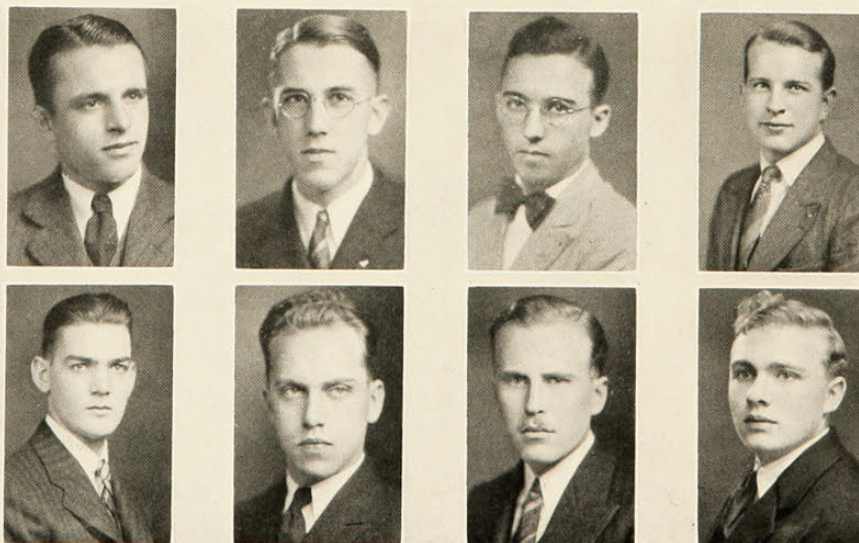
The Dormitory Key

Bursiek played great defensive ball all year, and the latter part of the season flashed some bang-up offensive ball-toting that bodes no good for the opposition next year.

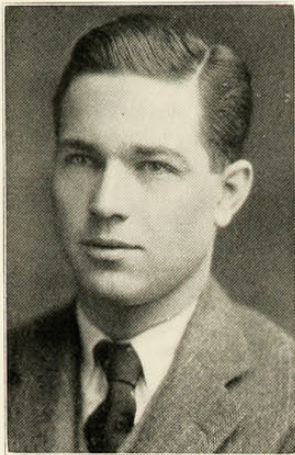

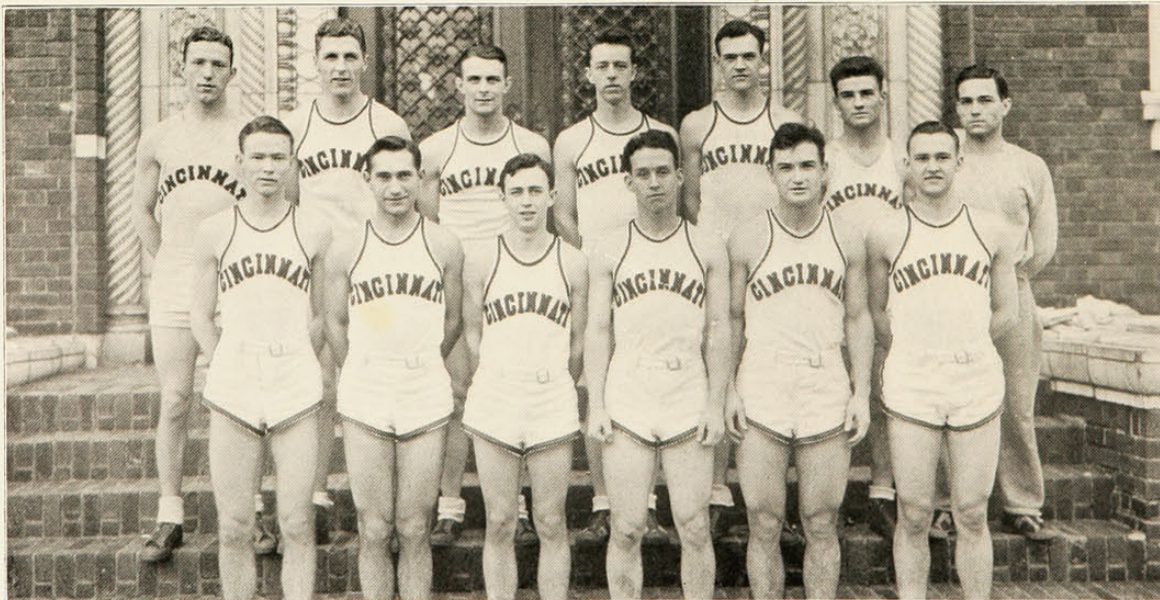

WHEN THE SMOKE AND DUST of the Buckeye Conference basketball race had cleared away, Cincinnati's Bearcats were to be seen sitting atop a heap of vanquished foes. This was a familiar picture, for in the five years since the inception of the Buckeye Intercollegiate Conference, the Red and Black team has finished in first position exactly four times. But, atop that same heap, the Battling Bishops of Ohio Wesleyan could also be discerned. Cincinnati and Ohio Wesleyan, for the second consecutive year, were joint title-holders.

The season of 1930, from all angles, was a distinctly successful one. The Bearcats started off in a blaze of glory. They won game after game, until twelve out of thirteen contests were chalked up on the right side of the ledger. But, after Gervers was declared ineligible, and after Flax and Berwanger were injured, the Bearcats faltered in their stride and dropped two successive games. Recovering themselves in short fashion, the 'Cats won two of the remaining three games to come swaggering into their lair bearing the laurel wreath of Championship.

The highlights of the season were perhaps the first game with Ohio Wesleyan, the second game with Dayton, and the second game with Miami.

