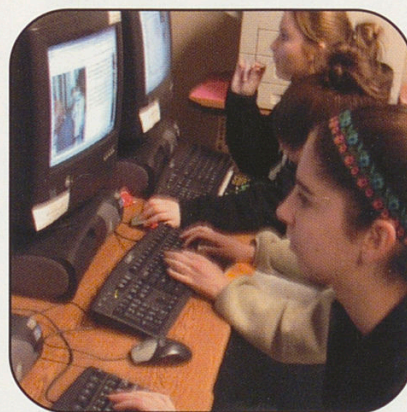


PRESERVING MEMORIES

Although it may seem easy to put together words and pictures creating a yearbook was a lot harder than many of the students expected upon signing up for the rigorous course.

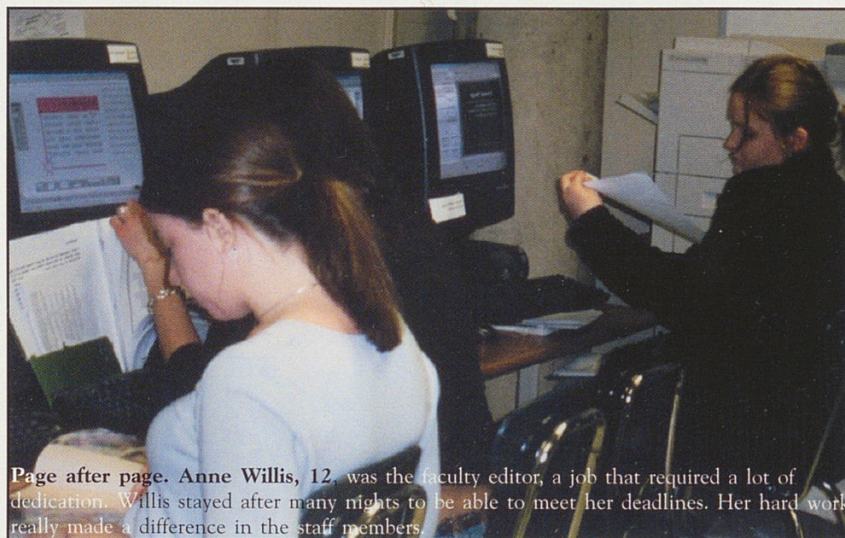

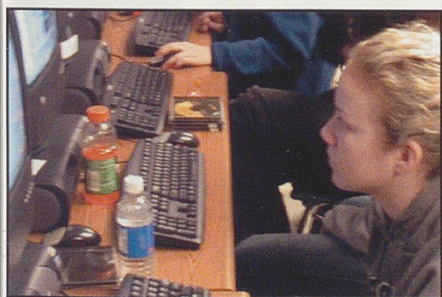

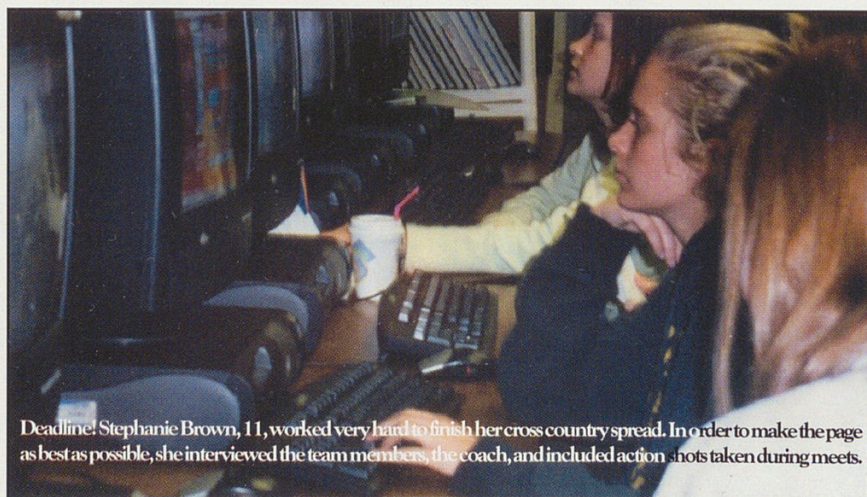
