Sanning and Barrows, who was our most consistent scorer, both ran the half-mile in fast time, and Barrows was especially reliable in the quarter-mile. "Bus" Bursiek, judging from his continued improvement, should prove a dangerous opponent to any high hurdler in the Buckeye Conference in the season of 1930. Popp looked very nice in the 220-yard low hurdles, and Grant and Marshall were as good as any Buckeye pole-vaulters with whom they competed. Pownall, who stands only 5 feet 7 inches in height, was surprising in that he cleared 5 feet 11 inches in the high jump. The loss of Captain Harry Anderson, who has finished his three years of Buckeye competition, is keenly felt, for he was our mainstay in the distance events.

However, since all the lettermen except Captain Harry Anderson, Barrows and Fisher will still be eligible for competition next year, the prospects for an even more successful track team in 1930 are exceedingly bright. Although Varsity was a little weak in the weight events, the track fans can look to many men, especially Lakamp, Harrison and Ballman, for strengthening these field events. Their performances in their freshman year lead us to believe that the success of the track team, with the field events strengthened, will be even greater in 1930 than it was in 1929.
