# *The Window*

Behind all great men and behind all great monuments, there must be a story, but seldom is there found a story so vivid, so real, so touching as the one behind the success and deeds of William Woodward. The founder and benefactor of our school was a man who must at this very moment rest peacefully and happy, knowing that the work he began is still going on and that his labor has been made immortal by the boys and girls, men and women, who honor and respect his memory because they appreciate the benefits made possible to them by his works and his effort.

The beautiful window depicting the landing of William Woodward at Cincinnati in 1791 was dedicated to William and Abigail Cutter Woodward, our illustrious founders, by the Alumnae Association in 1911. They felt the need of some tangible, visible memorial, which would be seen and appreciated down through all the years. Which one of us, teacher or student, hasn't stood in front of this masterpiece and felt the power and determination and hope behind the heroic figure in the prow of the boat?

Let us go back a few years and see who this young man was, and what his hopes and accomplishments were. William Woodward was born near Plainfield, Connecticut, in March, 1768, son of a liberty-loving father and a mother who was a member of one of the most prominent families of that day. Here, in the hills of Connecticut, close to nature, William Woodward spent his childhood and youth. But at the age of twenty-three, there came the call of the West, the irresistible urge to see what lay beyond, and off he went, by foot and horseback, and finally by flatboat. He came down the "Beautiful River" as the Indians called our Ohio River, until he came to the end of his journey and turned the prow of the boat toward the Ohio side, landing near the present foot of Broadway. So we see him pictured in the memorial window. Let us follow him off the boat and into the small settlement comprised of a few log cabins on the bluff just above the river. The name of the settlement had just been changed from Losantiville to Cincinnati.

The year after his landing, Mr. Woodward bought a farm from his brother, the property now embraced by the streets Hunt, Liberty, Main, and Broadway. This land he cleared with his own hands, building a small house from the lumber of his flatboat. Then he made a living by farming, surveying, tanning, and trading. By simple, frugal living and hard work, in the pursuit of these humble, honest occupations, he acquired honor, dignity, and a fair competency.

Seldom is a story complete, or a great man great, without somewhere, some time in his life, a great woman wielding her influence. In the life of William Woodward she was Abigail Cutter, of small stature, fair features, dainty figure, and of a kind, tender, and generous heart. Mr. Woodward was Miss Cutter's guardian after her father had been carried away by Indians. His character, modesty, and tender sympathy became manifest to Miss Cutter through the close companionship of legal condition and in 1803 she became his wife. He, thirty-five; she, eighteen—they brought together their love and worldly goods, and lived in security and contentment. She brought to him all the love of her strong nature and the generosity of her noble heart. Several children were born, but again, as in the death of Mrs. Woodward's father and mother, tragedy struck and one by one they were laid to rest in their little graves.

The love and help which they could have given to their own children, Mr. and Mrs. Woodward gave to others in the form of a free school for the education of poor children whose parents or guardians could not afford to pay for an education for them. In November of 1826, Mr. and Mrs. Woodward executed a deed conveying seven acres of land to trustees, for the purpose of building and supporting such a school. Later another acre was given and the actual work of building was begun in 1830. Mr. Woodward himself hauled away the first load of earth excavated from the cellar. On the twenty-fourth day of October, 1831, just one hundred and fourteen years ago, the school building was opened and dedicated. Mr. Woodward attended the ceremony and received the praises and congratulations of his friends.

In the few years of life left to him, he must have been a very happy man, content in the knowledge of good deeds well done as he beheld the fruits and visible evidences of his benefactions. On the twenty-fourth day of January, 1833, at the age of sixty-five, William Woodward passed away to a better world to receive due honor and reward. He rests from his labors but his works do live on, bringing inspiration and benefit to those who follow.

Let us look again at the window, or picture in our minds the figure in the prow of the boat, landing in a strange but conquerable land. He knew not what was ahead, but went in and found out and was the victor. And to us who follow he has left something that has been handed down year after year, to class upon class, and that is the Woodward Spirit. It shall always live, because there is more behind it than power and possessions. There is behind it those things which conquer evil, and hate, and prejudice, and live because men like William Woodward lived, and because women like his wife lived, and are now living to keep alive and proud the Spirit of Woodward.





*Woodward High School*



The Woodward High School of today is the outgrowth of a glorious history. It is an old institution and its development through the years has been marked by four distinct architectural changes. The first Woodward building, completed in October, 1851, was a modest two-story brick edifice with two rooms on each floor. It was very plain and unpretentious, without any particular architectural design. It had a belfry which contained a bell, now one of our priceless treasures from the past. The honor of ringing this bell is reserved for the oldest graduate present at the Founder's Day program each year. In 1841, ten years later, a third story was added, in which were laboratories and class rooms. An attic room was used by the boys for their debating society. For the first time, girls were admitted to the school, and they occupied a separate room.

