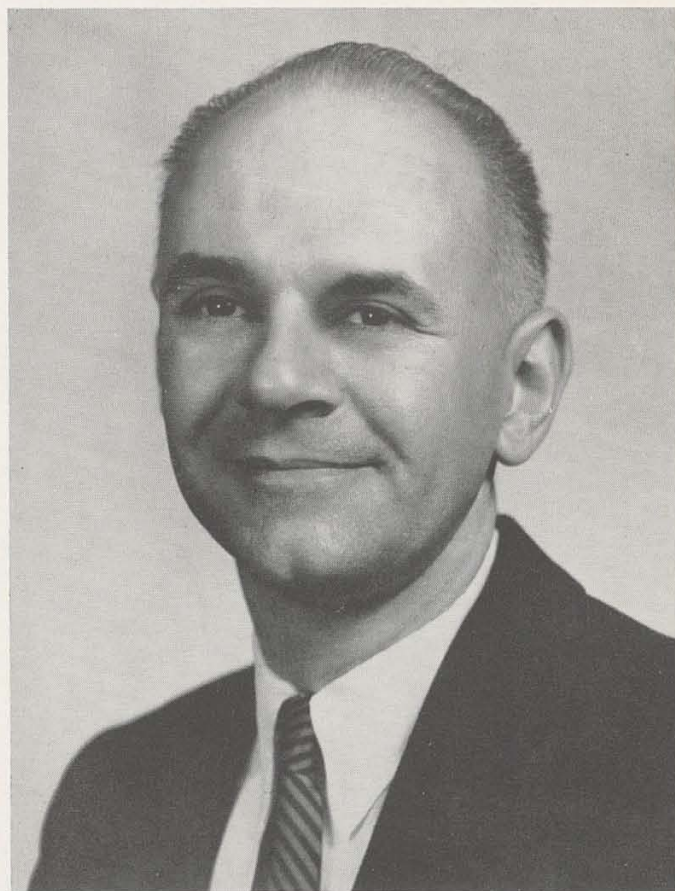


## Assistant Principal for Senior High

English plays a very large part in the life of students in Hughestown. In classes from the seventh grade on, pupils learn the fundamentals of their mother tongue, writing, speaking, and appreciative reading. Classes in journalism, dramatics, and speech are included in the English Department. Advanced standing classes are available for superior students who hope to skip college freshman English with credit. This year's seniors in the advanced standing class are the first to complete the full three-year program, since it was inaugurated. The Merry-Go-Round, the Annual, the Gargoyle, essay contests, and competitions like Boys' Week and Girls' Week give able students much practice in using the skills taught by the English staff at Hughestown. 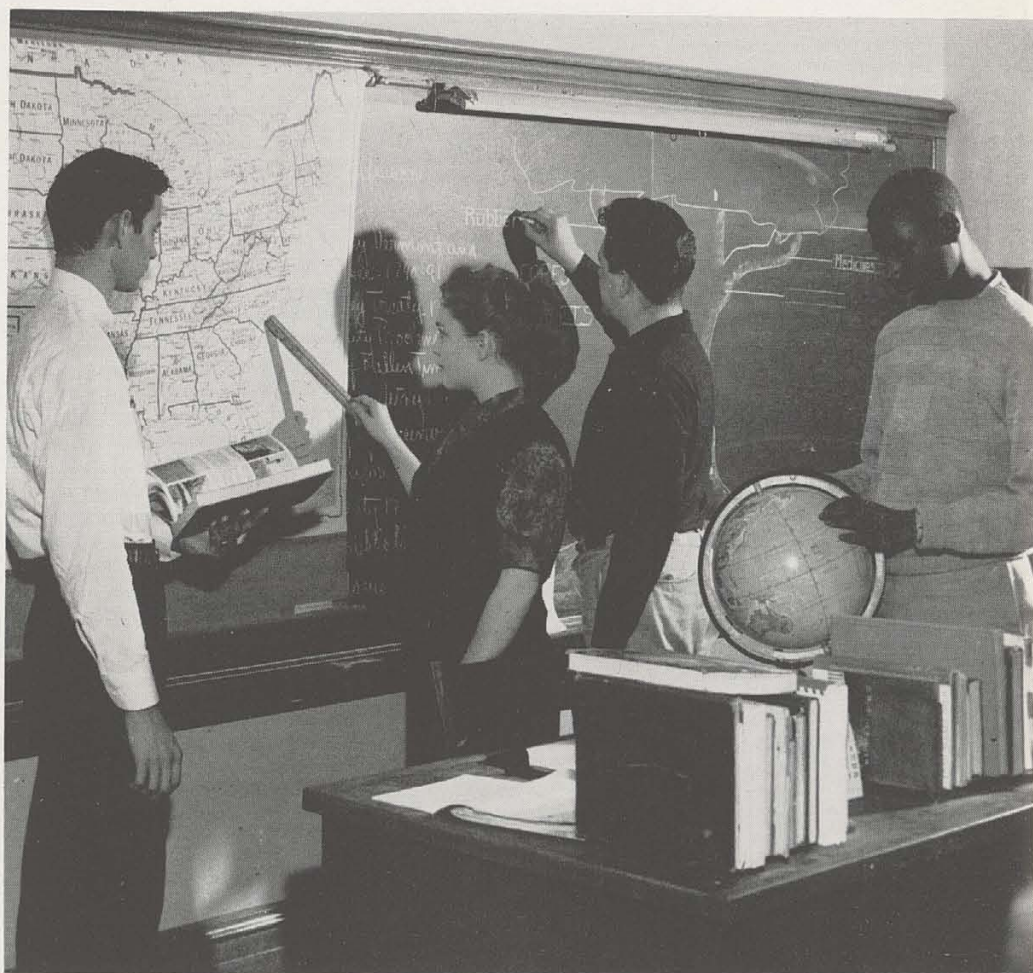


# Social Studies . . . Problems of Past and Present

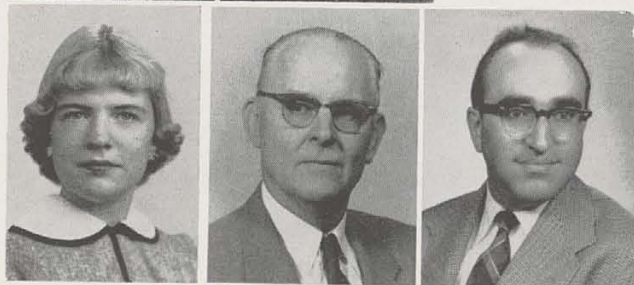

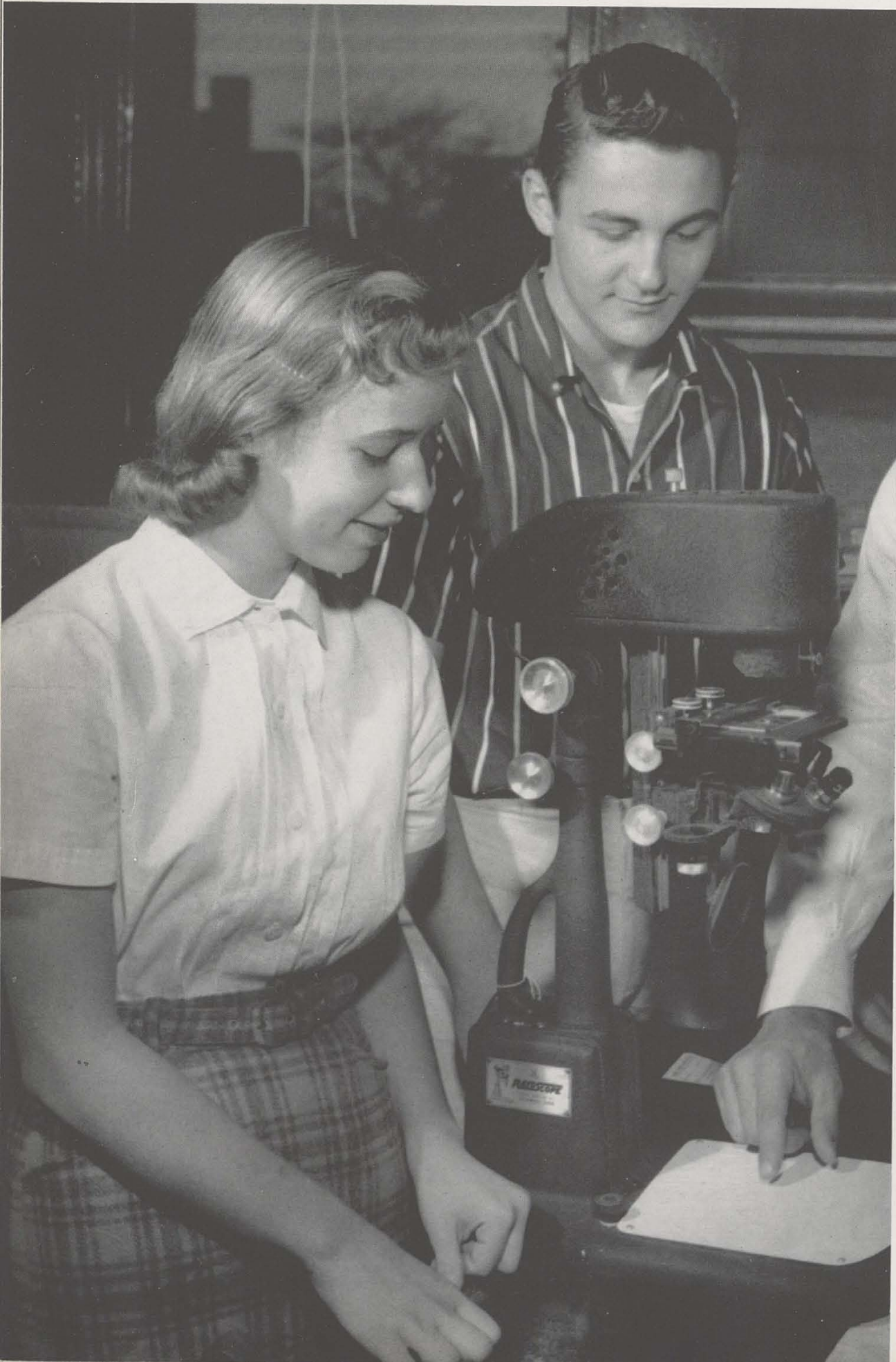

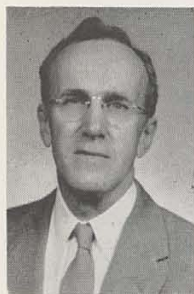

In this world of satellites and moon rockets, the training of youth in the various fields of science is of paramount importance to our country. The Hughes science department, among the largest and best in the city, is doing its part in giving students a better understanding not only of the phenomena of nature but also of the man-made wonders of the modern world.

