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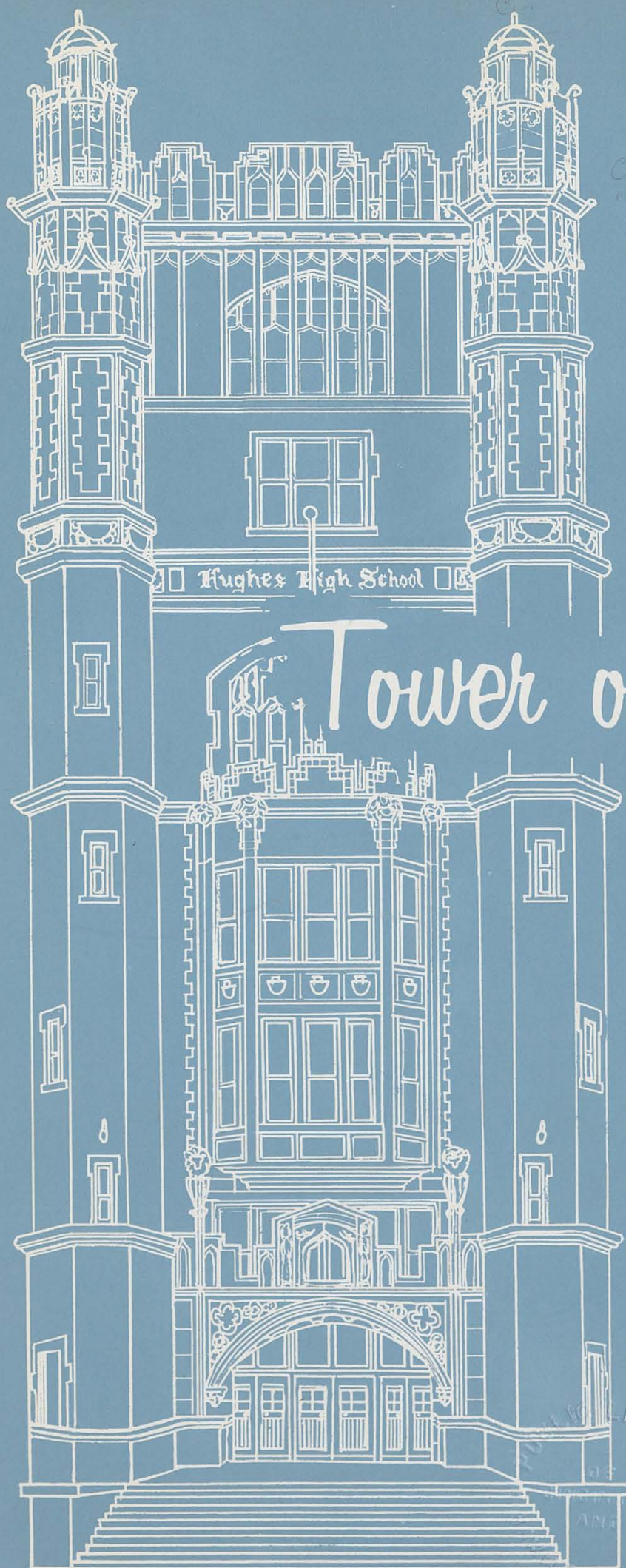

Junior high students learn the fundamentals that will be the stepping-stone to new experiences in senior high. Their own activities bring satisfaction and growth.

