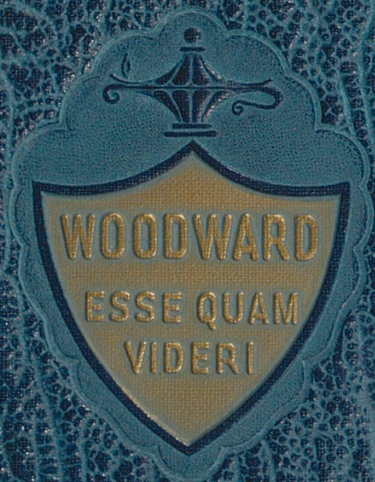

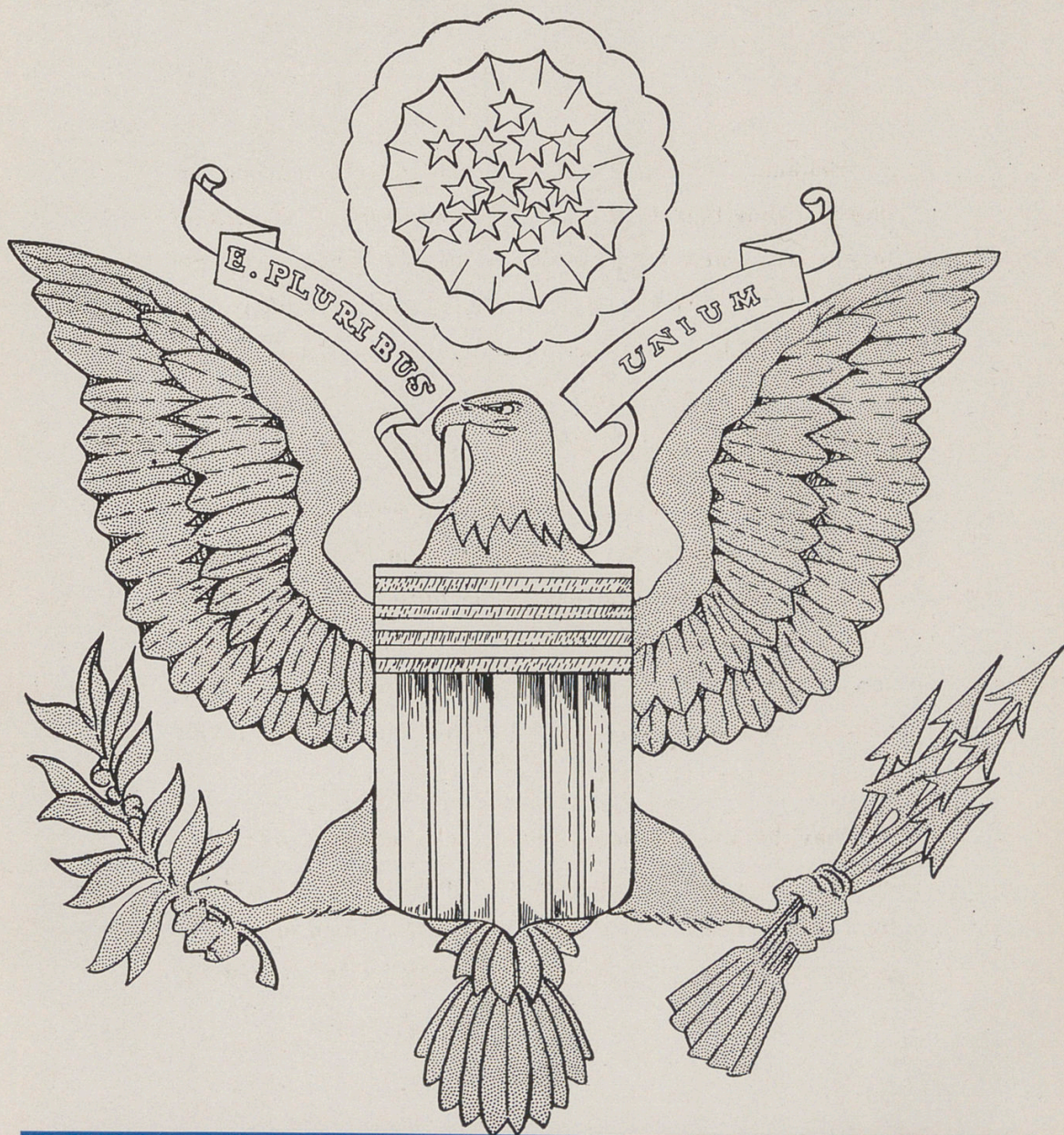

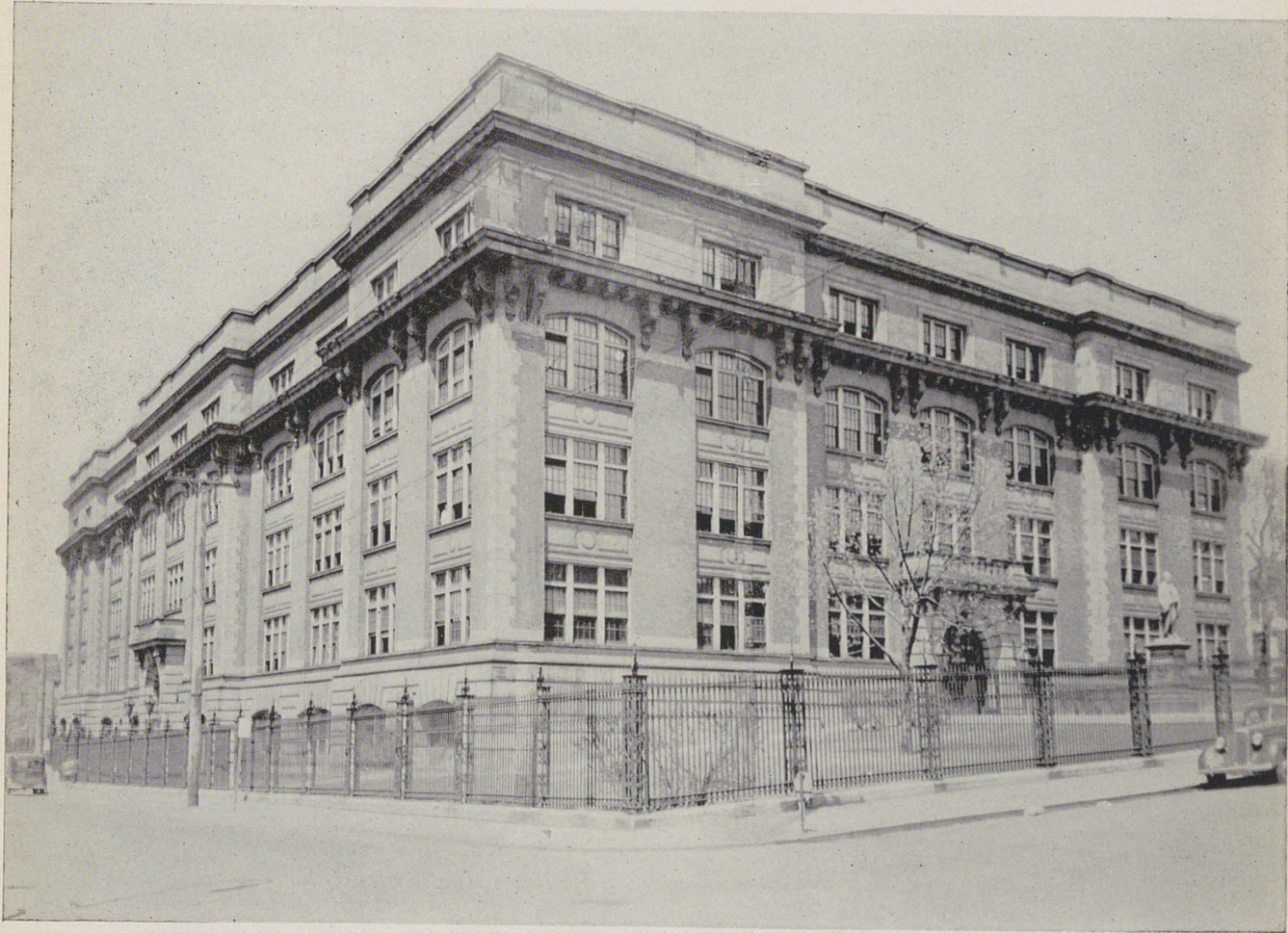
Education



William Woodward, a young farmer, came from his native Connecticut to the shores of our own Ohio to build for himself a new life. He was so deeply imbued with the ideals of Americanism — life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness — that out of his own private means, he founded a school which was to give a free public education to the young people of his community.