Instruction in science starts in the junior high school, with two years of science and health required in the seventh and eighth grades. The Junior High Science Club, under Miss Newman, stimulates interest in many fields related to science. Speakers and films from different industries are parts of the club's program. Elective courses in science at Hughes include general science, biology, physiology, botany, zoology, physics, and chemistry. These courses are made intriguing and challenging by many experiments using the equipment of the Hughes science department's very excellent laboratories. Another example of Hughes' keeping up with the modern trends is the teaching of two classes with alternate days of television instruction and classroom discussion. These classes are taught by Mr. Monk, one of the new members of the Hughestown staff, and by Mr. Williams.

In summation, the Hughes science department uses many methods in striving to create interest in science and to inspire students to go into careers in this field, which is so all-important to the future of the entire world.

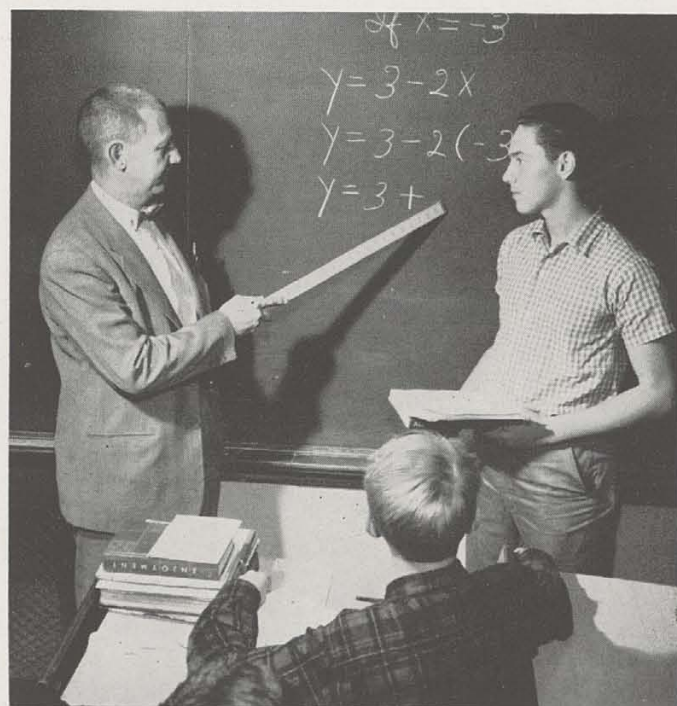

## Mathematics: Preparation

Mathematics, the exact science, teaches students to think for themselves, reason logically, and call upon past experience to serve present needs. At Hughes, there is a wide range of courses in mathematics, beginning with two required years of arithmetic in the seventh and eighth grades. Then, for the student who plans to go into a career in business after high school, there are elective courses in business arithmetic, general mathematics, and consumer mathematics. These emphasize the need for mathematics and reasoning in the business world. For those who want to go on to college, there are courses in algebra, plane geometry, solid geometry, and trigonometry. There are also advanced courses for qualified students, which go into calculus and analytic geometry. Interest in higher mathematics is stimulated in the Math Club, sponsored by Miss Austin and Miss Kloak.

The evidence is that the math department does its task well. Hughes always scores well in the annual national mathematics contest. This past year, the school received an award for the outstanding work of three Hughes students. There is, then, ample opportunity at Hughestown for the student interested in mathematics to learn and to put his knowledge to use.

The Mechanical Drawing Department of Hughestown proudly boasts of having the best equipment in the city. Under the excellent instruction of Mr. Robert Keller and Mr. Edgar Hare, a resident of Hughestown will be well prepared to enter the field of engineering or architecture.

The first year of drawing is devoted to the basic fundamental aspect of construction. From here a student may enter a more advanced course in engineering or architectural drawing. If a student undertakes the study of engineering drawing, he will learn how to design gears, sockets, and threads, make blueprints, and use the drafting machine. If, however, he chooses architectural drawing, he will design and construct models of buildings.

Each year there are several contests for students of drawing with Hughes usually receiving several awards.

These classes give instruction in the skills which these students will need in their trade and which many students find useful in the home. Each year, many citizens of Hughestown, U.S.A., go from industrial arts courses into top jobs in shops, garages, and factories. These are the people who are adept with their hands and who enjoy working with wood, metals, and machines.

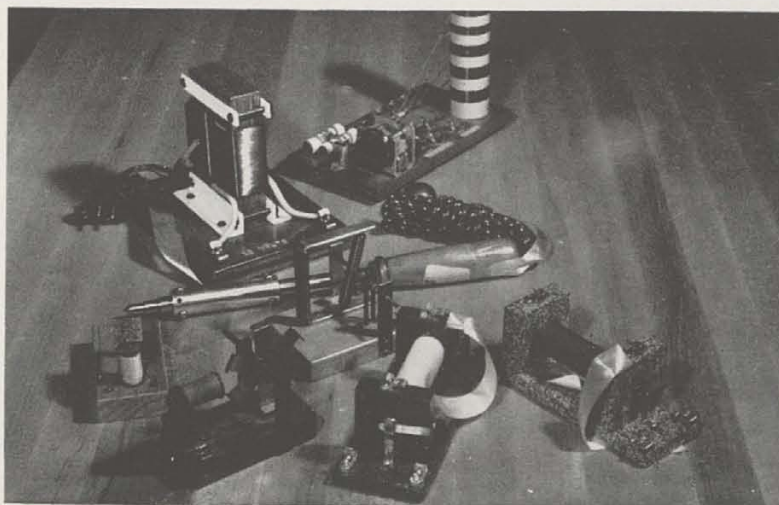
Hughes operates four shops: woodworking, electricity, metalwork, and printing. These shops compare very well with similar classes in vocational high schools, and students gain a much broader background here in academic subjects. Students make useful things for their homes and, after paying a nominal fee for the materials used, keep the fruits of their work. Hughes' industrial shops form an important working part of the school. For example, the printing shop, under the direction of Mr. Bongey, is kept very busy most of the year printing programs, notices, tickets, and invitations for the many organizations of Hughes.

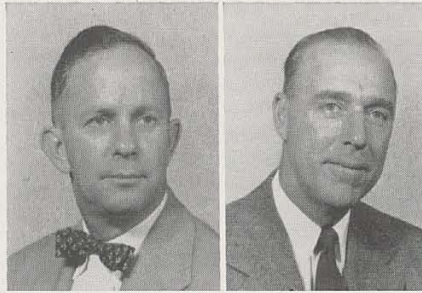

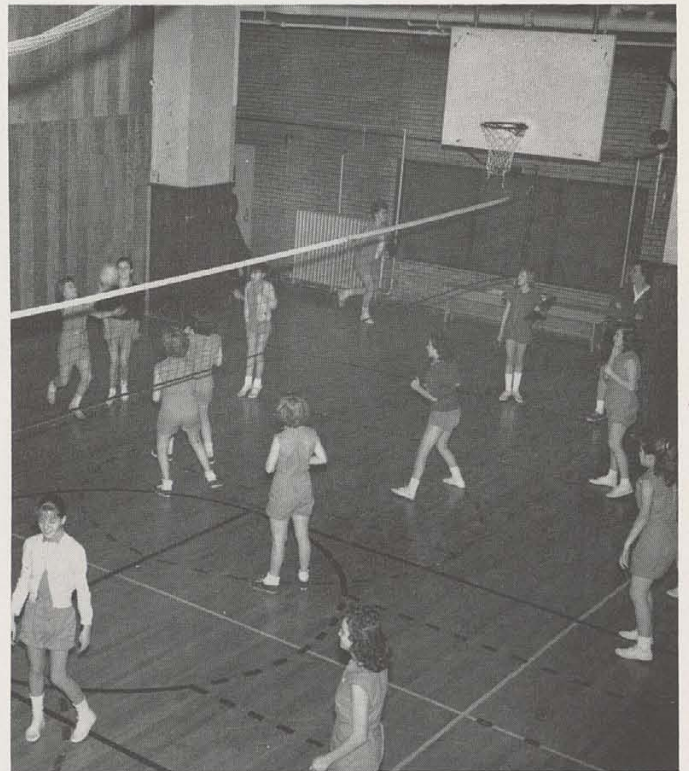

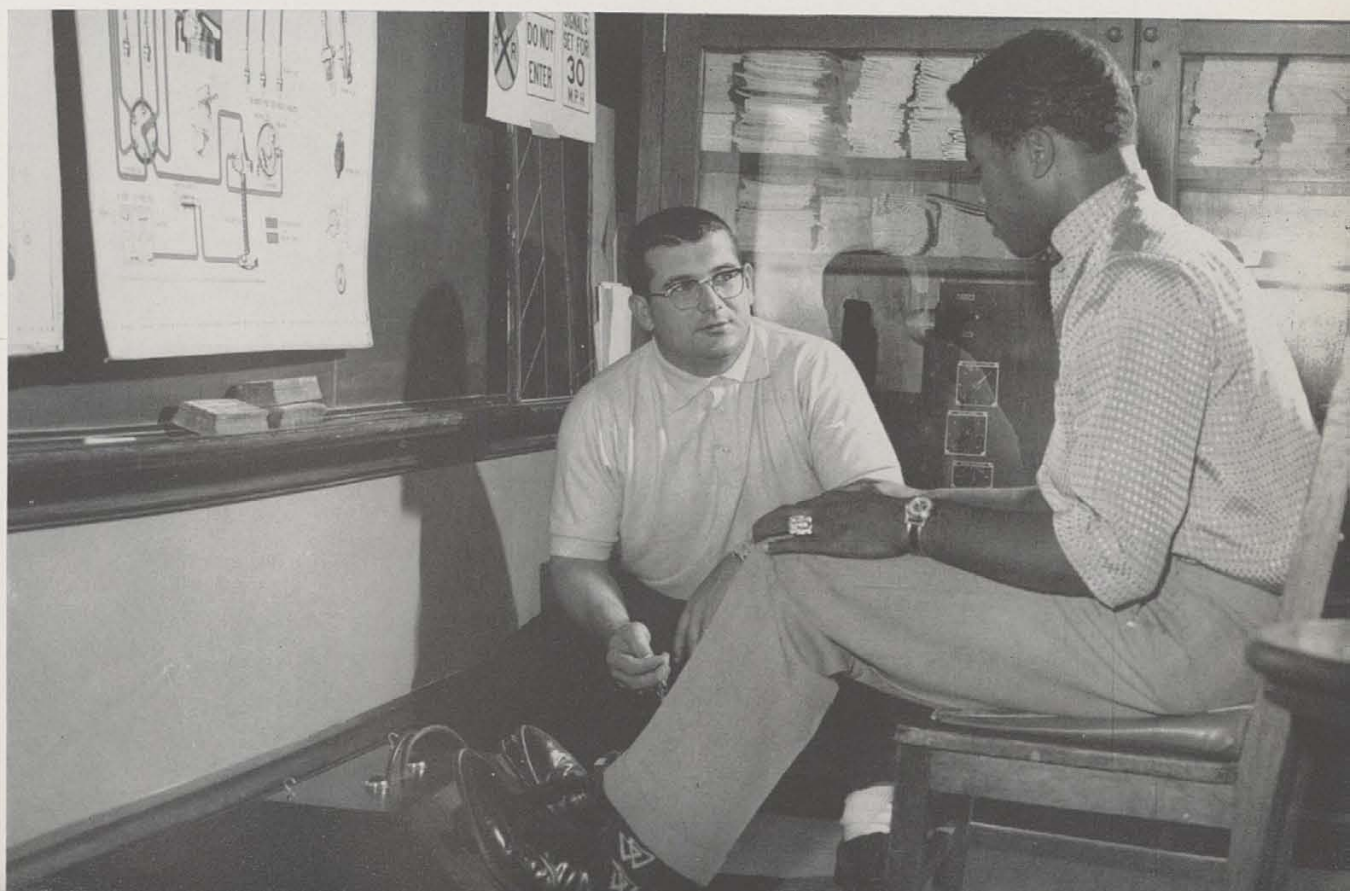
Health, a requirement in the tenth and twelfth grades, teaches students proper procedure for taking care of themselves in various emergencies. First aid instruction, leading to a Red Cross certificate of competence in emergency assistance, is given with a course in home nursing for all types of diseases and injuries. This gives Hughestown citizens an excellent basis for maintaining the good health of family members in their homes of the future.