Just after Varsity had downed Denison 33-27, in the opening Buckeye game, the powerful Ohio Wesleyan five came to town. The Bishops, who had beaten us twice last year, were determined to annex another victory for the Delaware fans to gloat over. And, when the two aggregations met that evening in the Burnet Woods gym, it looked like curtains for old U. C. Wesleyan was leading 28-22, and the game was fast drawing to a close, when three field goals and one foul swished through the iron hoop in quick succession, and the Bearcats were ahead 29-28. The Delaware team immediately scored one point on a foul throw, thus tying the count at 29-28. With only two minutes to play, the Ricemen rallied once again and scored another field goal and a foul, to win 32-29, while the Bearcat fans filled the gym with their shrieks of joy.

THE SECOND ENCOUNTER with the Dayton Flyers, although not a Buckeye Conference game, proved to be one of the most thrilling seen on the Cincinnati court this season. The first half of the contest was rather slow, but in the second period both teams came to life and played some remarkable basketball. The Flyers were enjoying a 31-29 lead as Willie Popp tossed in the goal which tied the score just as the final gun sounded. In the overtime period to decide the tie, Popp again proved his worth, for he sank the basket which put Varsity on the long end of a 36-35 count. White, just to cinch the game, then tossed in a foul shot to make the grand total 37-35 in the Bearcats' favor.

The final game of the season was played with Miami, our traditional rivals. With the Burnet Woods gym filled to capacity, the Bearcats and the Big Reds played to an audience which had come to see the Bearcats emerge victorious, for to win this game meant first position in the Buckeye race. The entire contest was featured by the fine team-work of both aggregations, and at no time was the result at all certain, because the score was tied no less than five times at various stages of the game. The Bearcats, although leading 5-1, soon became the victims of an 11-9 score, and were trailing 15-17 at the end of the half. The last few moments saw the Cincinnati fans in a frenzy as Miami led 33-31. However, the Bearcats managed to tie the score at 33 all, and then both teams tried frantically to work the ball into scoring position. During the final seconds of play, White broke through the Big Reds' defense and tossed the leather sphere through the hoop to win the game 35-33, thus bringing a most successful season to a fitting close.

The lion's share of praise goes to Popp, whose fine work helped the Bearcats make their remarkable record. Incidentally, Popp's total of 97 points scored during the season, placed him second in the high-scoring marathon of the Buckeye Conference. Flax, Berwanger, and Kunz also deserve an abundance of credit for their efforts during the season. The misfortune of Gervers' ineligibility removed a valuable man from the Cincinnati quintet. Of the reserves, Kiesling, Nelson, Rogoff, White, and Wright looked best.

Next year, although graduation and the three year rule of competition will exact a mighty toll, Varsity stands an excellent chance of again garnering high honors. The experienced reserves and the numerous promising Freshmen foretell a basketball machine which will be hard to beat.



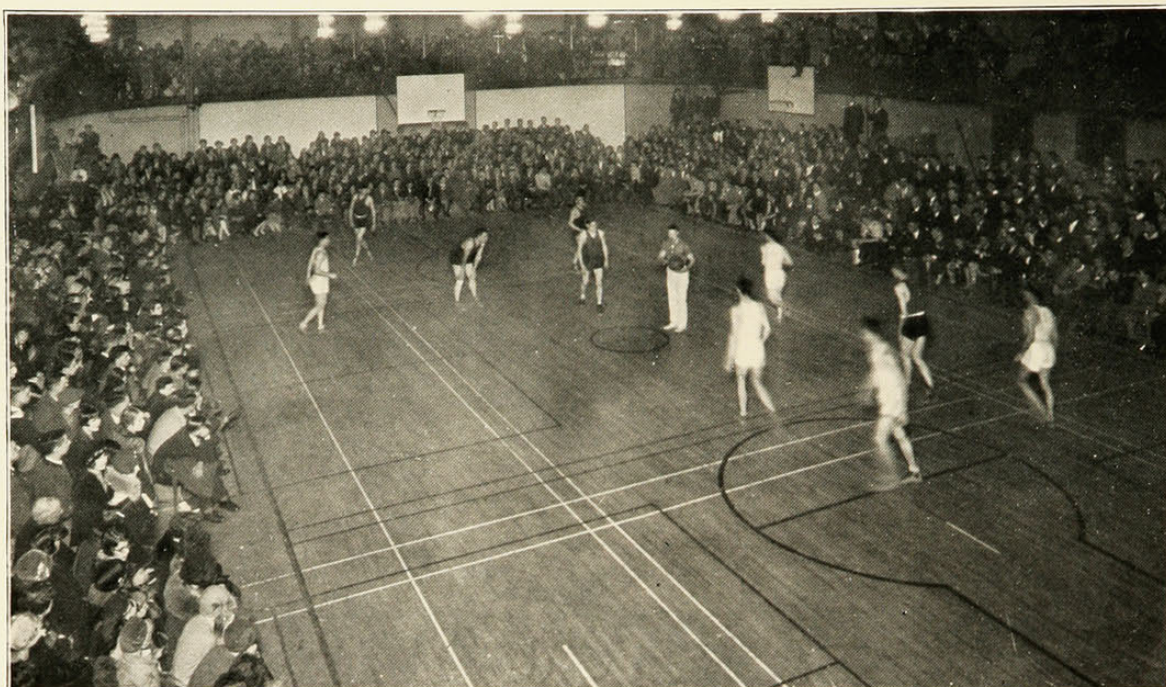

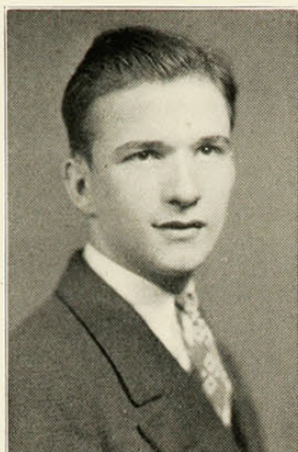

IN THE WINDY MONTH of March, Coach "Doc" Rice sent out a call for prospective baseball players and soon a goodly number of men turned out for practice. Among this number were nine lettermen and a dozen or so promising novices. The appearance of these men was the first indication of the highly successful season which was to follow.

