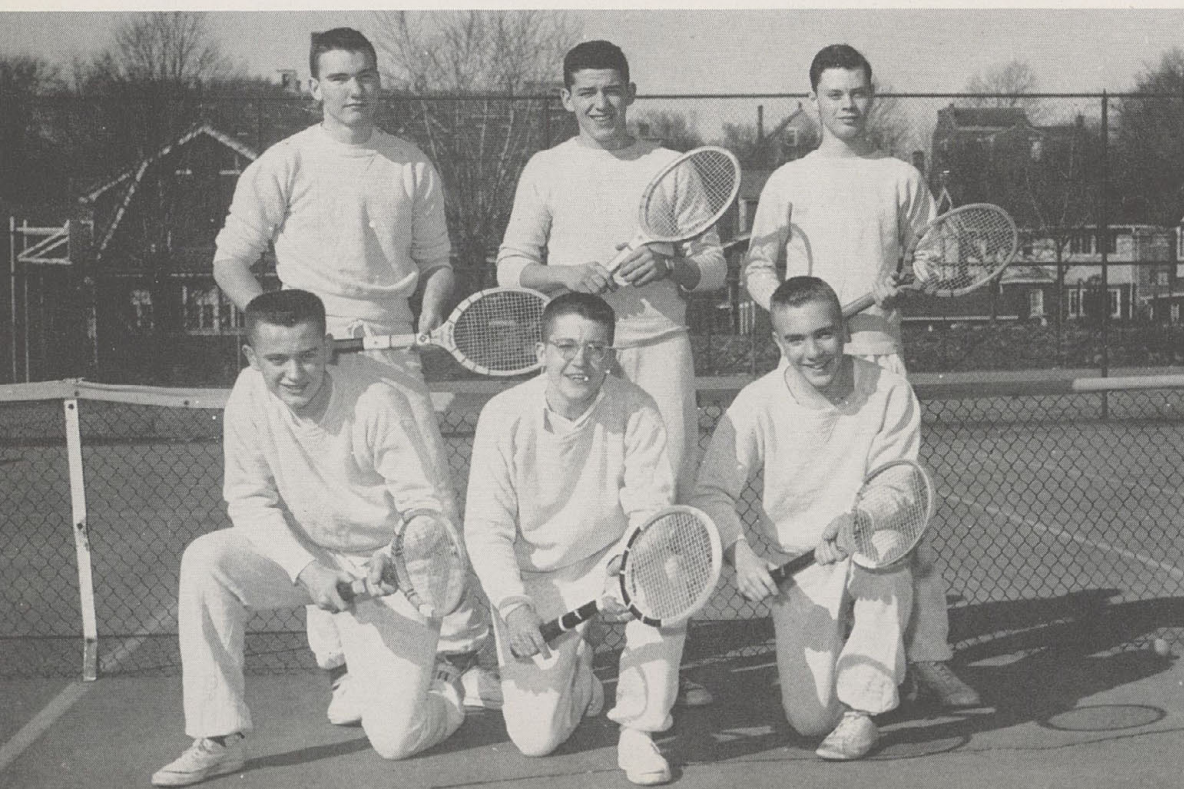
Coach Howard Grimes and the 1956 Big Red Racquet Swingers are hoping to top last season's performance of five won and nine lost.