For one semester, students receive instruction in driver education. These classes teach the motoring public of tomorrow safety rules, proper driving techniques, basic mechanics of the automobile, and its proper care. It is the hope of the teachers that the students will be better prepared for the future because of instruction in health and driver education.

# Home Economics Develops Homemaking Skills

With its modern equipment and very capable instructors, Hughes is the ideal place for future homemakers to acquire the knowledge they will need in the years to come. Home economics is available to all girls of Hughestown, from the seventh through the twelfth grades.

Before beginning actually to sew, the students become acquainted with the different types and qualities of fabrics, and they learn what to look for when buying material. Besides having class fashion shows and designing their own clothes, the students do various sewing jobs for the school and the community, such as making curtains for some of the offices, sewing bibs for the Children's Hospital, and creating costumes for school dramatic productions.

Along with cooking the girls learn budgeting and different table settings.

A special course in homemaking is offered to those seniors who have had no previous training in home economics. In this course they learn the essentials of home planning, family relations, and child care.

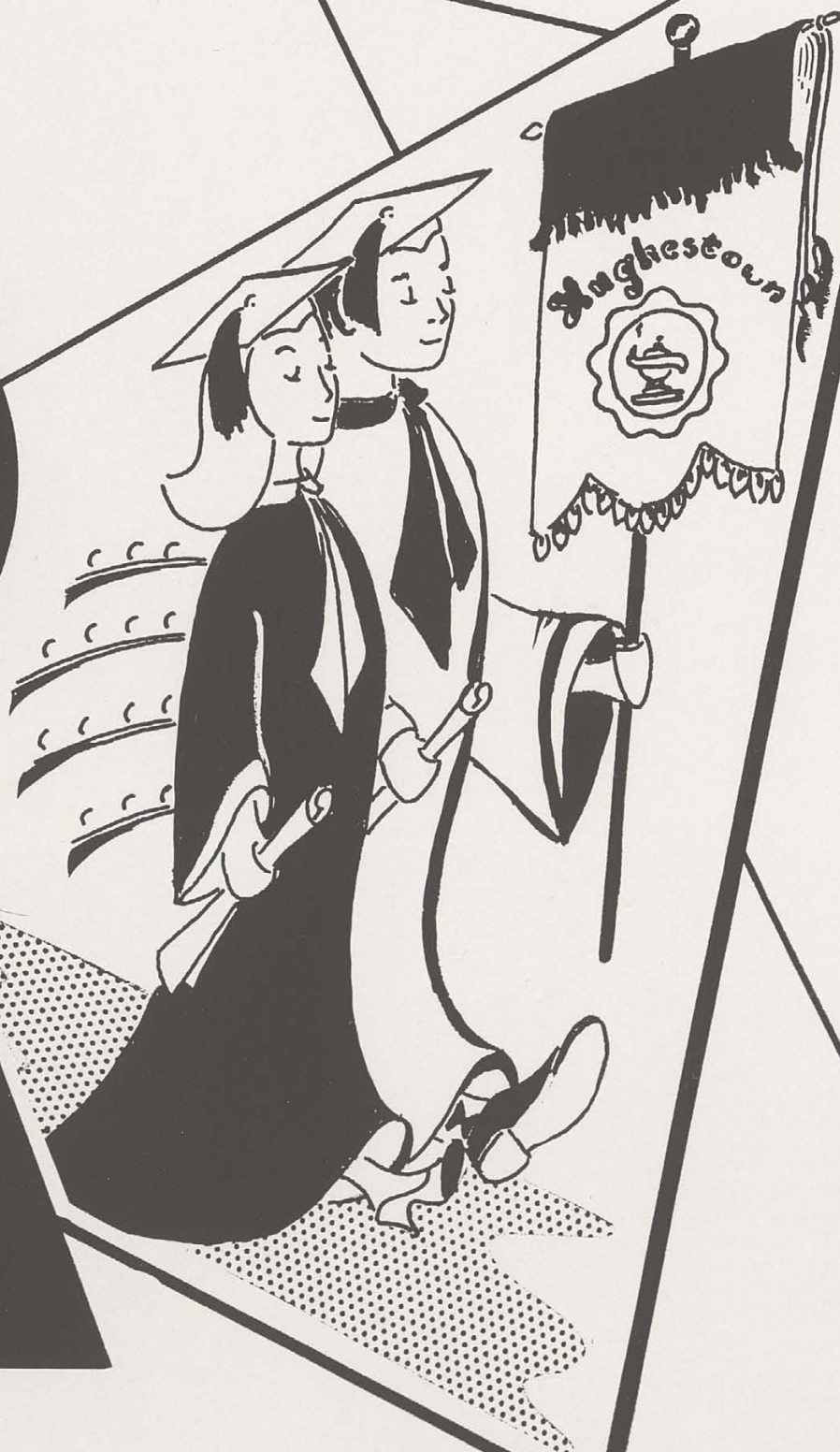

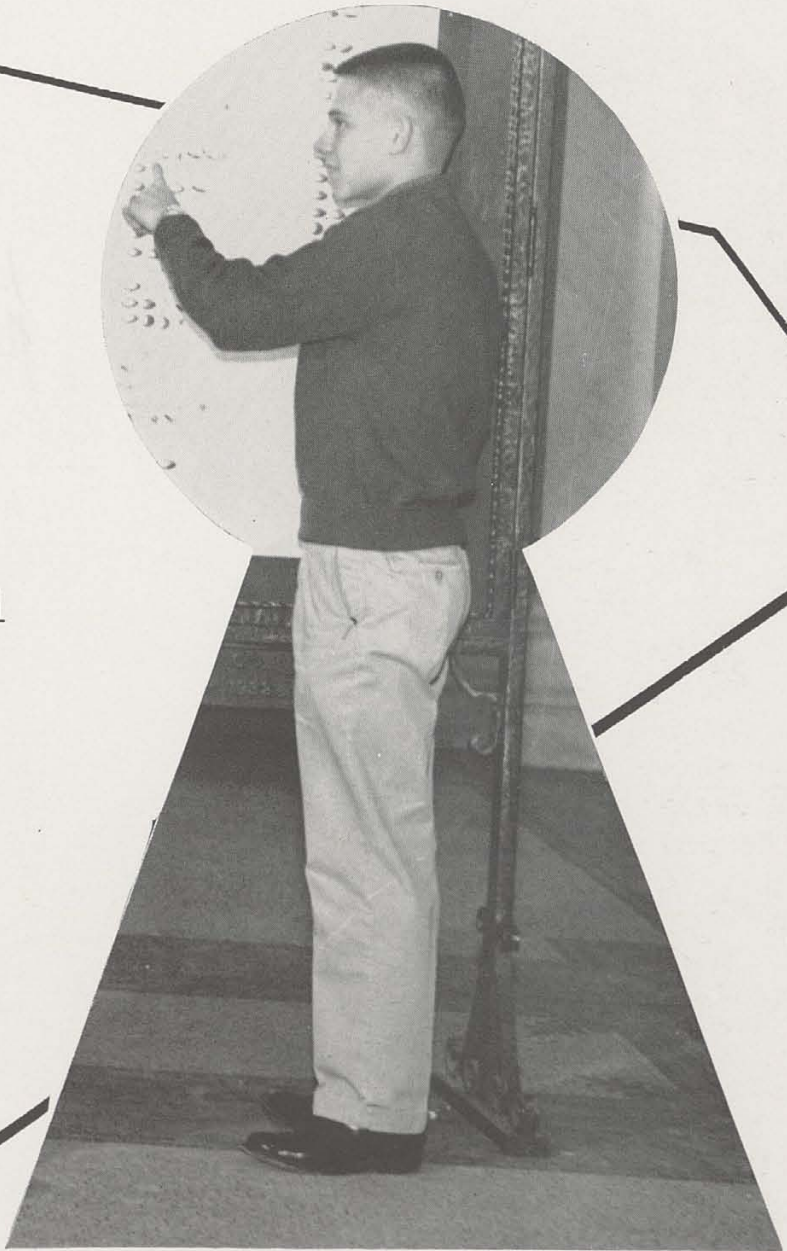


The three years spent by Hughestown citizens in the senior high are the most important in their school careers. Here the students put to use the knowledge acquired during their previous school years. Here they experiment for themselves, instead of just reading science from a textbook; they read the full-length works of the immortals, rather than the simplified versions; they derive for themselves the theories of the great mathematicians, instead of accepting them unquestionably. Climaxed by graduation, these three years prepare the students for their life as adults.