The Bearcats broke even on the first two contests, winning one from the University of Michigan, and losing the other to Michigan State College. Ohio Wesleyan contributed Cincinnati's first Buckeye victory by dropping a game to the Bearcats 4-5. Varsity then won a twilight practice game from the Fenwick Club by a score of 9-4.

In an easy game, the Cincy ball-tossers next trounced Wittenberg 5-0, but in a practice game a few days later, the French-Bauer Dairy team licked our boys 8-5. Denison proved to be the next Buckeye Conference victim by losing to the Red and Black team 5-6. The next day Ohio University took the Bearcats to the cleaners by beating them 3-0. The Bobcat pitcher, Trace, allowed but four scattered hits during the course of the game.

Varsity's victory over Townsend-West Dairy put the 'Cats in a winning humor, and they soon journeyed to Springfield where they downed Wittenberg for the second time of the season.

In a game lost to Dayton University, Steve McNutt, Bearcat first string catcher, unfortunately broke his leg and was forced to remain out of uniform all the rest of the season. Altemeier replaced McNutt behind the bat, and held down that post quite capably. Gervers' homer in the sixth inning of the next contest gave the Bearcats a lead which Ohio University could not cut down and enabled Varsity to win 4-1.

Cincy then overwhelmed Denison 17-3, and Ohio Wesleyan 12-3 in two contests featured by the hitting of the Red and Black team. In the next contest, a pitching duel between Bass of Miami and Franz of Cin-





cinnati, finally resulted in a 2-1 victory for the Big Red team. Miami's win placed her in first position in the Buckeye Conference race, with the Bearcats holding down second honors.

In her second encounter with Dayton, Varsity revenged herself to the tune of 9-6. Kentucky State College then handed the 'Cats two defeats on two successive days, one game being played here, and the other one taking place in the Blue Grass State.

The Bearcats closed their Buckeye season by defeating Miami in the annual Decoration Day struggle at Oxford, Ohio. This victory put Cincy in a tie with Miami for the title-honors of the Buckeye Conference. Varsity was well on her way to winning the contest, but the Big Reds staged a magnificent rally in the ninth inning and knotted the count 2 all. In the tenth inning neither team could score, but in the eleventh stanza Si Kunz's single enabled Gervers to cross the plate with the winning tally.

Iowa University was the second Big Ten team to go down before the Bearcats this season. The final score was 6-7 with the Bearcats holding the slight margin.

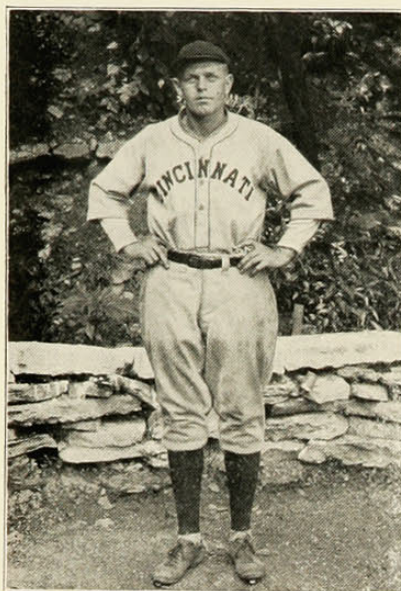
In a post-season exhibition game at Oxford, Ohio, the Bearcats became the victims of Miami by losing 9-5 in a loosely played game. In the final game of the year Cincy downed Wooster College (undefeated Ohio Conference champions) by a score of 2-1.

With the Wooster game the Bearcats completed a very auspicious season, winning fourteen of twenty-two games. Of the ten Buckeye Conference games Varsity was victorious in eight. Injuries to six of the regulars handicapped the Bearcats to no small degree, and it was indeed fortunate that despite these injuries, these men were able to lend their aid in the Buckeye Conference contests.

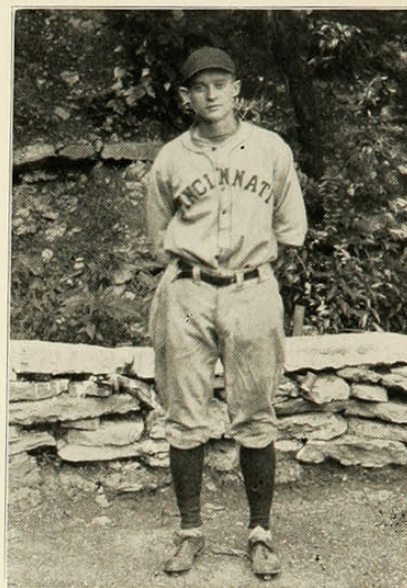

Track

CINCINNATI GOT OFF to a fine start in its track season of 1929 by defeating Georgetown College 92-39. The meet was held at Nippert Stadium, April 20, 1929, and was an easy victory for the Varsity tracksters. Cincy copped 11 first places, 8 seconds, and 7 thirds. Popp was the individual high scorer of the meet with 18 points. Exceptionally good work was also done by Marshall, Grant, Pownall, Goldmeyer, Miller, Barsdale, Knisely, Maas, Sanning, Vreeland, Barrows and Auburn, every one of them placing at least once in some event.

On April 27, 1929, at Nippert Stadium, the Varsity track team won its second victory of the season, defeating Denison University 78-53. This time the Bearcats acquired 9 first places, 7 seconds, and 6 thirds, to make their grand total of 78 points. Popp set a new Varsity record for the 220-yard low hurdles, running this race in 26 seconds flat. Barrows, Sanning, Vreeland, Case, Anderson and Knisely were outstanding in the running events, while Schott, Pownall, Goldmeyer, Miller and Fisher looked best in the field events.

