

To this America, we, the class of nineteen hundred and forty-six, dedicate our Annual. May the magnificence and glory that is America ever endure.






In Memoriam



Reserve Basketball






Baseball



Gym Team

"W" Club


The "W" Club is made of those boys who have earned their varsity letters in a major sport such as football, basketball, baseball, or gym team.



Physiology Club
