

## Girls Learn to Cook, Sew

In preparing future homemakers for life during the Sparkling Sixties, Hughes uses modern equipment and gives helpful instruction to guide students in the right direction. Courses in the field of home economics are available to all girls from the seventh through the twelfth grades. The department is headed by Miss Florence Volkmer, a member of the Ohio Association of Home Economics, who has spent many years as a popular and respected teacher of home economics.

The students learn about correct table settings, the basic seven foods groups, planning well-balanced meals, room arrangement, color combinations, budgeting, and the different types and qualities of fabrics. The girls also study good grooming, child care, and development of desirable personality traits. They also have an opportunity to make clothing to add to their wardrobe. A special course called home-making is offered to senior girls who have never had training in home economics. This course teaches the girls the fundamentals of becoming a good housewife.

Under Mrs. Holscher's employ are twenty-two women, who prepare the delicious food, serve it cafeteria-style to the students, and make ready for the next day, after the noon rush has departed. Thirty students give their time at noon to help in the lunchroom, working as cashiers and lunchline guards. Also assisting Mrs. Holscher are the dietetic interns from General Hospital, who take three weeks of their training at Hughes.

After graduating from Michigan State University in Lansing, Mrs. Holscher gained much experience as head dietitian for a dormitory, housing fifteen hundred men. For the splendid job she has done this year, "The Sparkling Sixties" now pays tribute to Mrs. Holscher, who came to Hughes from Cutter Junior High School in April 1959.