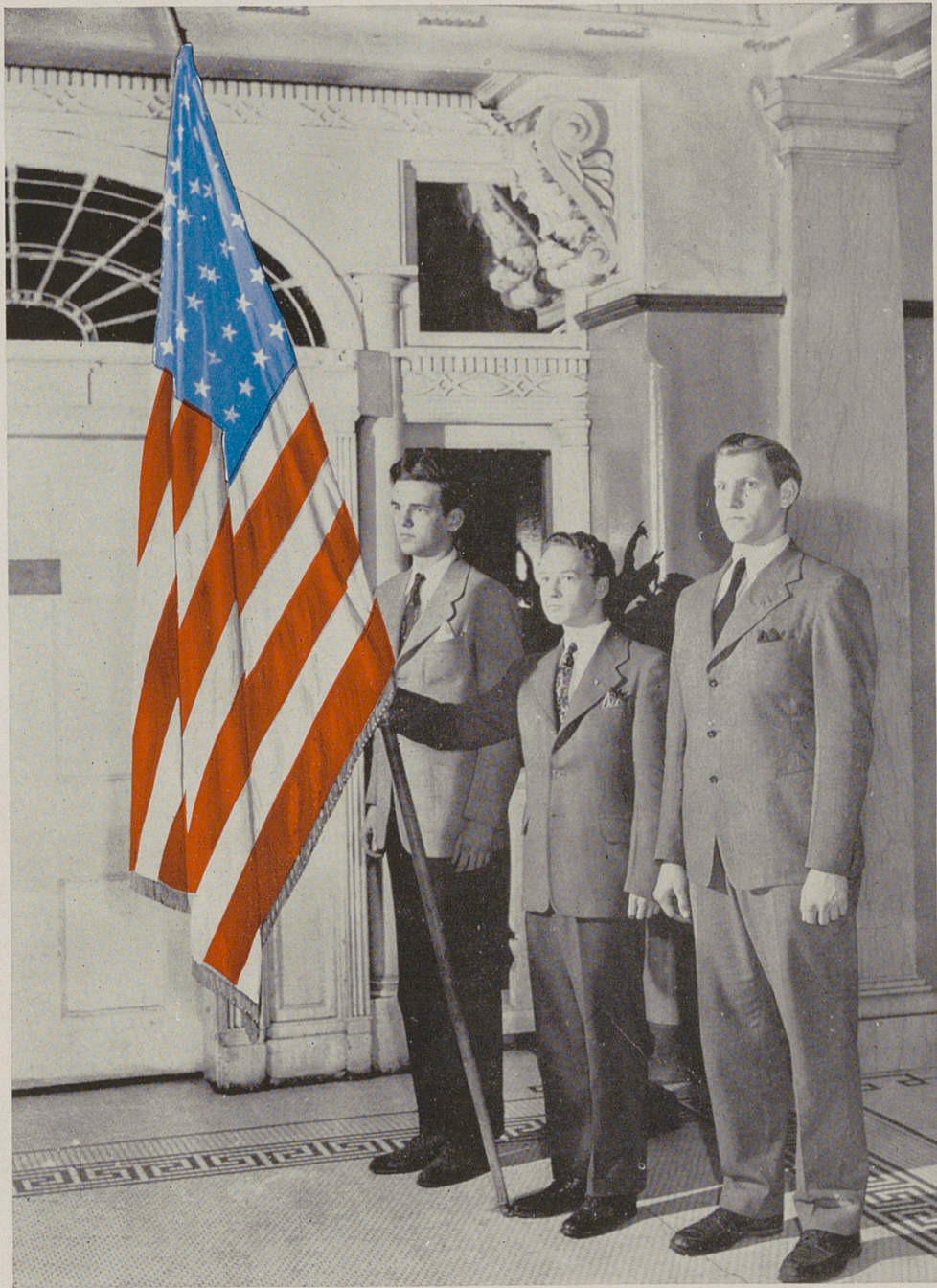
For fourteen years this building stood—a monument to education. Then, in 1855, a new building south and west of the old school was begun. This new school was the first to be built under the auspices of the Union Board of High Schools. The new Woodward was as beautiful and artistic in design as the old had been plain. The old building was ordered demolished when the new was completed and was torn down during the Christmas holidays of 1855. The new building had four entrances, spacious halls, and eight rooms. The north and south halls on the second floor were used as a library and laboratory respectively. On the third floor was the Assembly Hall. Some time later a three-story, one-room deep addition was built on the south, making fifteen rooms in addition to the halls. About 1890, a gymnasium in the form of a separate building was added.