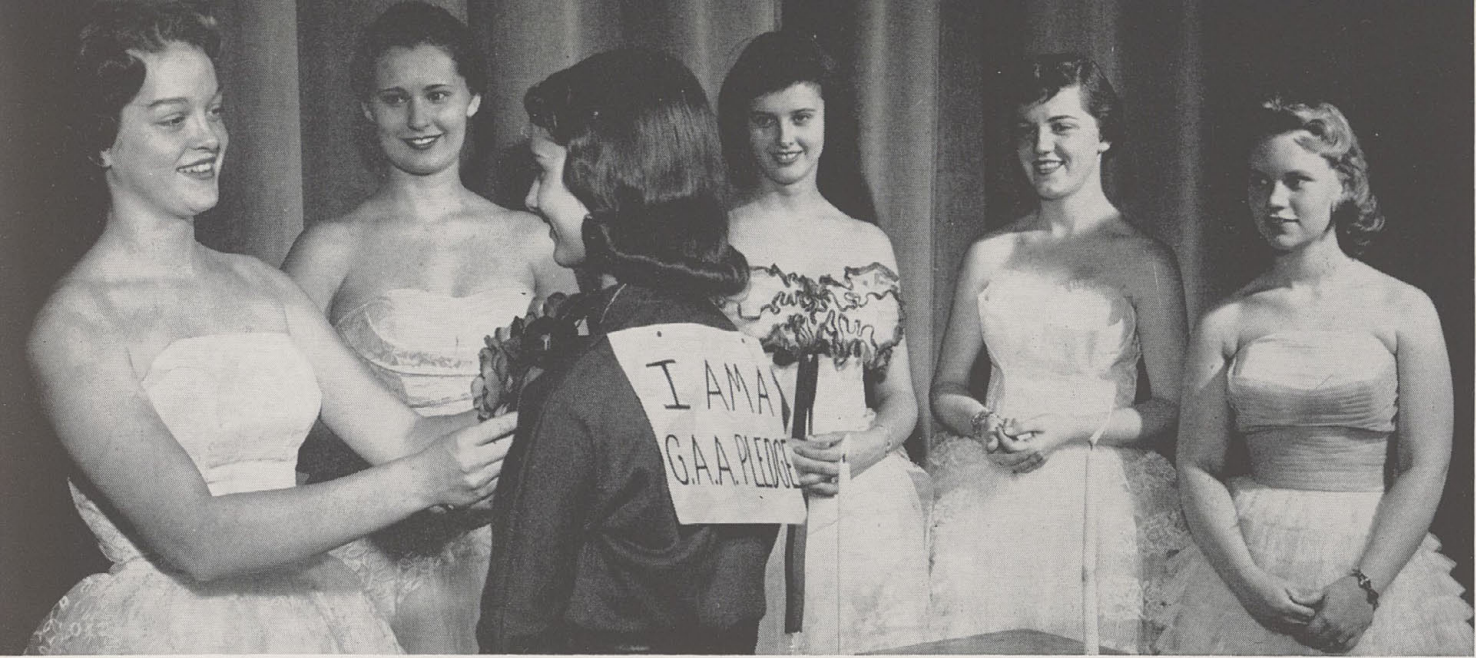

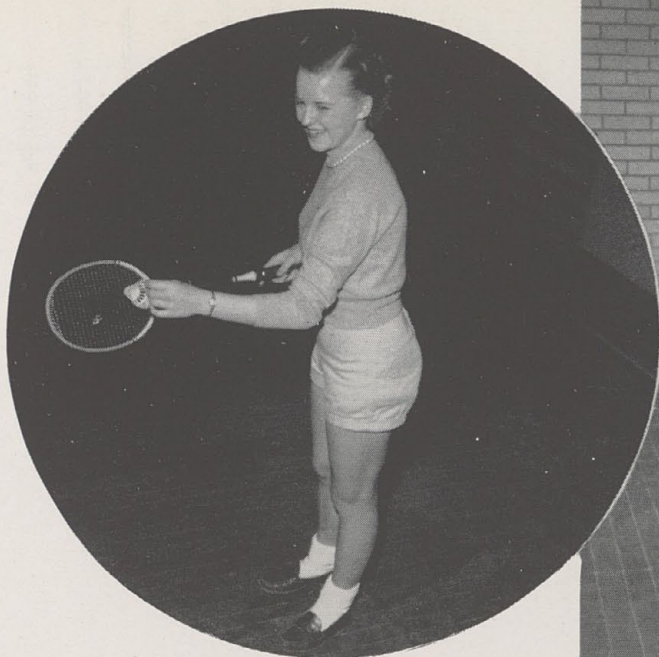

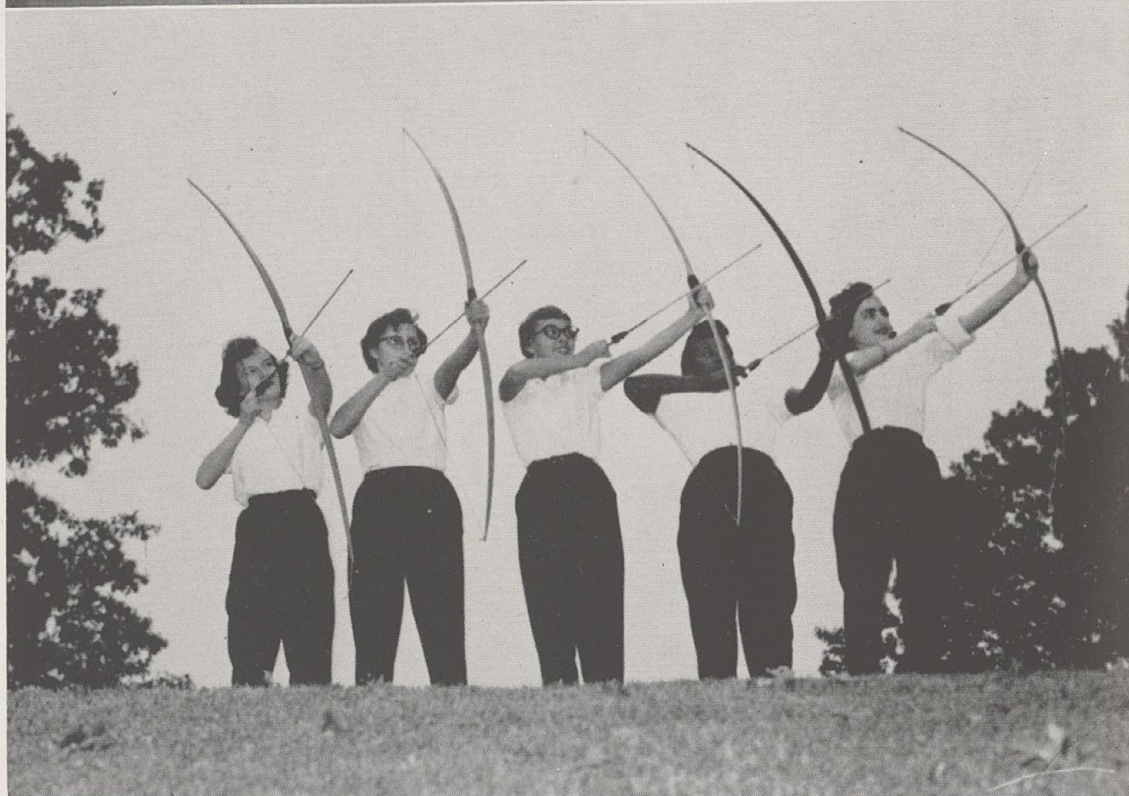

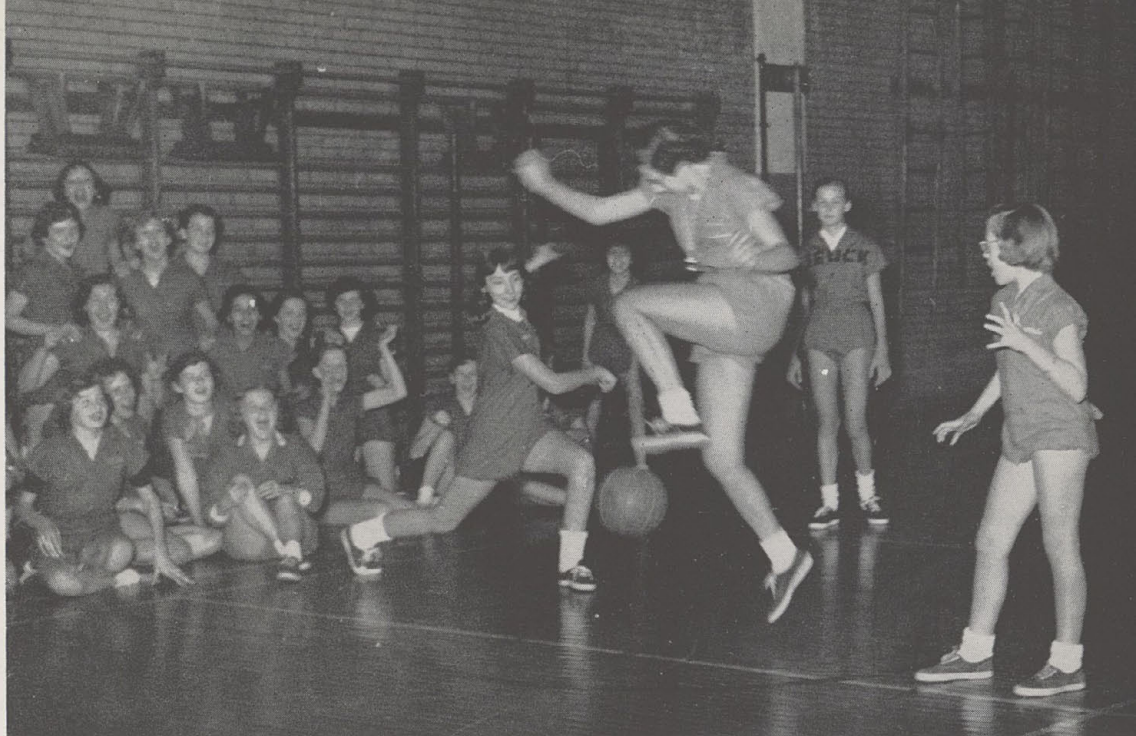

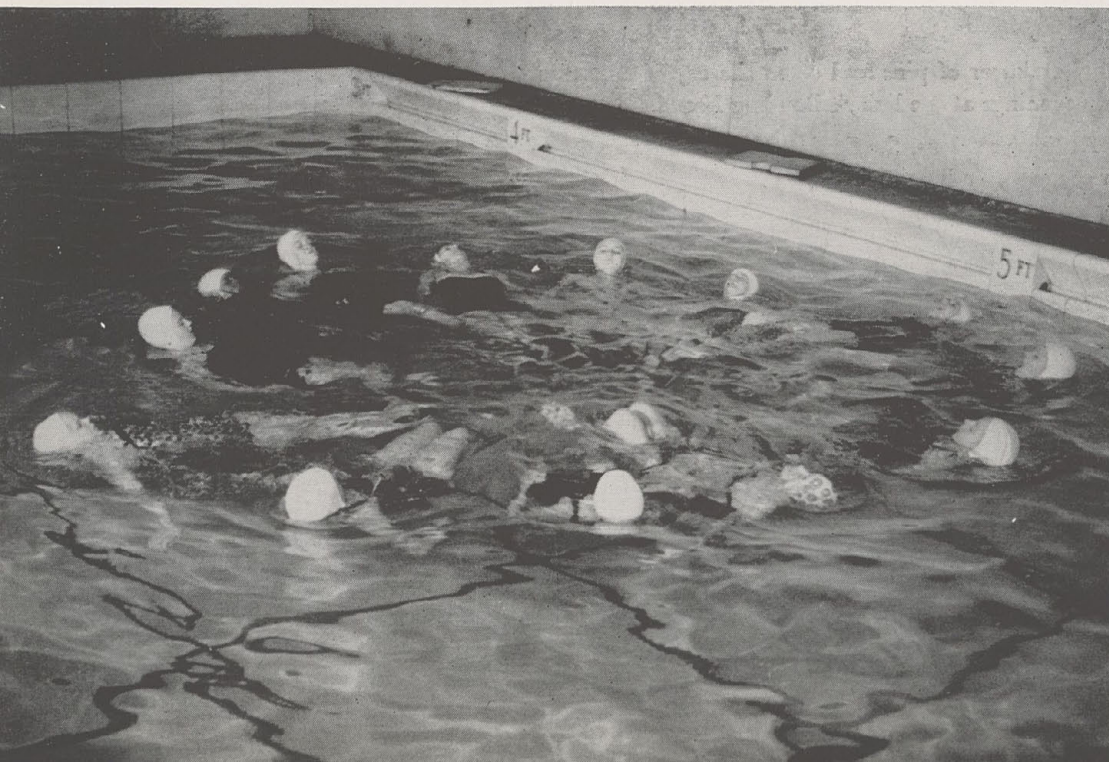

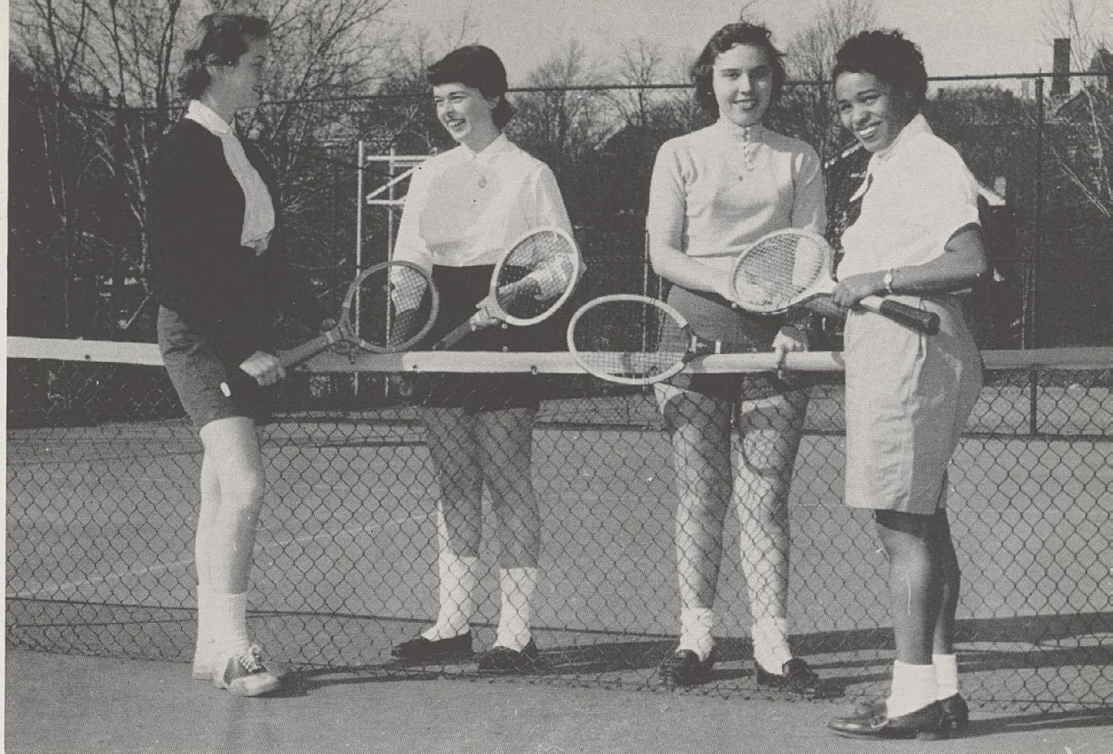

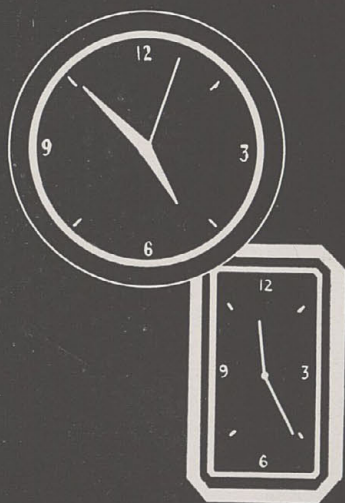

This year, the Council launched a campaign to clean up the school, and printed booklets containing club information to be sent to schools having students entering Hughes next year.