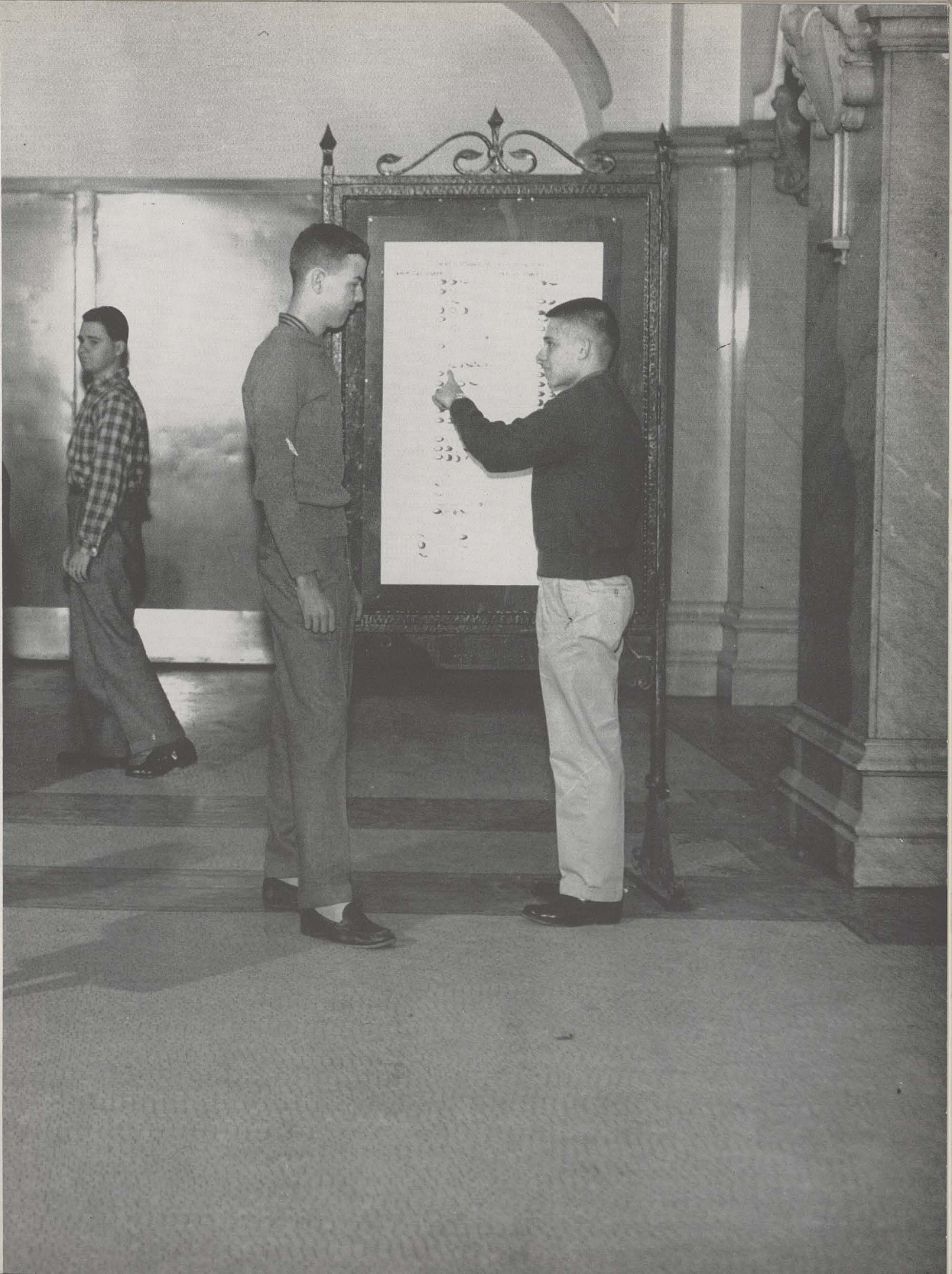

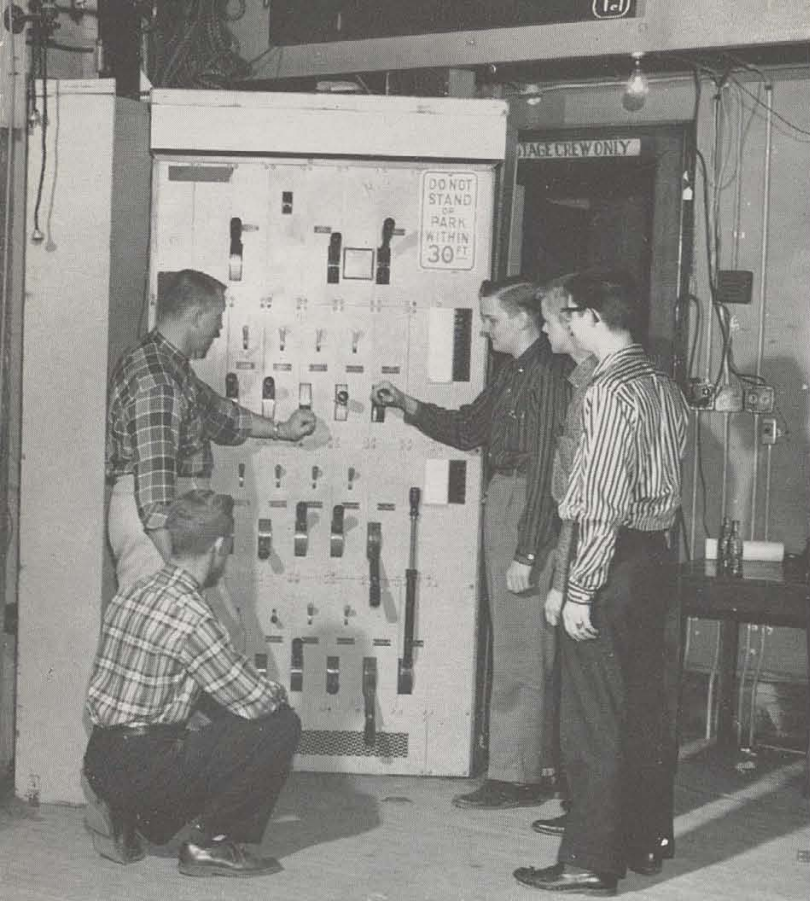


## Tel Boys Rule Backstage

Due to the change in the printing company, many new problems had to be faced. The new style is called offset, but in considering the first few copies of it, the staff described it as "upset."

The new Gargoyle is two inches longer than the former one, but the type lacks the face of the old style type.

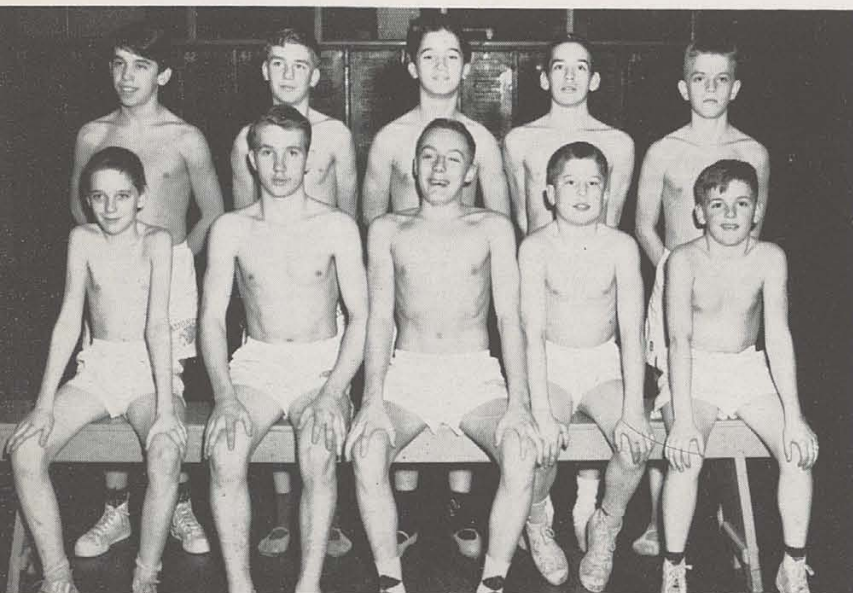


## Sports—Fun, Friendship

## Gridders Finish First

The Hughes Big Reds football team, after a slow start, went on to win five of its last six games and a share of the Public High School League crown. Hughes' first four games were played against tough teams, which were all rated in the top twenty-five high schools in Ohio Class AA. The team had trouble scoring points and also allowed their pass defense to slacken in these games. This partly accounted for their losses. When put up against P.H.S.L. competition, Hughes responded like champions for the first five games but then

collapsed against a weak Taft team. Thus, the Big Reds became co-holders, with Western Hills, of the P.H.S.L. championship in football for 1958.

In the first game, which was played with Xenia Central at Xenia, Ohio, Hughes suffered a 33-14 defeat. Hughes' teamwork was evidently disorganized at this early date in the season. However, the team did show the speed of its backfield when Charlie Braddock and Jesse Hodges each had a long run for a touchdown.

A week later, Hughes took on a very strong Roger Bacon team, which was destined to become the top high school team in Ohio for the 1958 season. Hughes had little luck with Bacon and, in spite of strong defensive efforts by Steve Ranker, end, and Elliot Williams, back, wound up on the short end of a 30-0 score.

Hughes battled a tough Middletown team to the last seconds and finally lost 21-20, in the third game. Hughes' defensive line had a hard time stopping an effective Middle quarterback sneak. The offense started clicking, though, and found Jesse Hodges breaking away and outrunning the Middletown secondary for touchdowns of 42 and 75 yards.

Hamilton's Big Blue played host to the Big Reds in their fourth game. After a tough battle during the first half, which ended in a 6-6 tie, Hamilton put on sustained drives with powerful bursts through the Hughes line and short jump passes to pile up a 27-6 victory.

In its first league game, Hughes stunned a long rival, Withrow, 29-0. The Big Reds were led by quarterback Kenny Peters, who ran the team offensively, and by Tom Parthenakis and Larry Walker, linemen, who kept Withrow cold with their fine defensive play. Peters scored two touchdowns and Elliot Williams and Larry Hughes added one each as the Big Reds cracked the winning column for the first time.

Although Western Hills was a heavy favorite in Hughes' fourth league game, which was the deciding game for the P.H.S.L. championship, a high-spirited Hughes squad scored 37 points in the first half, finally winning 43-22. Elliot Williams led the Big Red scoring with two touchdowns, and lineman Larry Walker tallied once by picking up one of two Western Hills punts that were blocked by the Hughes' linebacker, Charlie Neal.

Hughes continued its winning streak by defeating the Walnut Hills Eagles 14-12. An inspired Walnut Hills squad gave the Big Reds a scare by controlling the ball for all but four plays in the last half. Kenny Peters carried over for one touchdown, after which Larry Walker, lineman, scored the two extra points that proved to be the winning margin. Jesse Hodges scored Hughes' final tally on a twenty-two yard end run.

