Cross Country—1928

CINCINNATI, with a well balanced team, made its best record in cross country in the last ten years. Only one dual meet, that with Denison, which was run at Granville under adverse weather conditions, was lost, and the Bearcats were nosed out by Ohio Wesleyan for the Buckeye title and forced to content themselves with second place.

The first meet with Ohio Wesleyan resulted in a close victory. The consistency of the Bearcat harriers was just enough to gain a three point margin, 26-29.

Ohio University next came and bit the dust before the Bearcats. So decisive was the margin of victory, 18-40, that Cincinnati came within three points of a perfect score.

Next on the schedule was Miami, who has consistently trounced Cincinnati and again possessed another exceptionally good team. The meet was a thriller from start to finish and a great cheer went up from the crowd as the fifth Cincinnati man flashed across the line to gain a 27-28 victory over the Big Red.

The following week saw the fall of the hitherto undefeated Varsity team at Granville. The Bearcats were unaccustomed to the Denison track and suffered their only defeat in a dual meet all season, 25-30.

In the Buckeye meet at Delaware, Cincy's harriers finished second to Ohio Wesleyan. This meet concluded a very successful season.

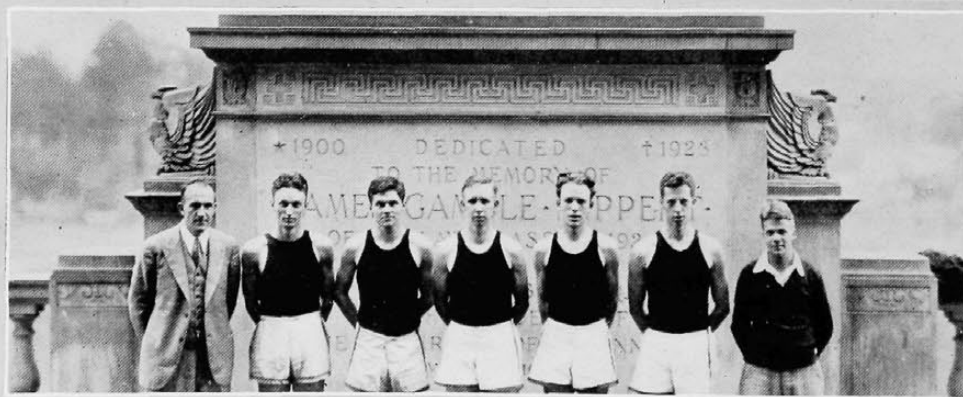