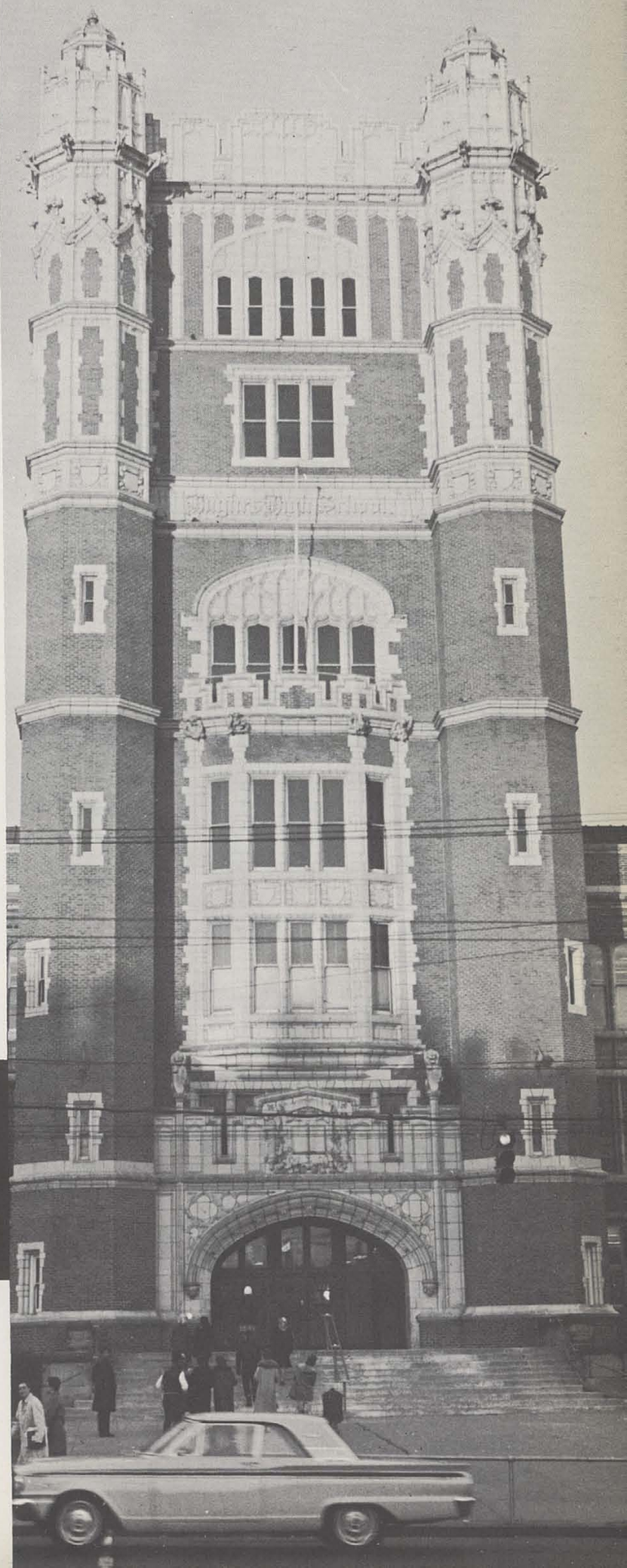

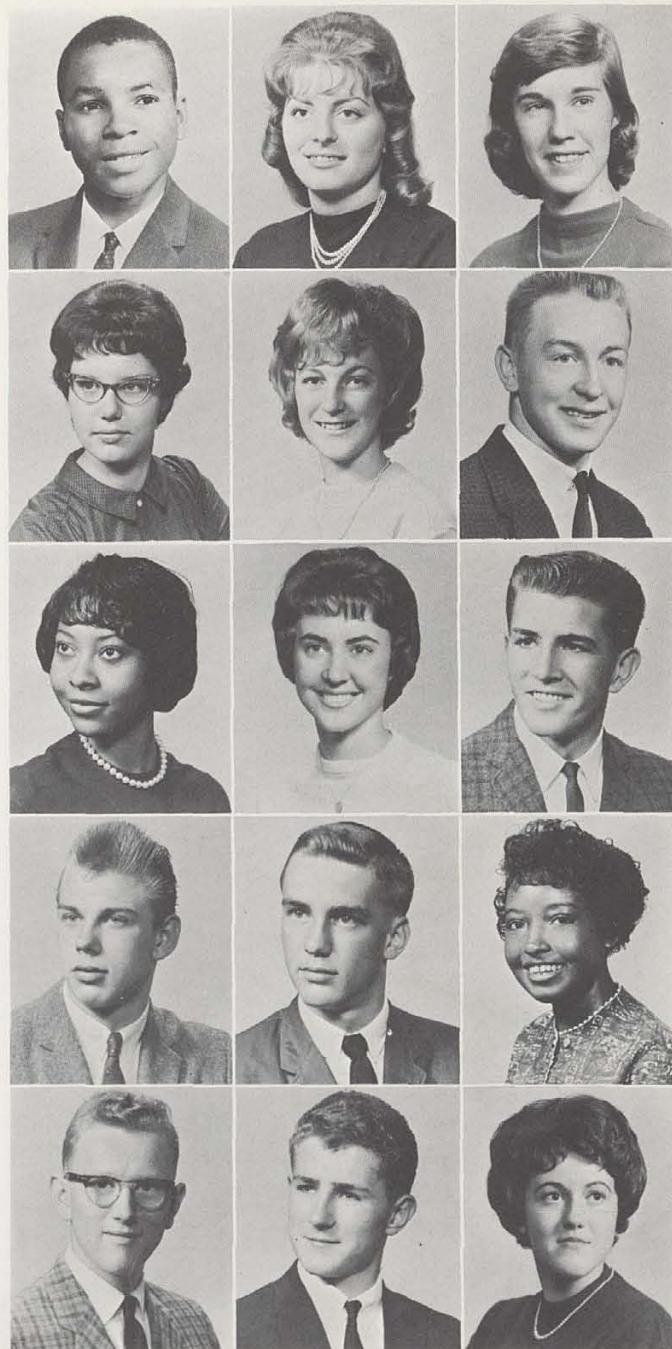

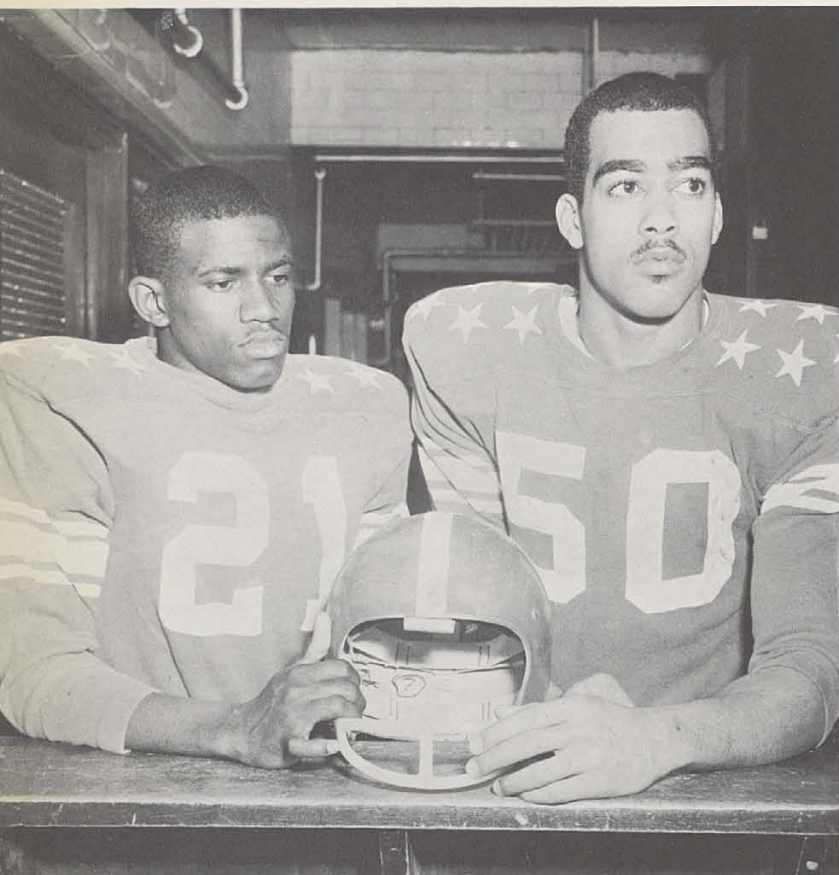

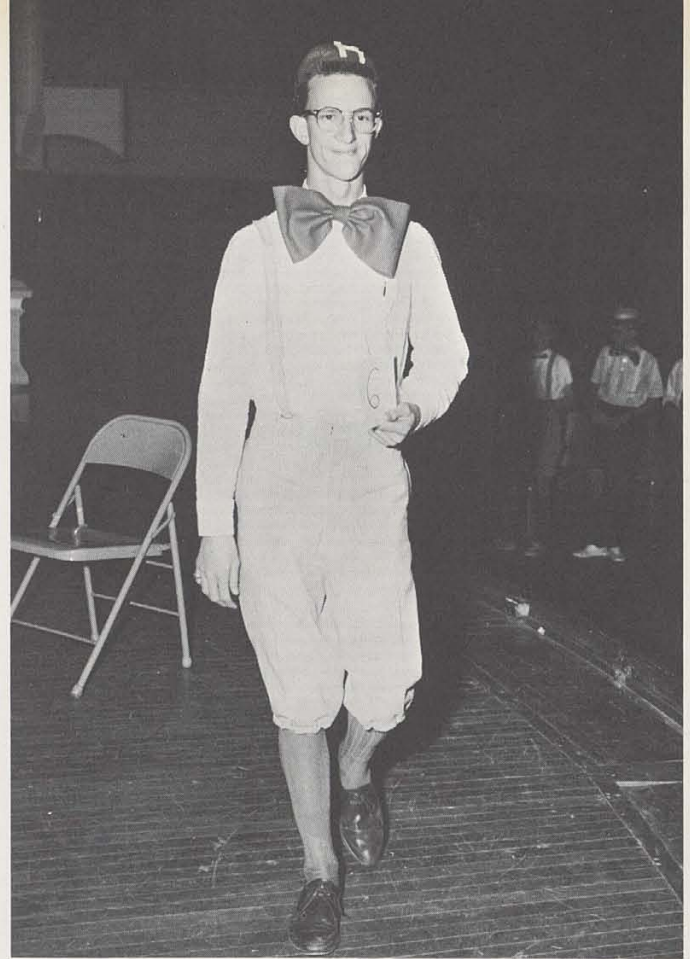

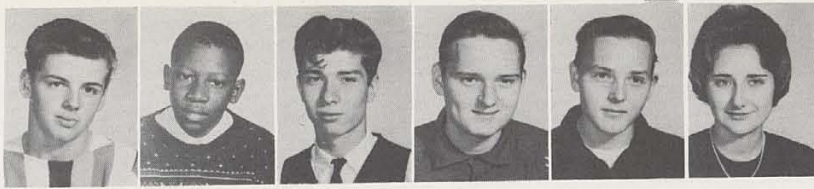

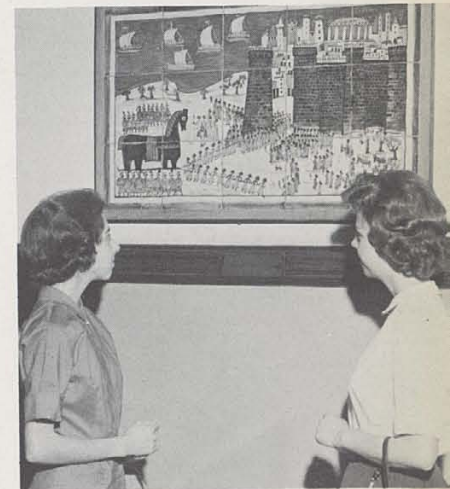

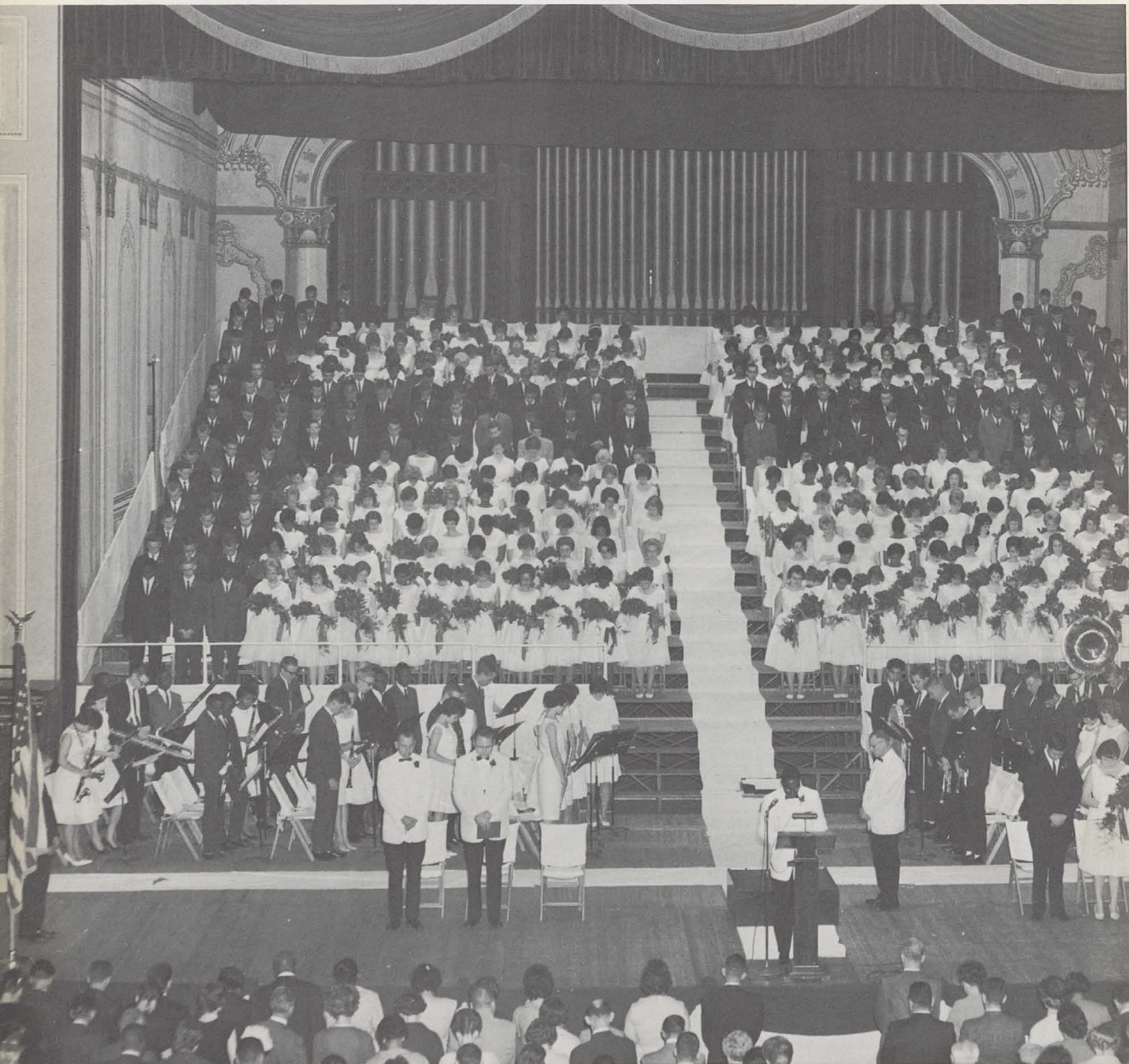

Good English, Today's Need

The study of English encompasses more than just the actual study of the English language. It includes literature and composition, and also subjects such as journalism, dramatics and speech.

At Hughes, students are required to study English in the seventh through eleventh grades, and they usually elect to take it in the twelfth grade also. In the ninth through twelfth grades, they may elect courses in dramatics, speech or journalism. Also in the English field is the new program in reading. In this course students learn to read more rapidly with full comprehension.

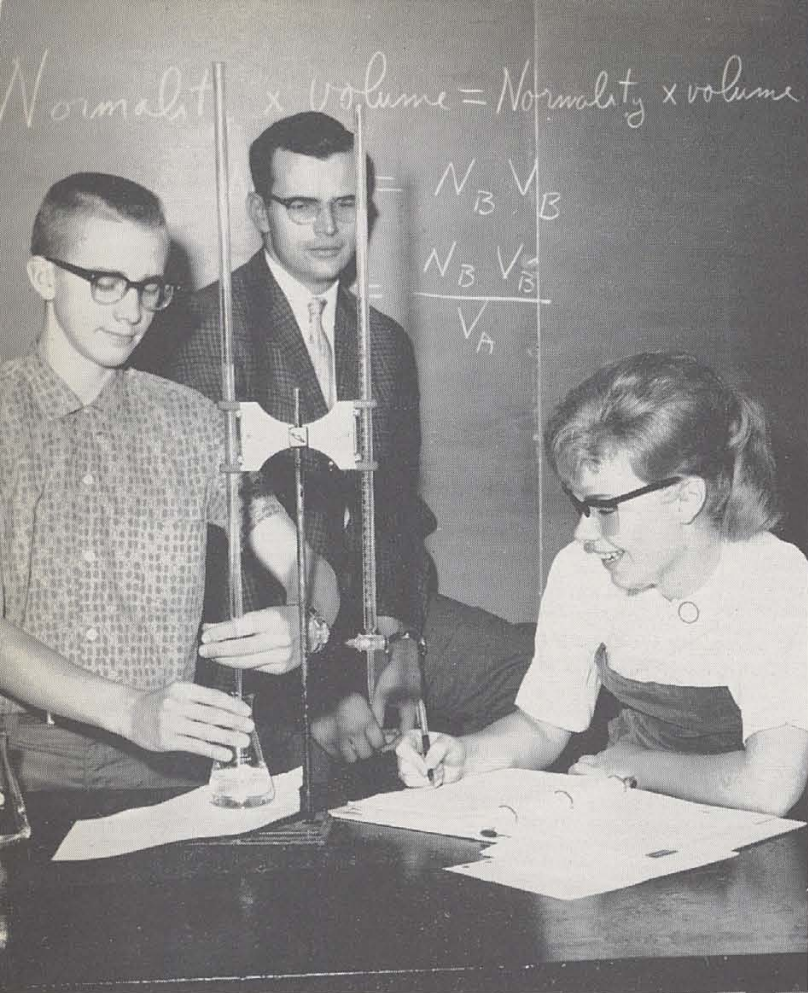
Numerous Books Read Here

Scientific Age Offers Challenge to Students

Today's scientific age has brought about a sudden recognition of the importance of science. Courses such as chemistry and physics have been emphasized, although biology, botany,

zoology, human physiology and basic general science are just as essential. Individual thinking and the use of the scientific method are the prime objectives. The need for clear, concise, logical thought is more important today.

The general science courses of the seventh and eighth grades are a basic and general study of science. They provide a background for the more specialized courses, biology, botany, zoology, human physiology, physics and chemistry. These courses are offered on an elective basis to ninth, tenth, eleventh, and twelfth-grade students.

The science department of Hughes, headed by Mr. Warner, is more than adequately equipped to offer these courses. The large physics and chemistry labs offer students an opportunity to experiment under the watchful direction of an instructor. The study of general science, biology, botany, zoology, and human physiology are further enhanced by paraphernalia, such as skeletons, enlarged drawings of plants and animals, preserved animals used for dissection, and various other pieces of demonstrating apparatus found at Hughes.

This excellent scientific training prepares the students of Hughes to meet the challenge of the scientific age.

Social Studies, The Study Of People, Is Vital Today

Social studies, or the social sciences, cover a large area. They include history, geography, and economics, but their main area of study is social and involves people. All history, geography, and economics concerns people. The social nature of human beings is the source of man's history, man's need to study geography and man's economic system.

Courses offered at Hughes in the social-studies field include geography, world, modern and American history, civics, world geography and socio-economic problems. These courses can be chosen on an elective basis by upperclassmen. Students in the seventh and eighth grades are required to take a general social studies course, which gives them a basic background in history, geography and some aspects of sociology and economics. Ninth and tenth-grade students can elect such courses as world geography, civics, world or modern history. Eleventh-grade students study American history. Twelfth-grade students may elect a course in socio-economic problems, which deals with economics and sociology, as related to each other.

The social studies department of Hughes has much equipment to enhance the studies. Some detailed maps show not only the geography of the world, but also mineral resources, industrial strength or other economic conditions. Numerous films and filmstrips procured through the Board of Education provide visual study. Magazines and newspapers are used as further reference materials in some courses.

Social studies are often overlooked in today's scientific era, but the study of the world and its peoples is essential. Social studies, therefore, must be concentrated upon, in order to enable citizens to live better with the other nations of the world.

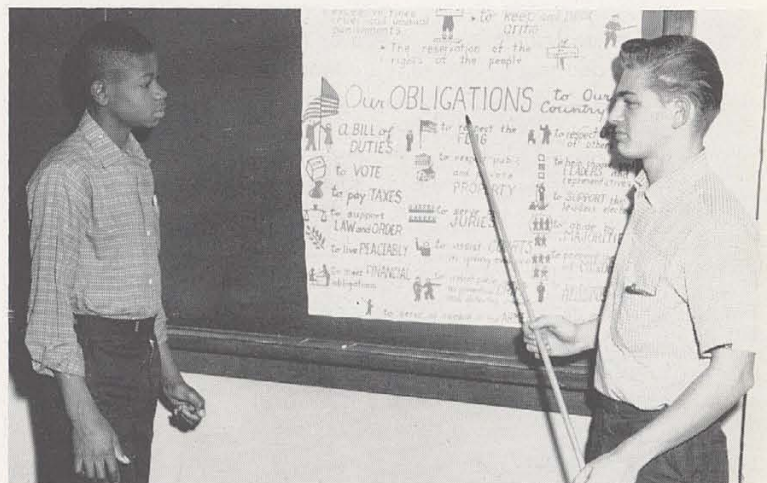

Special Education Courses Help Students at Hughes

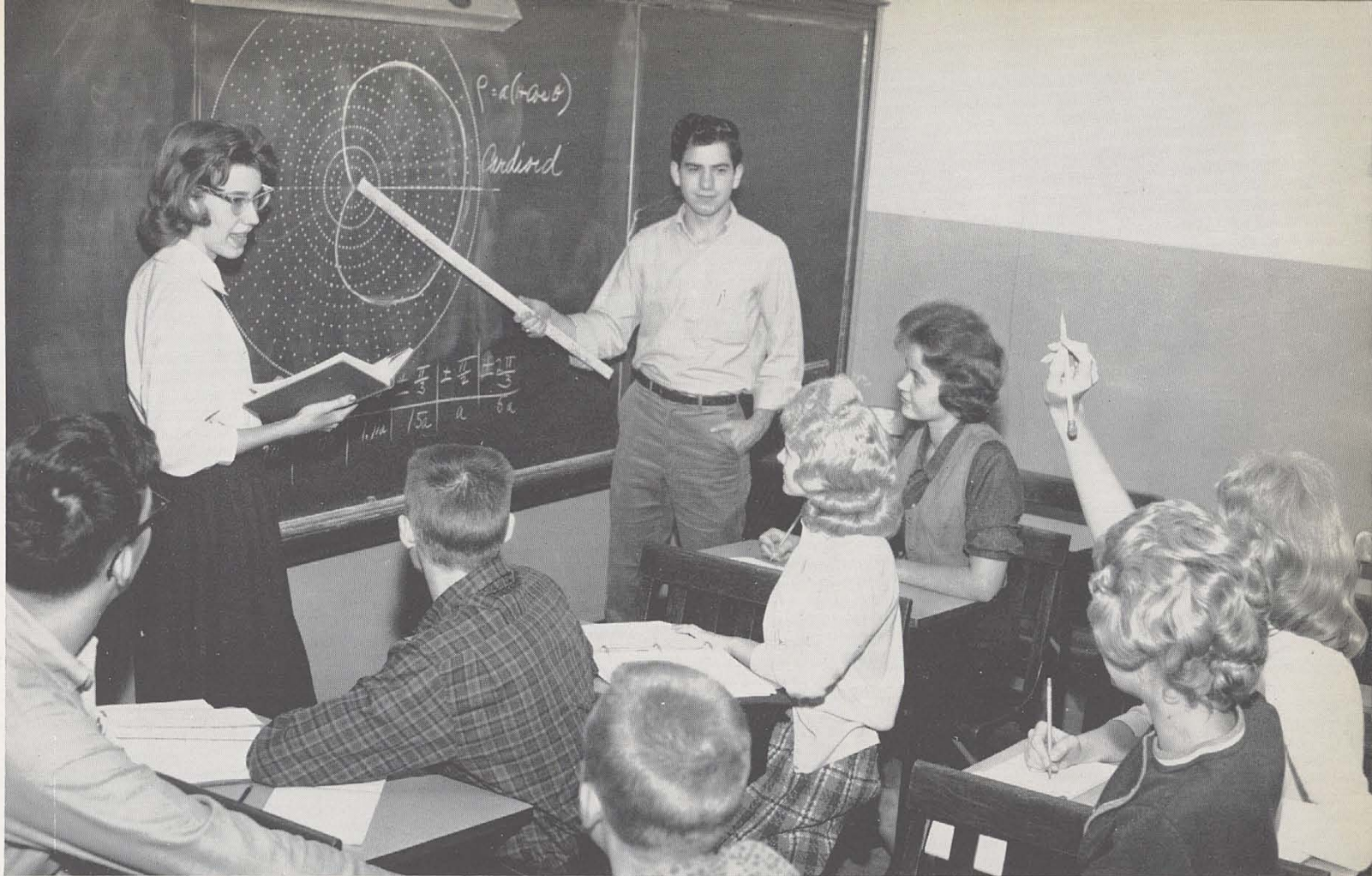
Special Education is a relatively new field of education. It covers areas of education in which students benefit from the work and guidance of specially trained teachers. These teachers must have a great deal of patience and be very dedicated to their jobs. Because of this they probably receive greater satisfaction from their work than do teachers in any other field of education. Special equipment, including special texts and visual aids, is used to supplement the ordinary classroom materials.