The third meet, held May 11, 1929, at Miami Field, Oxford, Ohio, proved disastrous to the Red and Black track artists. Miami's fine track team experienced little difficulty in downing the Bearcats, handing them their first defeat of the season. The Big Reds ran rings around the boys from Cincinnati, and although the Bearcat tracksters did their best, that best was not quite good enough.

The large number of points tallied by the Miami track team was distinctly surprising, for Cincinnati had been conceded at least an even break with the Oxfordites.

Cincinnati closed a successful track season by taking fifth place in the Buckeye Meet, which was held at Edwards Field, Delaware, Ohio, May 24-25, 1929. Miami won first place, and Ohio Wesleyan was a close second, with Denison, Ohio, University, Cincinnati and Wittenberg trailing in the order named. Cincinnati really deserved fourth place in the meet, for our relay team, composed of Barrows, Vreeland, Knisely and Sanning, ran a fine race to place third. However, the officials disqualified the relay team, thus depriving Cincinnati of the points which would have cinched fourth position in the meet. Nevertheless, the Bearcat runners annexed a total of 20 5/6 points, 7 of which were accounted for by Barrows. "Bus" Bursiek, who had been steadily improving throughout the season, took third place in the high hurdles.

For the track season of 1929, Coach O. M. Nikoloff and his assistant, "Chick" Mileham, deserve a great deal of credit. Their able coaching was responsible for much of the improvement

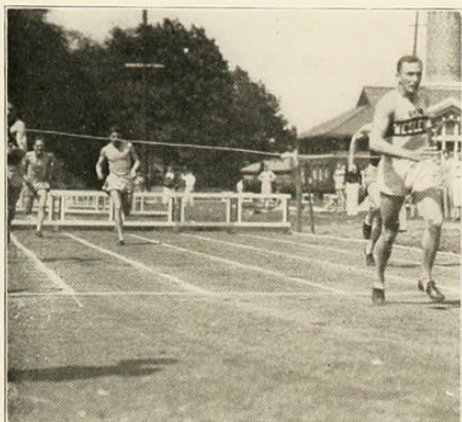

shown by the track team of 1929 over the team of 1928. Sanning and Barrows, who was our most consistent scorer, both ran the half-mile in fast time, and Barrows was especially reliable in the quarter-mile. "Bus" Bursiek, judging from his continued improvement, should prove a dangerous opponent to any high hurdler in the Buckeye Conference in the season of 1930. Popp looked very nice in the 220-yard low hurdles, and Grant and Marshall were as good as any Buckeye pole-vaulters with whom they competed. Pownall, who stands only 5 feet 7 inches in height, was surprising in that he cleared 5 feet 11 inches in the high jump. The loss of Captain Harry Anderson, who has finished his three years of Buckeye competition, is keenly felt, for he was our mainstay in the distance events.

However, since all the lettermen except Captain Harry Anderson, Barrows and Fisher will still be eligible for competition next year, the prospects for an even more successful track team in 1930 are exceedingly bright. Although Varsity was a little weak in the weight events, the track fans can look to many men, especially Lakamp, Harrison and Ballman, for strengthening these field events. Their performances in their freshman year lead us to believe that the success of the track team, with the field events strengthened, will be even greater in 1930 than it was in 1929.