Today, the graduating class of 1942, filled with the same deep enthusiasm for the American way of life, dedicates its Annual to all those who have gone forth from the halls of Woodward High School, and are today, directly or indirectly, serving to keep alive in a war-torn world the same ideals that inspired William Woodward to found the first free public high school west of the Allegheny Mountains.

May the fine traditions of their school fill them with courage and the high resolution that democracy shall and will rise from out of the turmoil of the present, to flourish anew in a world which they have helped to make better by their efforts.



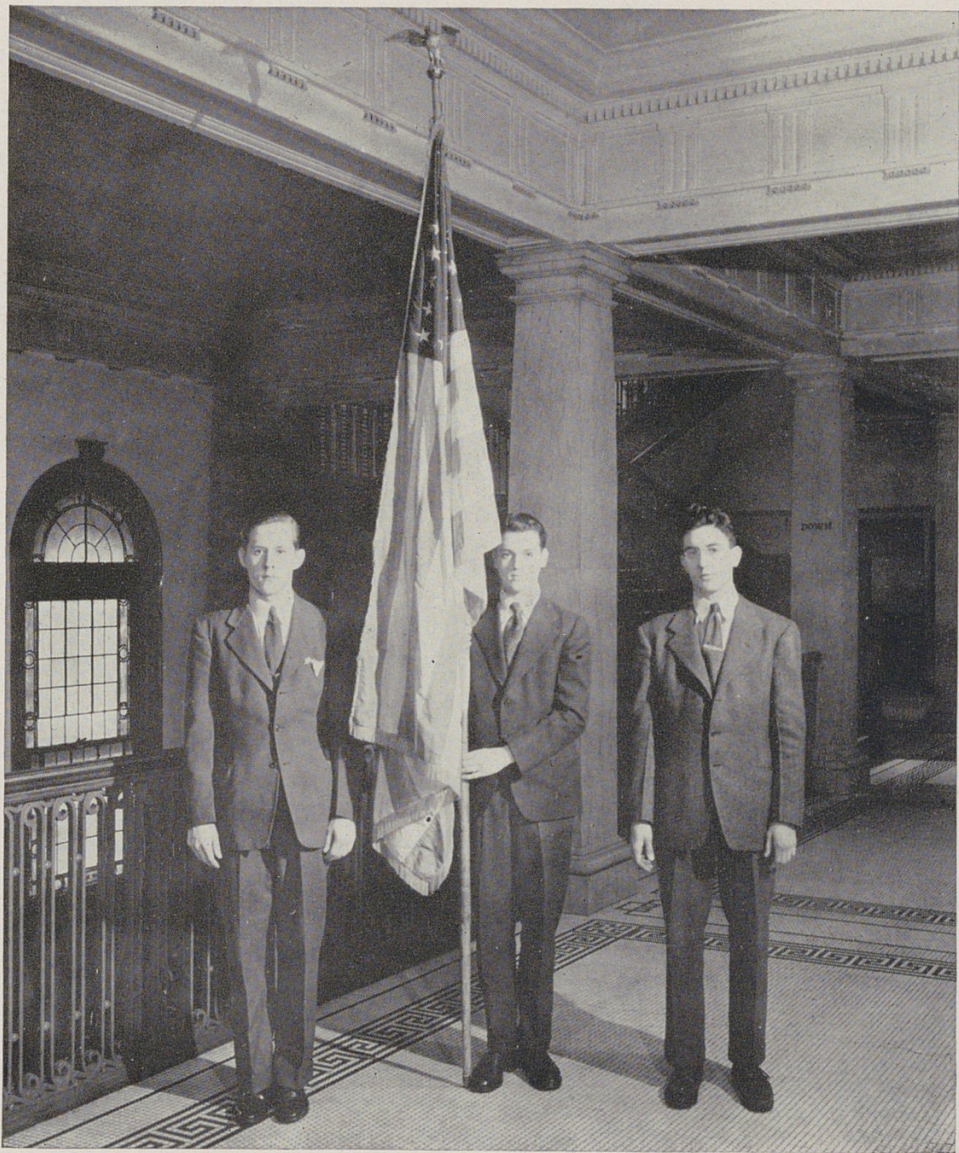
During more than a hundred years, various buildings, each known as Woodward High School, have occupied the same location. The first school building was begun in the early spring of 1831; Mr. Woodward himself hauled away the first cart-load of earth from the cellar. The building stood at the northeast corner of the school lot and was built of brick, two stories high, with two rooms on each floor. The building was surmounted by a belfry, containing the famed Woodward bell. This was the building that was opened on the twenty-fourth day of October in the year of 1831, with three teachers and forty-two pupils in attendance. Ten years later, in the summer of 1841, a third story was added to this building; it still remained very plain and unpretentious, without any particular architectural design.