Special education at Hughes includes classes for the deaf, for the partially sighted, and for students who wish to avail themselves of special training. The deaf and partially sighted receive extra help from their respective teachers, Mr. Kundert and Miss Ashley. The other special education classes are taught by Mr. Britton and Mr. Ridenour. The courses offer practical training to help the students in later life. Classroom activities and projects encourage the students to work together in a friendly and enthusiastic way.

These students, who receive added guidance and help from special education, also make important contributions to Hughes High School activities.

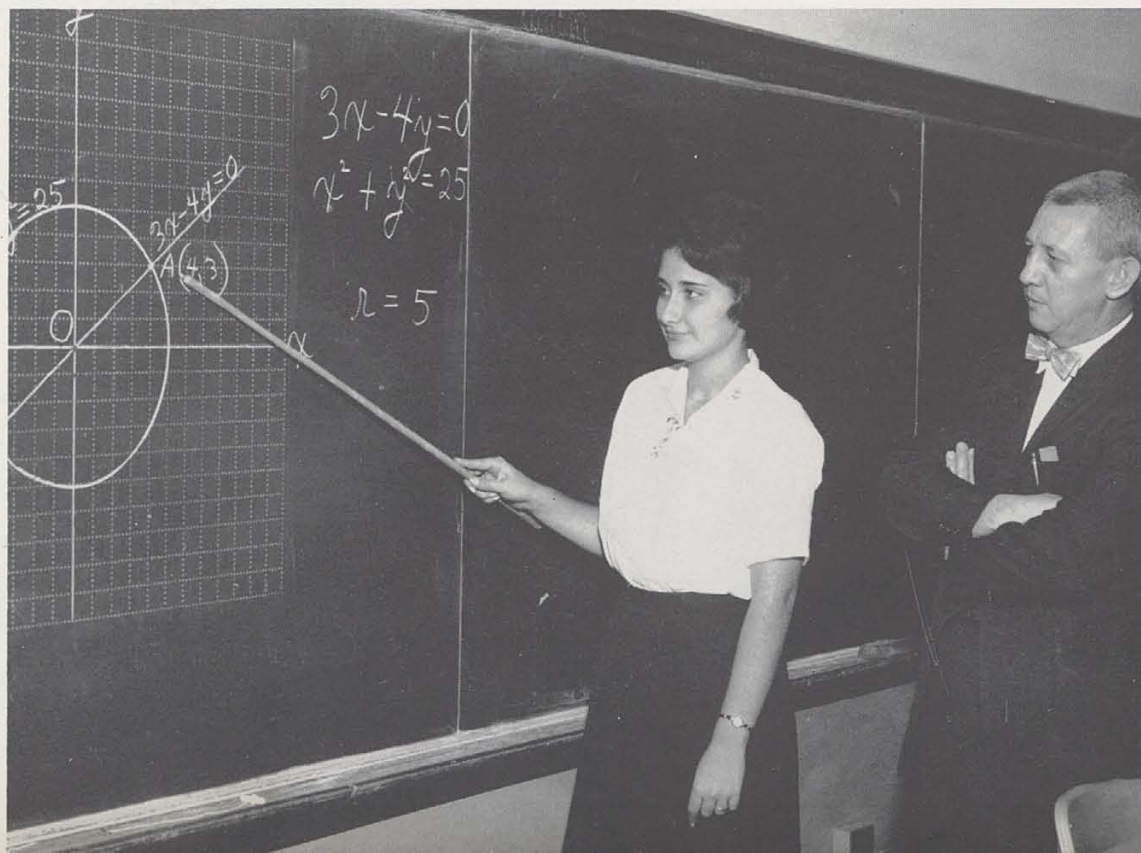
Curriculum Stresses Math

Mathematics, along with science, has become an essential course for many students. Math today is important, not only from a scientific view, but from a business one, also.

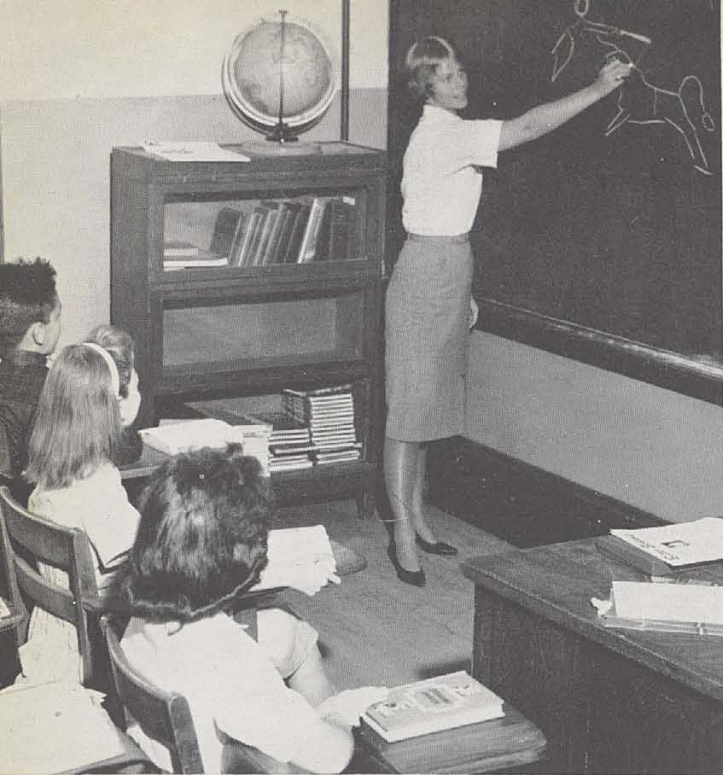
A large selection of math courses is available to the stu-

Training For Job-Seekers

The business classes teach the students things that will help them to get a good job after high school.

There are several different types of business classes. Among these are office practice, bookkeeping and typing. In these classes the students have a chance to use the latest types of office machinery. Some of these machines are the ten-key and full keyboard electric adding machines and the four-manual adding machine. Business students also use the rotary calculating machine, key-driven calculating machine, duplicating machines, dictographing machines, and electric and manual typewriters.

During the year, the students go on tours to different companies. There they watch the people at work in the offices and receive many beneficial tips for the future.

To encourage excellence in spelling, the NOMA Spelling Test is given twice a year to Typing I and Office Practice students. An award is given to those who receive perfect scores on both tests.

Having practiced their first aid skills on each other, Steve Owens, Norb Tscheiner, Ed Koch and Jim Cook show the results to Mr. Bowers.



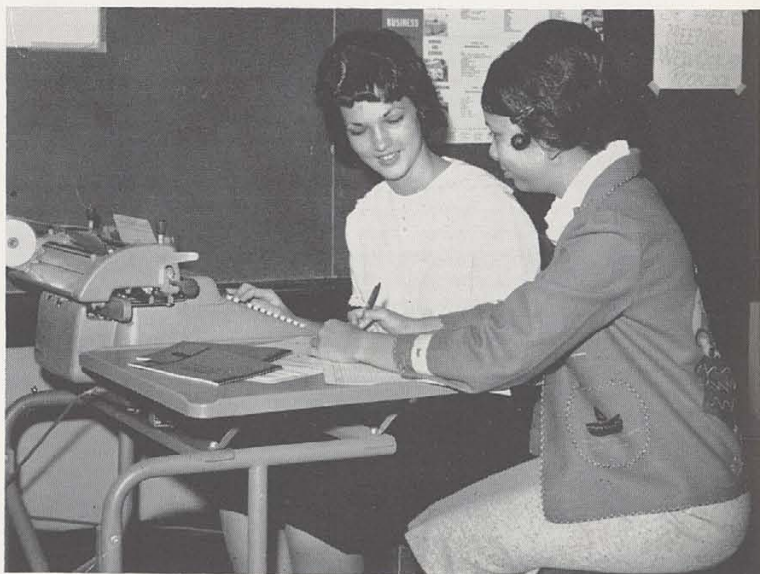
Shops—Practical, Popular

The graphic arts classes, under the guidance of Mr. Bongey, have been very busy all year. They are responsible for printing school forms and programs. Seniors are also required to take a health course. It consists of instruction in first aid and home nursing during the first semester. The second-semester course involves discussion of planning for marriage and family living. This class helps prepare students for their future as probable spouses and parents.

Both of these health courses, along with driver's education, more fully prepare students to meet the responsibilities of adult life.

Home economics courses offering this same outline in greater detail may be elected. A course called home-making is available to senior girls. It especially stresses caring for a family and teaches girls skills helpful in marriage.

The home economics department has a variety of equipment which is used in the courses. Sewing machines and individual kitchens represent just two of the types of equipment used.

Home economics is a vital field for all girls. These girls will be wives and mothers in the future, and at Hughes they learn how to care properly for their future husbands and families.