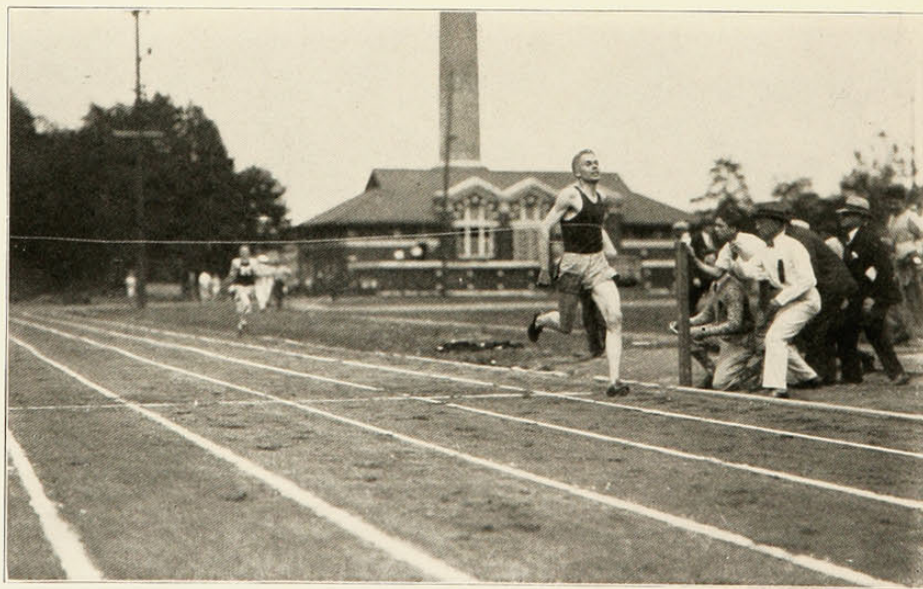

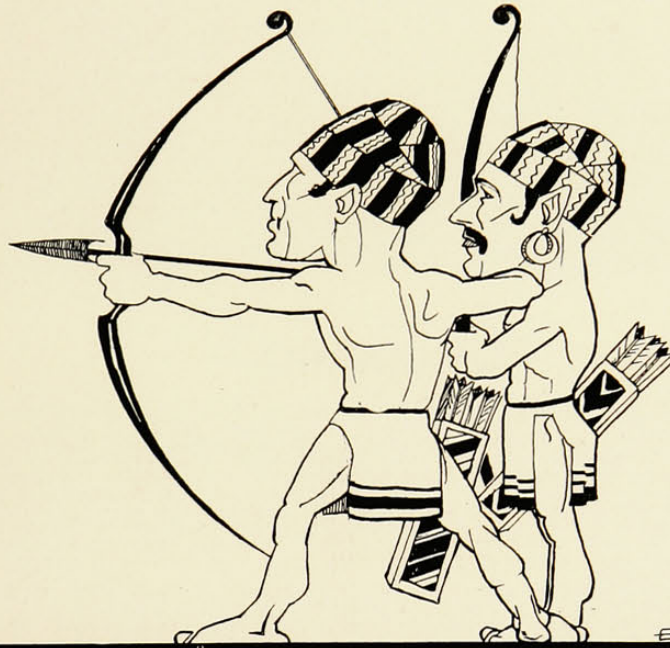

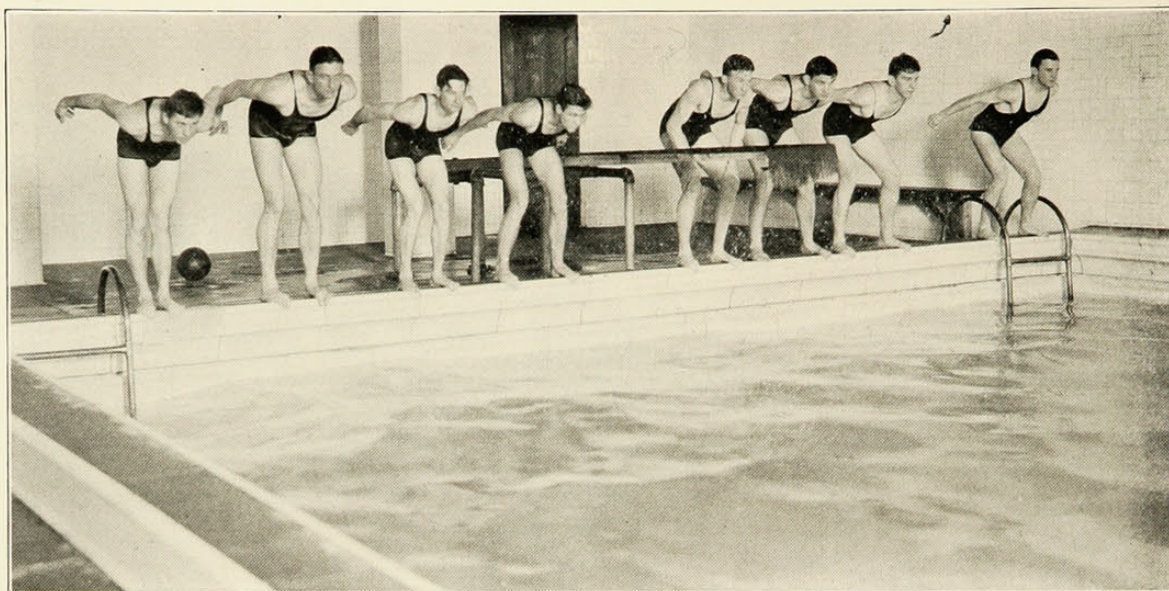
MIAMI GAME—BETWEEN HALVES

KEEPING UP THEIR FINE RECORD of previous years, the University swimming team again came through with flying colors, despite the fact that several of their men did not compete. Another thing which shows the prowess of the Cincinnati waterdogs is that the coaches have a hard time booking meets, for most of the teams in Ohio are not capable of stiff opposition. As a consequence, the team suffered one intercollegiate defeat, that by Illinois, rated as one of the best of the Big Ten teams.

The first meet of the season was a complete walkaway for the Varsity tank-men, in which they downed the Ohio Wesleyan team by the score of 54-12. Ahlburn and Ballman were the outstanding stars of the meet in which the Bearcats took every first place. Ahlburn broke the pool record for the 100-yard backstroke.

In the next contest the Cincinnati swimmers were forced to bite the dust. The Illinois men defeated the Varsity men to the tune of 51-24. The loss was not so overwhelming, considering the closeness of the events and also the national ranking of the Illinois team.

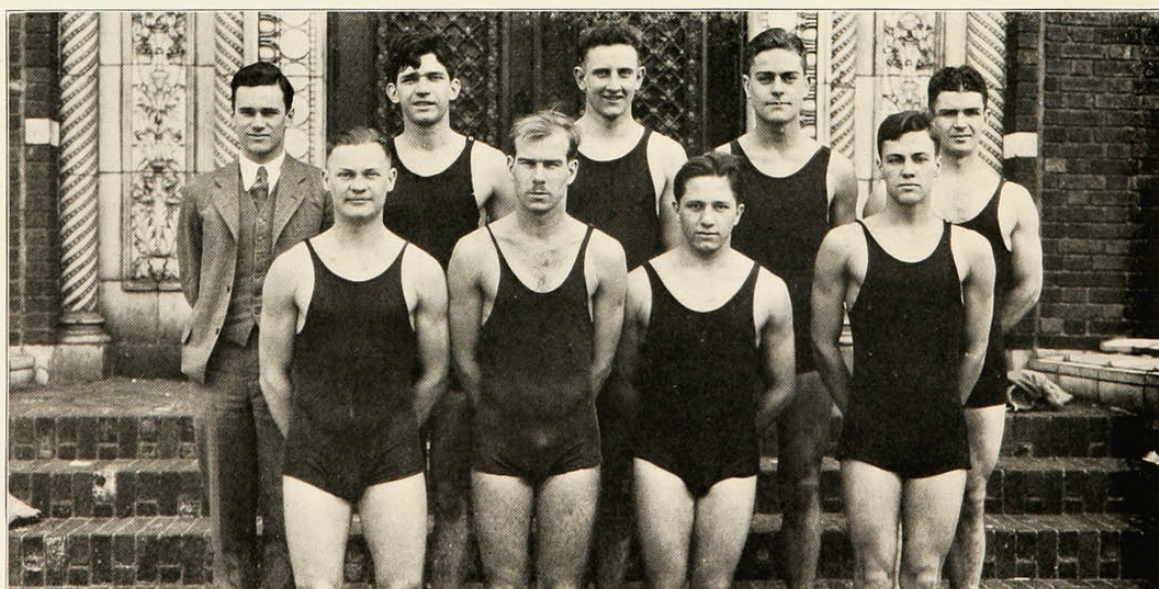
One of the hardest fought battles of the season took place at Pittsburgh between the University of Pittsburgh and the Bearcats. After a hectic struggle the two teams emerged with the count tied, 31-31.