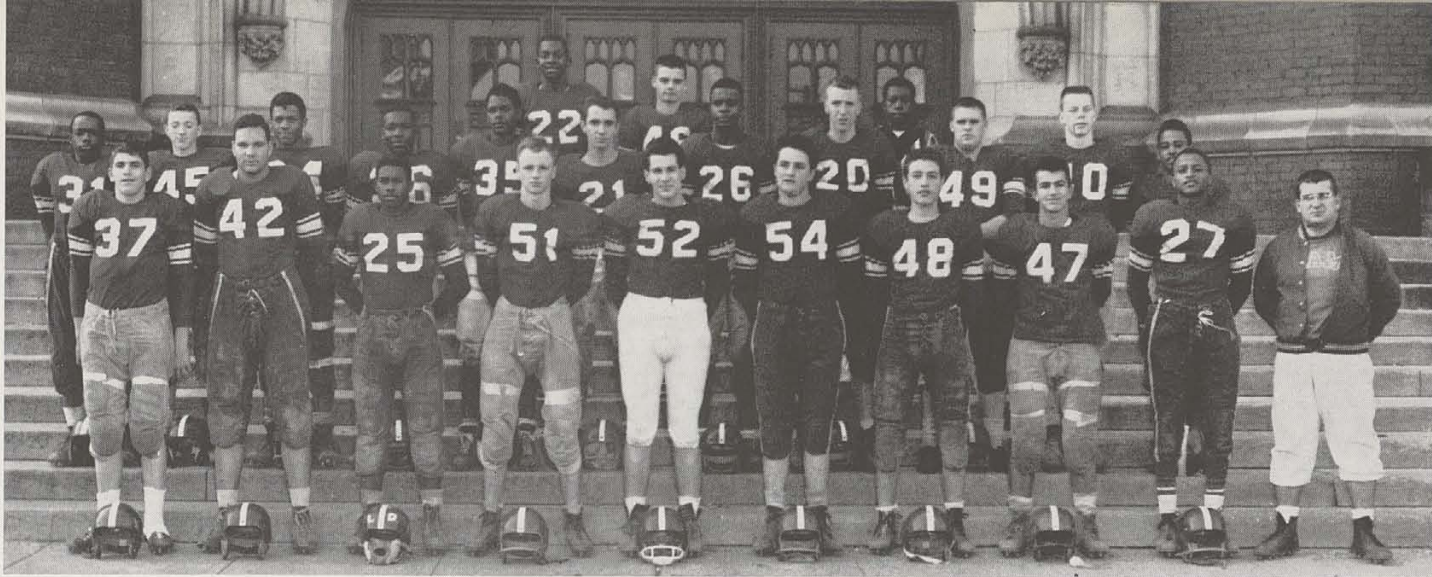
All in all, the Big Reds, under Coach Thomas, had a fine year, especially in P.H.S.L. play, in which Hughes shared the championship with Western Hills.

The Hughes Big Red harrier brought back to Hughestown a fourth-place finish in the Public High School League and also a fourth-place finish in District Meet. Hughes was off to a good start in the first P.H.S.L. meet with a total of sixty-five points and finished third, only ten points behind the winning team, Woodward. After the first meet, the Big Reds dropped to fourth in the final two meets and had a three-meet total of 267 points.

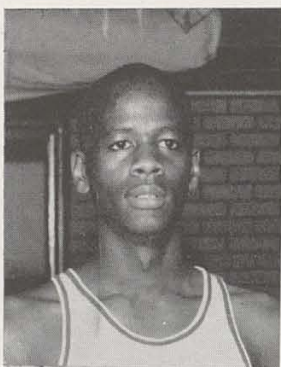

The Big Reds, under the leadership of Coach Howard "Burley" Grimes, employed a switching man-to-man defense and a two out, three in, offense the whole season. Hughes, as a whole, had a very accurate team in field goals as they hit over 45% of their shots from the floor, but they were below average in foul shooting. During the season the players practiced every day after school, working on full-court presses and practicing free throws especially, along with the regular fundamentals.

Excluding the Central games, Hughes had an exceptional 8 won, 2 lost record in P.H.S.L. play. In their first league game, the Big Reds lost to Woodward 58-46, but countered by defeating Walnut Hills 61-52 and then Western Hills 63-60. These wins were paced by Todd Ertel, Hughes forward, who scored 20 points against the Eagles and 14 against Western. Following their loss to Central, Hughes downed the Taft Senators 46-40 in a low-scoring game, which found Tom Whitaker high-point man in the game with 15 points.

The Big Reds then won four straight games extending their winning streak to five, which was the longest of the season. Wins over Withrow, Woodward, and Walnut Hills, together with a non-league victory over Anderson, put Hughes in a tie for first in the P.H.S.L. with Central. In these four games Hughes displayed fine teamwork and ability to overcome their opponent's first-half leads. Stacy Bunton, 6'8" center for the Big Reds, was Hughes' outstanding player in this win-streak, as he totaled 30 points in the 71-68 win over Withrow, 9 points in the 50-49 win over Woodward, and 15 in the Anderson game. Against Walnut Hills, Hughes played excellent ball, tallying their highest score of the season with 81 while holding Walnut to 65. 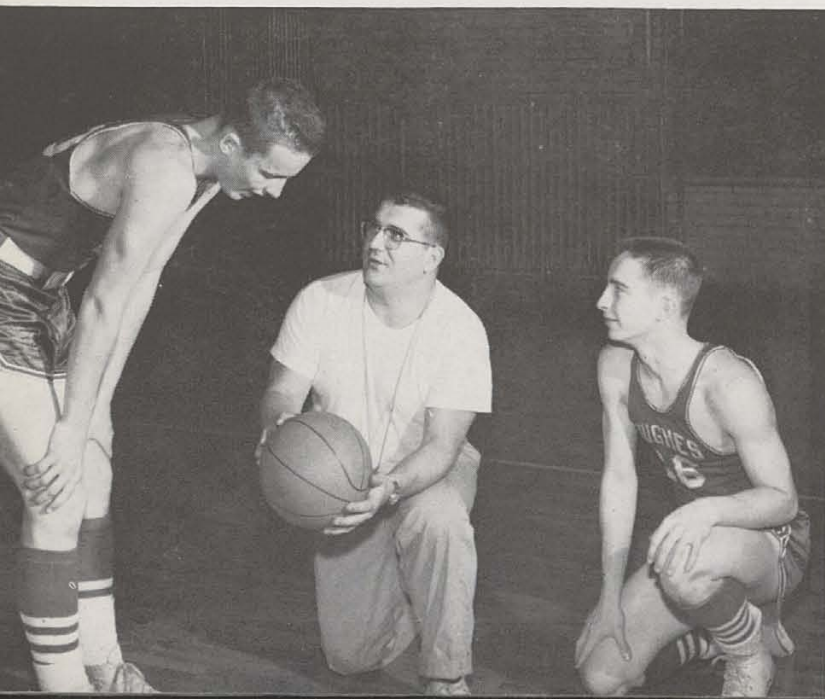

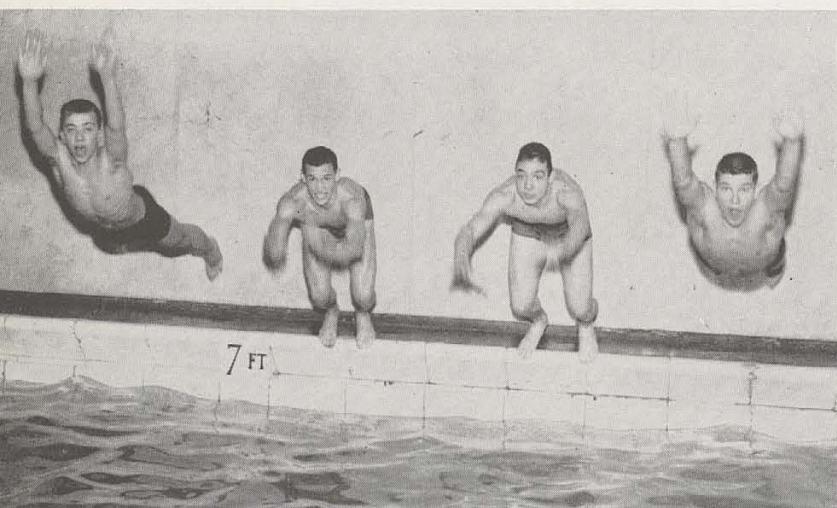
The next two games were not happy ones for Hughes fans as their team lost to Western Hills and then suffered defeat at the hands of Central by a 40-point margin.

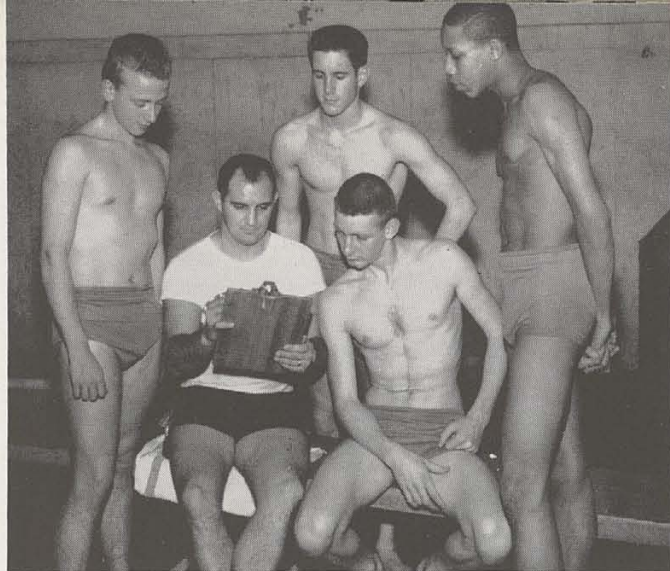


Diving (left to right): Cliff Young, Bob Bibee, Dave Hudson, Ray Nulsen.

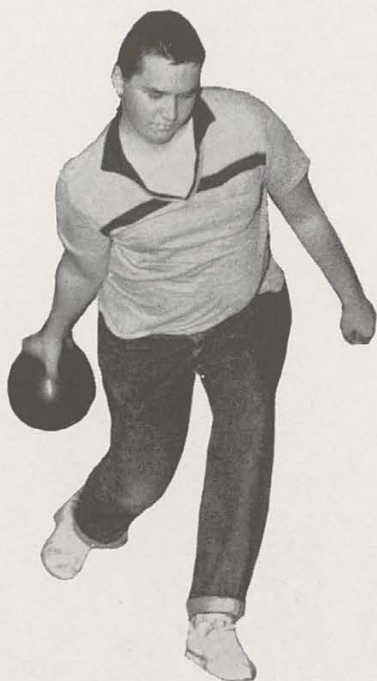

Coach Richert, who is celebrating his twenty-fifth year as track coach at Hughes, expects the boys to have the desire to put the Hughestown team on top!

