# Woodward Annual

The Class of nineteen hundred and forty-three presents this Annual as a record of an outstanding year at Woodward High School, so that, in the years to come, the graduates may turn to it and live in memory the days of their senior year.

Education





Nineteen hundred and forty-three marks the one hundred and seventy-fifth anniversary of the birth of William Woodward, the founder of Woodward High School.

Early in his life, William Woodward felt the lure of adventure in the West. At the age of twenty-three, he left his native Connecticut. He traveled through forests and over mountains until he reached the shores of the Ohio River. From here he traveled by flatboat downstream until he ended his journey on the northern bank of the Ohio, opposite the Licking River, near what is now the foot of Broadway.

Not long after he settled here, Mr. Woodward conceived the idea of a free school for the young people of his community. Out of his own private means he secured land for such a project. The building that was opened on the twenty-fourth day of October in the year 1831, with three teachers and forty-two pupils in attendance, was a modestly simple two floor structure, surmounted by a quaint belfry, in which hung the old bell, now one of our priceless treasures. In the summer of 1841, a third floor was added to the school building. For the first time in its history, girls were admitted to the school. They occupied a separate room on the east side of the first floor.

For fourteen years this building stood as a symbol of educational pioneering. In 1855, it gave way to a greater structure three stories in height and of noble Gothic architecture. For more than half a century the building of '55 served the students of successive generations.

Then came another Woodward, the building of 1910, much larger and more spacious. This is the Woodward of today. For more than a hundred years, various buildings, each known as Woodward High School, have occupied the same location. The ground has been hallowed by the youth who have passed beneath her portals. May her name ever be cherished in the hearts of her students and may she continue her noble mission of education for Democracy.