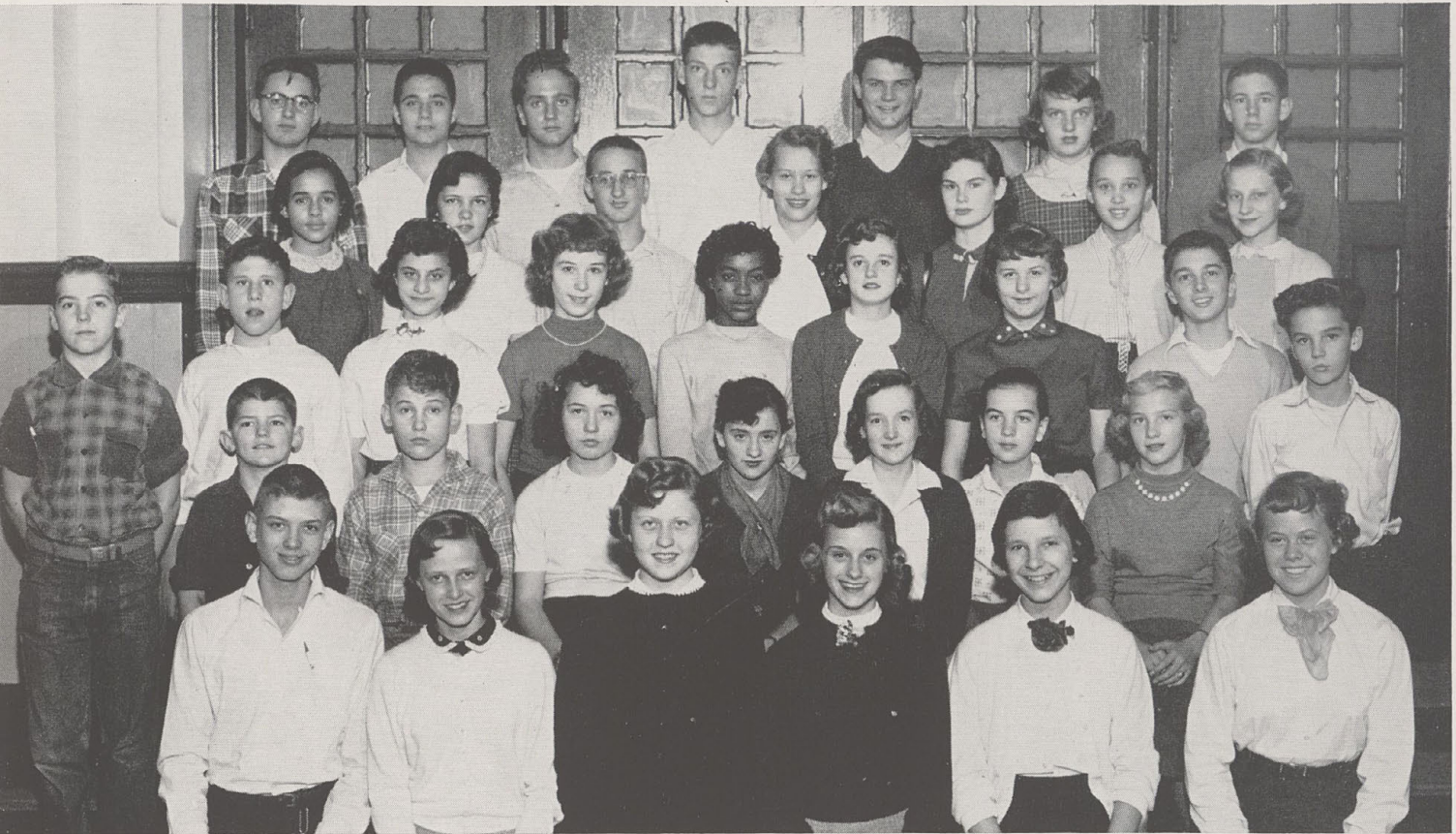

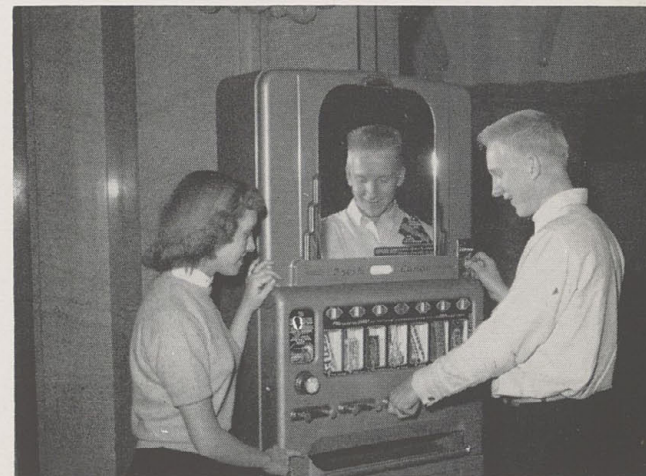

Scholarship, leadership, and citizenship are the necessary qualities for membership in this service club.