For more than fifty years this beautiful building of 1855 continued its service and usefulness. Then came another Woodward—the Woodward we know and love. It was the building of 1910, much greater than any other. The cornerstone was laid in November, 1908, and President-elect William Howard Taft, '74, was the principal speaker on that memorable occasion. On the twenty-fourth of October, 1910, this building was solemnly dedicated to its sacred mission. Exercises were held and an "All Woodward" program was written and presented by graduates and students. For thirty-five years this building has stood, a new Woodward in form, but still the Old Woodward in tradition.

The only physical change of recent years has been the removal of Woodward's beautiful iron fence. During the early years of the present war, when the need for iron was very great, Woodward donated its fence to the war effort. This was done willingly but sorrowfully—a necessary sacrifice.

We, the graduating class of nineteen hundred and forty-five, know and love the Woodward of today. We have been the recipients of all she had to offer. We are grateful that it has been our good fortune to secure a part of our education in a school so steeped in sacred tradition. May we ever be worthy of our beloved alma mater.

What is that which the breeze, o'er the towering steep,

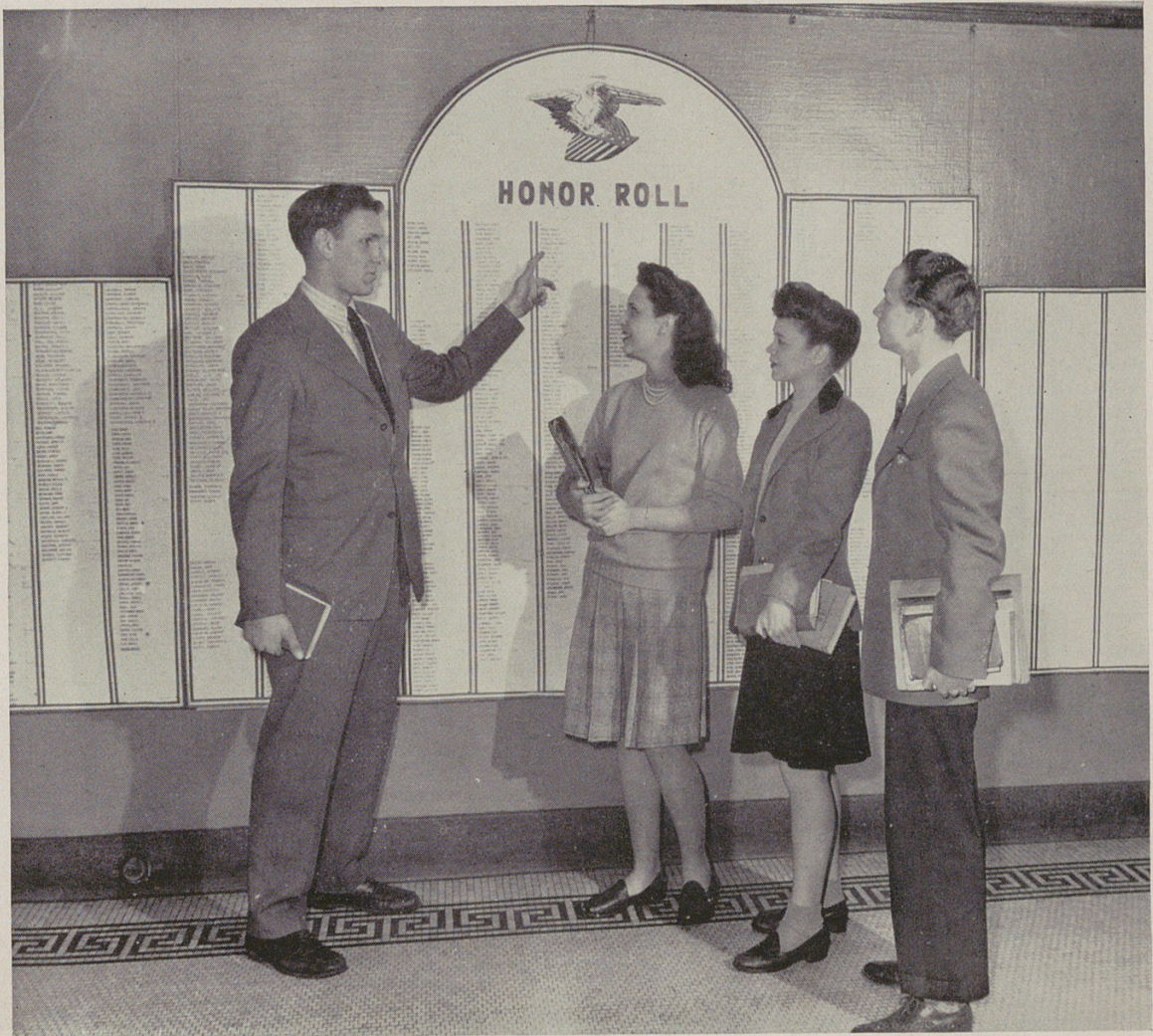
As it fitfully blows, now conceals, now discloses?