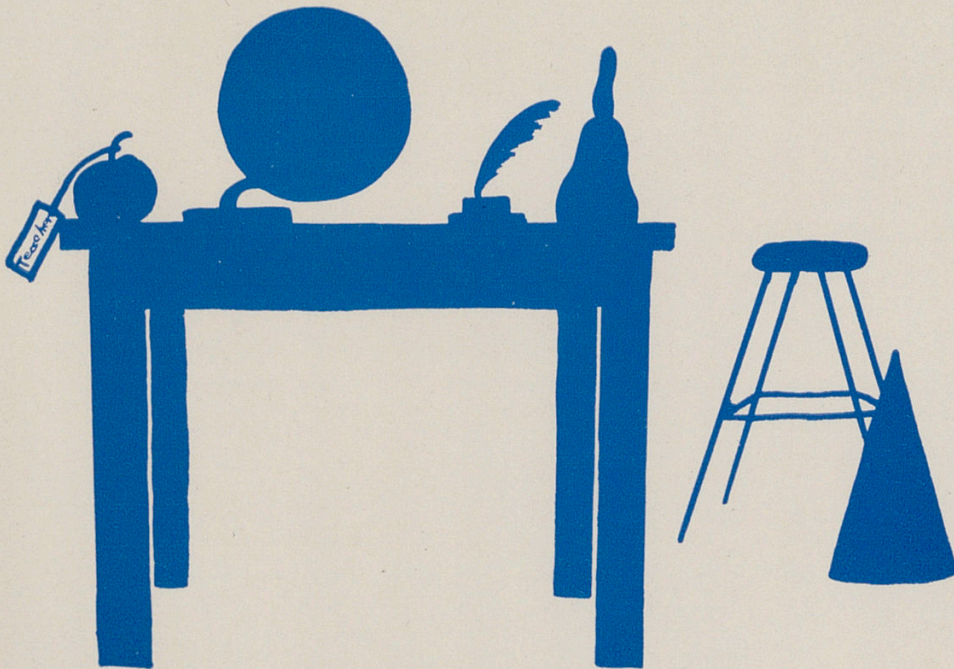

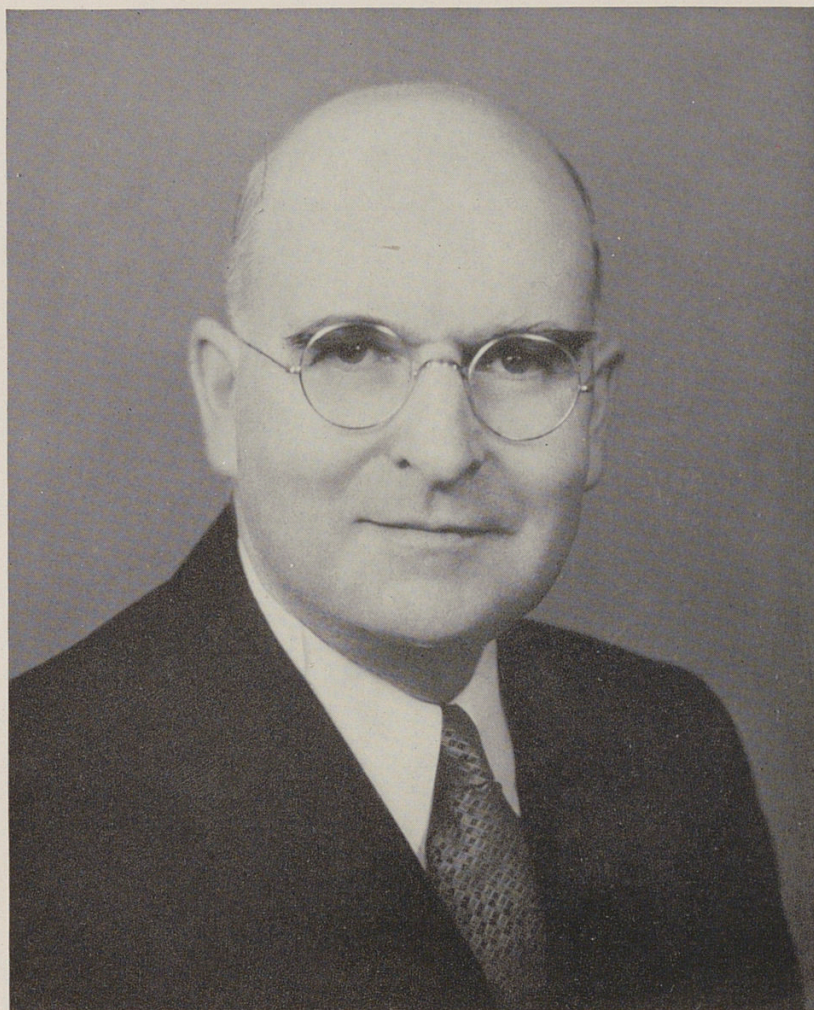




# Faculty

## SEPTEMBER



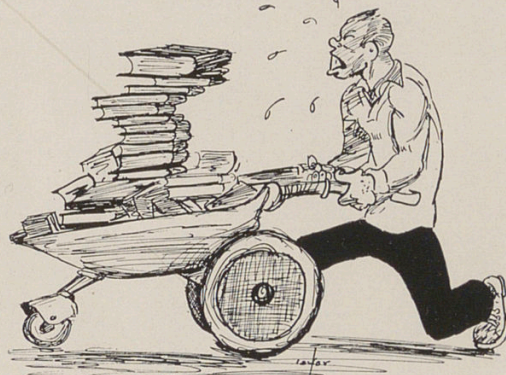

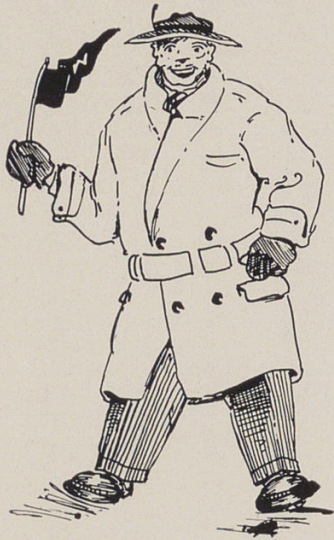

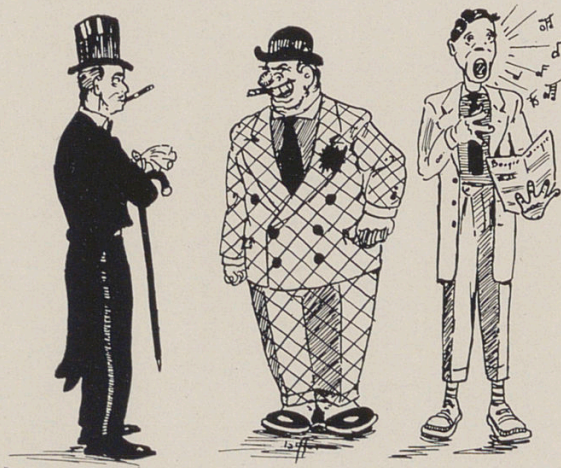
## OCTOBER

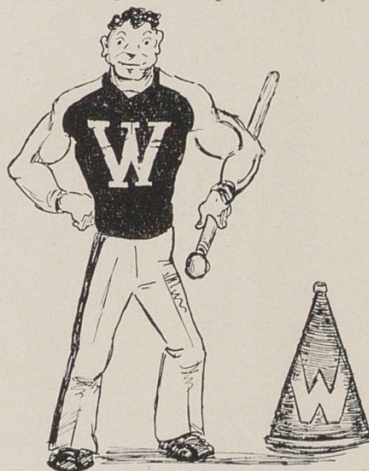

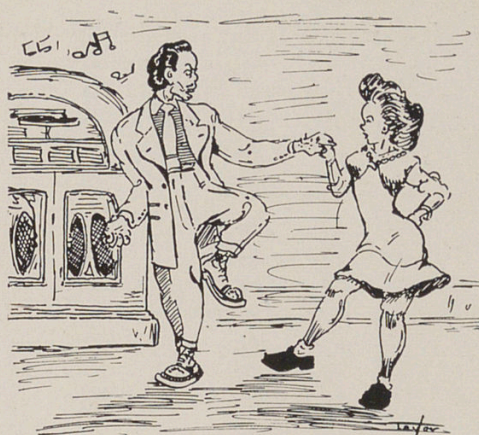
DECEMBER 11—Lieut. Robert Duffy, a former teacher, came home on leave and visited us today. Slick as a whistle in his uniform with his gold bars.

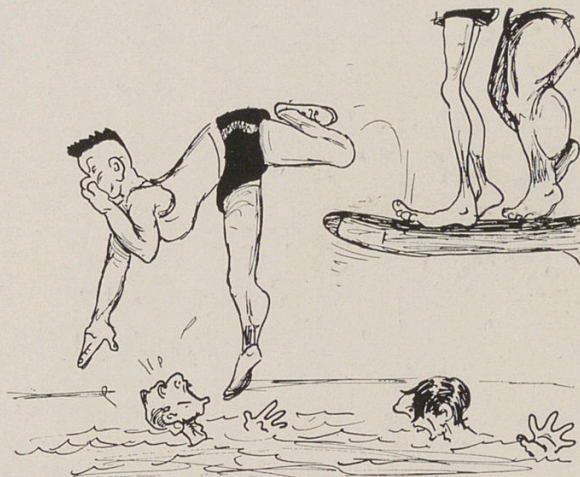

we were dismissed early. I can't help being excited and curious. I'll be glad when tomorrow's here. Hope the B. F. comes through!