Cincinnati next encountered the team from Carnegie Tech at Pittsburgh. Ahlburn and Ballman again stood out in the 44-22 win. Five first places to two was Cincinnati's margin over their opponents.

For the second time in the season the Varsity swimmers subdued the Bishops from Wesleyan, this time 50-16.

Cross-Country

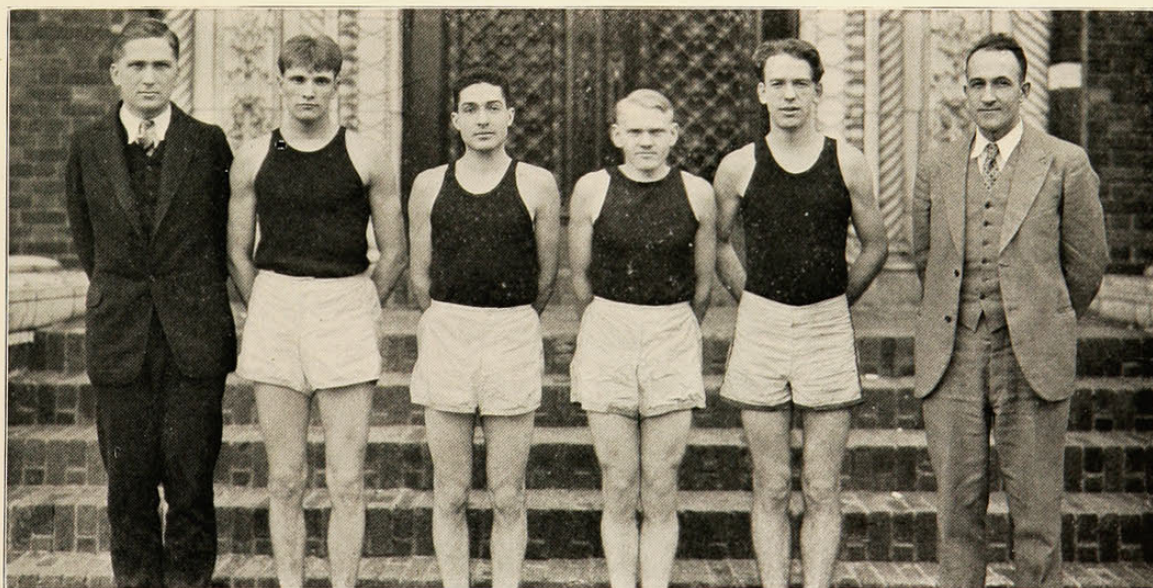
THE CROSS COUNTRY TEAM, coached by O. M. Nikoloff, opened its season on October 19, by losing a dual meet to Denison University at Cincinnati. Varsity was to reap a measure of revenge for this defeat by finishing ahead of Denison in the Buckeye Meet later in the season.

The second meet, on October 26, 1929, was also held at Cincinnati. This meet was with Ohio Wesleyan. Carney, McCuskey and Dunlap finished second, fourth, and sixth, respectively, but when the final results were tallied, Cincinnati was on the short end of a close count.

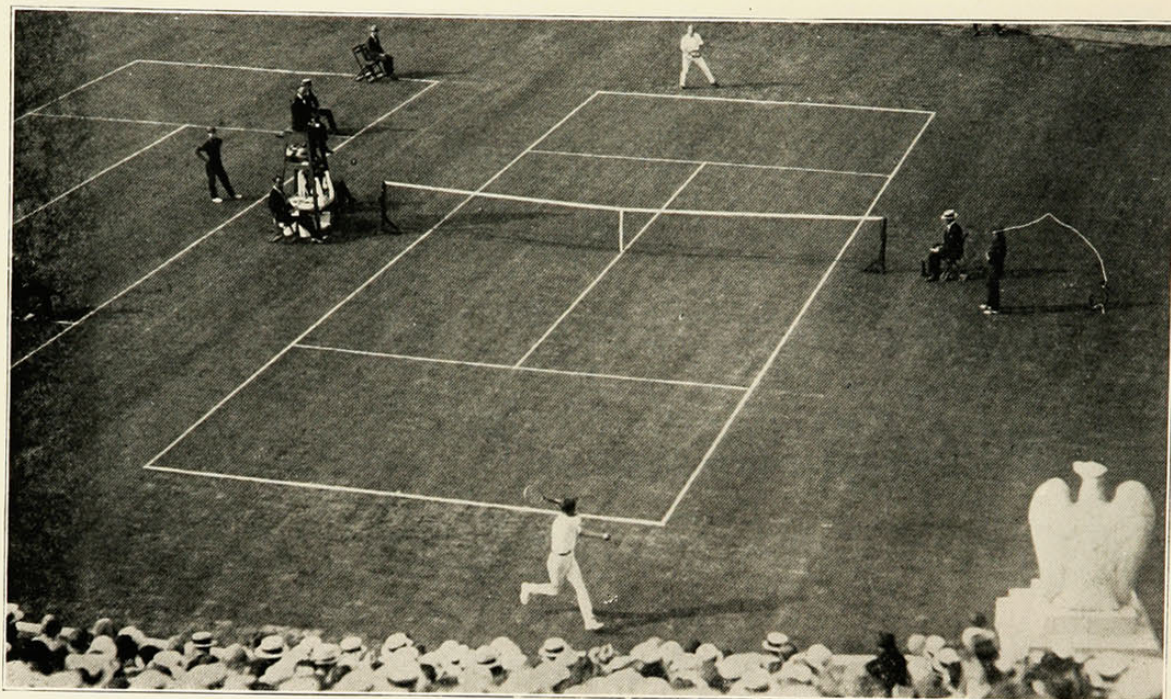
On November 9, 1929, Cincinnati journeyed to Oxford to engage in a meet with Miami University. Shugart of Miami, who later was to win the Buckeye Cross Country Meet, finished in first place. Varsity was defeated, Carney running a nice race to place third.