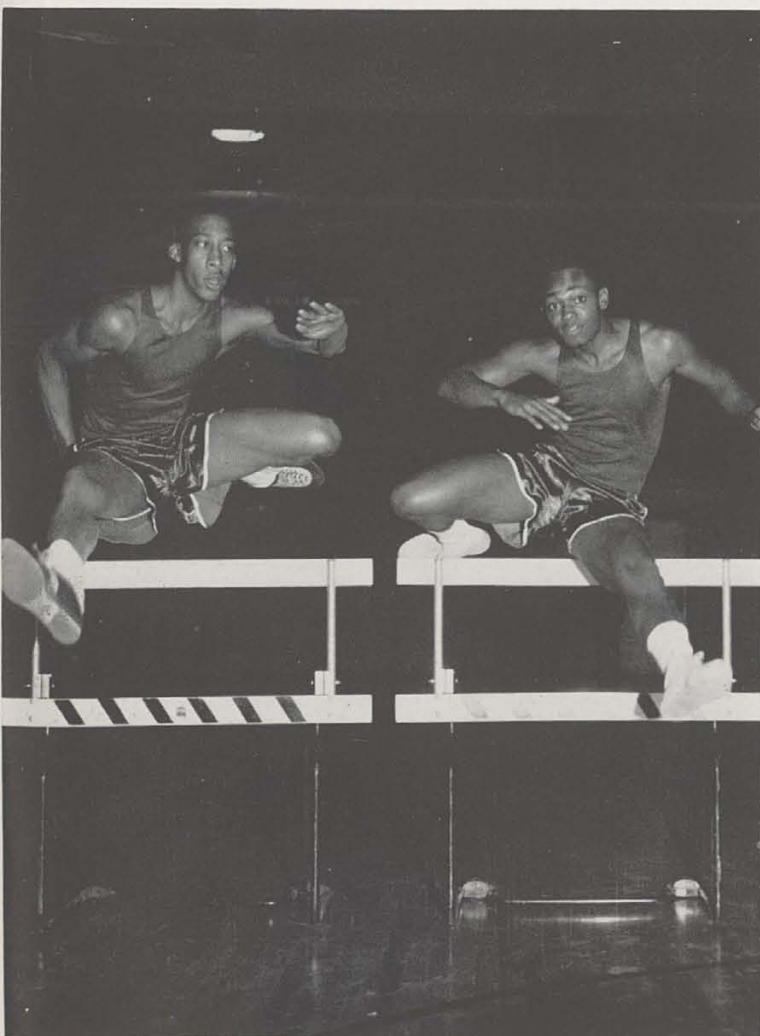


Richard Boehm and Bob Banes demonstrate correct form in putting the shot and throwing the discus.