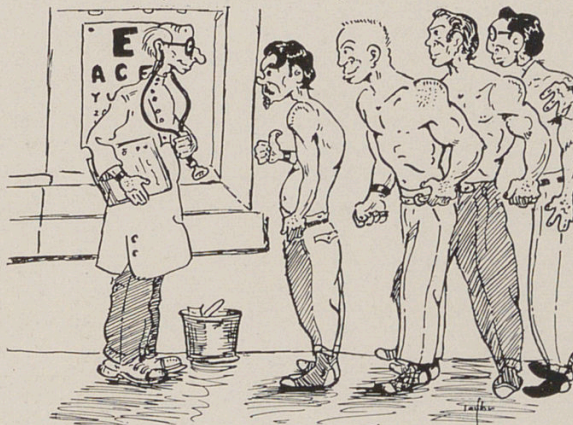

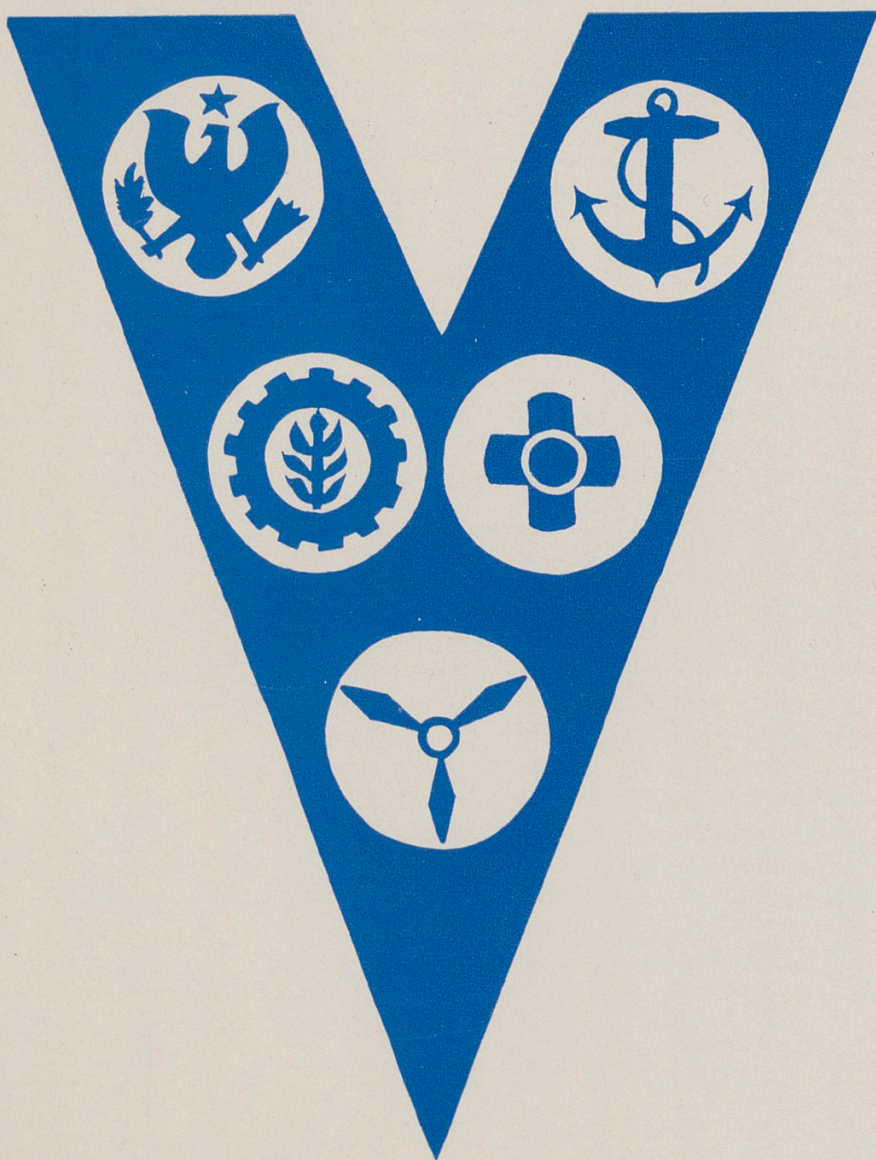








# *Victory Corps*





# Victory Corps

Among the major war activities of our school at the present time, probably one of the most important is the Victory Corps. The work of this organization is so far reaching and vital that its history should be of the greatest interest to every student.

The Victory Corps, or Junior Army of America, was founded by the National Education Association in cooperation with the United States Office of Education, under the leadership of John W. Studebaker. Captain Eddie Rickenbacker, hero of World War I and II, has assumed the responsibility of Chairman of the National Policies Commission. Secretary Willard E. Givens of the NEA and Secretary Paul E. Elicker of the National Association of Secondary School Principals are members of the committee, along with representatives of the War, Navy, and Commerce Departments. These are only a few of the many illustrious names connected with this organization.

All the countries of the world realize the value of training youth in the ideals for which that country stands. The United States was not slow in recognizing this fact. We have seen the great assembling of German youth in their war machine; we have known of the priceless sacrifices made by Russian children for their country; and closer to home, we know of our own boys who have lost their lives on foreign fronts fighting for this great land of liberty. We at home must do everything within our power to make the peace, when it comes, a lasting one. It is for this reason that the high school Victory Corps has been organized.

In the twenty-eight thousand secondary schools of this nation, the students have always been eager to do their bit for the war effort. However, there was no guidance so that this enthusiasm could be harnessed and turned into useful power. The purpose of the Victory Corps is to direct this eagerness into effective action and to channel it into areas of increasingly critical need.

In the high schools of our country, it has been unnecessary to stimulate interest in these activities. Already, students of all races and creeds have become members in the General Service Division of the Victory Corps. The mobilization of our youth has not been neglected over the many months of war in which we have been engaged. Great strides have been made by the Victory Corps, and undoubtedly greater ones will be made in the future.

The original organization of the Victory Corps was not a definite plan of working for all the schools; it was merely a pattern which they could follow in planning their own program of operation. This pattern was created by the main office at Washington. In our city, as in other cities, a Central Committee of the Board of Education has planned the organization of the Victory Corps in the Cincinnati High Schools. Dr. Orin B. Graf, chairman of this committee, working with the other members, has formed a policy of operation for the Victory Corps in each high school. A definite uniform set of principles has been worked out for all the schools of the city — such as, organization of activities, the granting and wearing of the insignia, and other associated details.



In each school, there has been worked out a highly technical plan of action, with the principal as the head, a director, and a main council of teachers and students. In Woodward, Dr. Peaslee, director of Victory Corps activities, has appointed Miss Sylvia Naish as Director of Woodward's Victory Corps. Working with her, are our two wartime counselors, Miss Schwartz and Miss Aiken, who advise pupils in choosing a program which may be helpful in planning their part in the Student Wartime Activities. In addition to the director and wartime counselors, the council includes Miss Jessamine Faught, Mrs. Rose Helmers, Mrs. Lora Nantz, and Mr. Gustav Nyman.

There are two councils working with the Director and Counselors, the Victory Corps Council of Teachers and the Wartime Council of Students. Once a week the Faculty Victory Corps Council meets with six representatives of the Student Wartime Council to form a coordinating committee. It is this body which forms the policies for our Victory Corps.