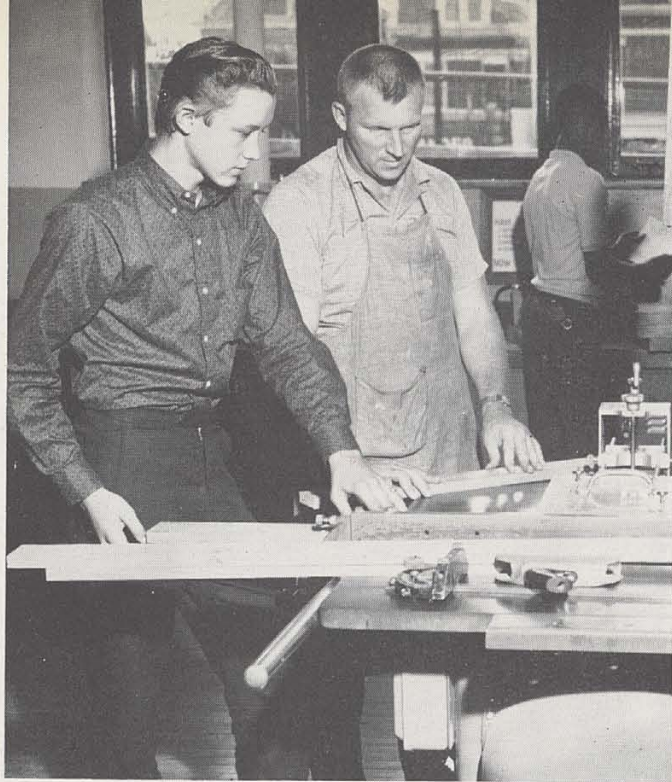
Teachers Assist Students

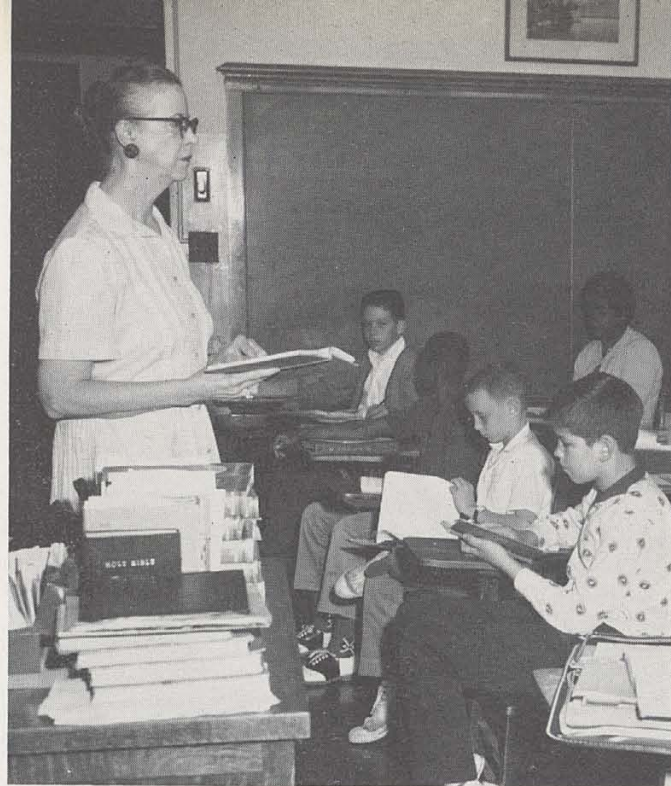

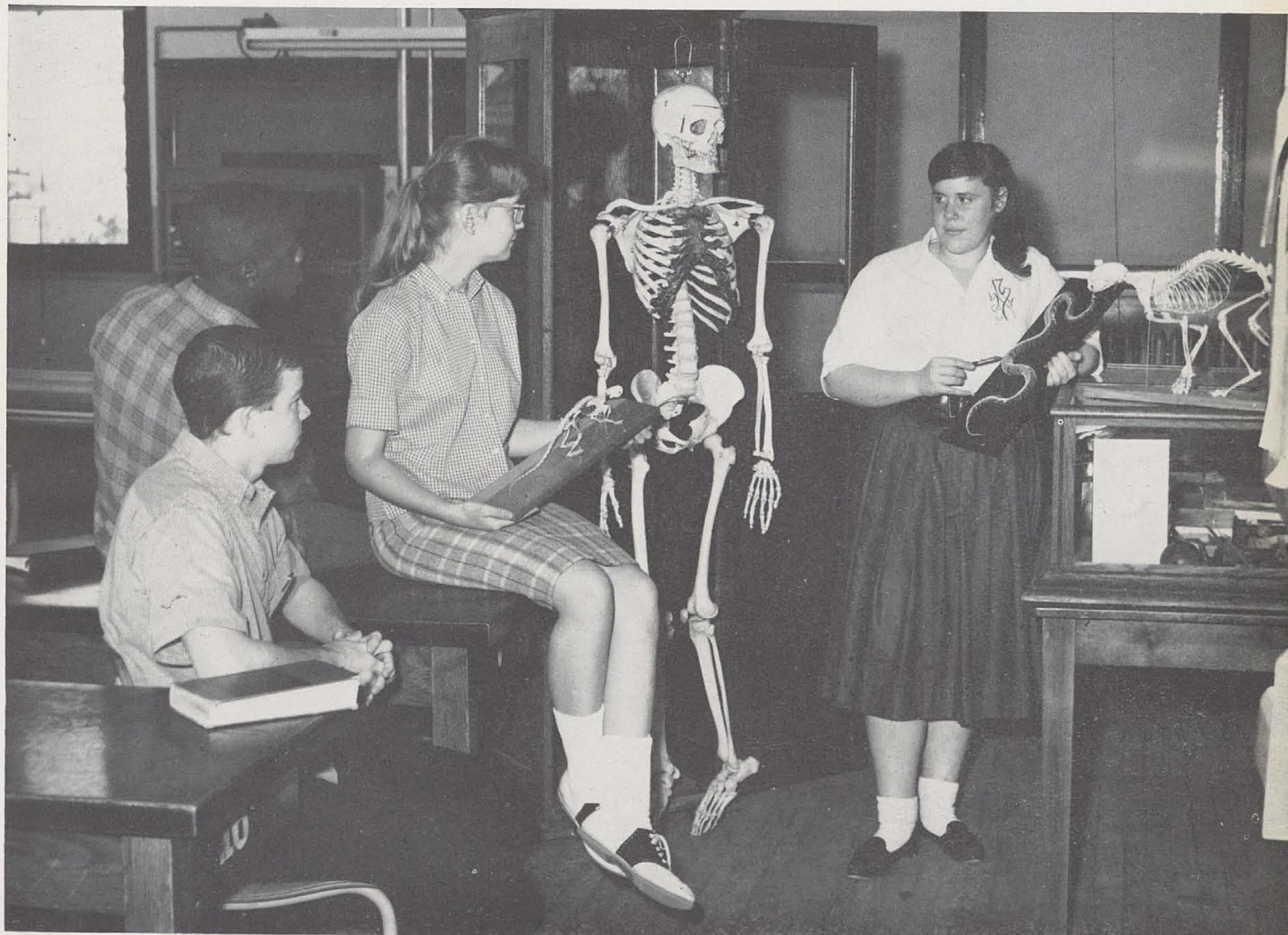

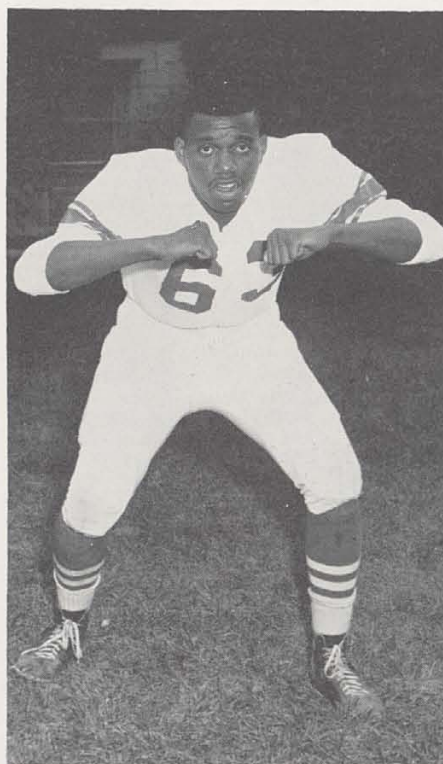

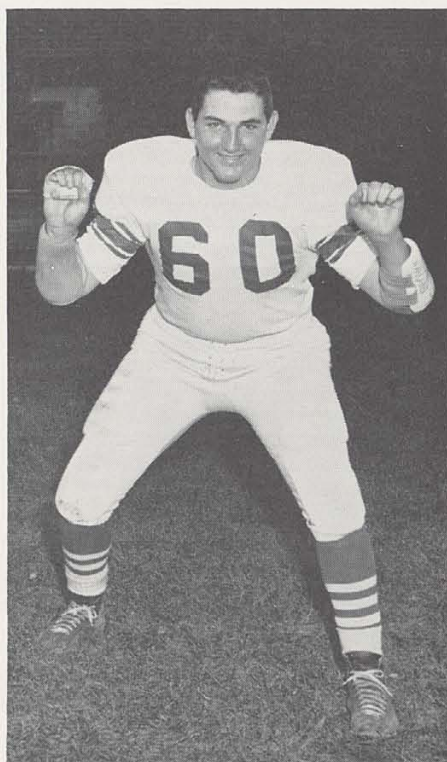

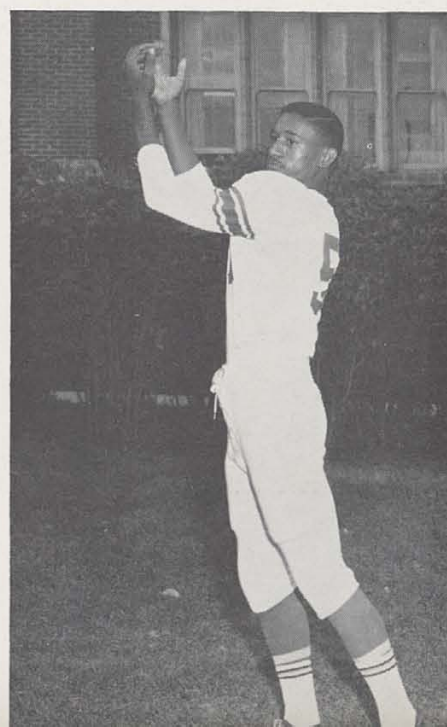

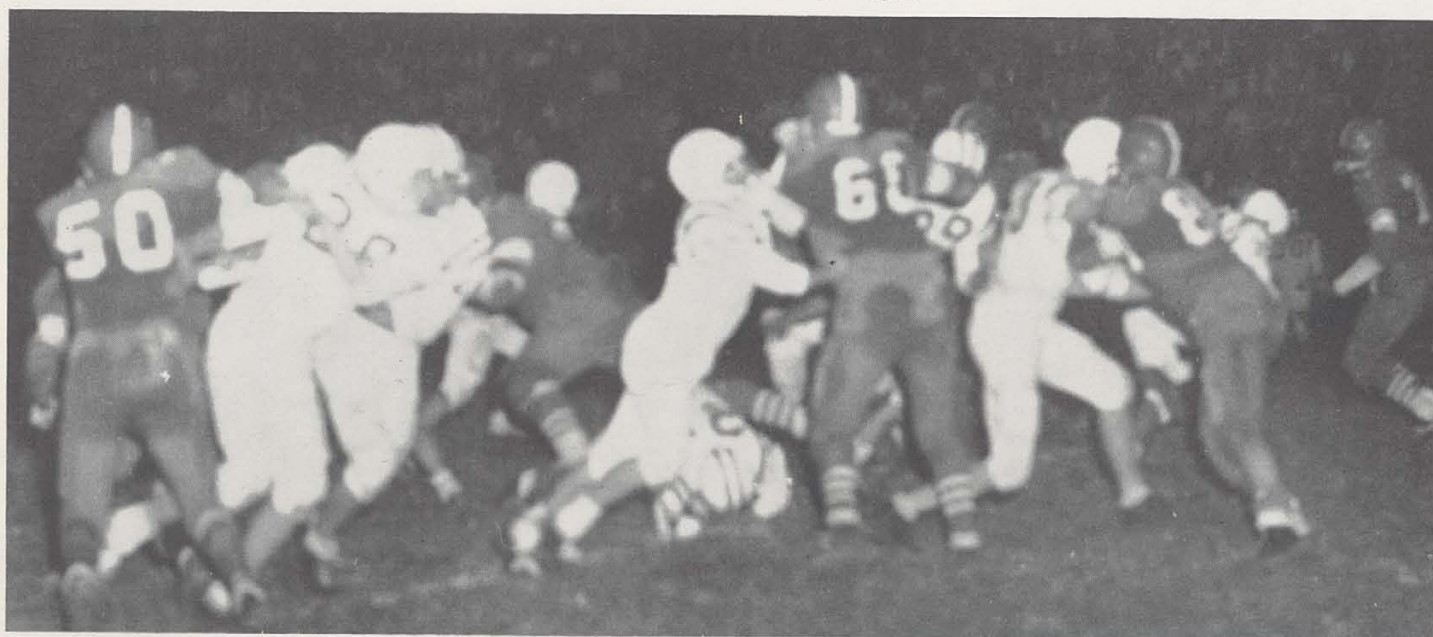

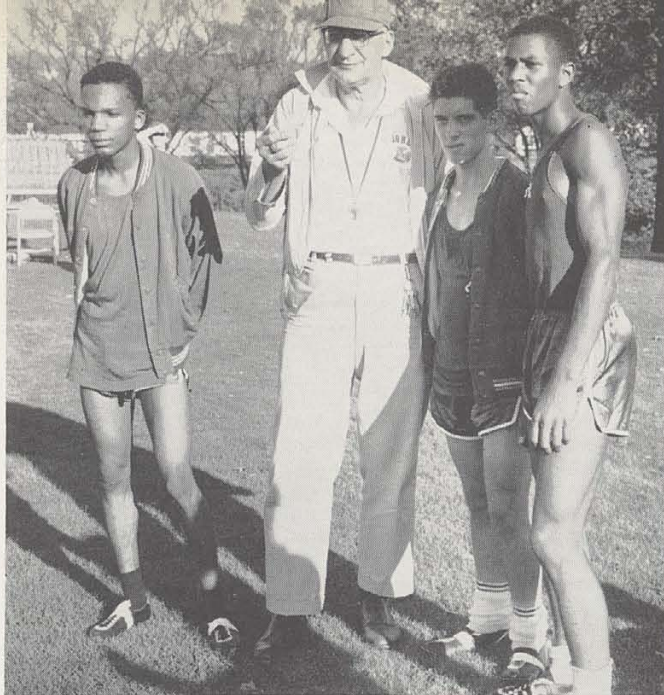

The 1963 Hughes varsity basketball team finished the season with an over-all 3-16 record. Coach Frank Rolfes hopes for a better season next year, with many sophomores and juniors returning.

The season opener saw Lemon-Monroe handily defeat Hughes, 72-43. Western Hills won the second game as they trounced the Big Reds, 65-51. In a see-saw contest, Anderson eked out a 44-42 decision. The Woodward Bulldogs, despite Pepples' fourteen points, beat Hughes, 65-53.

Taylor High School invaded Hughes and walked off with a 59-36 win. The Big Reds lost their sixth straight, as Aiken won in the last second, 46-45. The highly-touted Taft Senators snagged an easy 63-27 victory in the fourth league game.

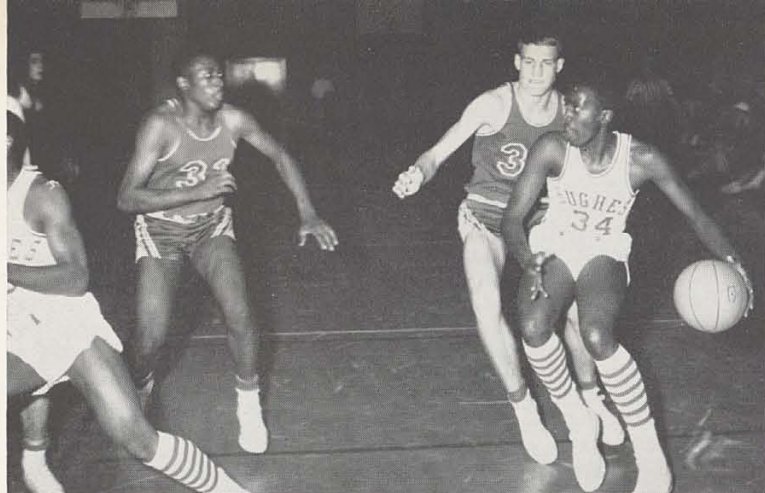
Hughes turned the tables on Aiken and decisoned them 49-48, the first Big Red win, as Bill Reece scored twenty-two points. 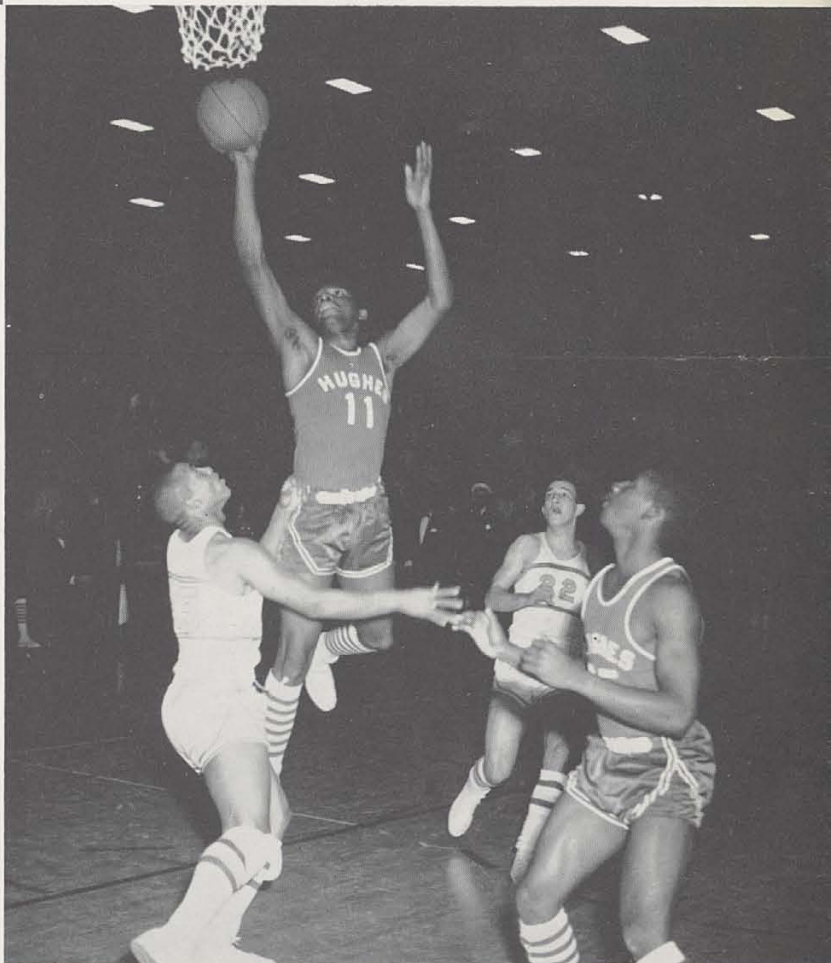
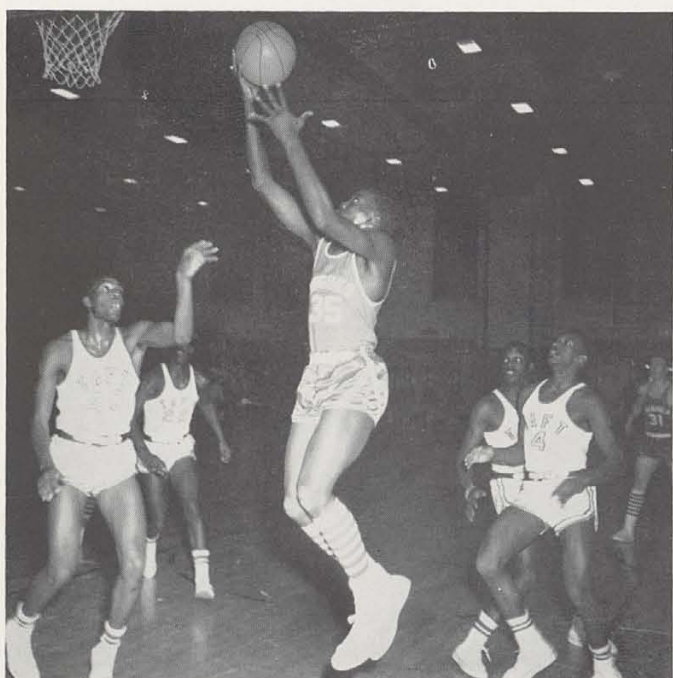

