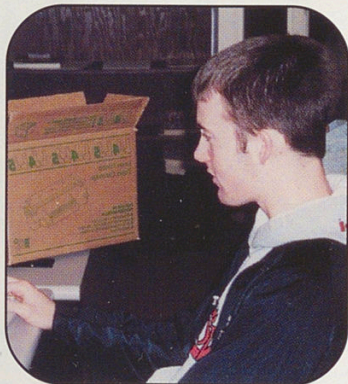

"Best class in school... good teacher, good students, good fun,"

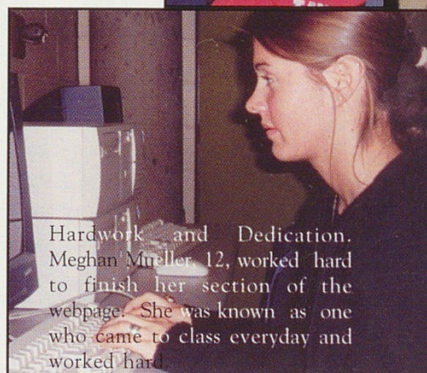

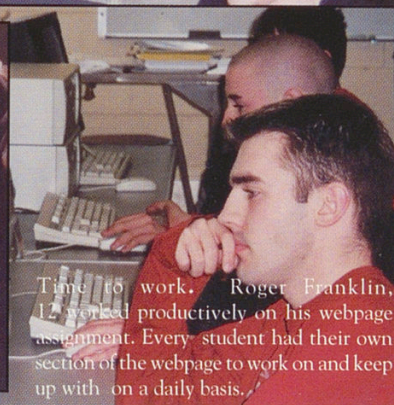
"Mr. Mel Hoffert let us work on anything that interested us," said Roger Franklin, 12.

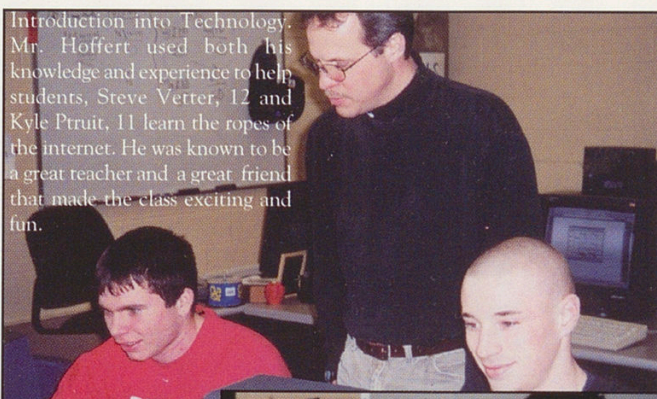
"We should get paid for what we do, its hard work and takes a certain