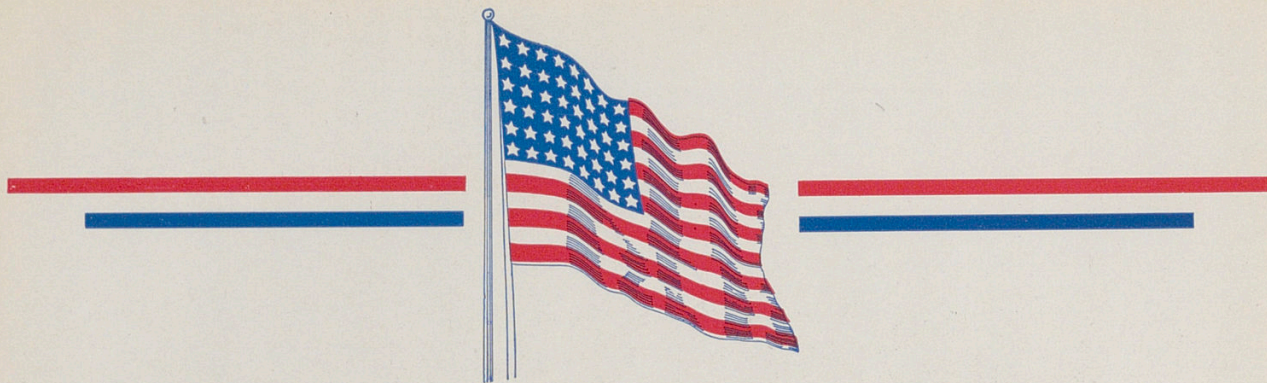
For fourteen years, this building echoed and re-echoed to the tread of young Woodward feet — then in 1855 gave way to a greater structure, as distinctive and pronounced in its architectural design and beauty, as its predecessor had been lacking in it. It was three stories in height, and was considered the noblest specimen of Gothic architecture west of the Alleghenies.

For more than half a century, the beautiful building of 1855 continued its noble mission of service and usefulness — for more than fifty years, it stood as the representative of high ideals of life, of loyalty to home and to nation, of strong minds and great names, of consecrated teaching and of high standards of scholarship.

Then came another Woodward, the building of 1910 — much larger and more spacious, rising in majestic dignity against the skies. Even at its creation it was glorified by the sacred traditions of the Woodward of the past.