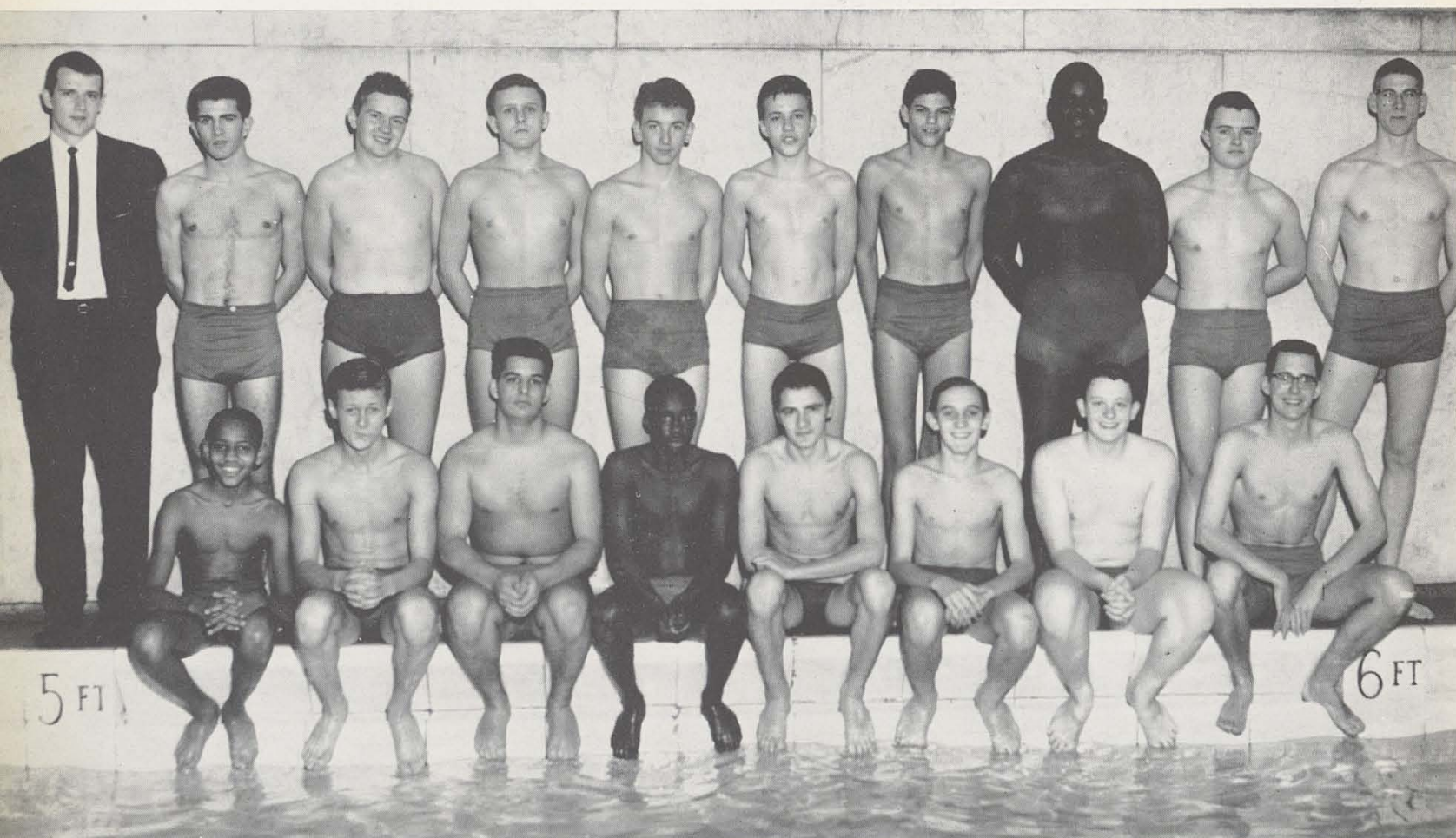

The three city meets saw Western Hills clinch the league championship by edging Walnut Hills, with Hughes far behind.

In individual scoring, junior Greg Bereskin, who swam the 400-yard freestyle, led the Big Reds with 38 season points. Horsley, Drahman, Tepe, and Spencer rounded out the top five scorers.

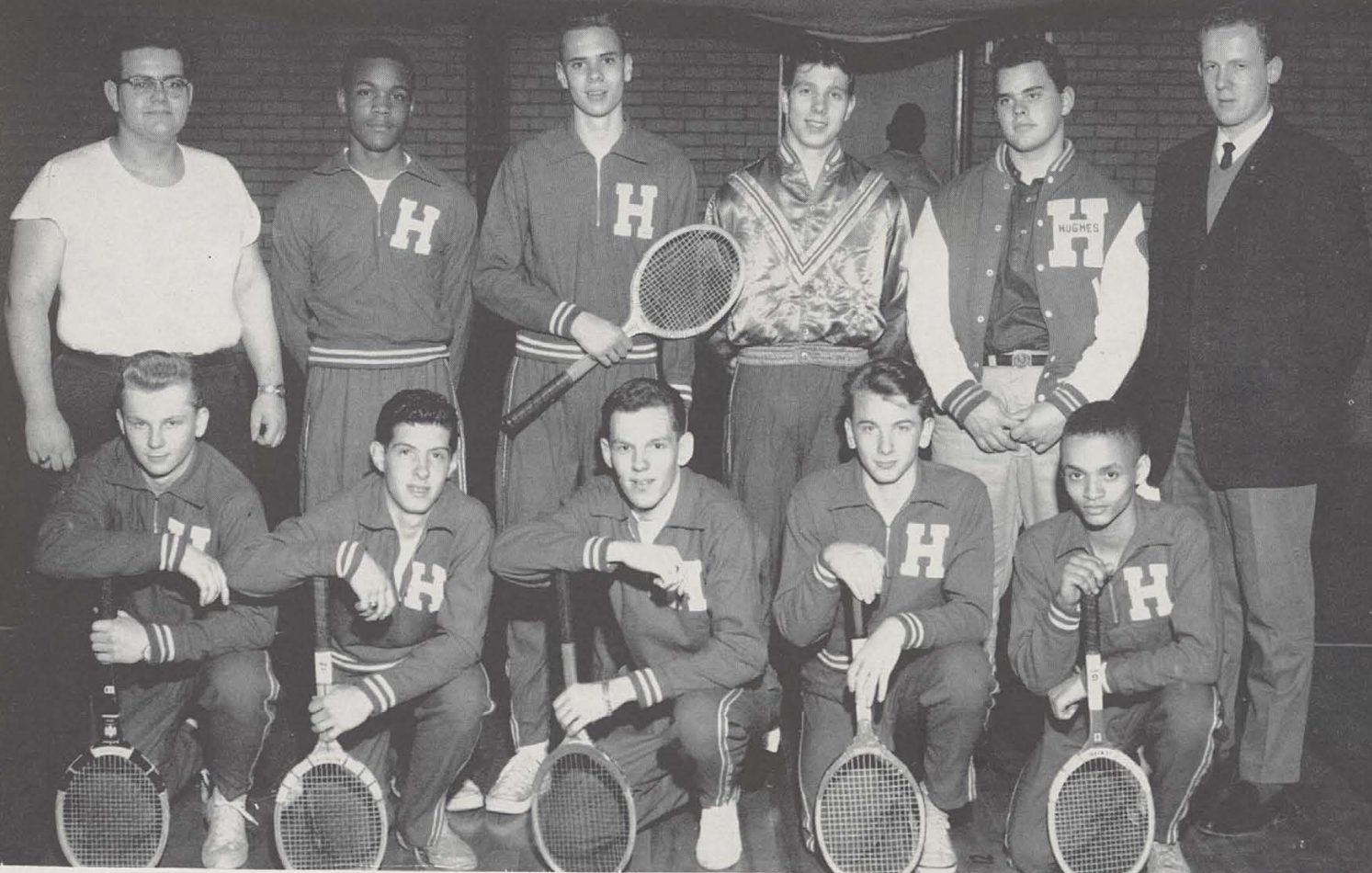
Playing a tough schedule, the team consisted of Dan Bartholomew and Ed Weise at singles and Dave Curry and Dan Goebel at doubles.

