

# Industrial Arts Shops Train Boys for Trades After Leaving Hughes

Classes in industrial arts are offered at Hughes for students who plan to go to work directly after high school. These classes give instruction in the skills which these students will need in their trade and which many students find useful in the home. Each year, many citizens of Hughestown, U.S.A., go from industrial arts courses into top jobs in shops, garages, and factories. These are the people who are adept with their hands and who enjoy working with wood, metals, and machines.


Hughes operates four shops: woodworking, electricity, metalwork, and printing. These shops compare very well with similar classes in vocational high schools, and students gain a much broader background here in academic subjects. Students make useful things for their homes and, after paying a nominal fee for the materials used, keep the fruits of their work. Hughes' industrial shops form an important working part of the school. For example, the printing shop, under the direction of Mr. Bongey, is kept very busy most of the year printing programs, notices, tickets, and invitations for the many organizations of Hughes.
