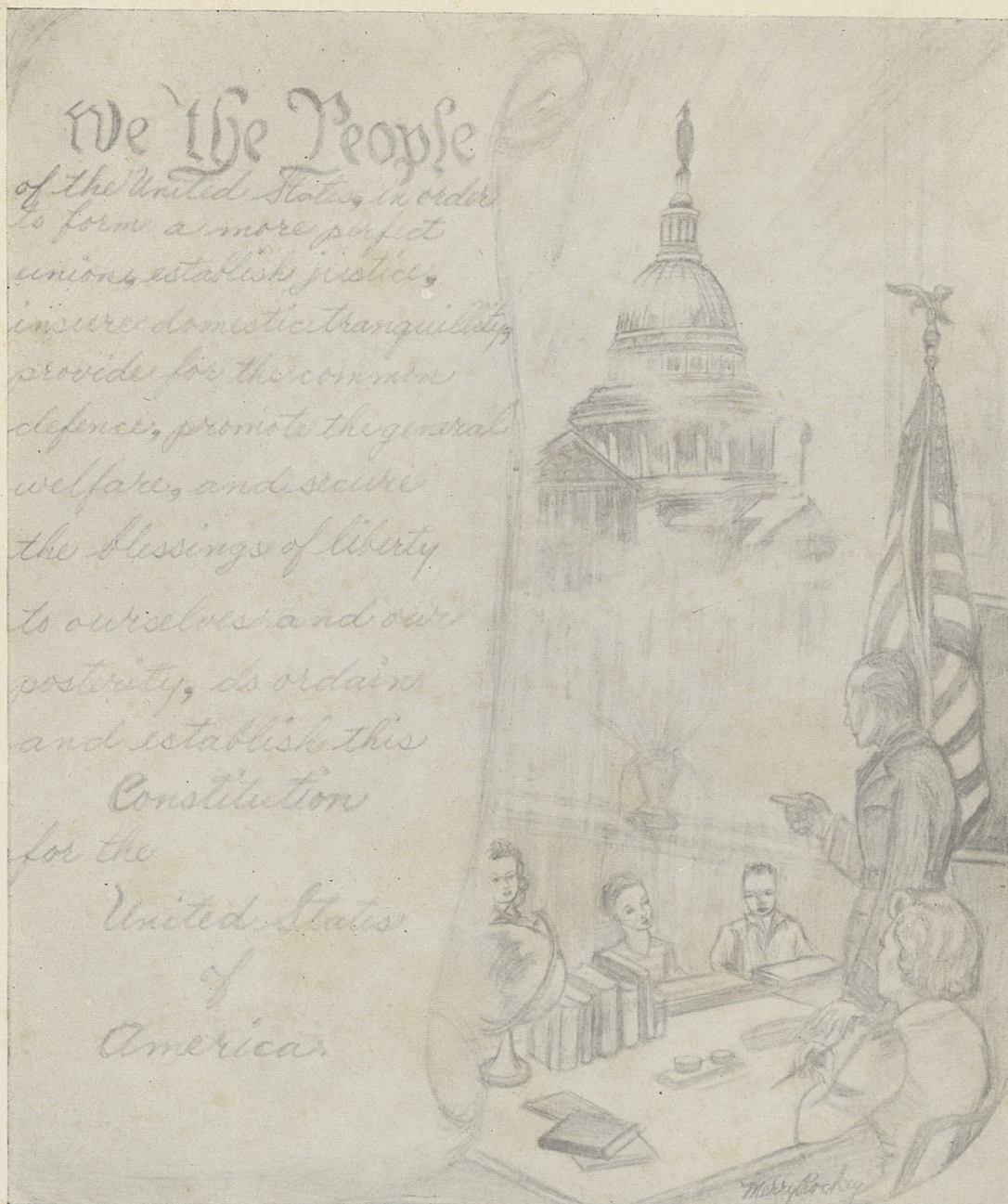

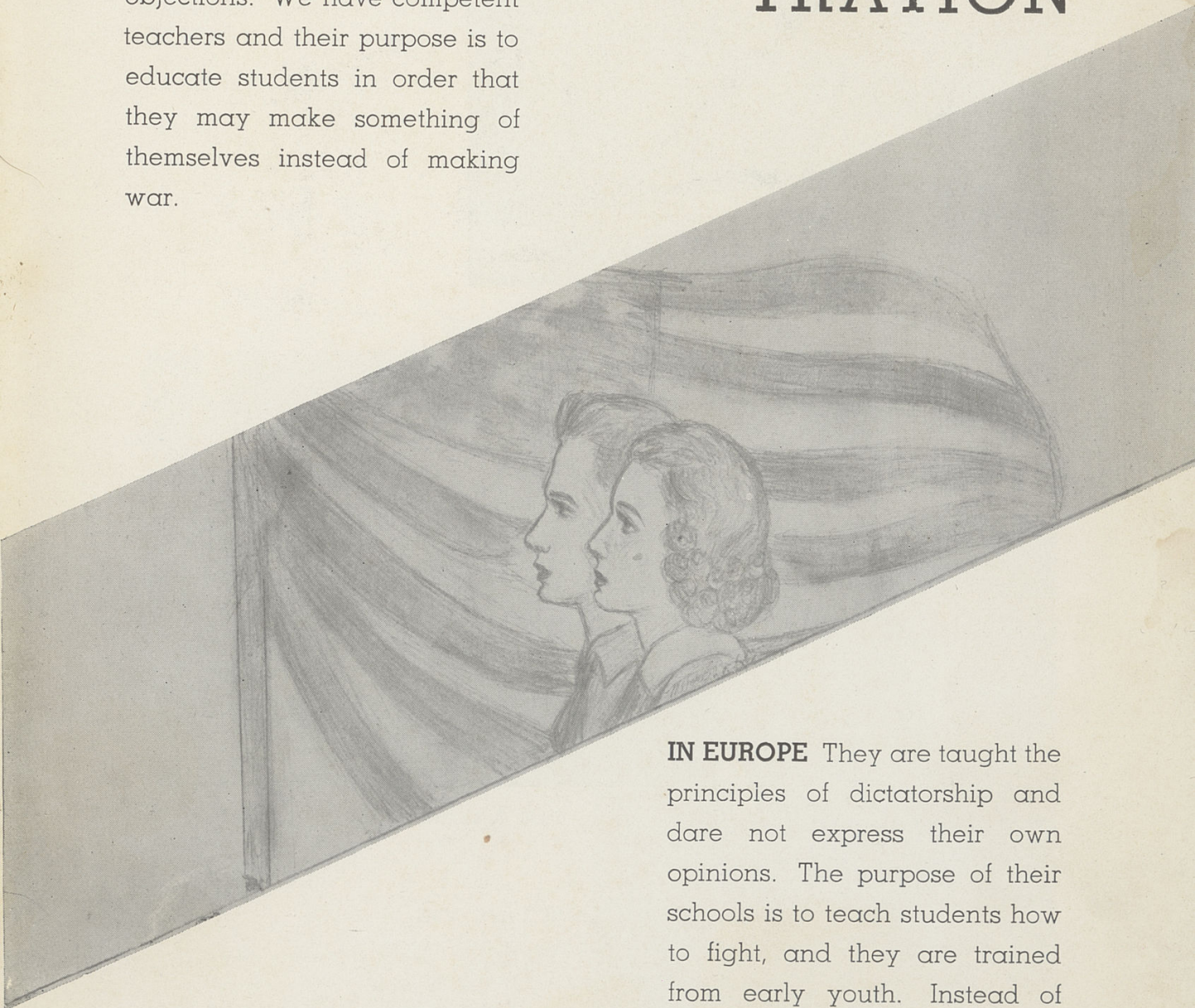


DEVOTED TO

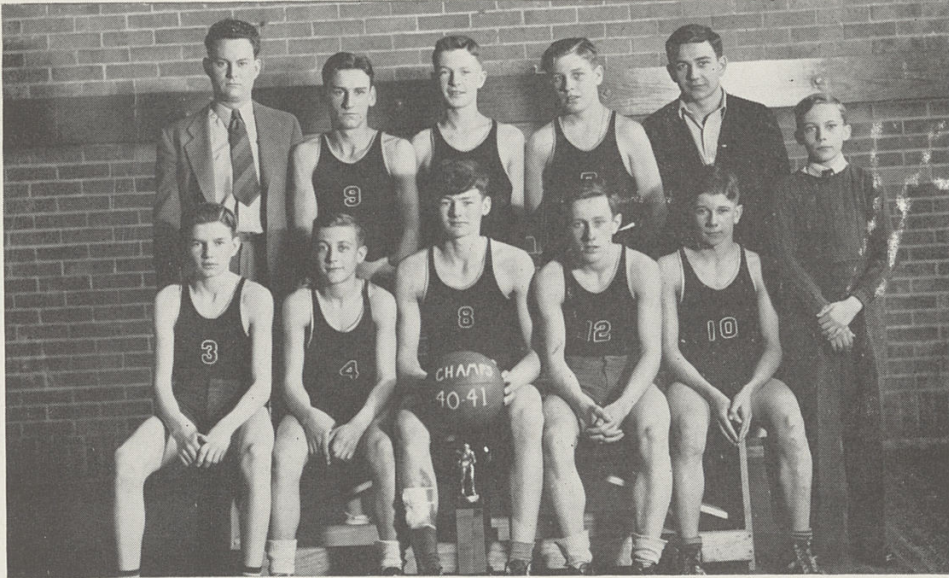
The Germantown Cardinals, after having won their first six games, fell to the losers column and lost the next eight county games.

