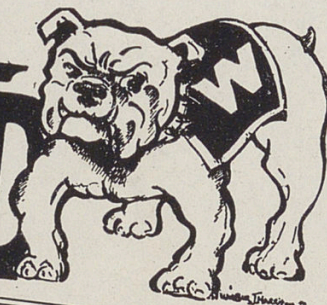

Jack Becomes a Jolly Tar For A Day

Jack Rothwell represented Woodward on Tuesday, November 19, at the Navy's Science Exhibition in Cleveland. Rothwell was chosen to attend the exhibition along with nineteen other boys from Hamilton County and Northern Kentucky high schools. The trip was sponsored by the Naval Research Department, with the co-operation of the Cincinnati Post.

While making the trip, the boys were under naval authority. The trip was made in a navy bomber and the boys stayed at the Navy barracks when not inspecting the exhibitions.

The boys were privileged closely to inspect the National Aircraft Shows. They further inspected the laboratories and facilities of the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics. Until the present time many of these weapons and scientific achievements were military secrets.

Rothwell was appointed a Navy Science Cruiser before leaving for Cleveland. He received orders to submit a brief report to the Office of Naval Research upon completion of the inspections. He was to give his impressions and views on the part that Science plays in national defense and the importance of acquiring a good sound education based on science.

After a twelve-day leave, Dave will return to the Great Lakes Naval Training Center and hopes soon to go on a cruise—to really get his sea legs; but he may be sent to a training school in one of the various centers in the United States. He is already climbing in rank—from Apprentice Seaman to Seaman 2/C.