In operation, many assistants are needed to help with the carrying out of this policy. Miss Bertha Oechsle has accepted the task of keeping a record of our school's wartime activities. Mr. Benjamin Fulks is in charge of all Red Cross Services. This includes First Aid classes, the Blood Donors' Committee, and other services. Miss Hazel Orr and Mr. Edward Eshman are in charge of our Physical Fitness Program. Mr. Neuman, now in the Navy, formerly was in charge of this. Mrs. Grace S. Walker is in charge of the publicity for the Victory Corps. Miss Mary Bierne gathers the news from the Commercial Department and Mrs. Helmers and Miss Vierling have taken charge of Community Services. They also look after the volunteer clerical service.

In charge of the recognition branch of the Victory Corps is Miss Jessamine Faught, head of the General Membership committee. She decides who shall wear the insignia of the General Service Division. She also keeps a permanent service record card of each student's activities. Certificates of Recognition were given to those students who had performed satisfactory wartime service throughout the year. Mr. William von der Halben is head of all special divisions. Working with him are five teachers, each of whom is in charge of one of the special divisions. Mr. Fred Roebuck is at the head of the Air Service Division; Mr. Wayne Rusher, of the Land Service Division; Mr. W. B. Johnston, the Sea Service Division; Miss Nellie Dowd, the Production Service Division; and Miss Margaret Clark, the Community Service Division. Special recognition goes to one of our student seniors, Charles Baird, president of the Student Wartime Council. In cooperation with Miss Naish, Charles has organized many student activities, has been in charge of the induction of the Victory Corps members, has written many articles on the Victory Corps, and has performed countless other deeds in the interest of the Victory Corps.

It is felt most certainly that the students of Woodward will fulfill all the responsibilities and tasks planned for them by the tireless directors of the Victory Corps. Woodward's place in the war will be one of increasing importance as the efficiency of the Victory Corps increases. The indomitable spirit which has prompted these activities will always be remembered by those interested in Woodward's youth, and their commendable work will always be appreciated by the boys fighting on the front, some of them boys of Woodward, fighting that we may be free!

# *Victory Corps Activities*

This year, the students of Woodward are engaged in many activities bearing direct relation to the war effort. Most of these activities are sponsored by student organizations under the guidance of the Victory Corps.

The Student Wartime Council, composed of home-room representatives, plans the Victory Corps activities and outlines a plan of action. Charles Baird, 201, is president of this council. The development of committees to carry forward the work of the Victory Corps has taken careful planning and organization. Through the Student Wartime Council and our council of teachers, these have been developed with the idea of directing our student power into productive channels.

A large number of the activities of the Victory Corps bears direct relation to the war effort. The Victory Corps has worked hand in hand with the Red Cross. This latter organization has made many requests for cooperation in their activities. First Aid classes have been organized here at Woodward and were very successful as to numbers and accomplishment. Home Nursing and Child Care classes have been offered and were enthusiastically received. Various groups have worked at making surgical dressings and making bags for the Tubercular Hospital.

One of the most serious of these activities in cooperation with the Red Cross is that of donating blood to the Blood Bank. The students who have done this not only have sacrificed time and energy, but have given their own blood for the soldiers on distant battlefronts. This service is open only to those over eighteen who have obtained their parents' consent. There was, therefore, only a small group at Woodward who could participate in this, but their spirit and enthusiasm made up for their lack in numbers.

The work of various of our clubs has been very commendable. They have undertaken the collection of the different items which the government, the U. S. O., and the Red Cross have requested. The Spanish Club has been tireless in their efforts in gathering suitable books and magazines for the men in the Armed Forces. The girls of the G. S. W. Club have worked hard in collecting bottles which are so vitally needed at this time. The Hi-Y groups whose members are students at Woodward have combined their efforts in the collection of games to be sent to army camps. Other collection campaigns have been carried on by the Victory Corps as a whole—such as the collection of silk stockings for the purpose of salvaging silk and the collection of pencils for use in war industries.

Working with the Victory Corps and connected with the Civilian Defense Corps, the Air Raid Wardens' Committee is one of the outstanding Committees. The volunteers in this group will be in charge of our school in case of air attacks and will assist in securing shelter for the students when this is necessary. At the present time they are operating as directors in charge of air raid drills and are in charge of the various air raid shelters.

The Camouflage Committee, under the guidance of Miss Clark, is training boys and girls for an important work with the armed forces. Camouflage is used extensively by the Air Force. Any preliminary training which our students receive will be just that much preparation for the vital work which they may be called upon to do later.



# STUDENT WARTIME COUNCIL



Many members of the Victory Corps as part of their service to their country have volunteered their services in connection with the rationing activities of the past year. About two hundred and fifty students took part in this program. The members of the Volunteer Service Group have generously contributed their time to the offices of the War Chest, Aid for Dependent Children, and the Junior Red Cross.