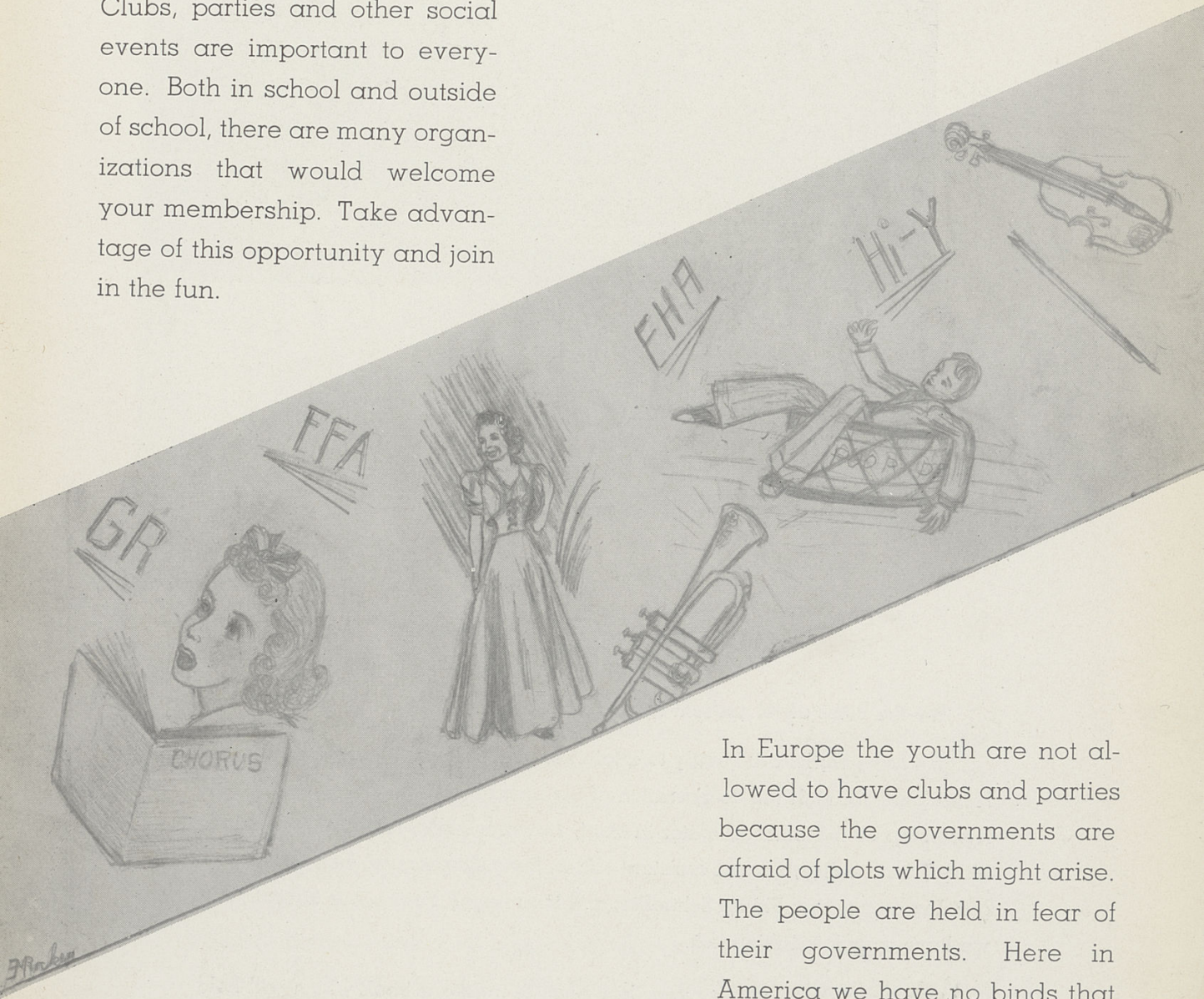