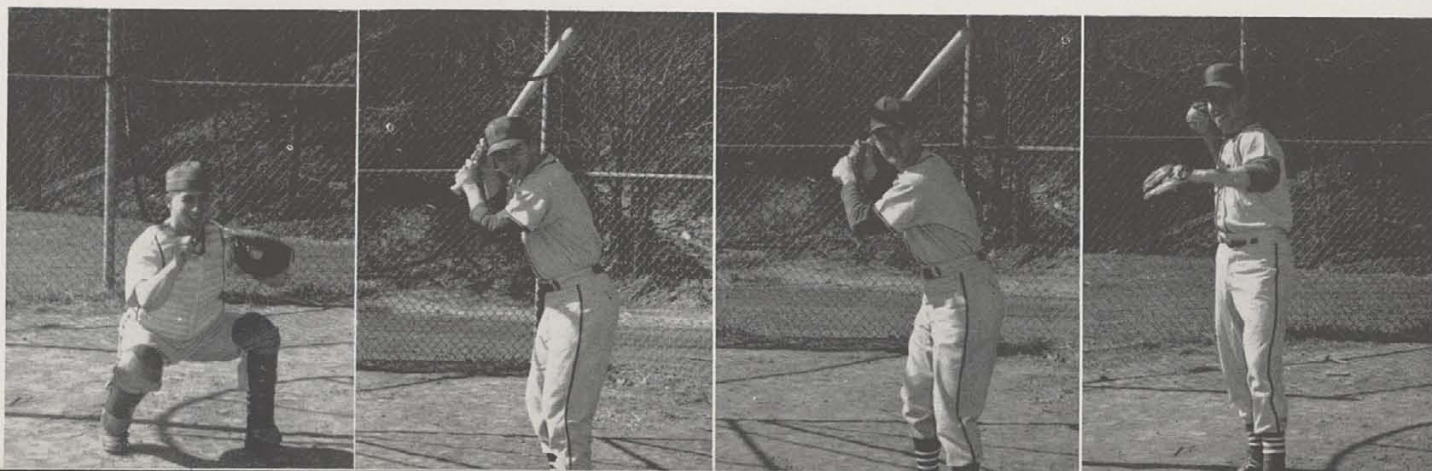

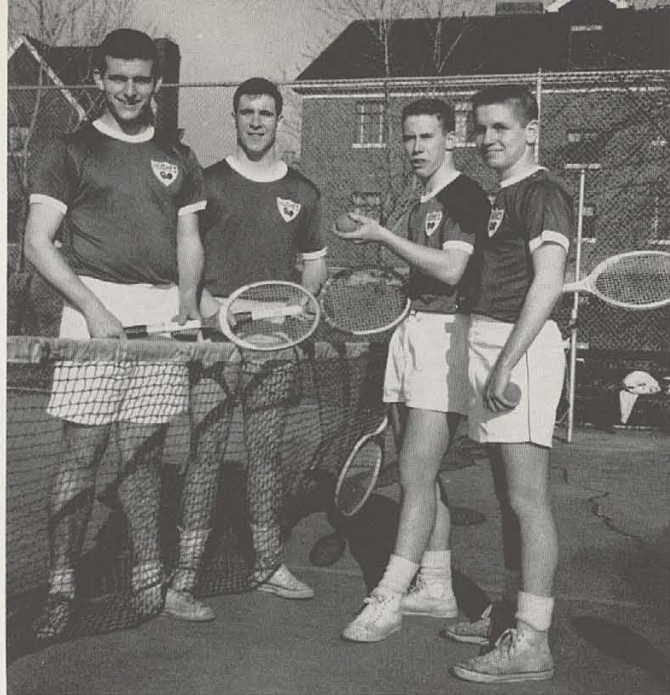

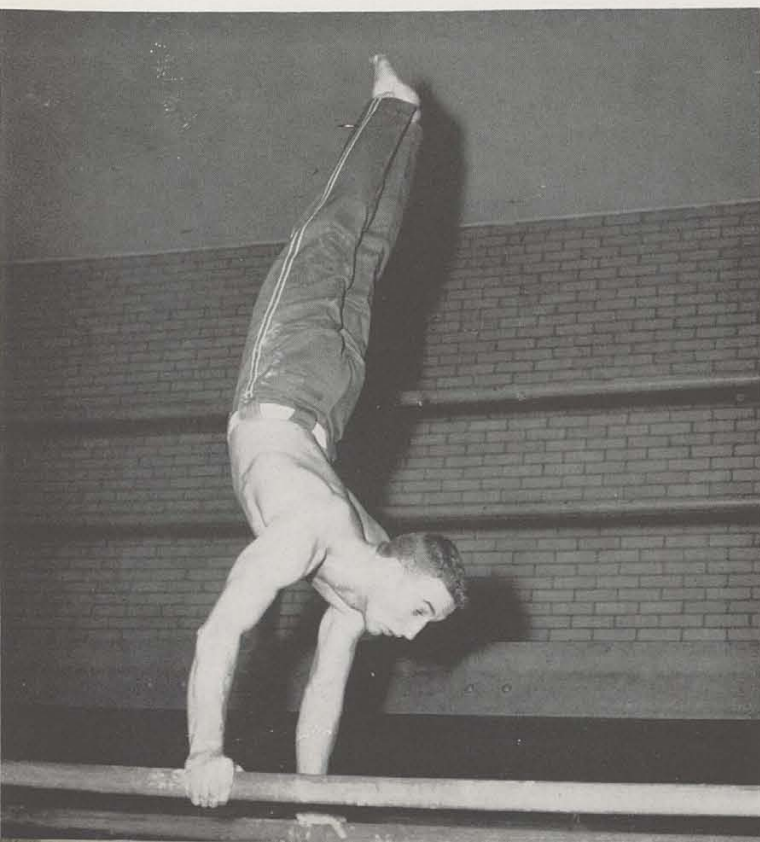

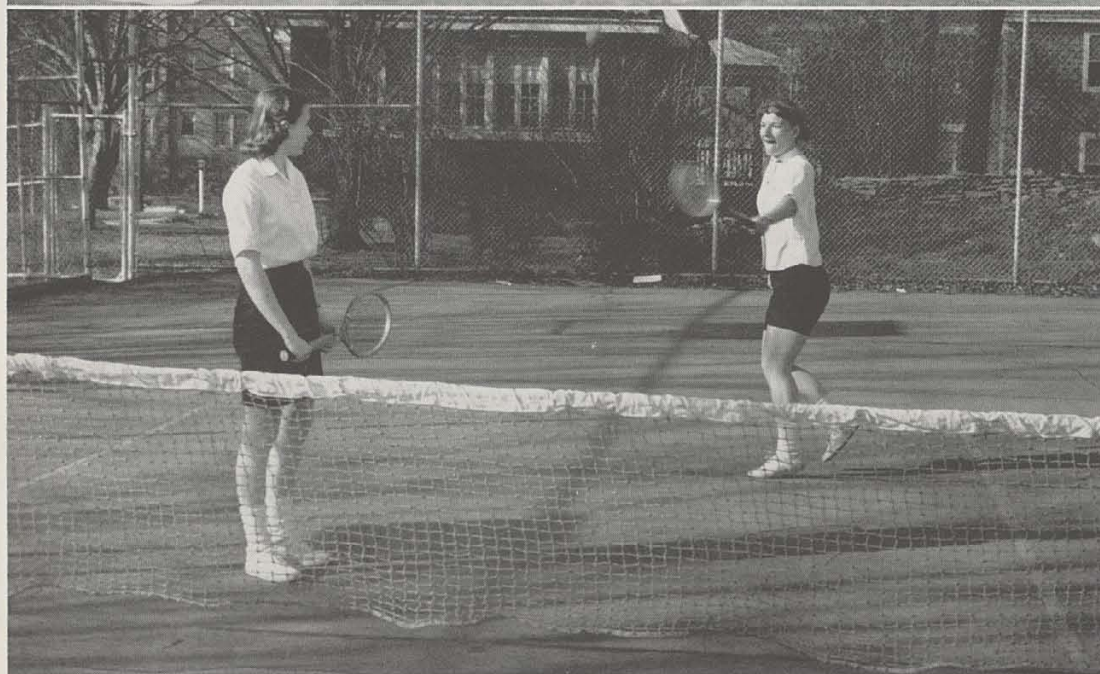

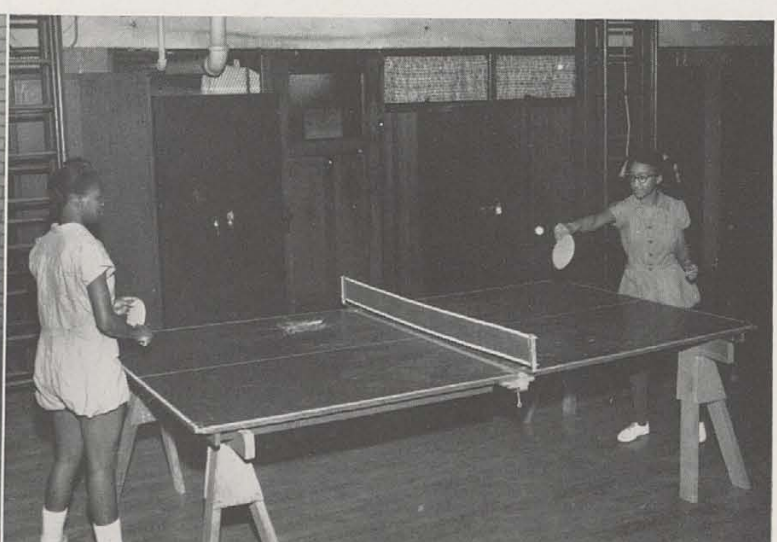
## Individual Sports

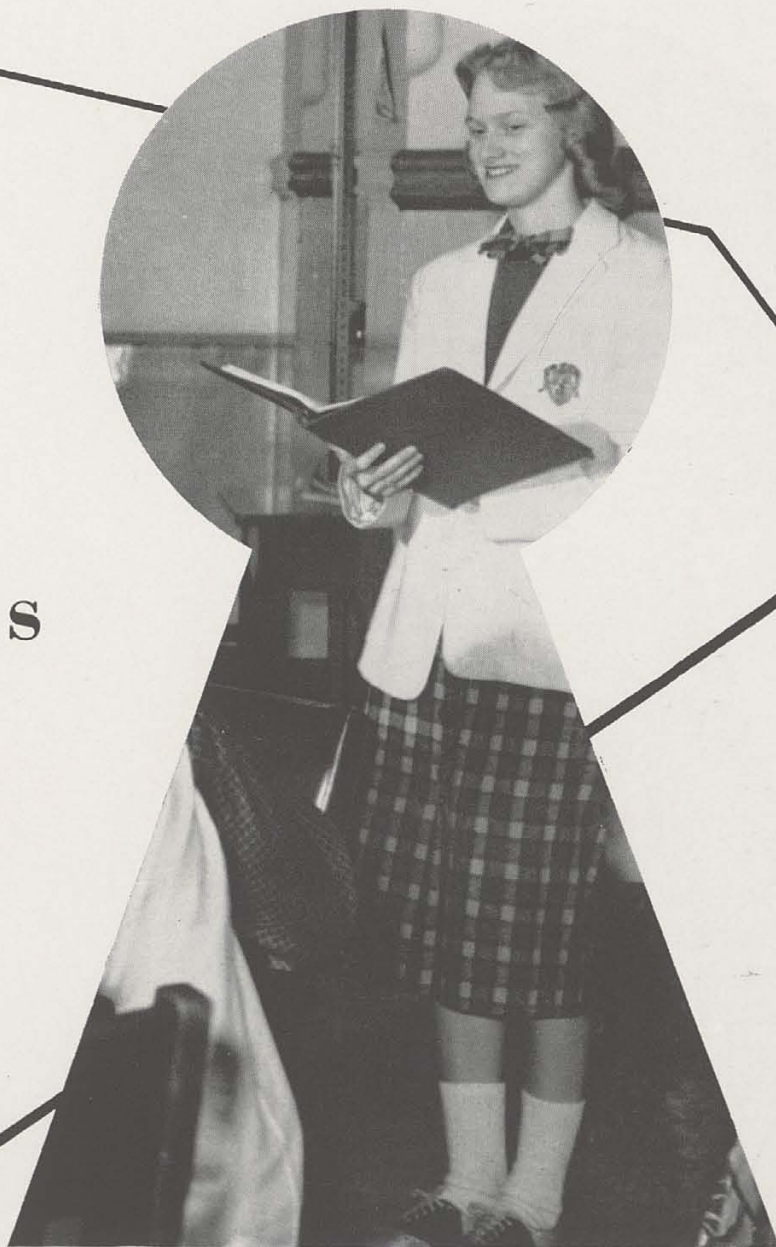

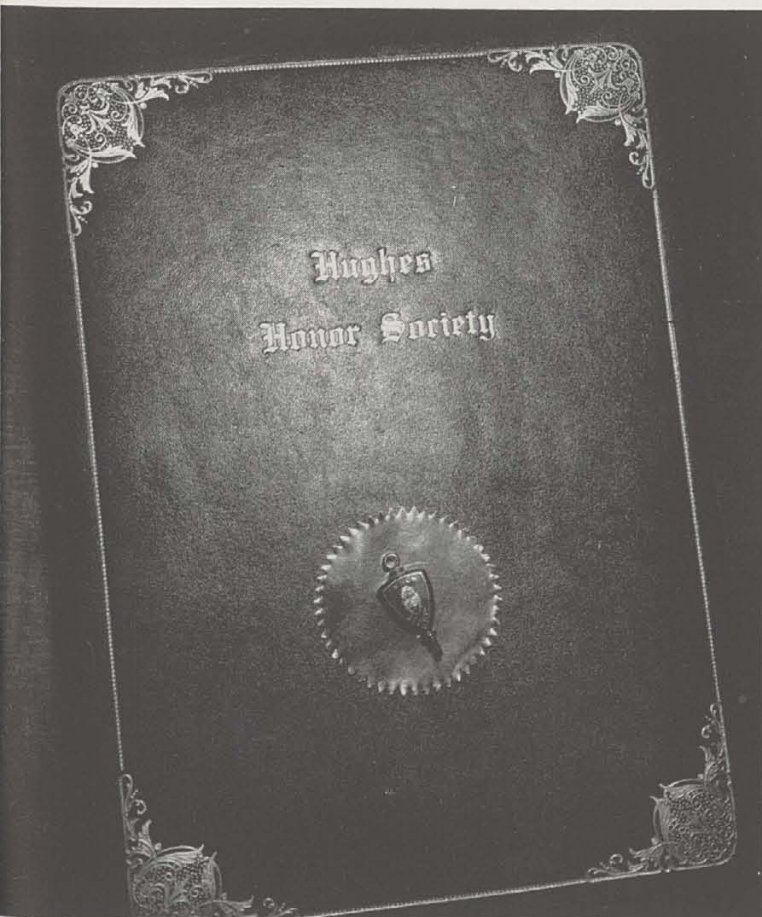
# Honor Society

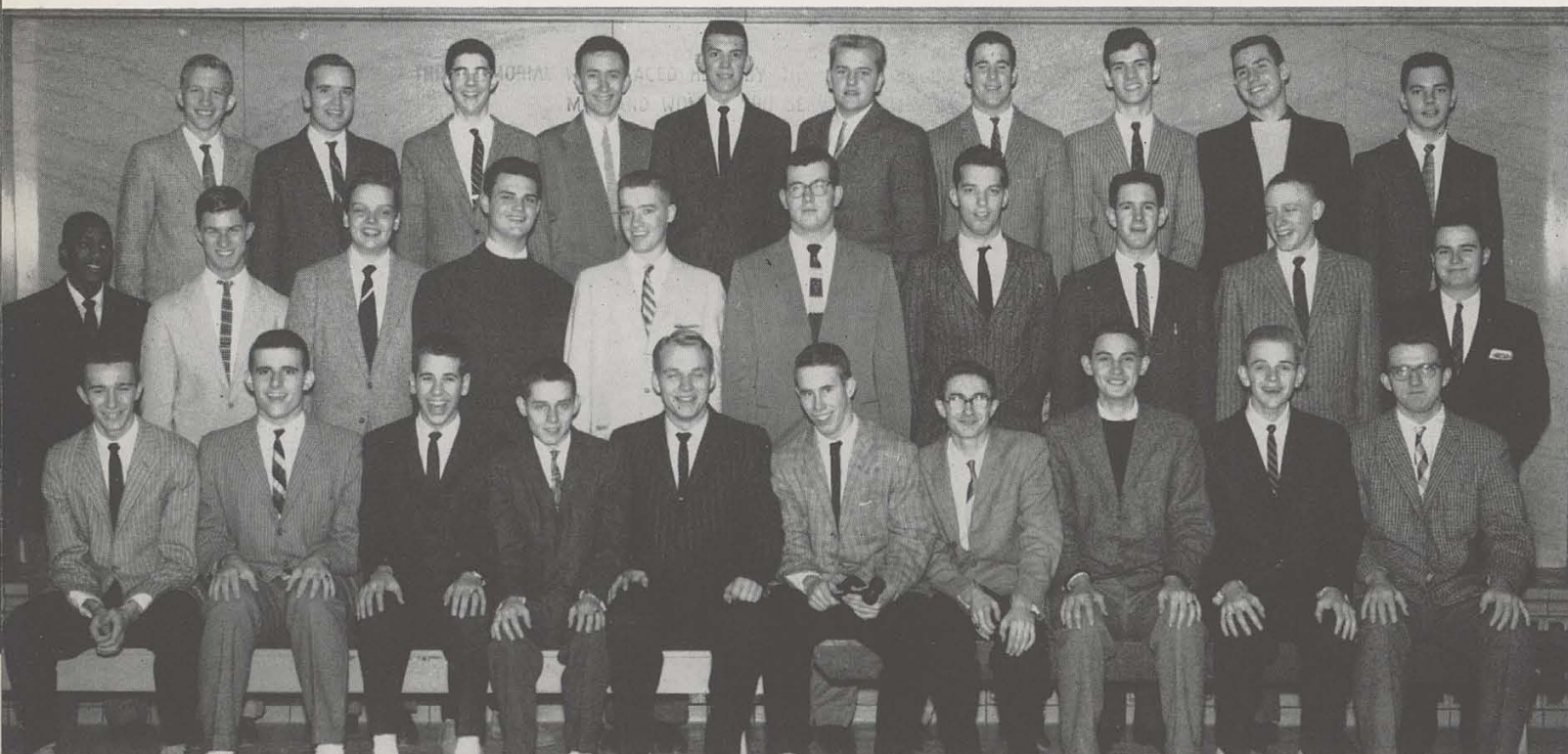
The event which all the boys look forward to most is the trip to Butler State Park near Carrollton, Kentucky, over Memorial Day week-end.

Latin Club is among the oldest clubs at Hughes. Latin Club is better known as Togati, so named because of the ancient toga-clad race whose language the members of the club study.