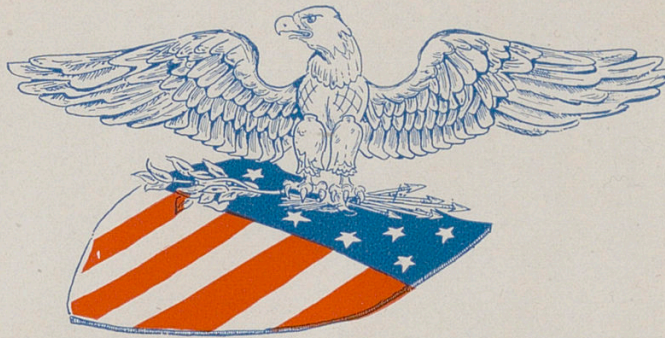


# *Dedication*

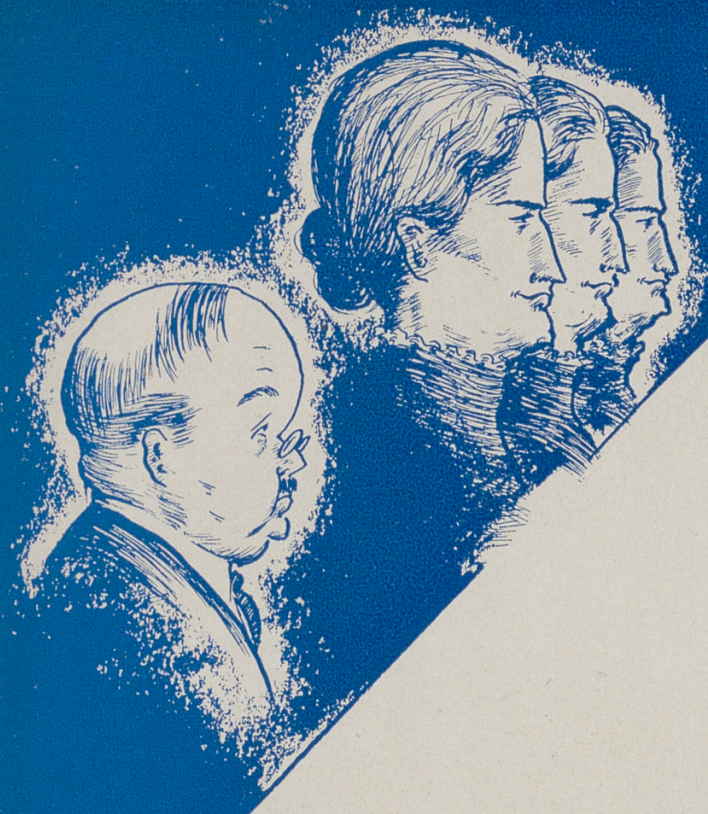

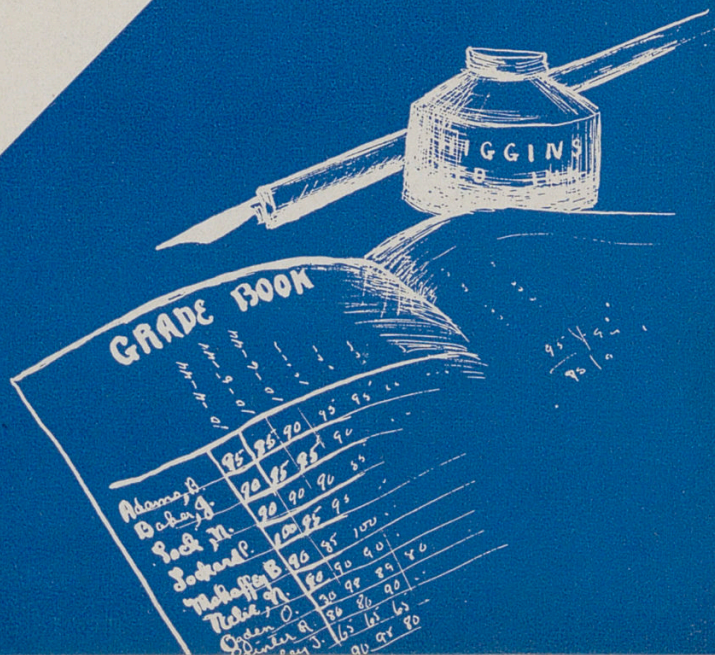








# Journal

## Baseball - STATE