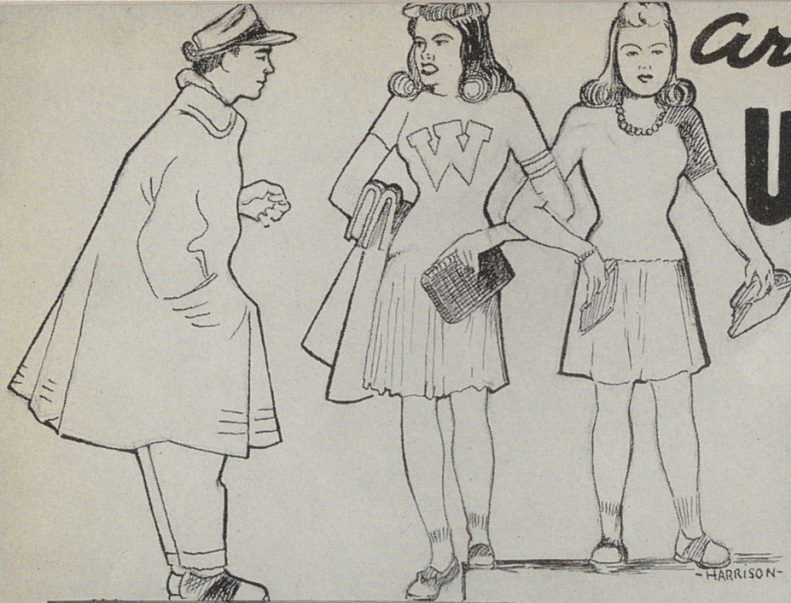

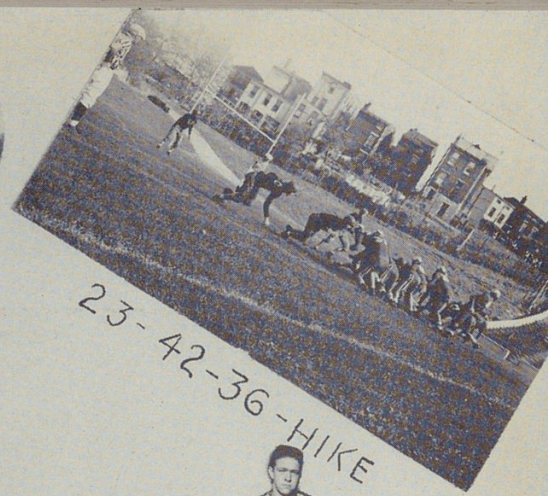

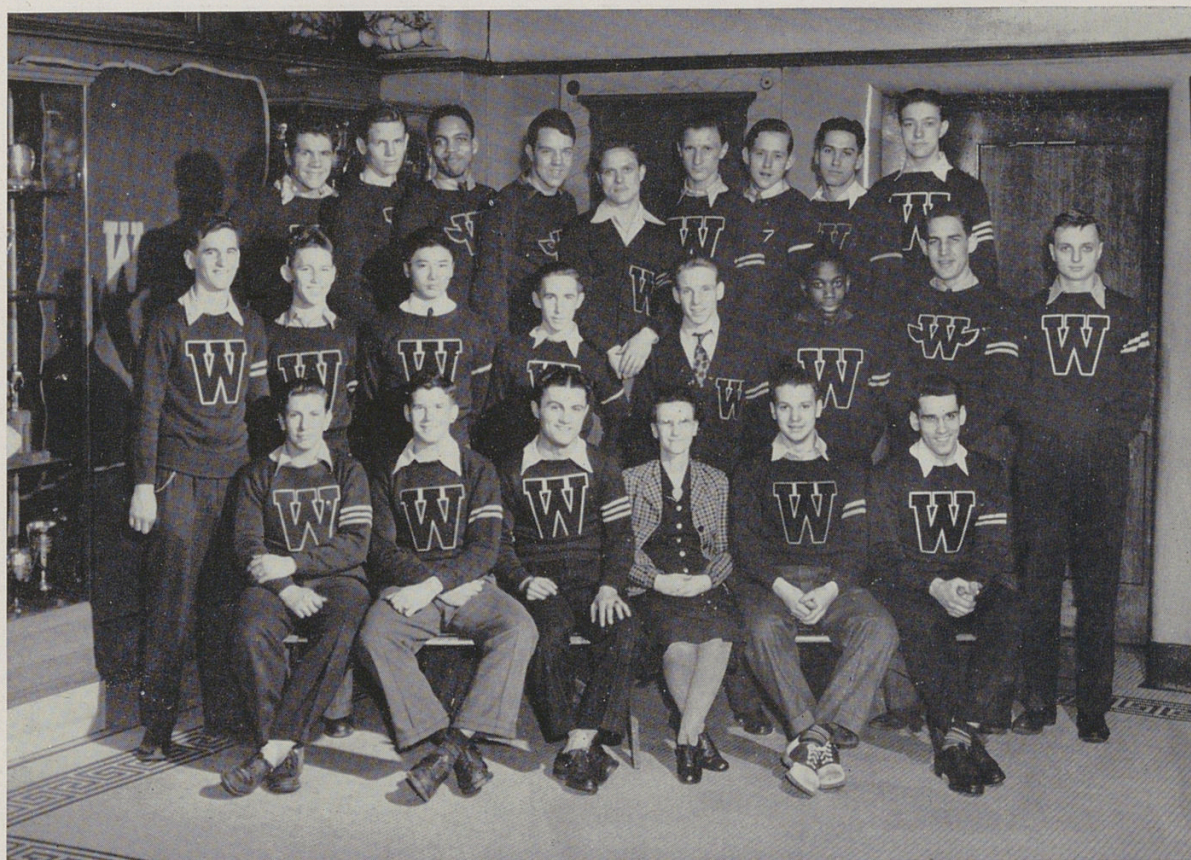

The success we have had in this endeavor has been such that we feel it is worthy of recognition in the Annual where the account can be forever recorded.

