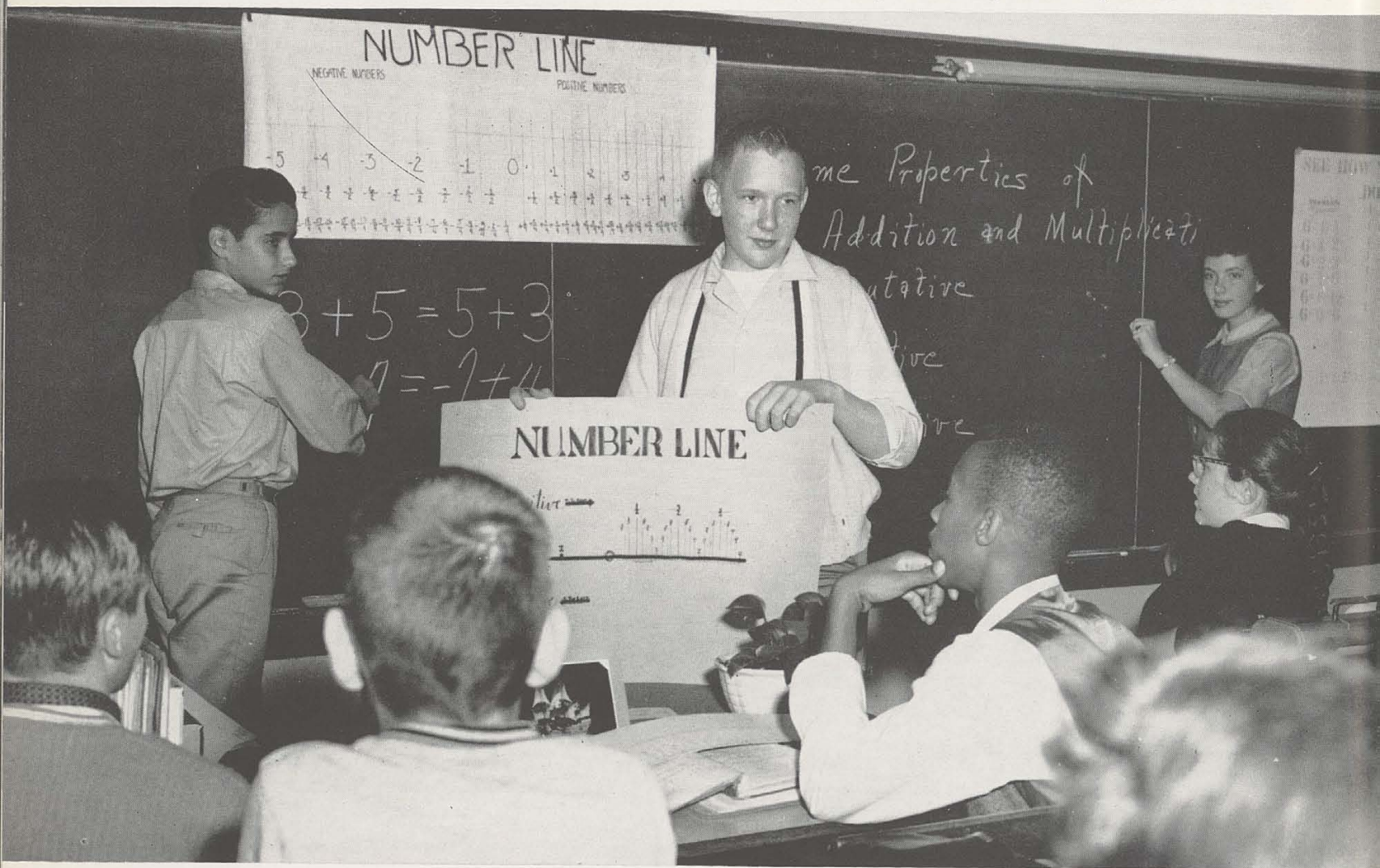


# Mathematics, Increasingly Important