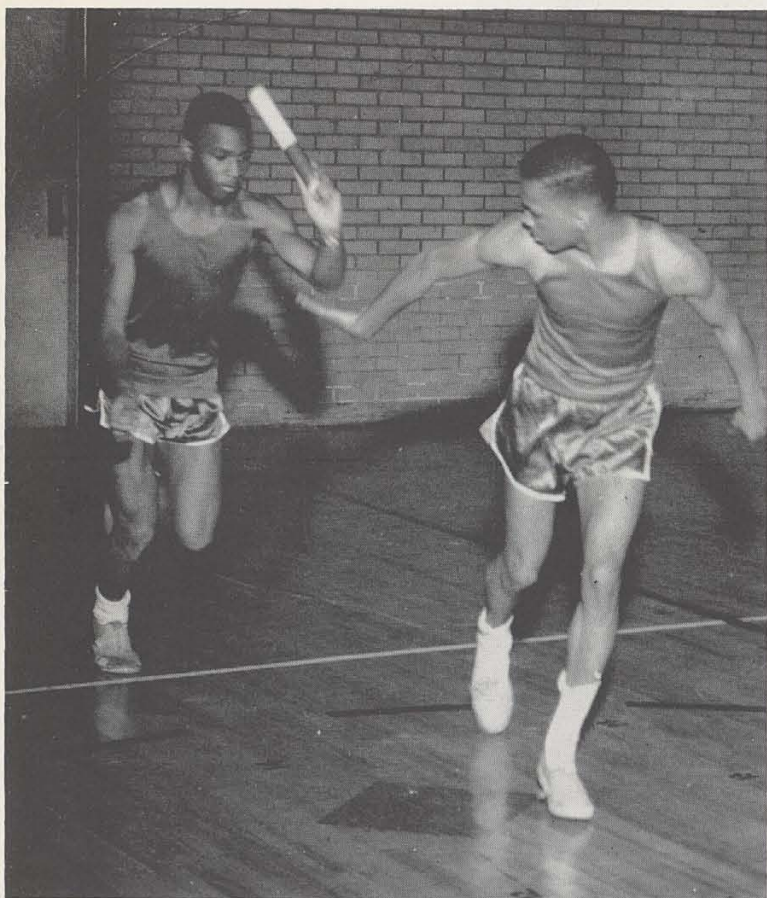

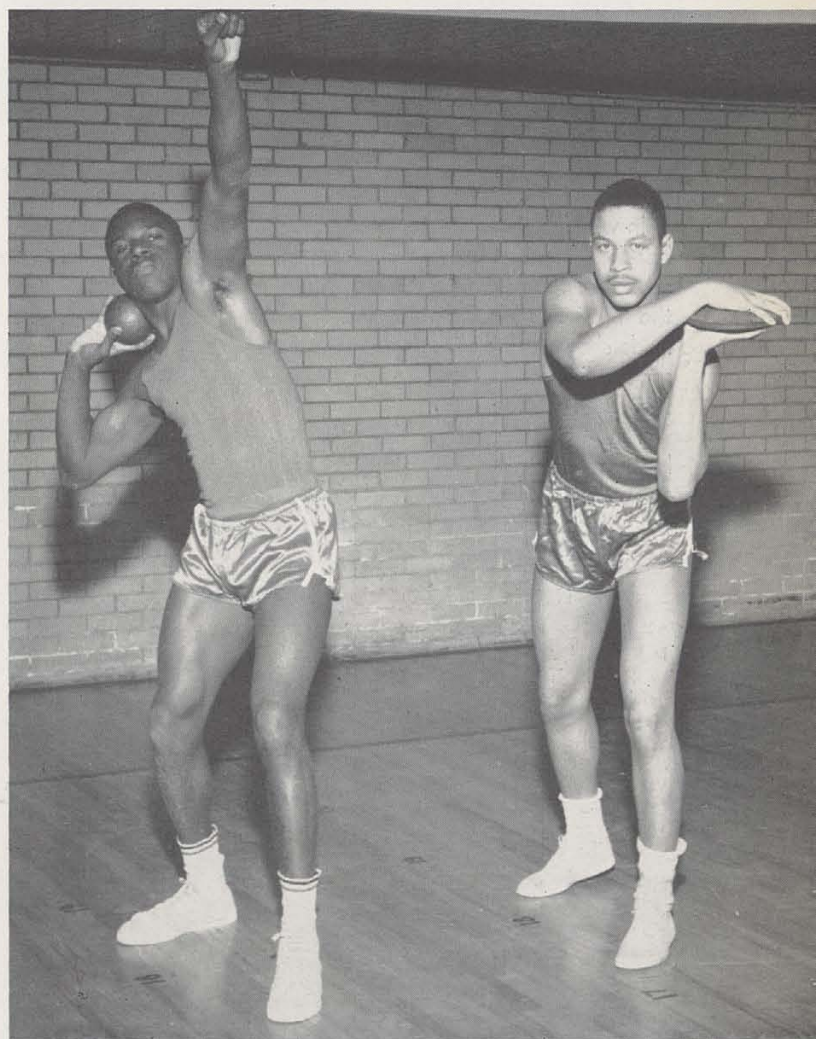
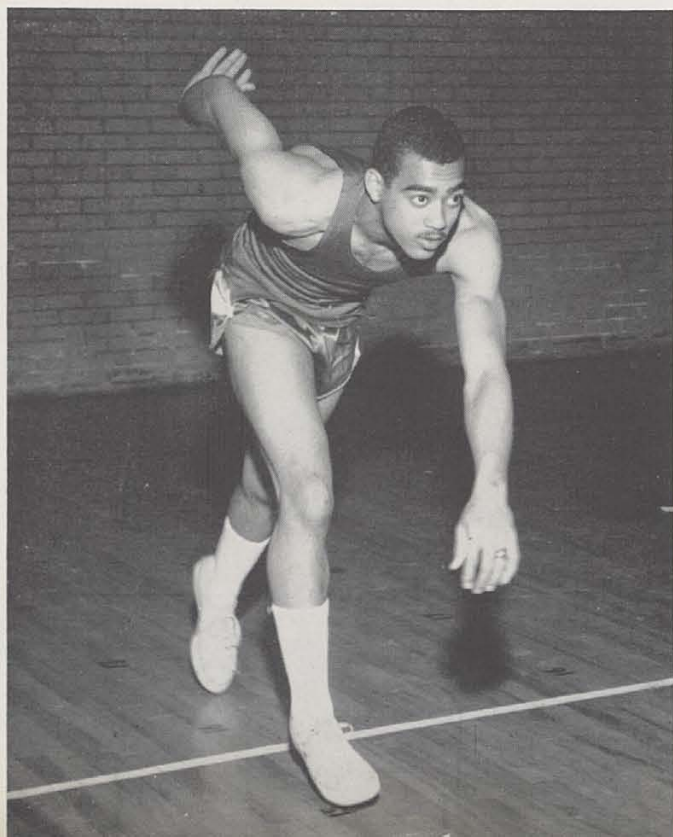