DANCE ORCHESTRA

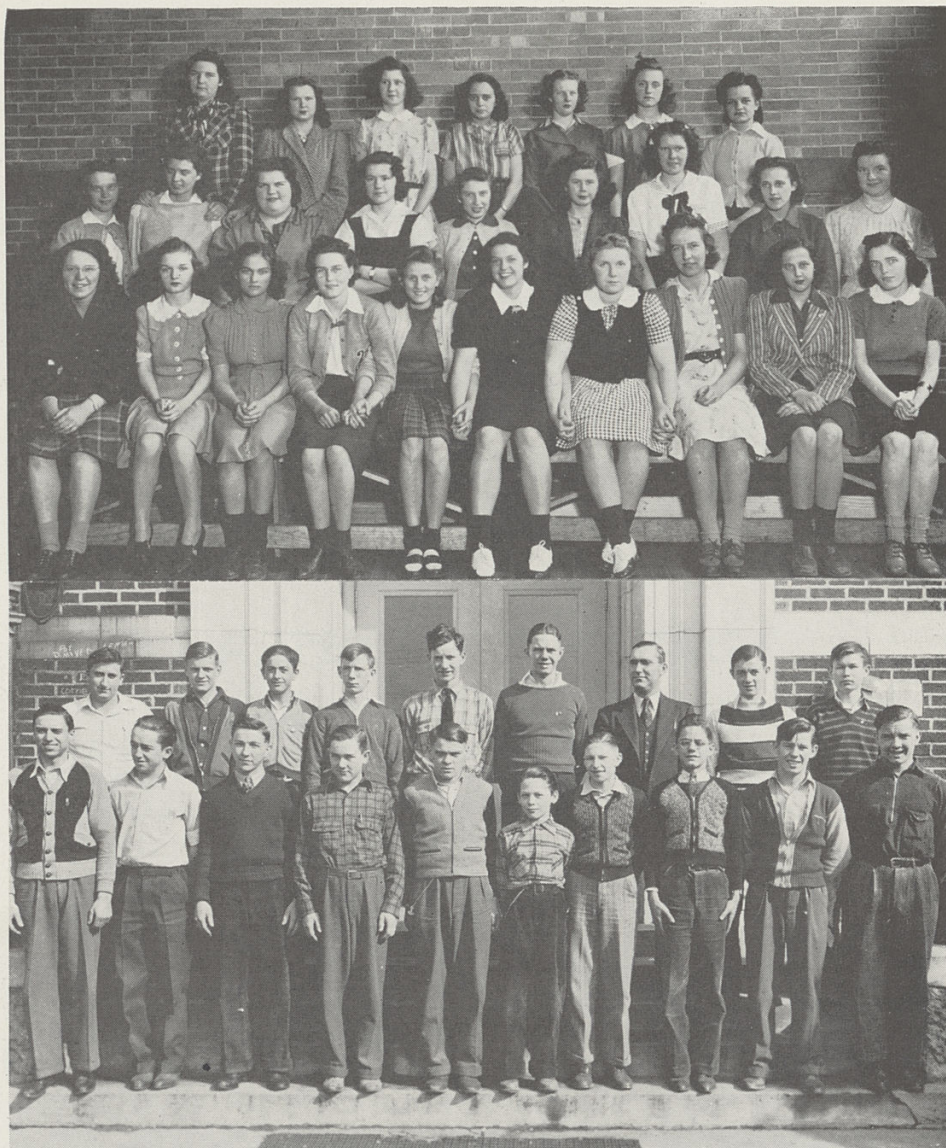