Not to be overlooked is the work the Victory Corps has done in the compilation of the Woodward Honor Roll. This is an unending task. The committee has worked unceasingly to make the Honor Roll complete and up to date.

The activities of the Victory Corps are undoubtedly a great help to the war effort. It is clearly recognized that many of these activities, especially the volunteer clerical work, release workers for service on other fronts. The collections of articles mentioned above are of definite use in wartime production. Many of these materials are greatly needed on the production front for essential industries. Other services can be classed as morale building. The kinds of work the Victory Corps can do present a limitless field of activities.

Those already in the Victory Corps have done admirable work in the many activities in which they are engaged. It shows clearly the undefeatable spirit which the students of Woodward bring to any undertaking—a spirit which will continue at Woodward as long as this crisis prevails and after—the indomitable American Spirit of cooperation.

The Bulldog quintet got off to a slow start, losing three of their first four games. Then, showing championship form, they won the next three contests in a row against parochial and public high school competition. Playing an "in and out" brand of basketball, the Woodward basketball team soon became the darkhorse of the Public High School Basketball League. At this point Woodward swamped a powerful Norwood team 51-37. After that game, the final bright spot in the Bulldog's season was the stand that they made at Springfield, where, playing one of the state's finest teams, the Woodward quintet fought hard the first half before going down, 47-30. They won six games, losing eleven during the season's play.