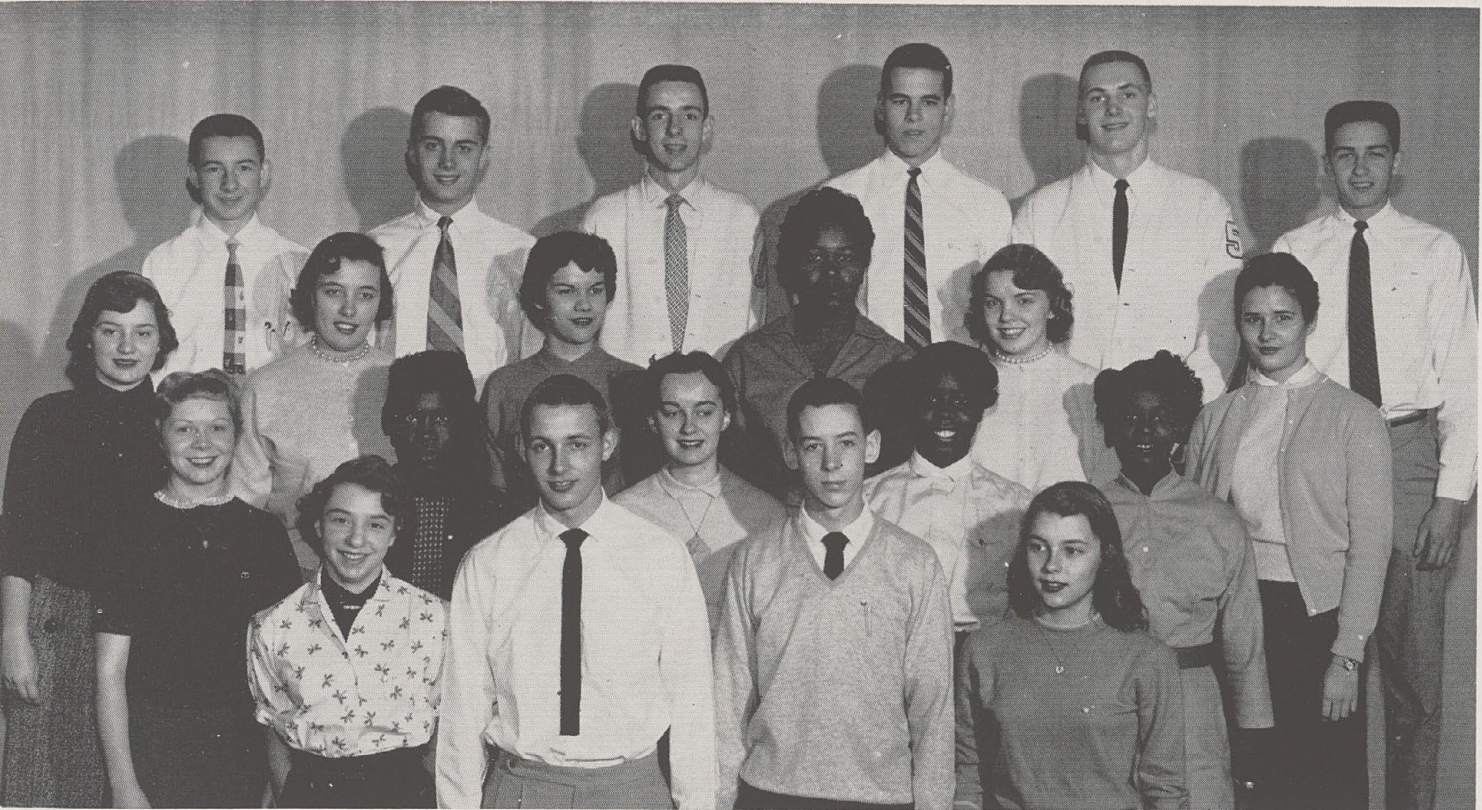

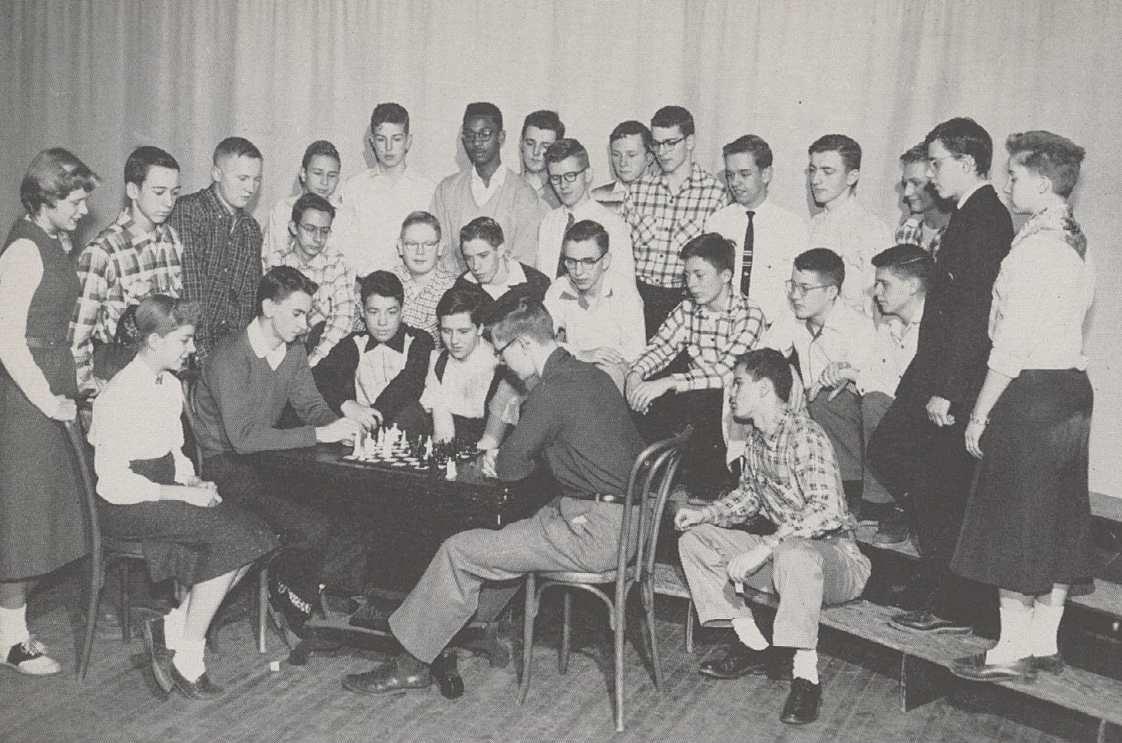

The Future Teachers of America, under the direction of Miss Marie Hunter, was formed to stimulate an interest in the teaching profession.