The Buckeye Cross Country Meet, held at Cincinnati, November 16, 1929, gave the Varsity harriers their revenge on Denison, for Varsity finished third in the meet, while Denison University, which had previously defeated Cincinnati by a large score, finished in fifth place. Miami and Ohio Wesleyan placed first and second, in the order named. Shugart of Miami finished in first place, and incidentally set a new record of 20 minutes, 57 2/5 seconds for the four-mile Burnet Woods course, breaking the record of 21 minutes, 27 1/5 seconds formerly held by Mitendorf of Cincinnati.

The cross country season was not as successful as it might have been, even though Varsity took third place in the Buckeye Cross Country Meet, and barely lost a hard battle to Ohio Wesleyan in a dual meet with that school. Although Dunlap, McCuskey, Lance, Bell and Griffith ran a fast course, Carney was the only one who consistently placed high enough in the various meets to warrant being awarded a letter.

In the first one of the year they took Ohio State into camp, 6-1. This victory avenged the defeat of the previous year suffered by our racketeers at the hands of the up-staters. Denison was then beaten badly, our netmen taking six and losing none. Vanderbilt was repulsed to the tune of 4-2.

Again the team avenged last year's defeat. This time they swamped Butler 5-1. The last dual meet of the season resulted in a 6-2 victory for Varsity over Ohio University.

Then came the Buckeye Intercollegiate Conference and with it more honors. Flax walked off with the single's championship, having to down his team-mate, Huffman, who was runner-up. Not satisfied with that, Flax and Moskowitz then proceeded to annex the double's title.

Still more laurels were to come, for Flax, in the Ohio Intercollegiate Tennis Association meet, grabbed himself another single's championship.