CHAMPS

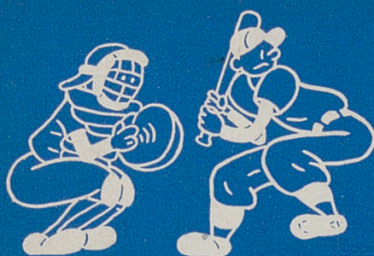

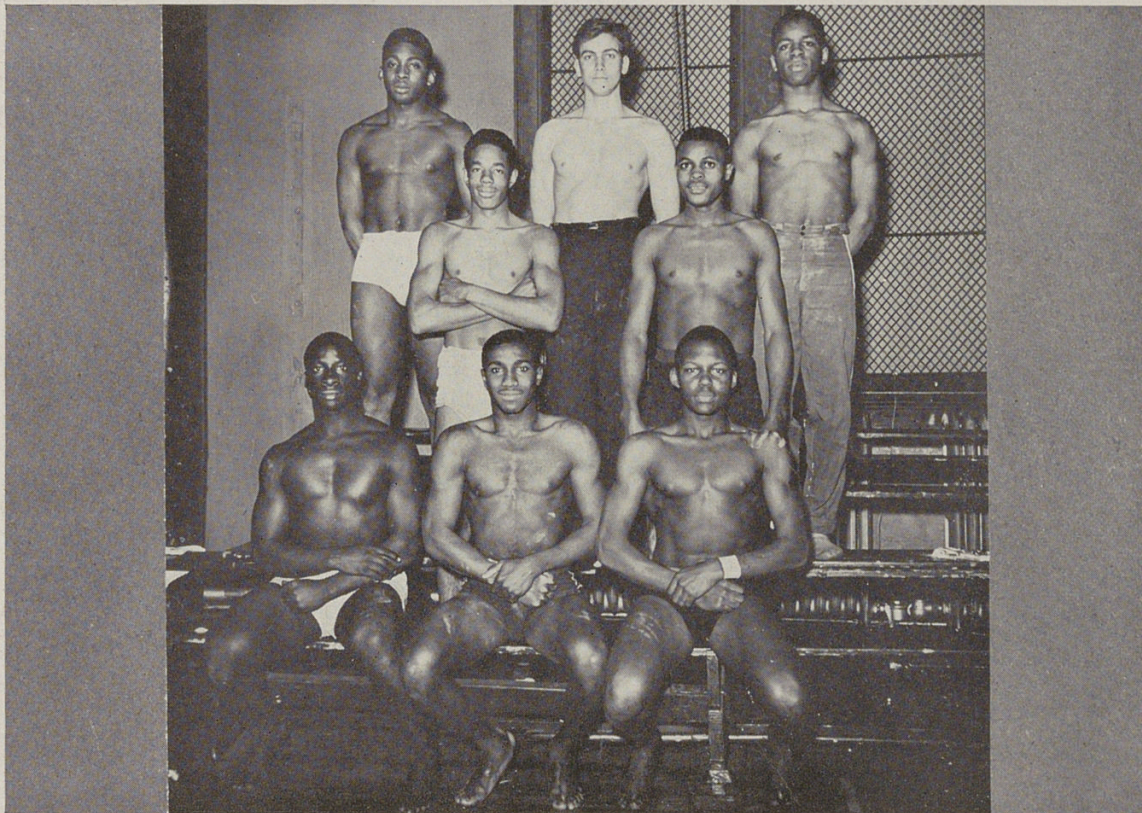

## Gym Team

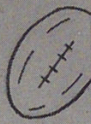
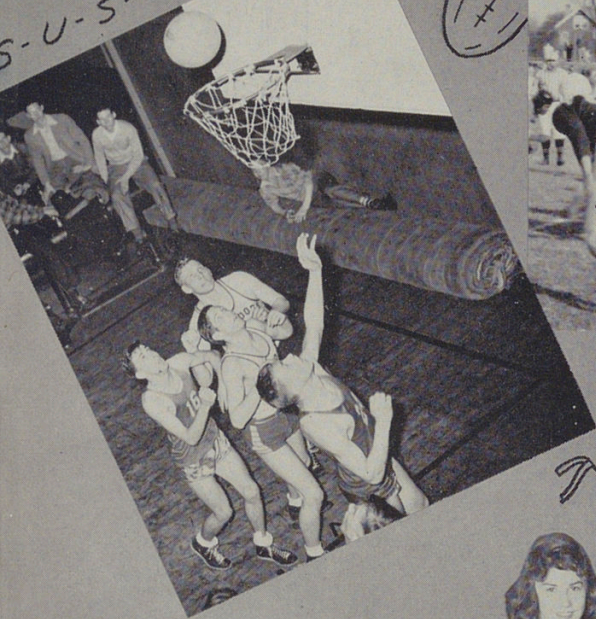

