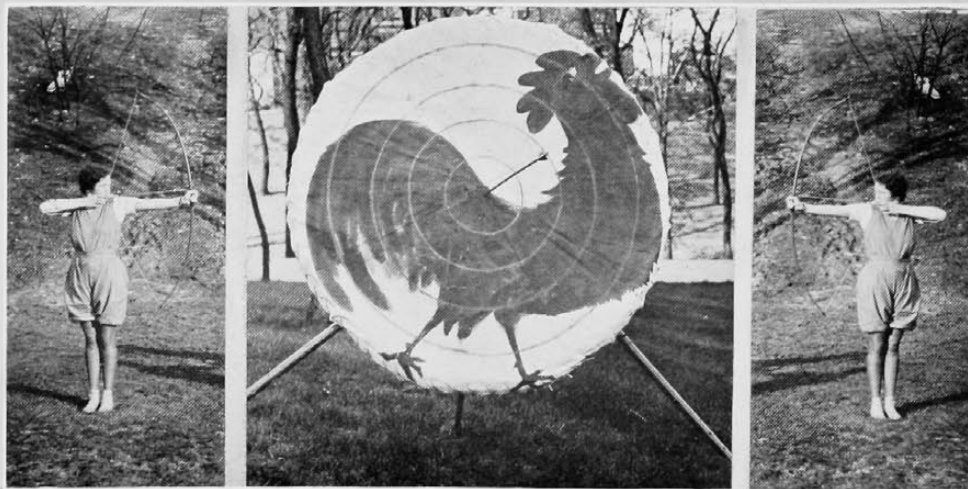


Archery

EVERY afternoon of the clear spring and fall days is devoted to practicing archery, a sport obviously appealing because of the training it gives in accuracy in vision. A certain number of practices is requisite before participation in the archery tournaments, one being held in the fall, and the other in the springtime. The League teams contest in these shooting events, and in order that a member may obtain points under the W. A. A. ruling, she must take part in both of the tournaments.

As to the tournament, six girls, one from each League, shoot at once. After the four rounds, the separate scores of the individual members of the Leagues are added together. There five scores on the target, one, three, five, seven, and nine, respectively, the last figure standing for the bull's eye score. Last fall the Vikings won the tournament, the Tartars capturing second place.
