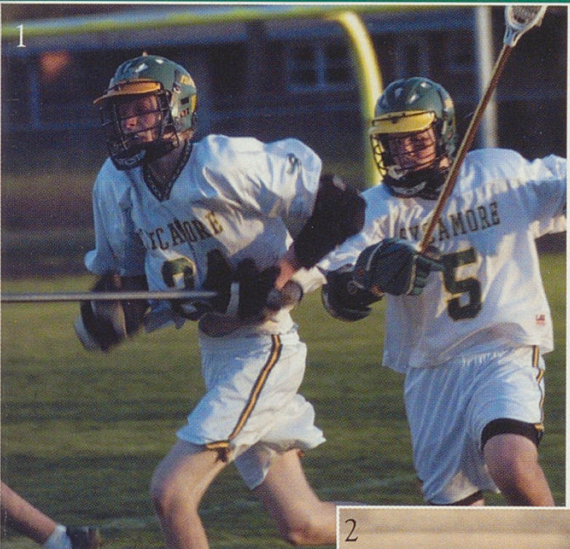
"I've never played with a team that had such hard working players and dedicated coaches," John Frank, 10.