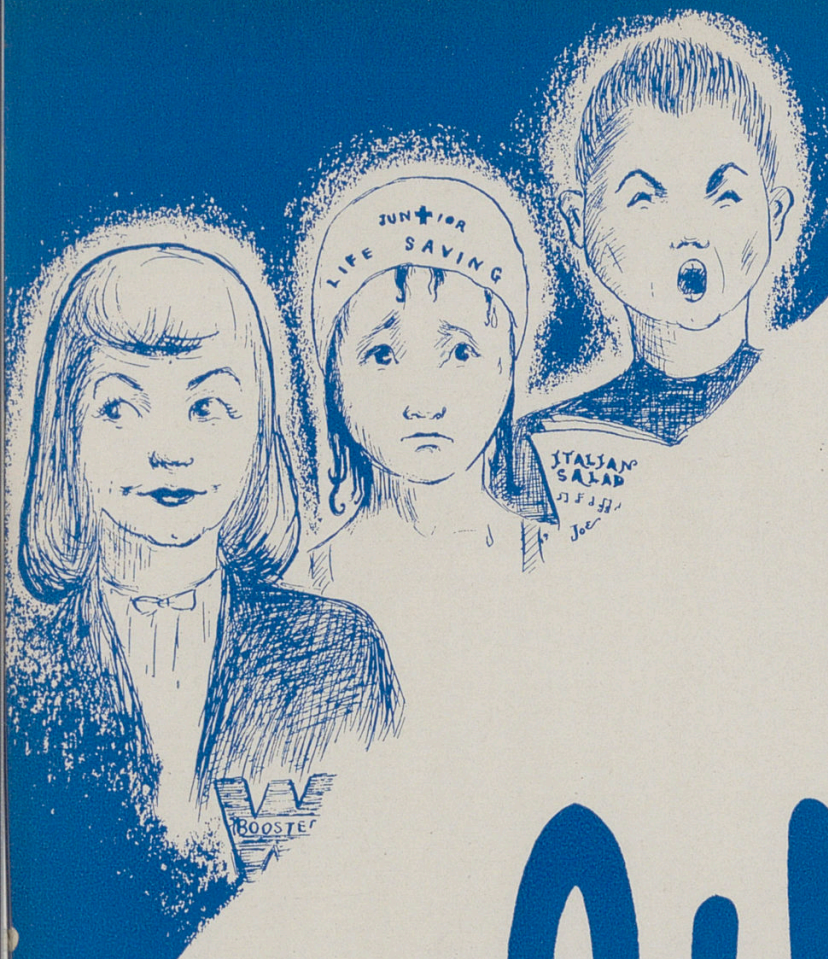

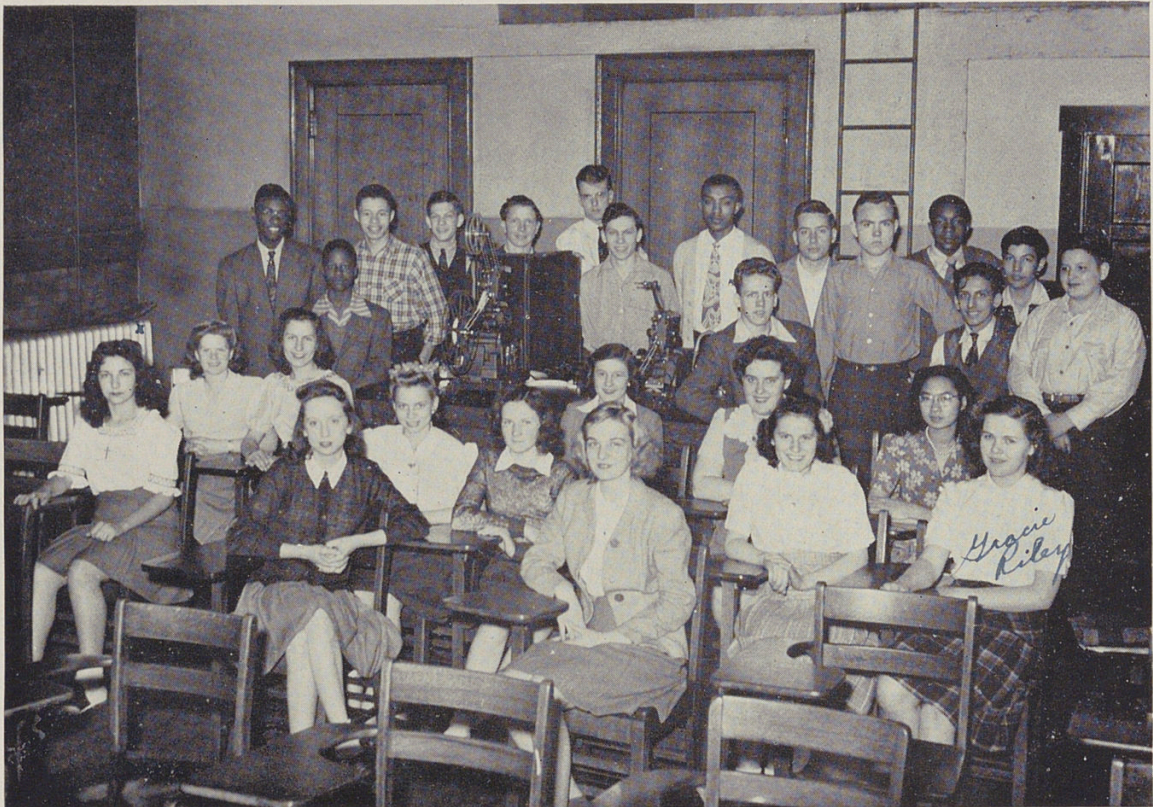

## Wartime Council

The Victory Corps was organized in Woodward High School in nineteen hundred and forty-three at the request of the National Education Association in cooperation with the United States Office of Education. Its purpose was to direct the eagerness of the students to do their share in winning the war into areas of critical need where their action would be most effective. The work of the Victory Corps is considered so important that it has been given a prominent place in the school program.

The director of the Victory Corps at Woodward is Dr. Peaslee. He has appointed Miss Curry as faculty advisor to the Corps, with Miss Aikin, Miss Schwartz, Mrs. Nantz, Mrs. Helmers, and Mr. Rusher to assist her. The work of the Corps is, however, carried on by the students and directed by a council elected by the student body.

In the first years of its existence, the Victory Corps was especially interested in initiating and organizing projects that would assist in the war effort. Needed activities were suggested to homerooms and club groups. These activities were not only successfully carried out, but also stimulated the interest of individuals in continuing to work toward the end of the war. Appeals for help from community agencies engaged in wartime activities were always heeded, and the students of Woodward gave assistance wherever it was needed to the best of their ability. A wide variety of projects, some temporary, some extending over a long period of time, were undertaken in the first years of the Victory Corps. During this time, the members of the Victory Corps Council gave freely of their time to direct this work and guide the enthusiasm of the student body into channels where it would be effective.

As it does to all vital organizations, change has come to the Victory Corps. Originally, membership was limited. Today every student belongs to the organization by virtue of his enrollment at Woodward. Early efforts were expended in beginning and carrying through to a successful end a multitude of projects. Now, that the need for initial impetus and centralized direction of activity has passed, the council acts as a co-ordinating agency for all wartime activities which the different groups in the school carry on. The name of the council, itself, has undergone some change. Victory Corps Council has become Wartime Council. The future will probably see other changes.

The thinking of the students as expressed through the council has expanded since its inception. Not alone are wartime activities stressed and co-ordinated. From the work of the council, the thought has emerged that we serve our country when we preserve and strengthen, even in the midst of war, the ideals upon which our nation was founded. Much of the work of this year's council has been organizational. The first constitution of the group has been written and a permanent organization has been established. The council of 1944-45 has looked toward the peace to come and has laid a firm foundation upon which the future may build.