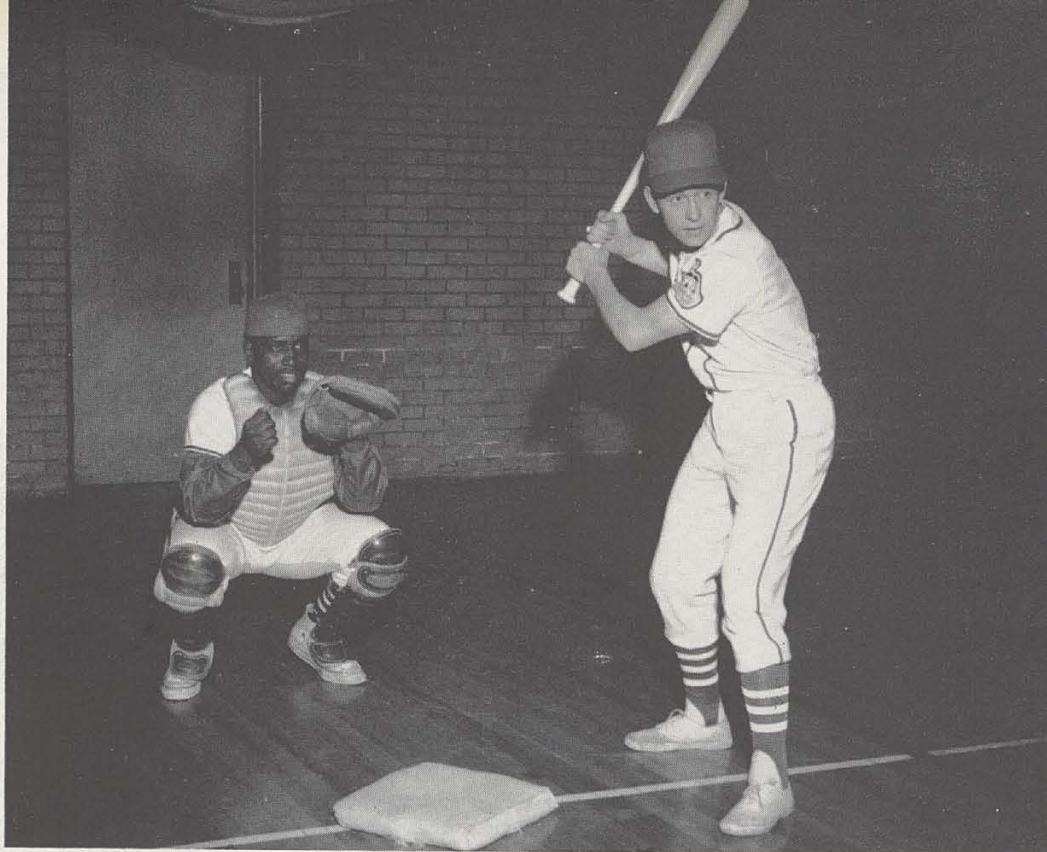

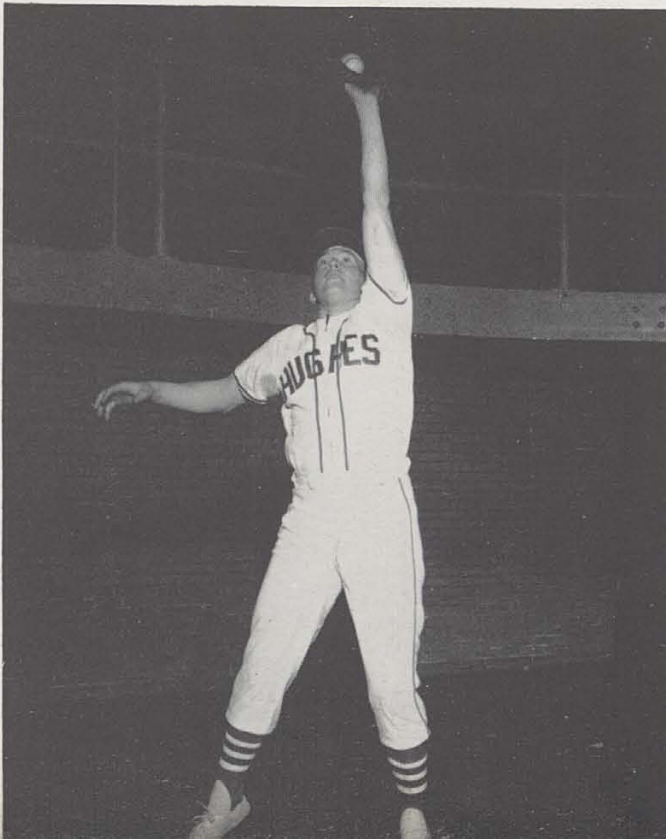

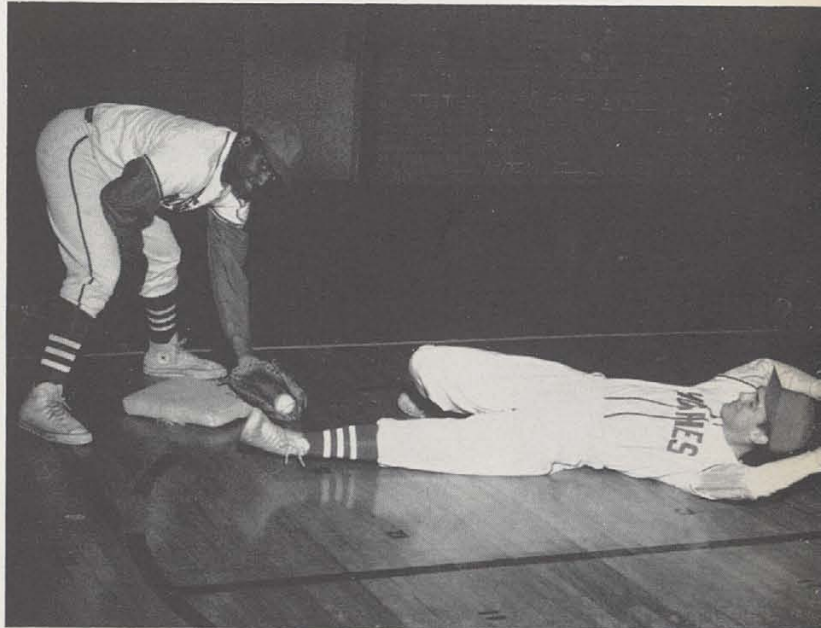

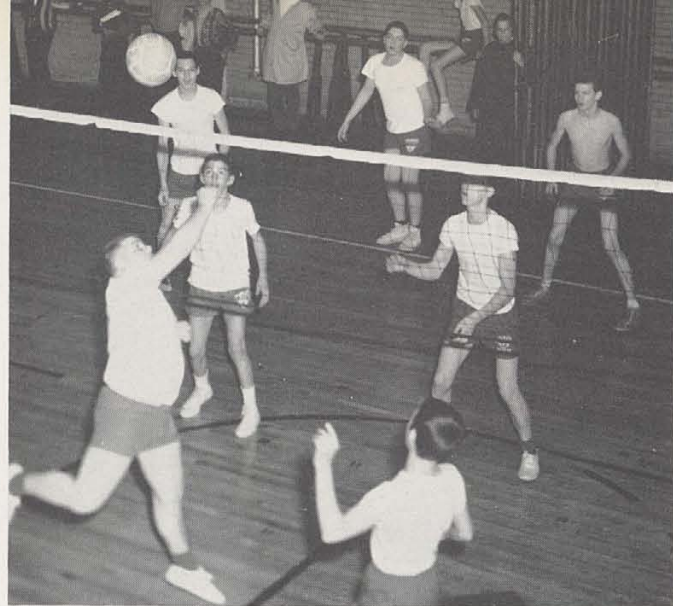

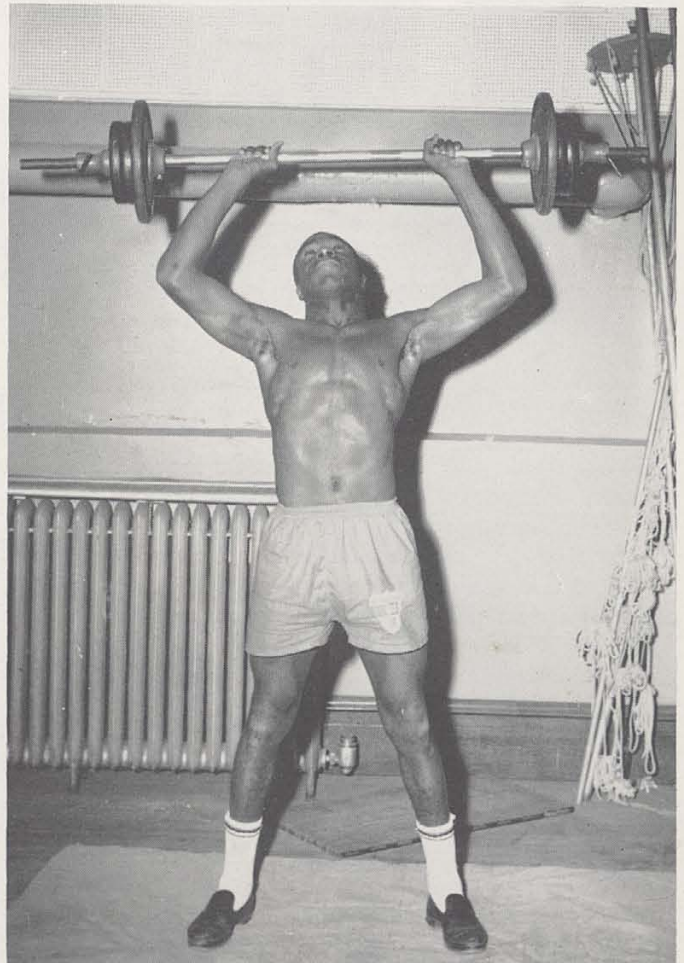

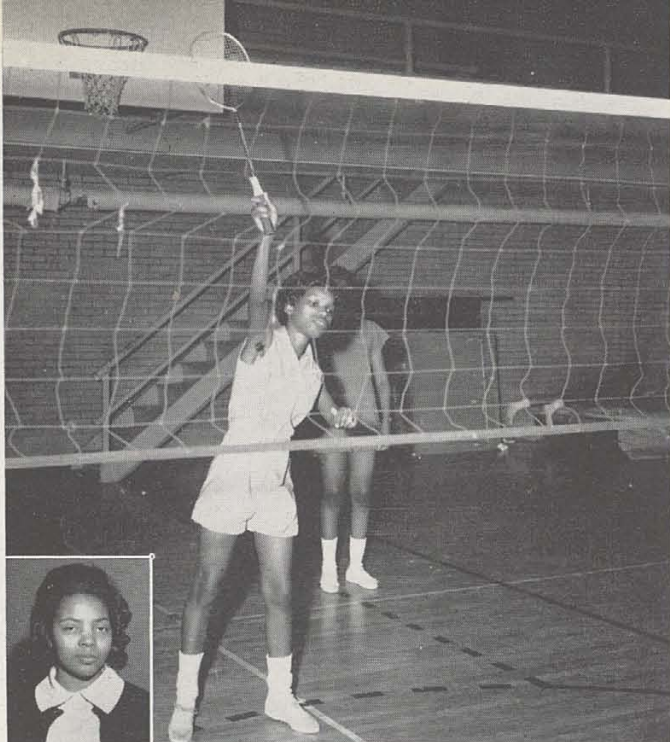

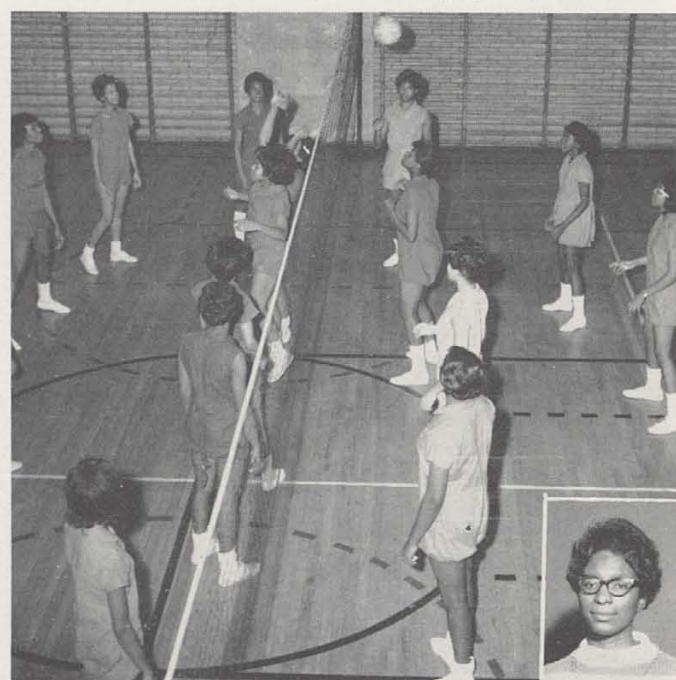

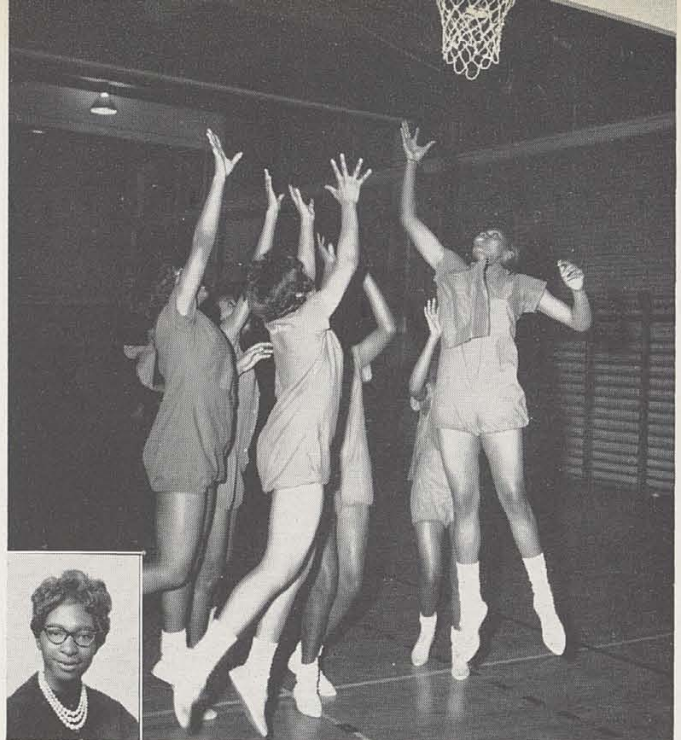

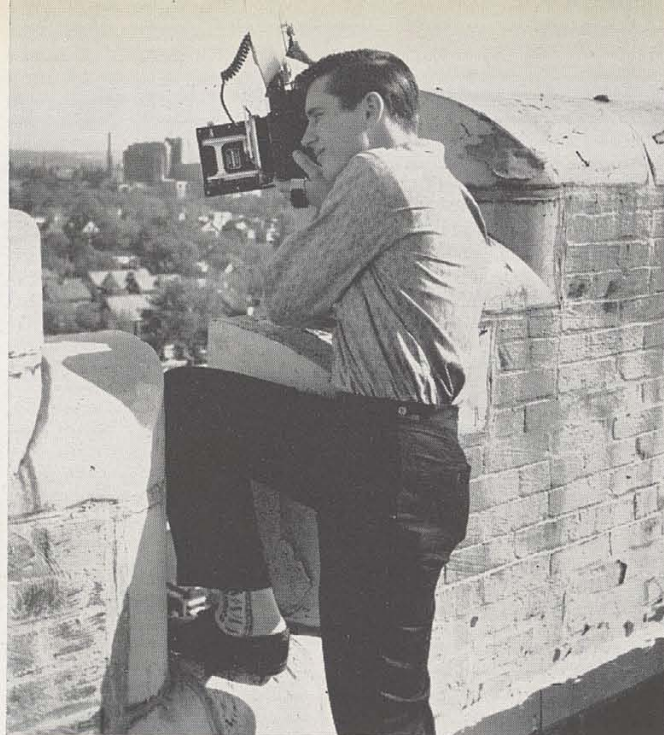
After this obstacle was surmounted, the real fun began. Pages and pages of copy and pictures had to be laid out in good form to display Hughes High School during the 1962-63 school year.

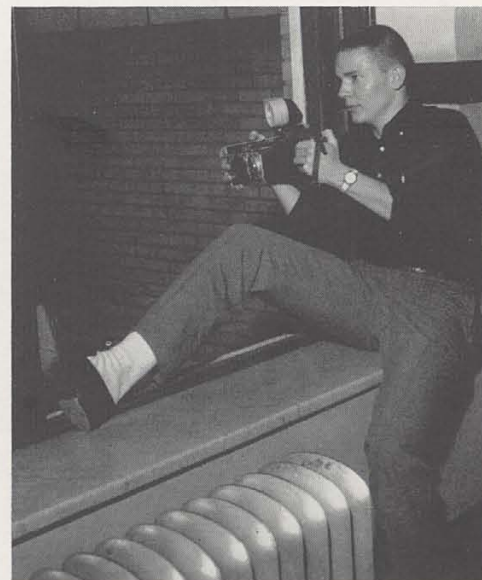

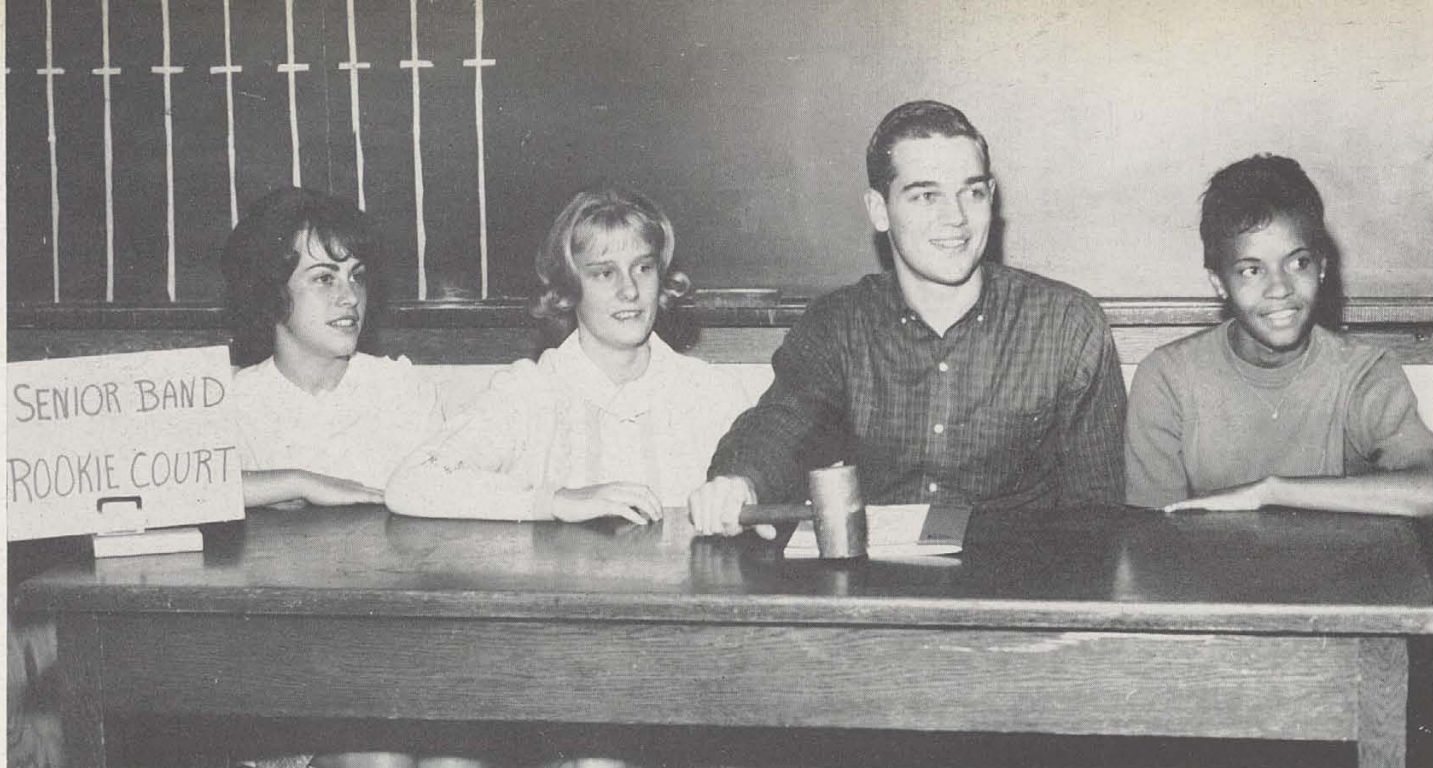

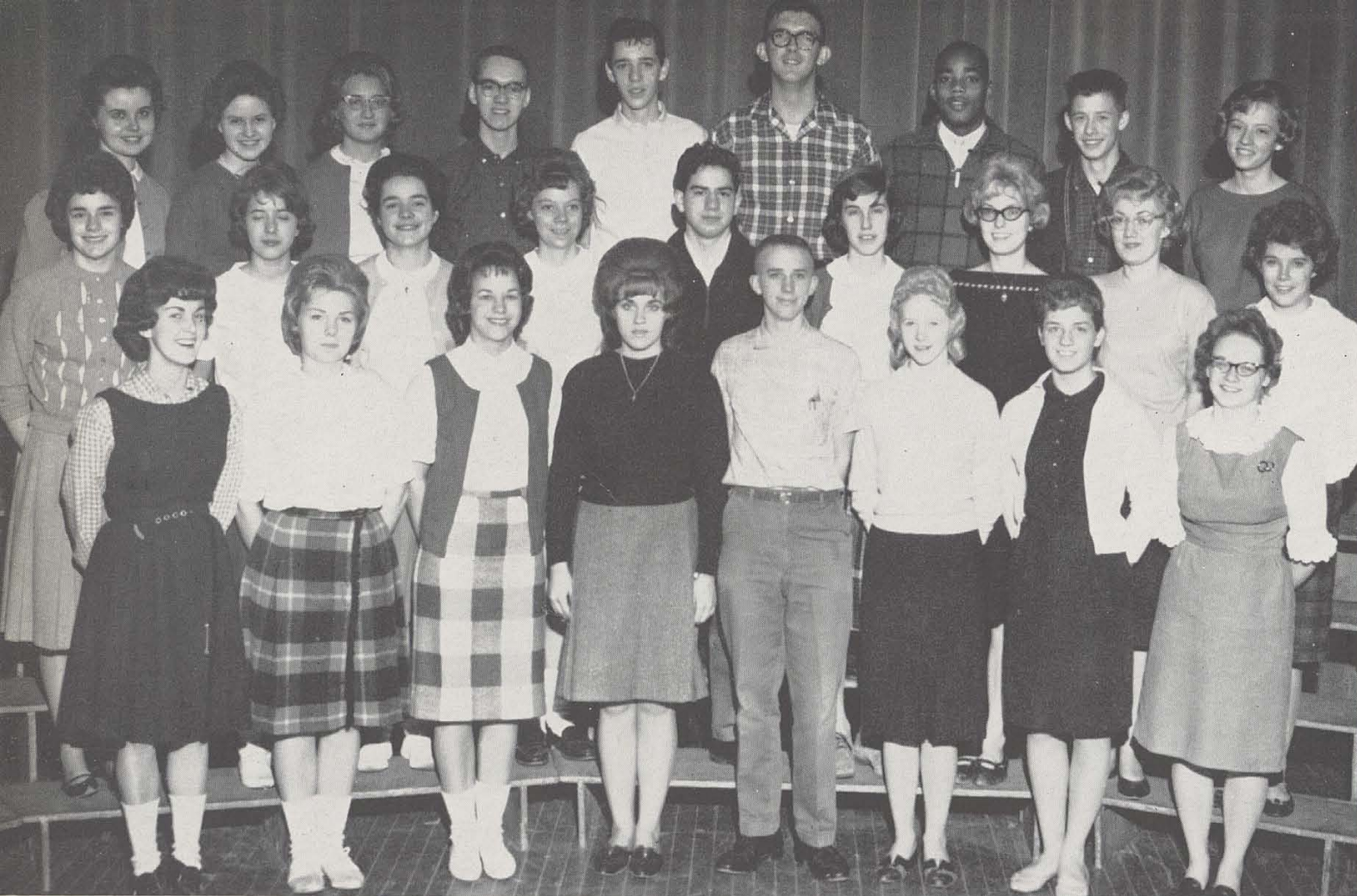
This scene was just one of the many over-acted skits presented by the Hughes Senior Student Council to let the students see how their thoughtless and inconsiderate actions appear to others.

