This girls powder puff game may have gotten out of control, but it was the intensity that counted. Girls football is now forever changed for the years to come, they will have to bring the heat.

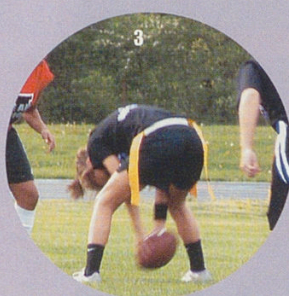