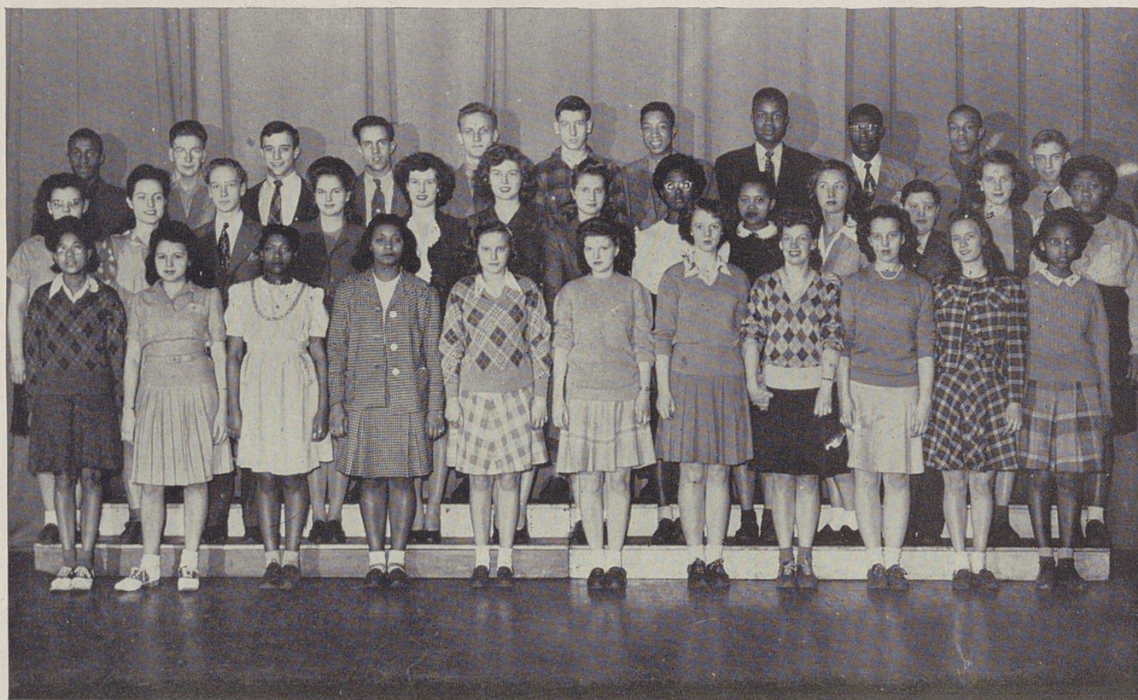

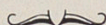

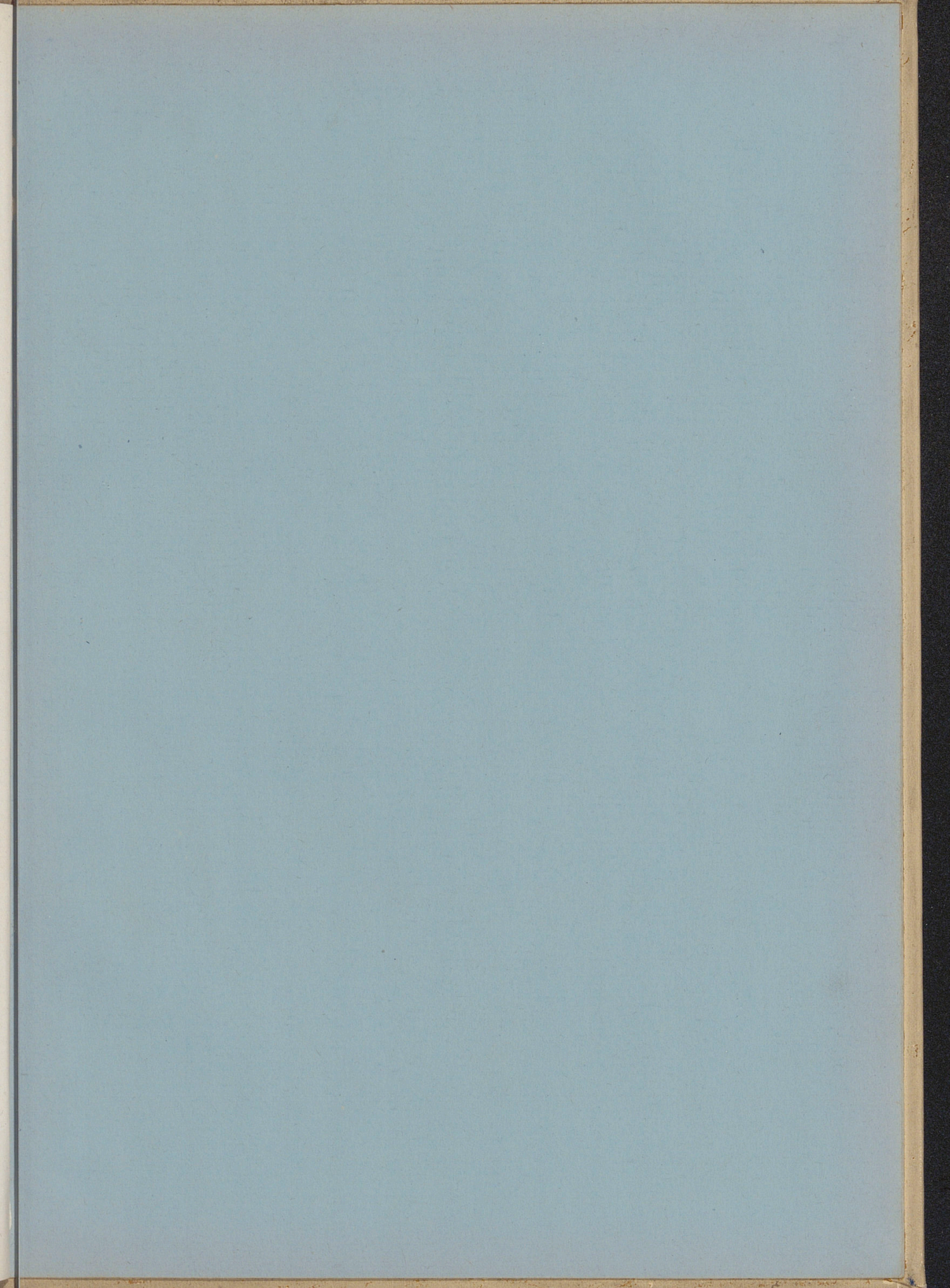
