




One hundred and thirteen years ago, Woodward High School was founded by William Woodward. In the glorious history of this fine old school, the years have brought four distinct physical changes. The original building was built of brick, two stories high with two rooms on each floor, very plain and unpretentious without any particular architectural design. It was surmounted by a belfry which contained the bell, now one of our priceless treasures from the past. In the summer of 1841, a third floor was added to the building, and, for the first time in its history, girls were admitted to the school. For fourteen years, this building served the youth of the community, a symbol of educational pioneering in the realm of free education.

In 1855, a greater structure was built, purely Gothic in design, three stories in height. For more than fifty years, this building stood as the representation of high ideals of life, of loyalty to home and nation, of strong minds and great names, of concentrated teachings and high standards of scholarship.

The progress of time placed new demands on Woodward High School and made imperative the building of a larger building. In 1910, the present building was erected, glorified by the sacred tradition of the Woodwards of the past. We, the graduating class of nineteen hundred and forty-four, know and love this Woodward of today. One important change was made during our years here — Woodward's beautiful iron fence was donated to the war effort. We mourned its passing, but it was a necessary sacrifice. We hail the Woodward of today. May it carry on gloriously in the future.

Educator, philosopher and friend


Dedication






I shall always cherish the many happy relationships that I have experienced with the class of 1944 in my first year on the administrative staff of Woodward High School.

Victory Corps



The Victory Corps was organized in Woodward High School last year at the request of the National Education Association working in cooperation with the United States Office of Education. The work of the Victory Corps is so far-reaching and so vital that it has been given a place of prominence in the school program. The students of Woodward, as in the other twenty-eight thousand secondary schools of the nation, are eager to do their share in the war effort now and for the peace which will follow. To the youth of America will fall the responsibility of making the peace, when it comes, a lasting one. This will require very definite preparation and guidance. In these two fields, aiding in the war effort now and preparing for the responsibilities of a just peace, the enthusiasm of youth needs guidance so that it can be harnessed and turned into useful power. The purpose of the Victory Corps is to direct this eagerness into effective action and to channel it into areas of increasingly critical need.

This year the organization of the Victory Corps has been somewhat altered. The leaders of the movement realized that every student wanted to do and was doing something to aid in the war effort. This in itself was the primary requisite of the Victory Corps and was sufficient to warrant membership. This seemed to remove any need for special requirements such as were necessary last year. Now everyone in Woodward High School is automatically a member of the Victory Corps, as are the students in all the other high schools in the city. The students are wholeheartedly behind the Junior Army of America.

The Victory Corps is not so much interested in carrying on activities itself, but rather, is desirous of acting as a coordinating agency for all the wartime activities that are carried on in the school. Of course, many of these activities are carried




over into the home. This too, is within the realm of the organization which seeks to have every student an active member whether his war activity be part of the school program or whether it be carried on within the home or community. Herein lies the coordinating responsibility of the Corps. Many individuals have found in and through the Victory Corps an opportunity to do that which will help bring their fathers, brothers, and friends home sooner — and home to a better world.

The Victory Corps has recommended projects to homeroom groups. These have been successfully carried out and have often stimulated interest within the members which urged them to the achievement of additional goals. Activities have been suggested to various club groups. Genuine enthusiasm met these suggestions and they were carried to a successful conclusion. The Victory Corps has directed, when conditions seemed to warrant it, a number of activities which were more or less temporary and which at the time of their development could not feasibly be turned over to any particular group. These have been handled by volunteers from the membership of the Corps. Whenever appeals have been made by community agencies engaged in war-time activities, the Victory Corps has always heeded their call. It has met every appeal which has come to it to the best of its ability.

Assisting Dr. Peaslee, the director of the Victory Corps at Woodward High School, and Miss Curry, the faculty advisor, is an Executive Council of students chosen from the larger Student Wartime Council, which is composed of a representative from each home room. Miss Curry is assisted in an advisory capacity by Mrs. Nantz, Miss Schwartz, Miss Aiken, Mrs. Helmers, and Mr. Rusher.