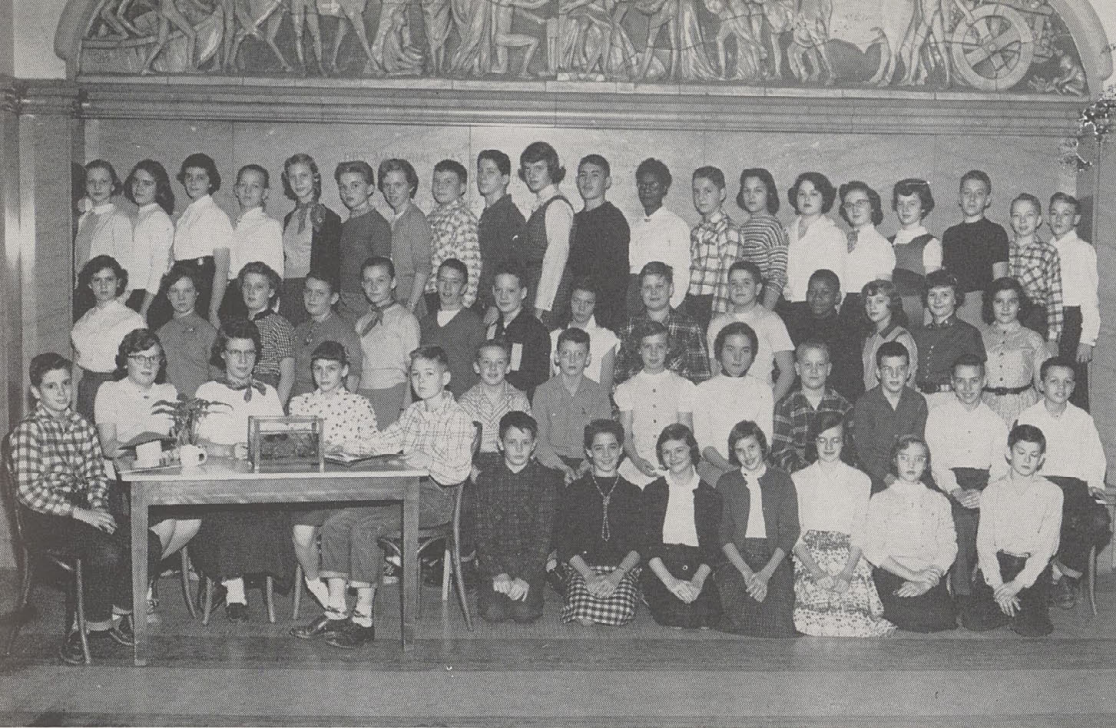

On March 5 Miss Newman and some club members appeared on WCET-TV for a program explaining how a science club is organized and functions successfully.