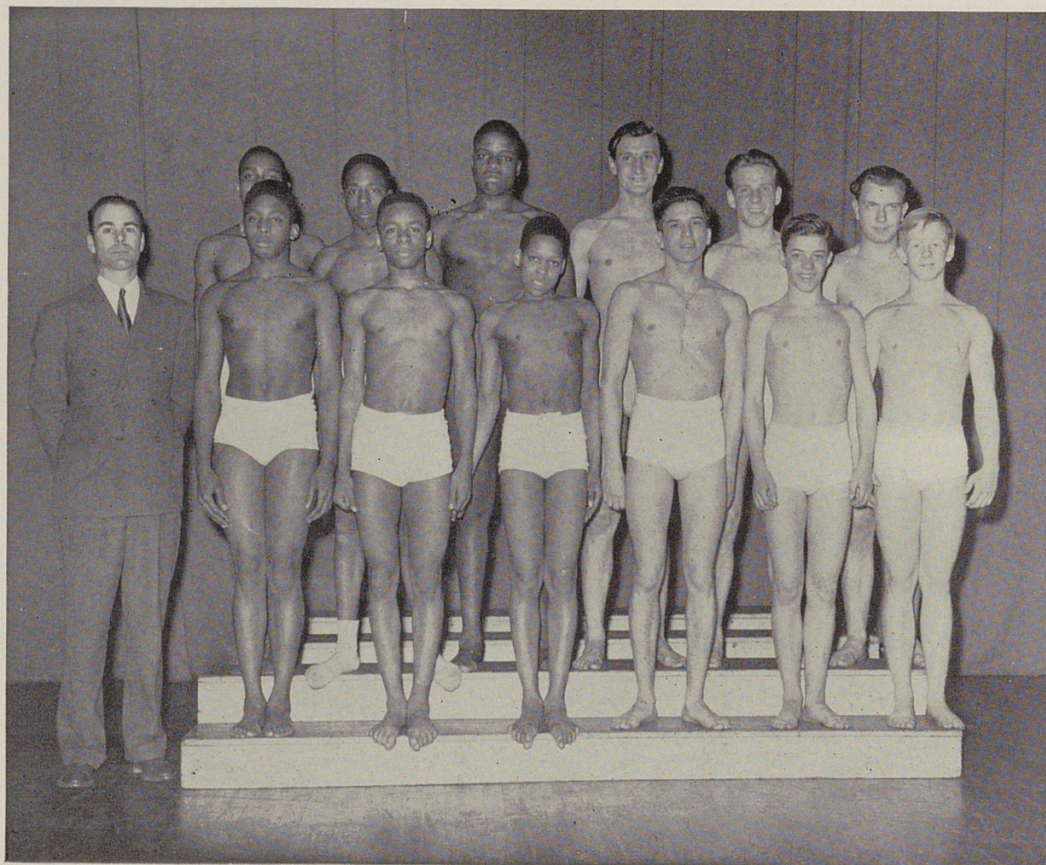

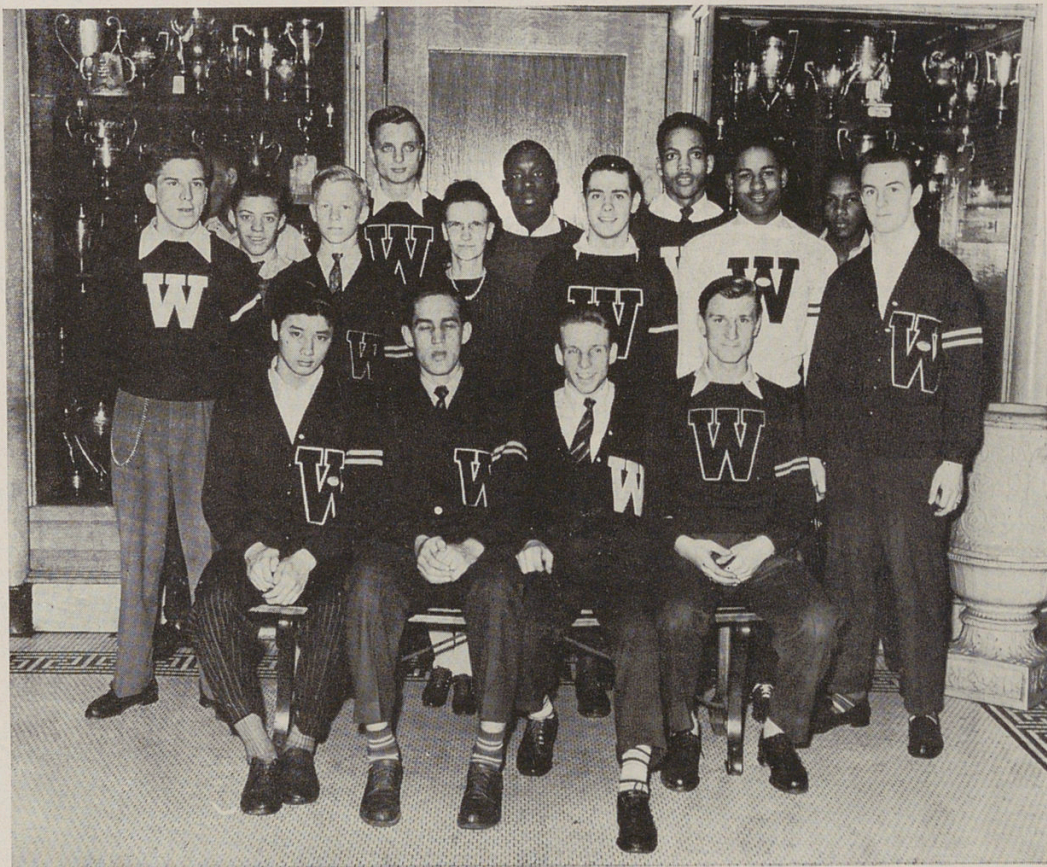

The members of the G. A. A. are also members of the Victory Corps, their program of activities being directed toward development of good health, which is a vital aim of the Victory Corps.