Math Club Encourages Superior Reasoning

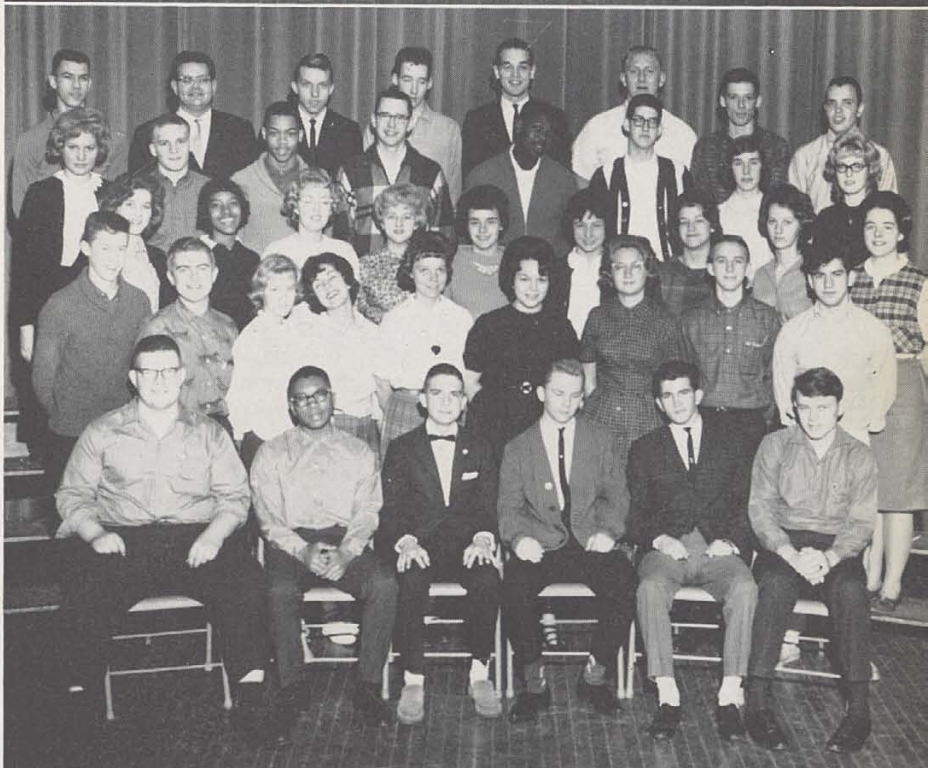

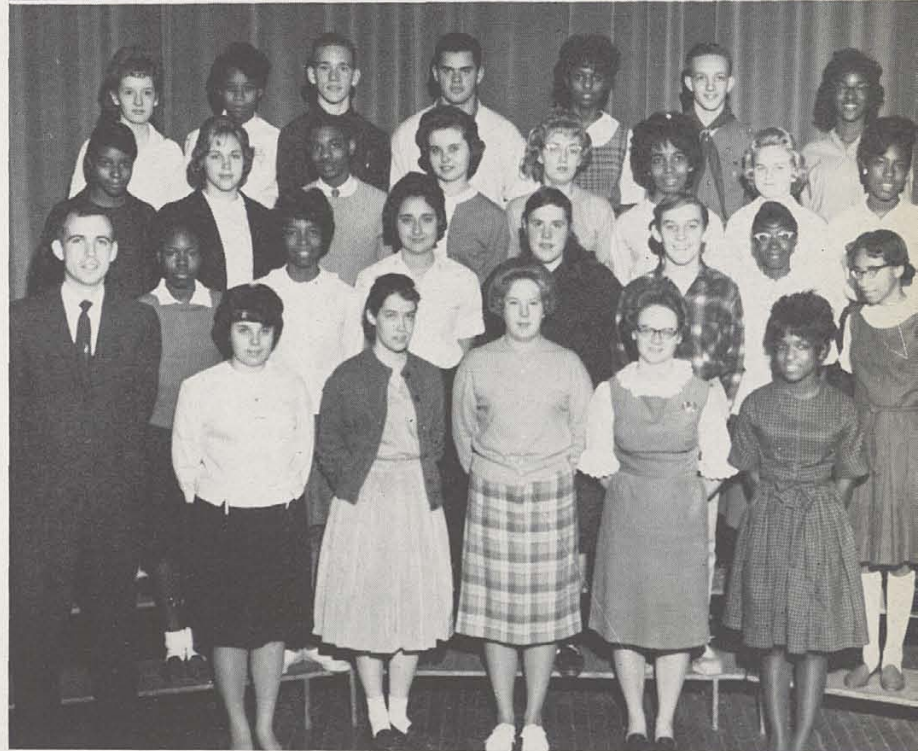
F. T. A. Furnishes Student Teachers

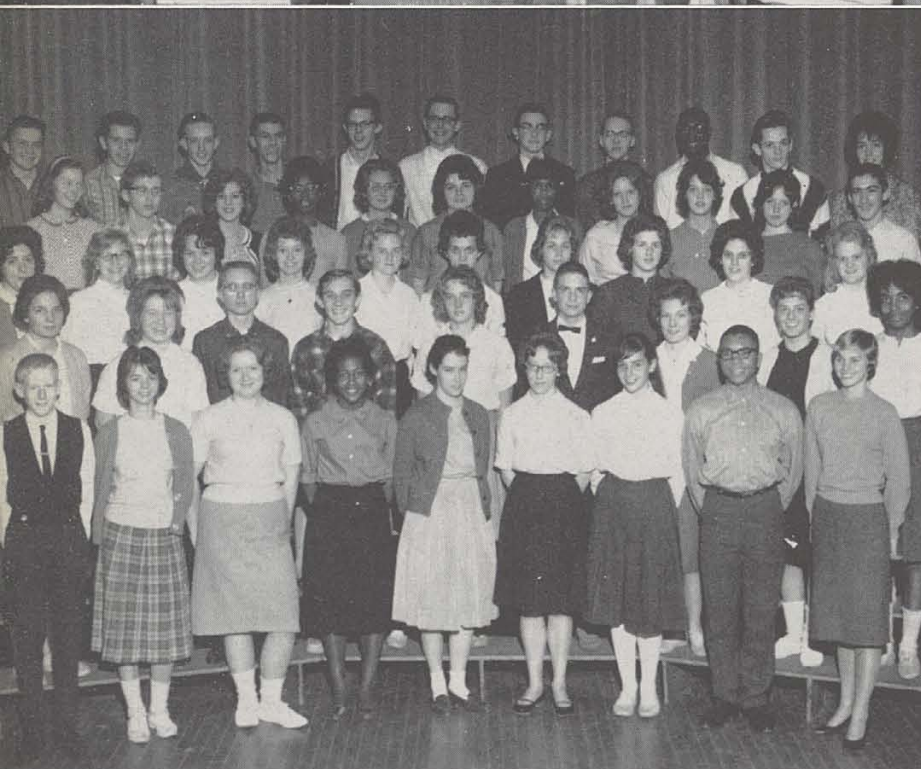


Togati Organized Like Ancient Roman Republic

Merchandising isn't all work and no play. The students visited Procter and Gamble, the Kroger Company and Coca-Cola.

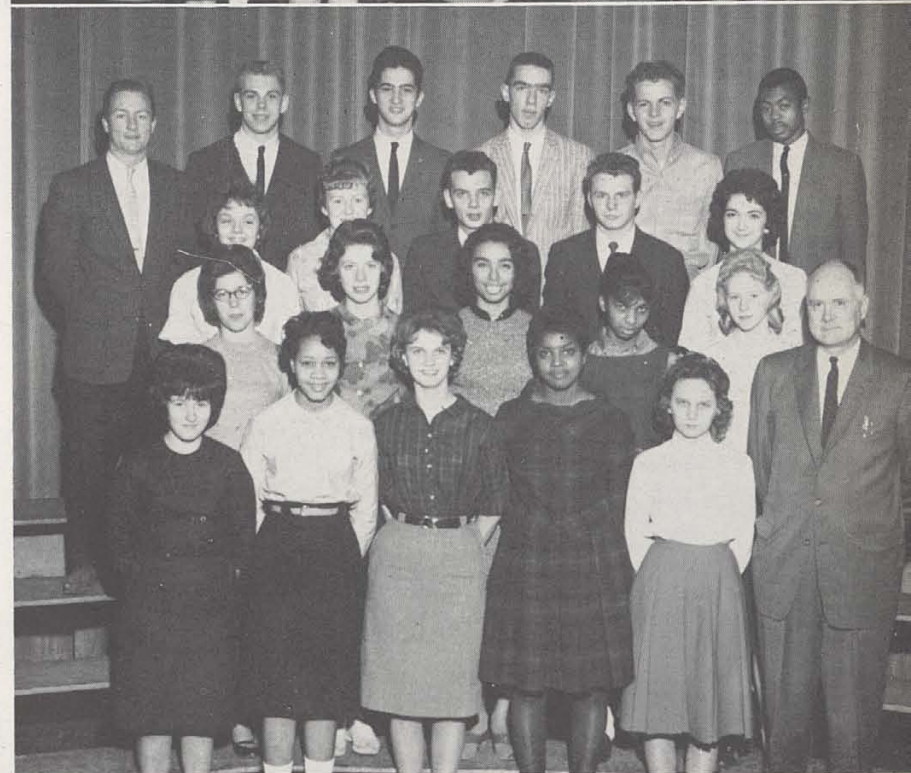
After two successful candy sales, the students were allowed to enjoy the benefits of an employer-employee picnic.

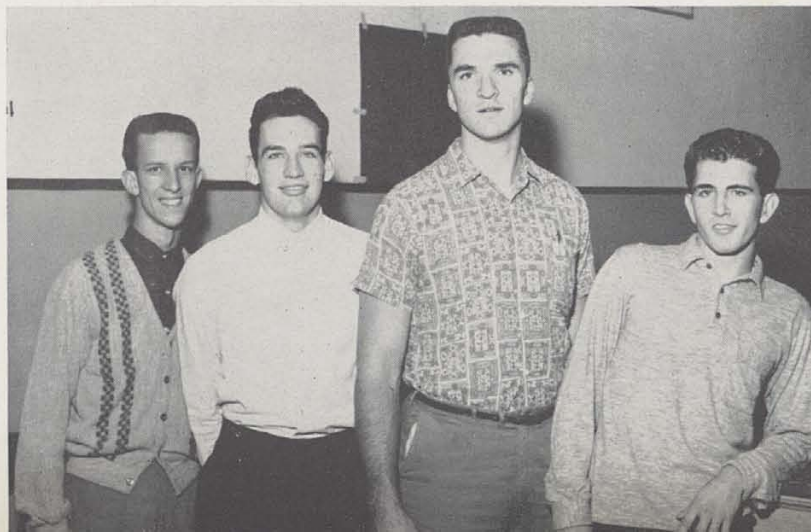

To encourage members to set their aims toward an interesting future in science has been the main purpose of the Junior High Science Club during its eleven-year existence.

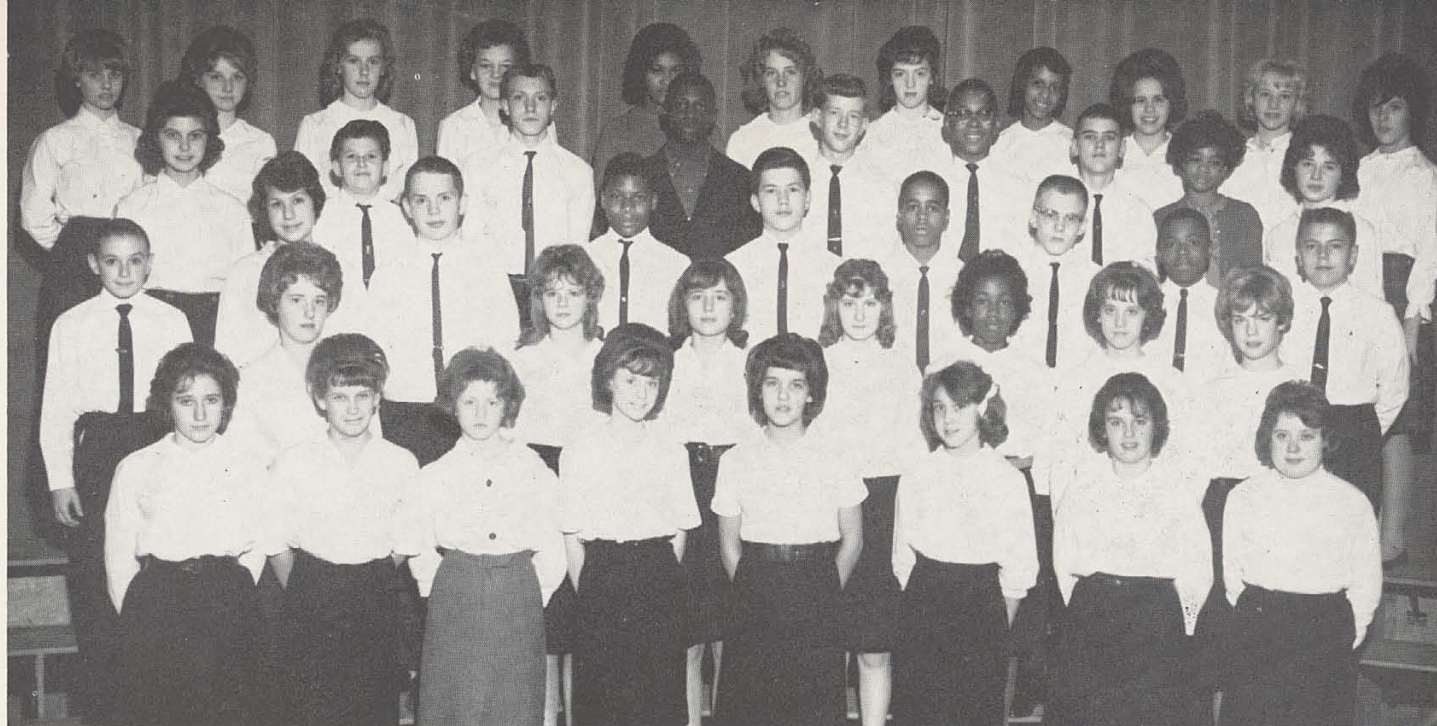