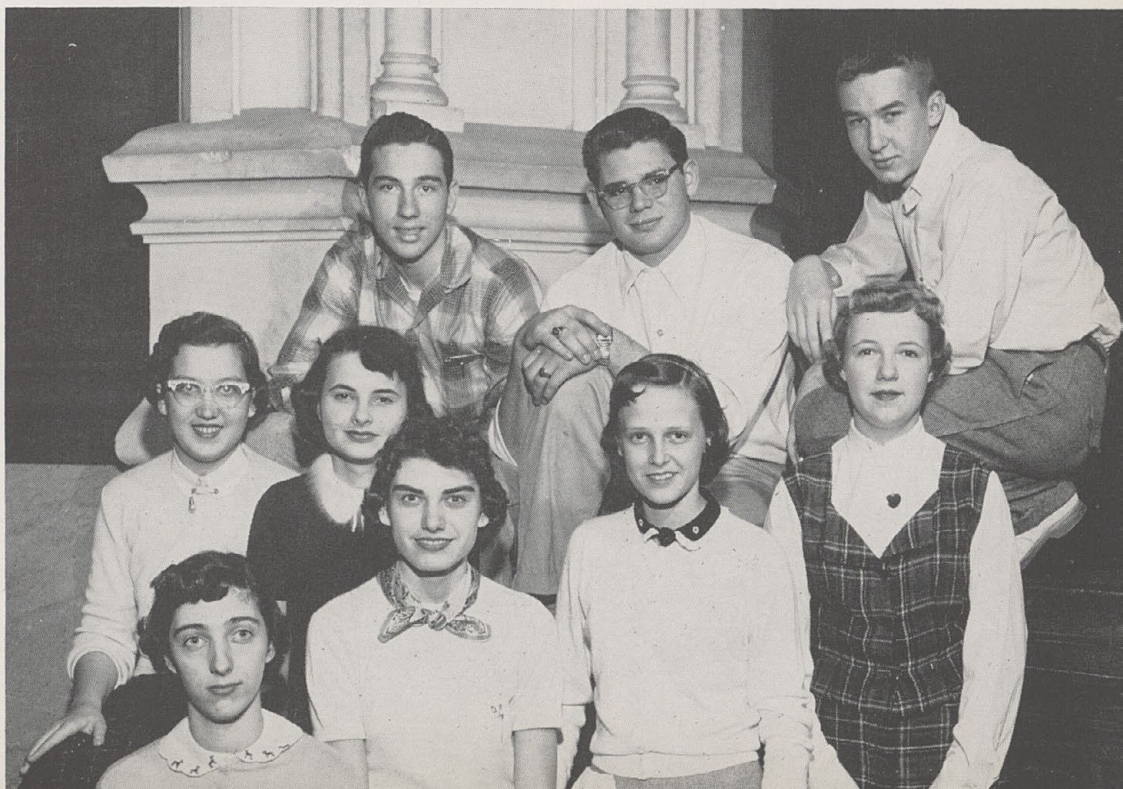
Pep Club stimulates spirit at game time

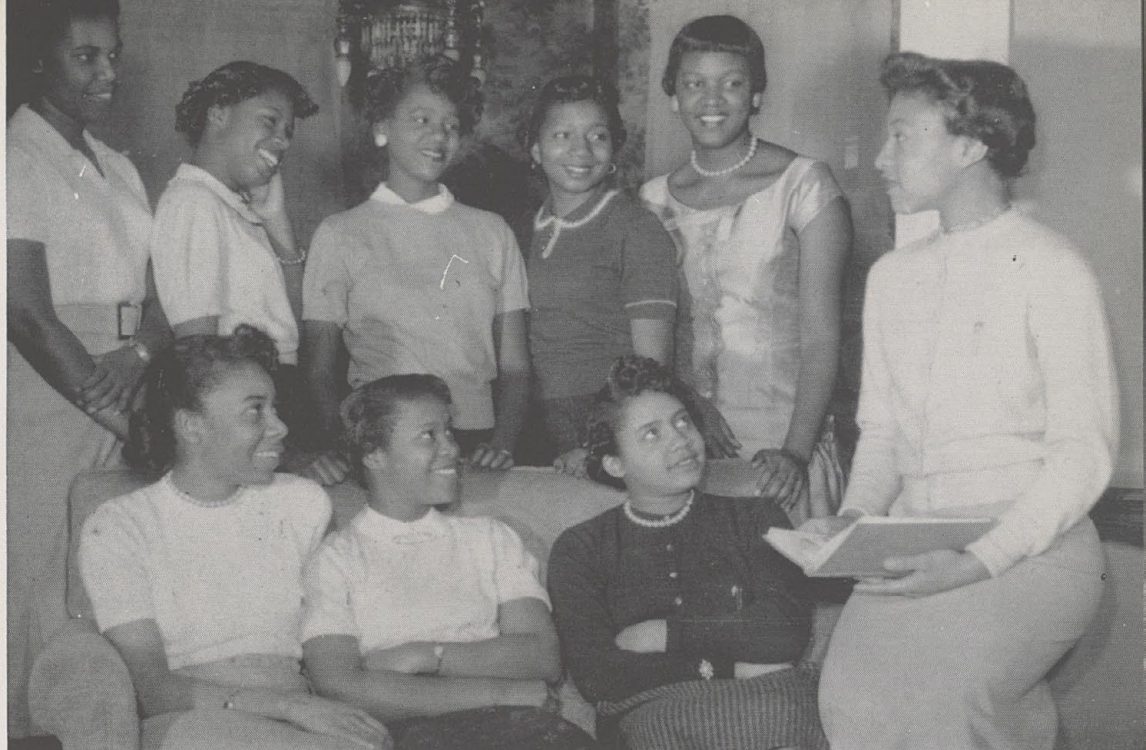
Organized at Hughes in 1924, the Delts have continuously striven to promote truth, honesty, loyalty, and life-long friendship.

The fraternity also tries to present a religious side to fraternal life by conducting an impressive ceremony for formal initiation, and by giving a prayer at the start of each meeting.