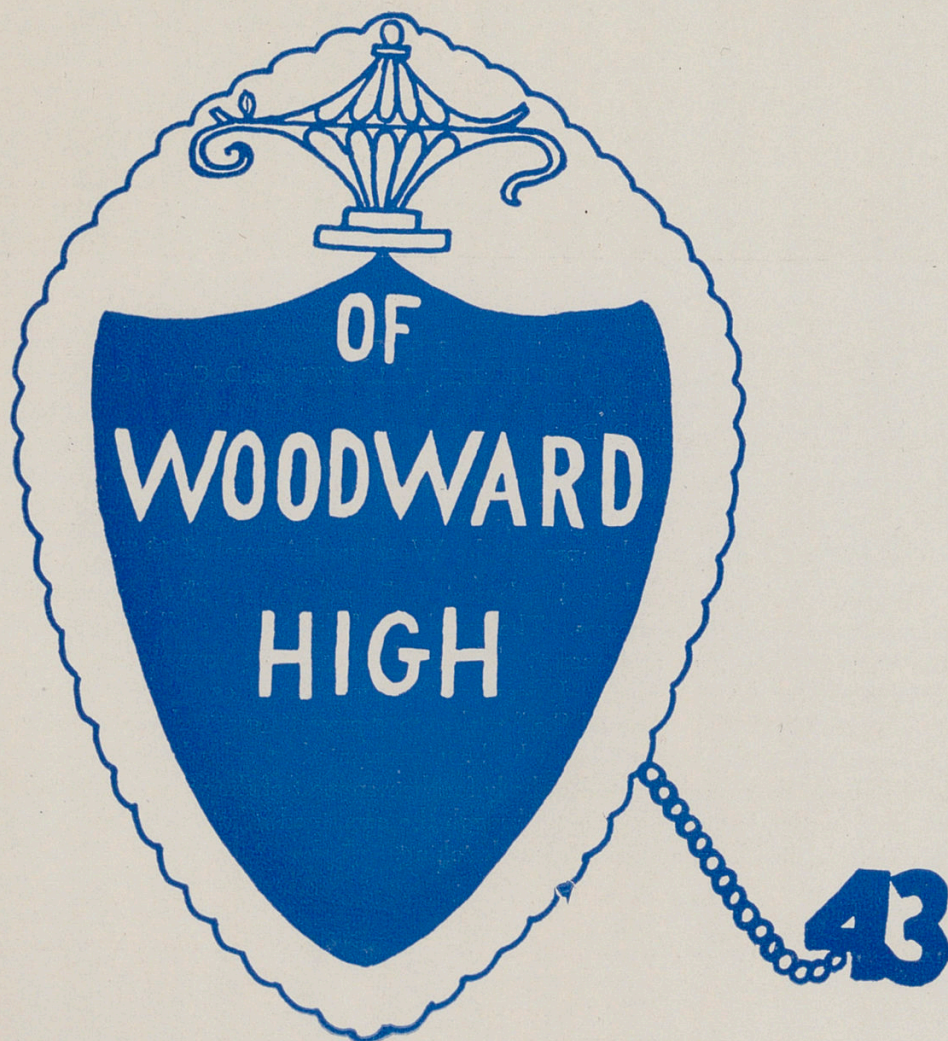

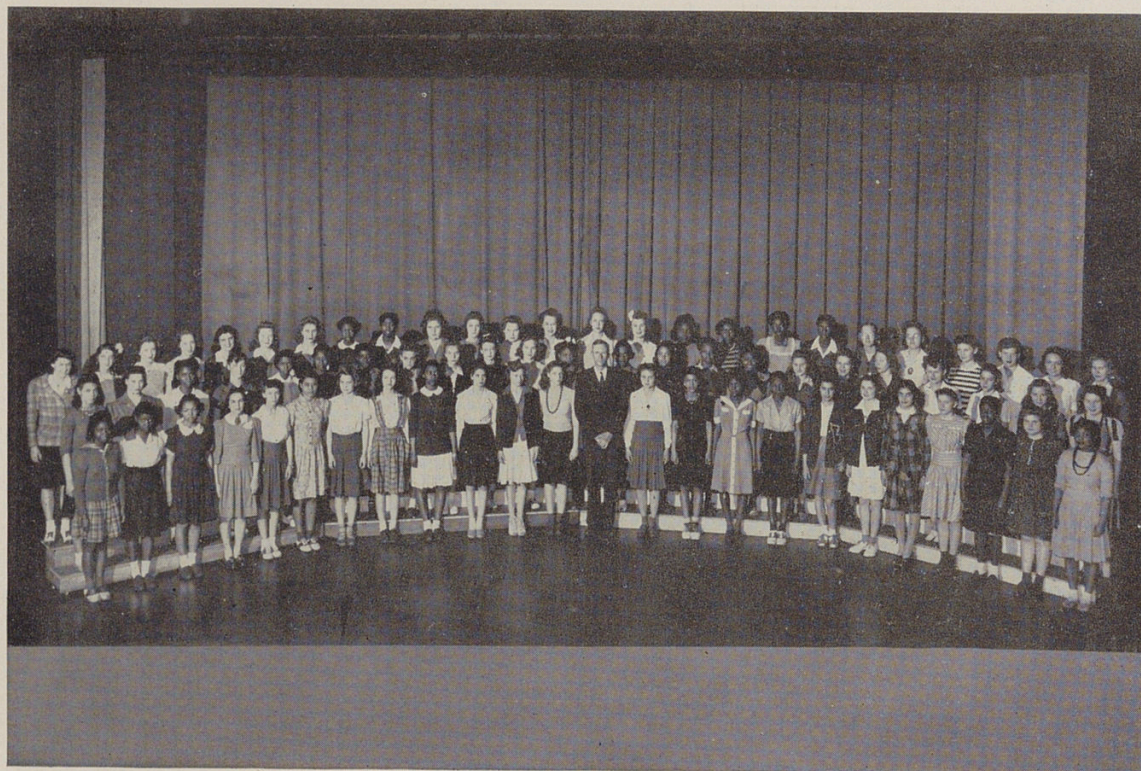

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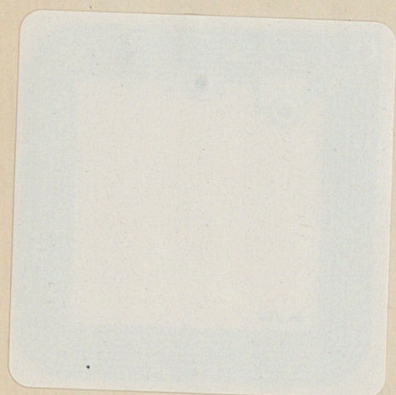
















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