A campaign for the promotion of the sale of defense stamps was launched immediately and met with whole-hearted cooperation on the part of the students. Posters urging the purchase of defense stamps were prepared by students of the Art department. Sales were encouraged through home-room promotion. Miss Grace Darrah was placed in charge of the sale of defense stamps, assisted by Mr. Frank Floyd and Mr. Robert Duffy.

A committee of student helpers was selected. This group, composed of Winston Sundlin, James Schwarberg, Bob Maples, John Kottsy, Tony Iacabucci, and Wilma Guirck, has worked diligently and faithfully each month, making prompt deliveries of stamps to the purchasers. Woodward can be proud of the response of her students in the purchase of Defense Stamps. Many students are now the owners of United States Defense Bonds bought with their accumulated defense stamps.

When the government sent out the plea to conserve paper and metal and urged the collection of all excess paper supplies and scrap metal, provisions were made to comply with this request. Under the able promotion of Miss Jeannette Eppinger, assisted by the boys of home-room 206, and the members of her classes, Woodward's paper drives were carried to greater heights of success because now there was the two-fold incentive of money for the Woodward Fund and aid to national defense through the collection of paper which might otherwise have been destroyed.

Mr. Lyons was placed in charge of the collection of scrap metal. Each Friday, barrels were placed at all entrances to school and patriotic boys and girls deposited in these containers any old metal of which they desired to dispose. Assisting in this work were James Daniels, Ralph Roach, Marvin Lovett, Bruce Helton, Robert Means, and John Pelfrey.



Even before the entrance of the United States into the war, an appeal had been made for books and magazines as reading matter for the boys in army camps. At Woodward, Mrs. McDaniel with the assistance of the Girl Reserves under the direction of Miss Juanita Randolph, launched a drive for the collection of reading material for the soldiers. After the entrance of our country into the war, and the increase in the number of men in the armed service, the drive for books was intensified. The girls were successful in accumulating a large number of excellent books and magazines of all kinds. The Girl Reserves who aided in this campaign were: Helen Kisker, Lillian Wiley, Joyce Owens, Shirley Hirt, and Virginia Zwygart.

These were supplemented by scrapbooks made by students who volunteered their services and worked after school hours on this enterprise. Some of the interesting scrapbooks which were completed had block printed covers which were made by girls of the Applied Art Class. This work was under the supervision of Miss Vera LeCount, Miss Marcella Schroth, and Miss Sylvia Naish. Some scrapbooks were also made by various classes as part of their work and these were also sent to the soldiers.

Pupils of the Household Arts Department under the direction of Mrs. Marie Schneider, Miss Florence Volkmer, and Miss Mary Jane Junk, responded to the request of the Red Cross and made over a thousand bandages, besides making various articles of clothing which the Red Cross asked for.

Girls of the G. S. W. Club under the direction of Miss Hazel Orr, as a group project, are knitting an afghan. These girls include Alma Averett, Lottie Enoch, Alma Redding, Lela Clark, Lazella Phillips, Lela St. Clair, Rachel Kinley, Sophie Kilgo, Ruth Johnson, and Eunice Barnes.

Boys of Mr. David Lyons classes, in cooperation with the Department of Naval Aeronautics, are making solid scale models of aeroplanes. The significance of this work has recently been stressed and those engaged in it are making an important contribution to national defense. This is not an all-inclusive list of what Woodward is doing for National Defense, but it will serve to give some impression of the "all-out spirit" of the students here at Woodward High School.

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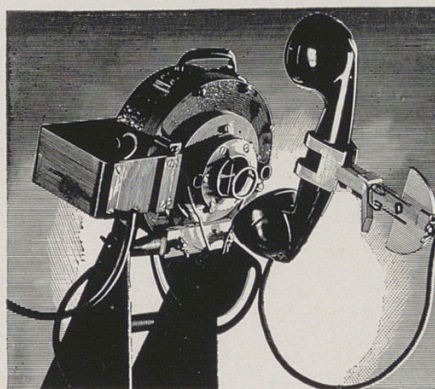
