

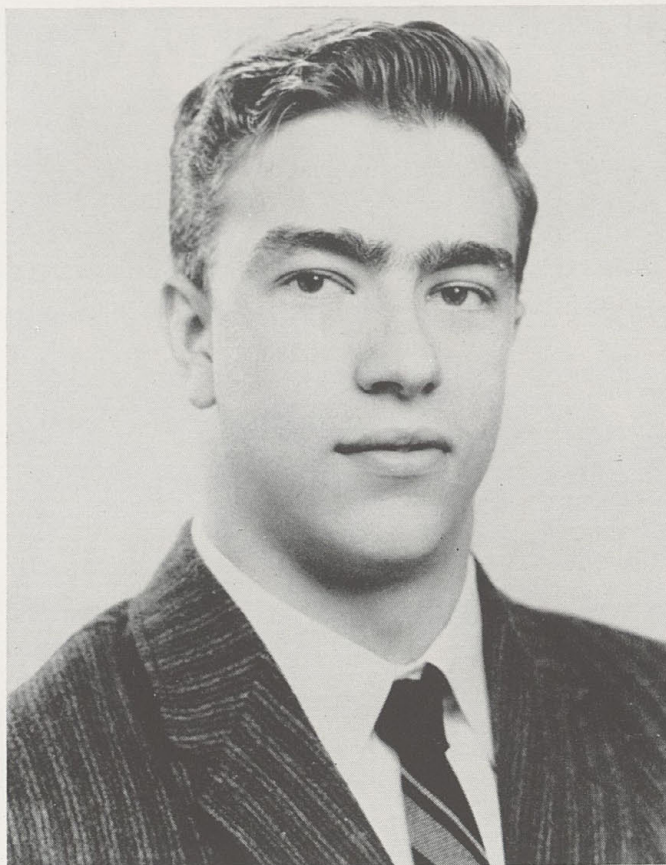
In Memoriam