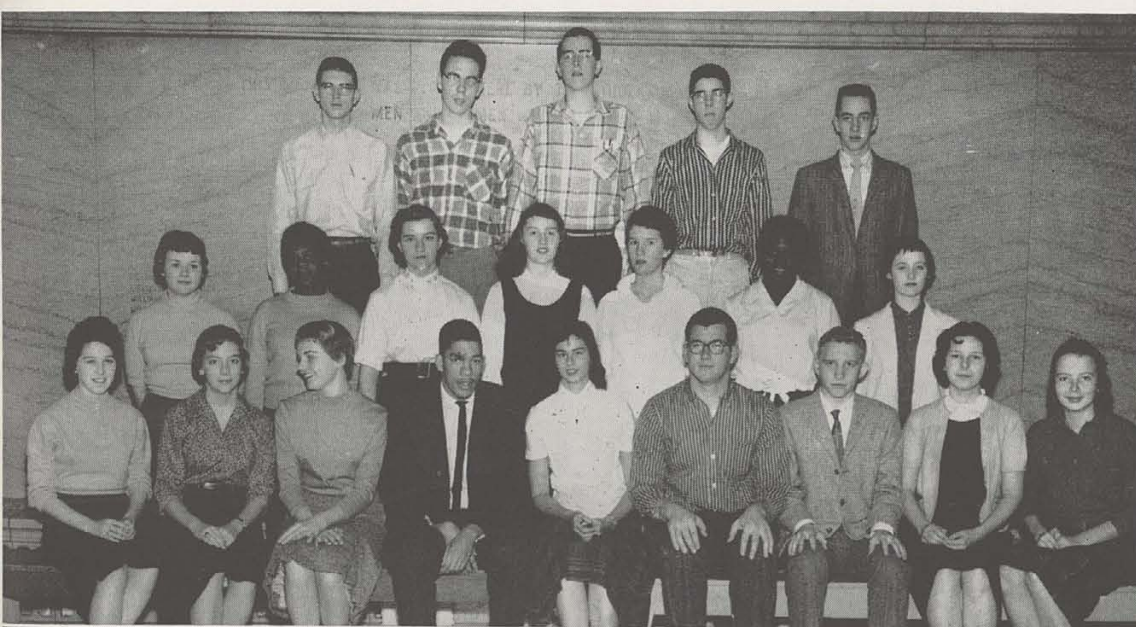

## Beta Hi-Y

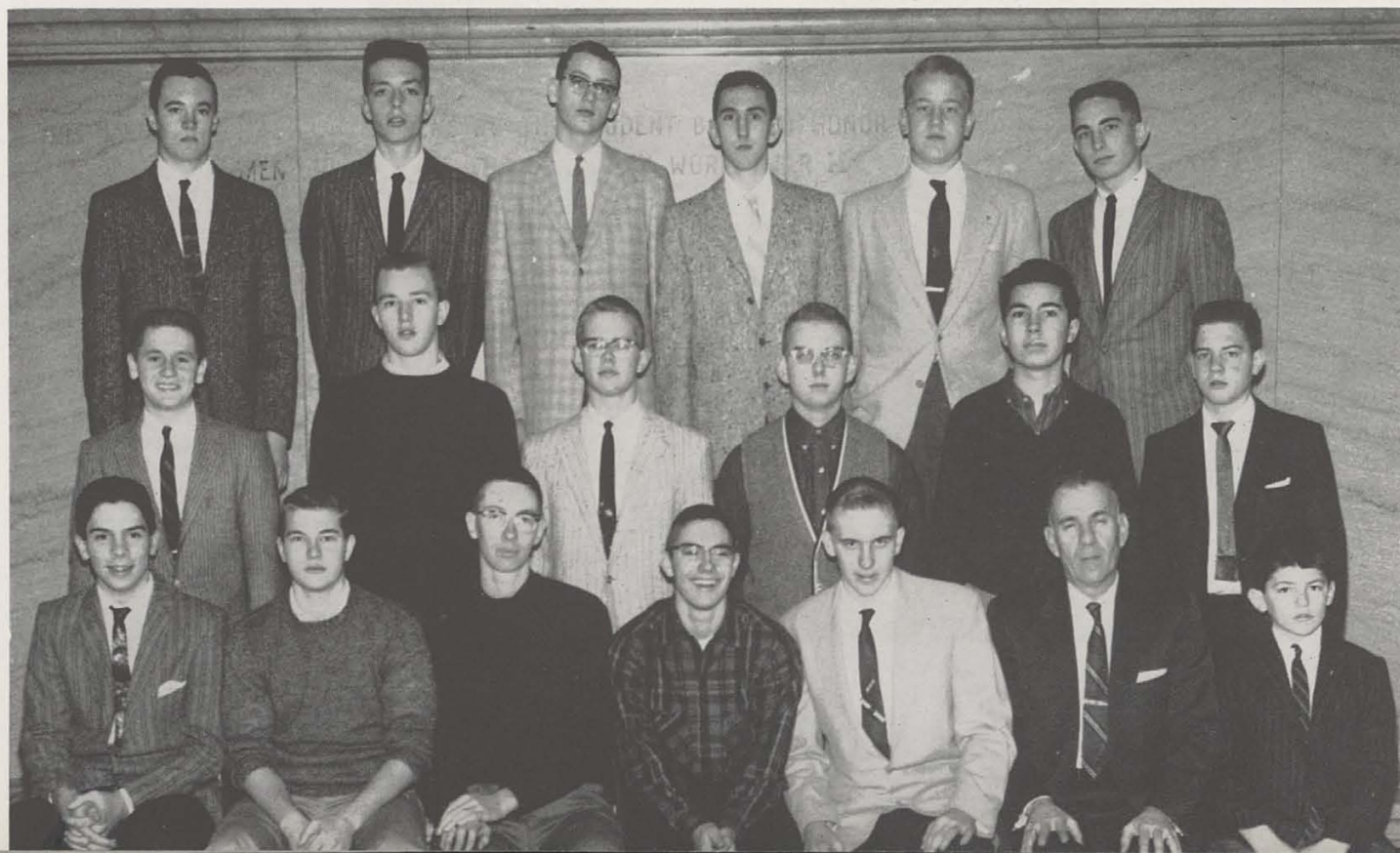

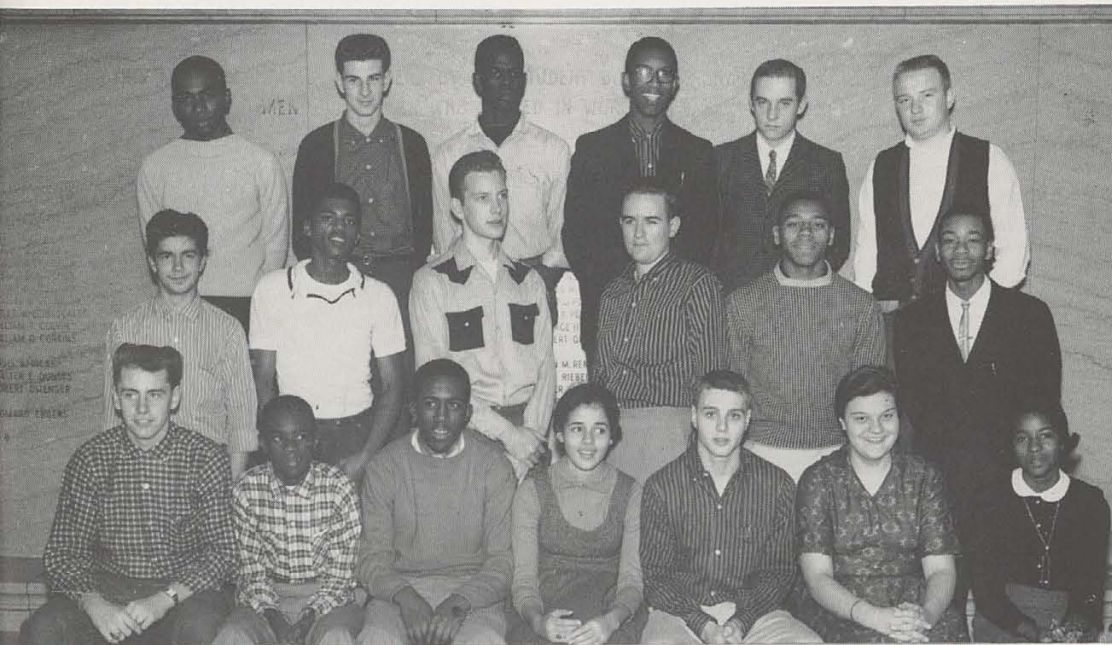


# Sales Club

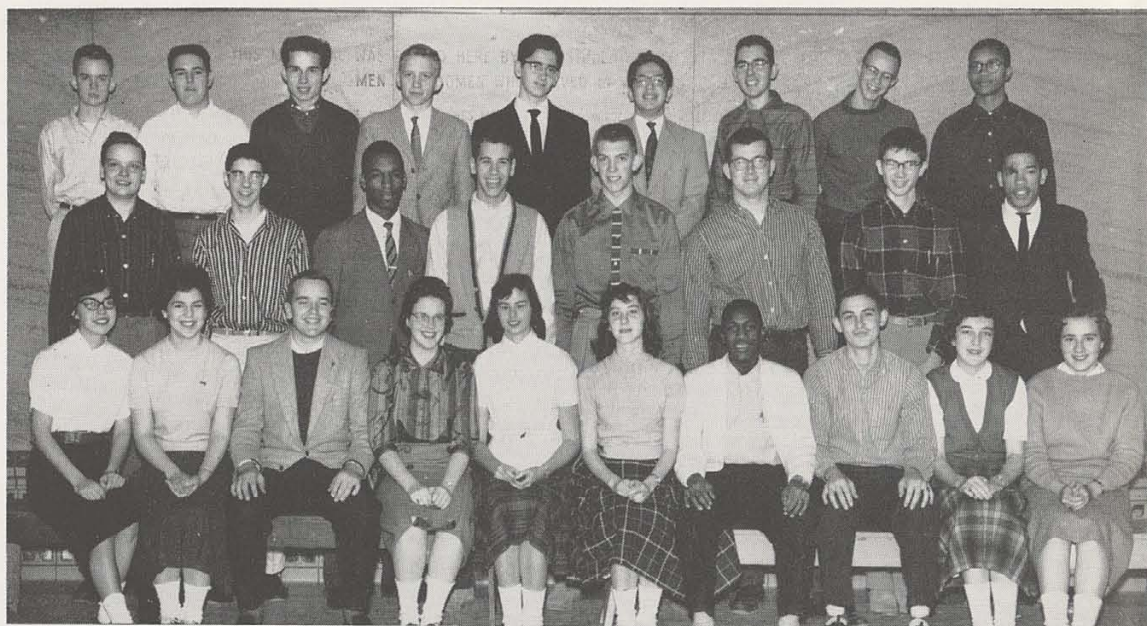

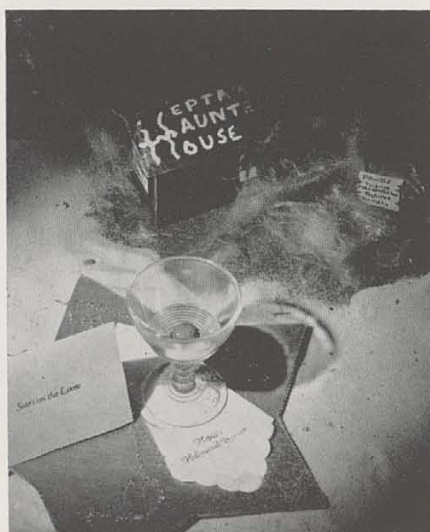

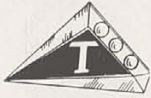