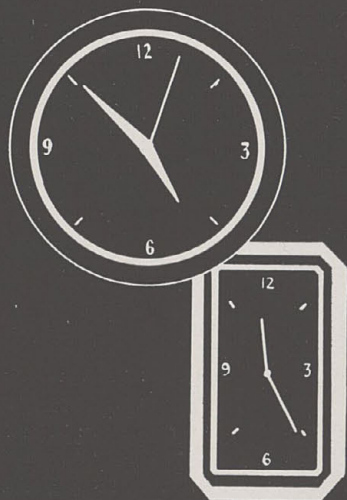

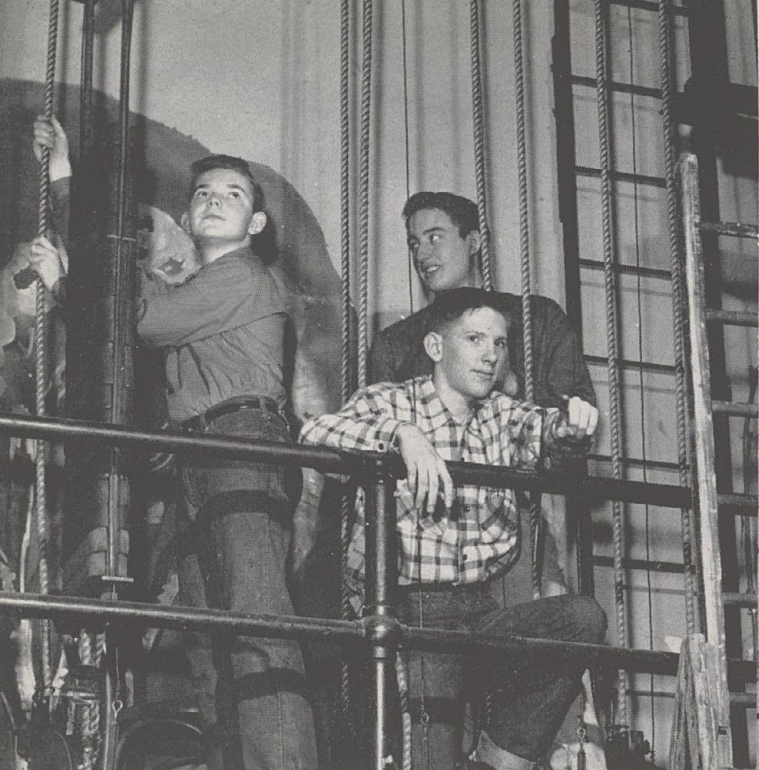

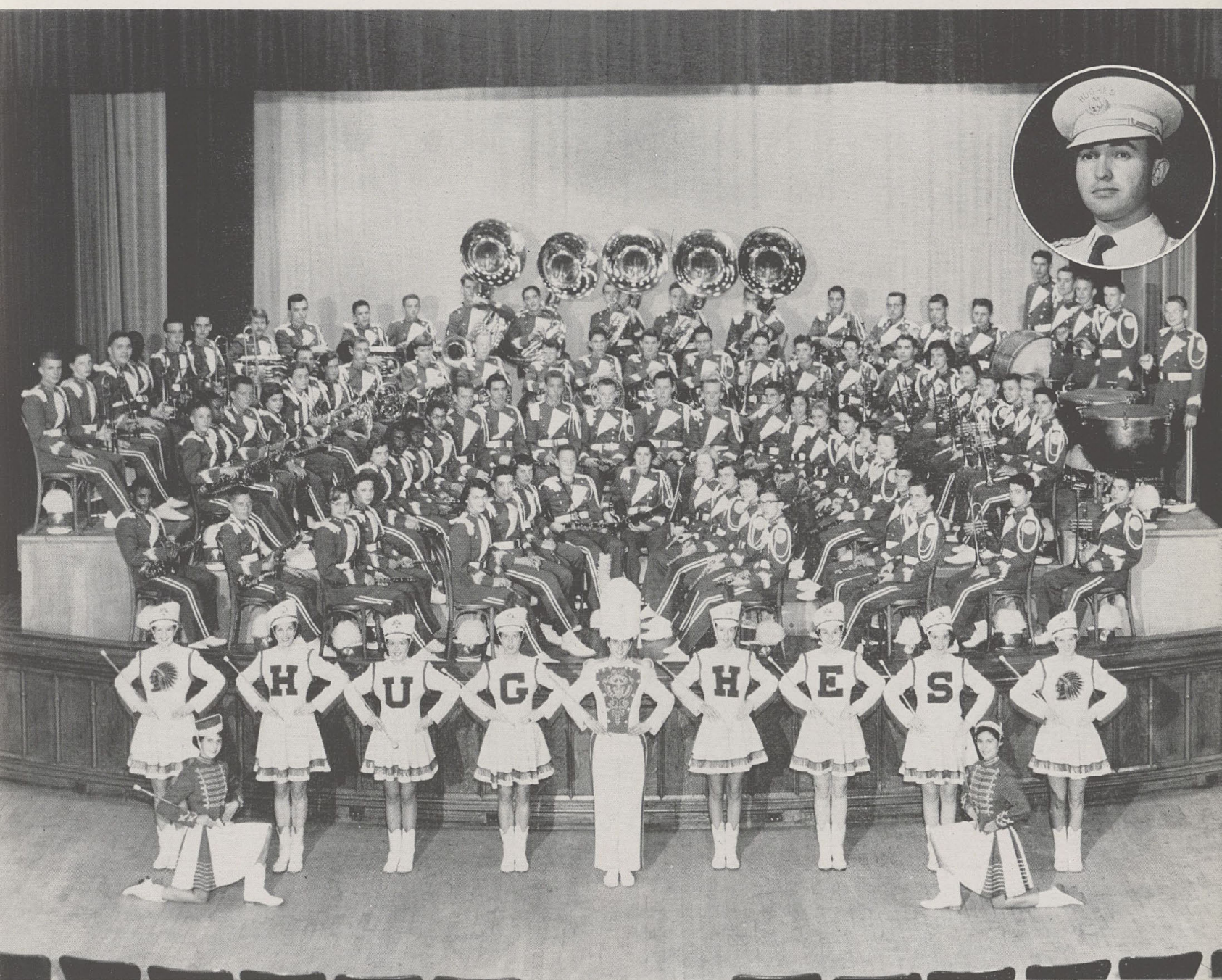

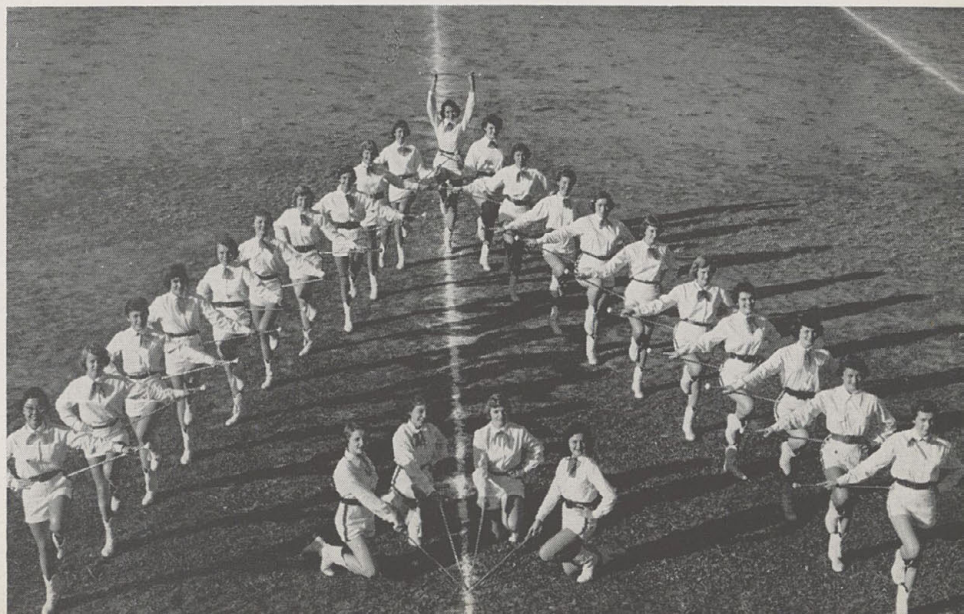

Annual Staff completes tome

Almost constant was the work for the 1956 Annual. Planning began in May, 1955, when "the many facets of Time" was selected as the basic, universal theme. Then, in June, the co-editors, Tom Minnich and Judie Wittlin, and the advisor, Miss Aria Parke Schawe, spent two days of hard thinking with the printers in Nashville, Tenn., in laying out a complete dummy. The first picture was taken at the graduation exercises of the Class of 1955.

Although planning clever picture shots was the work of the editors, the advisor, and the section heads, the actual photography was done by the staff photographers, Stephen Menyherth and Jack Farrell. Pictures had to be scheduled, props and costumes arranged for, and students advised long in advance. Photographic assignment cards giving exact requirements for each picture were posted. Later, with the use of a proportional wheel, all glossy prints were cropped.

Every day during the sixth bell, after school, on holidays, and one evening a week, the editors, advisors, and key staff members worked in the Annual Room identifying and selecting pictures, composing captions and heads, writing and re-writing copy, and pounding typewriters to meet the March 1 deadline.

Numerous, too, were the responsibilities of the business managers, David Ames and Elaine Ellerhorst. During the summer they scheduled senior picture appointments. In the fall, with the help of the staff, they organized a sales campaign. Throughout the year they kept records of money turned in by homeroom representatives, paid and sent out bills, with the aid of Mr. Clyde Hall, financial advisor. Jerry Franks assisted in getting advertising and patronage ads.

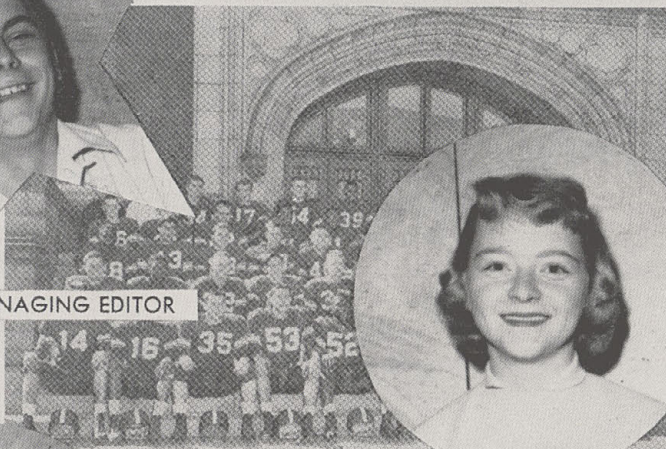