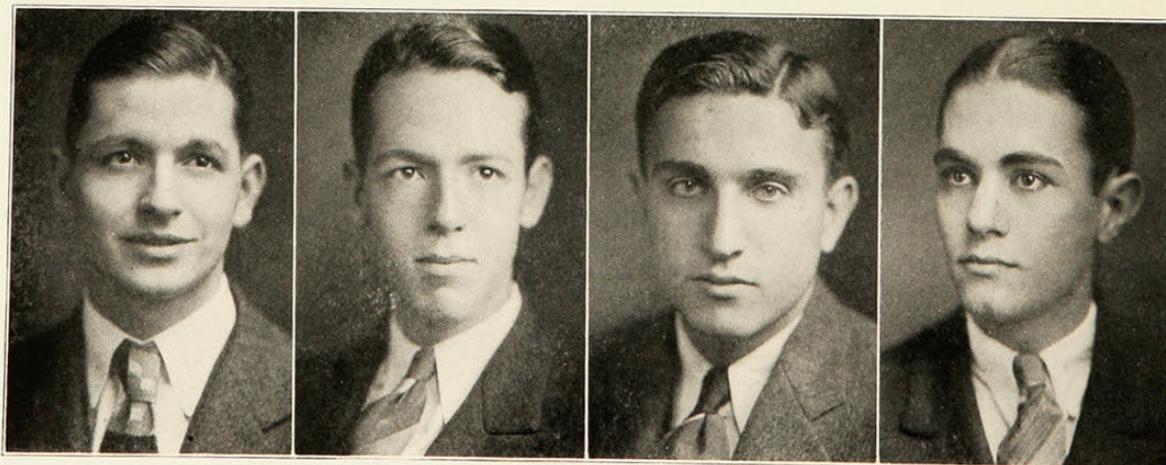

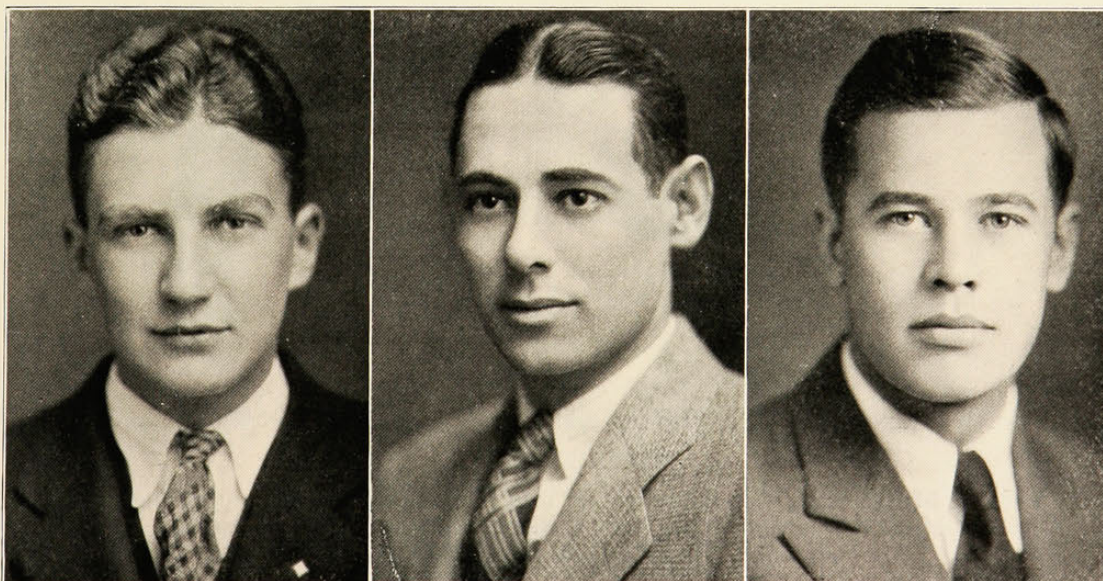

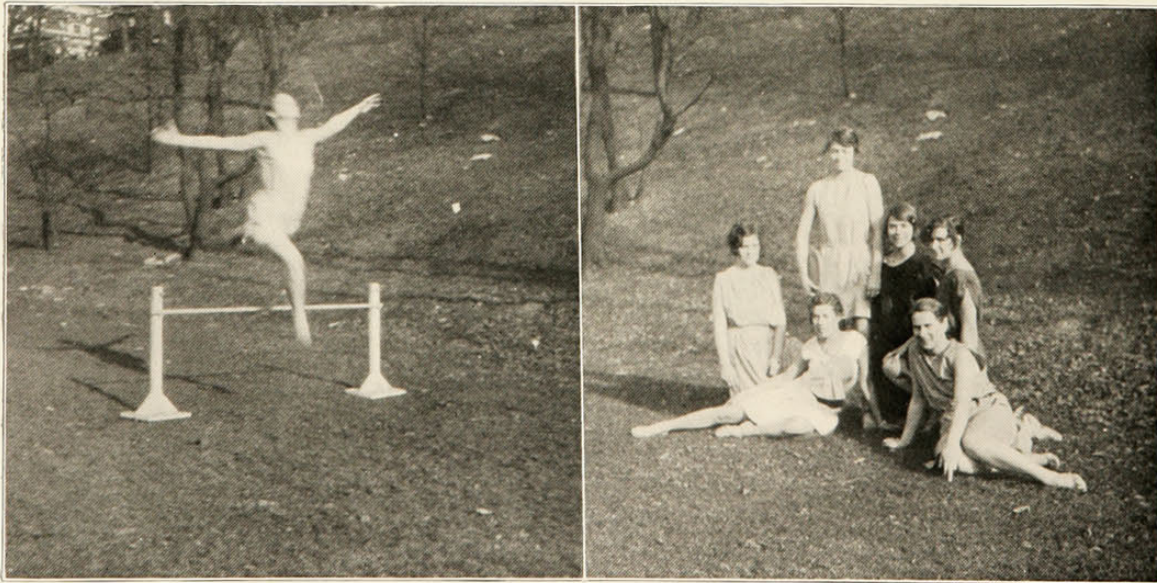
Greek Games

AS THE CLIMAX to a series of annual Freshman-Sophomore competitions a final contest in athletics, lyrics, costumes, and dance is presented in the spring of each year and is known as Greek Games. This event is dedicated to a Greek god or goddess and each of the participating classes chooses a Greek myth in which their patron figures. It is in the working out of the myth that great opportunity is afforded for original work in effective interpretation of pantomime, dance, and costume. A simple tunic arrangement of costume, which is in keeping with that of the ancient Greeks, is adopted and great effectiveness may be achieved by an artistic employment of color in the costumes.

After the presentation of the myths, the three best lyrics, chosen from a number composed by various members of the competing classes and dedicated to the patron of the day, are read, and their respective composers are awarded first, second, and third places.

The criterion used in judging the athletic competition is, as was the Greek, one of form rather than of mere speed. Consequently, anything which might tend to mar the perfect execution of an athletic performance detracts from the individual's score and, in turn, from the collective score of her class. Because of the emphasis upon form much practice on the part of those participating in the torch race, hurdles, discus throwing, and chariot display is necessary to secure perfection in form and movement.

Greek Games afford an opportunity for every eligible girl to express herself in one phase or another of art, dance, literature, and athletics. She may secure practice in, as well as recognition for, any praiseworthy talent along these lines that she might possess and at the same time aid in a possible victory for her class.

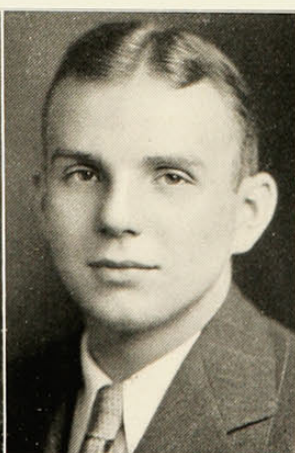
ably in tying the harum-scarum Peter to her apron strings in the course of a university cruise.

"On to the Boat Ride," is the motto of the Seniors, then caps and gowns, graduation and departure, some to return again at class reunions and some to be seen no more.

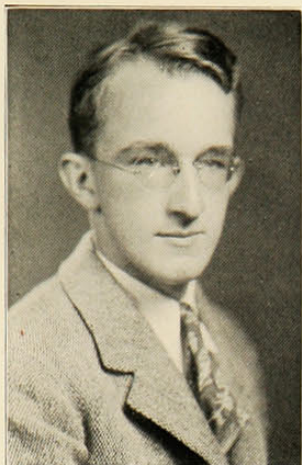

The Applied Arts Club assists the Co-op Club in the demonstration of Co-op Day, which consists of complete displays of the various departments of the college.



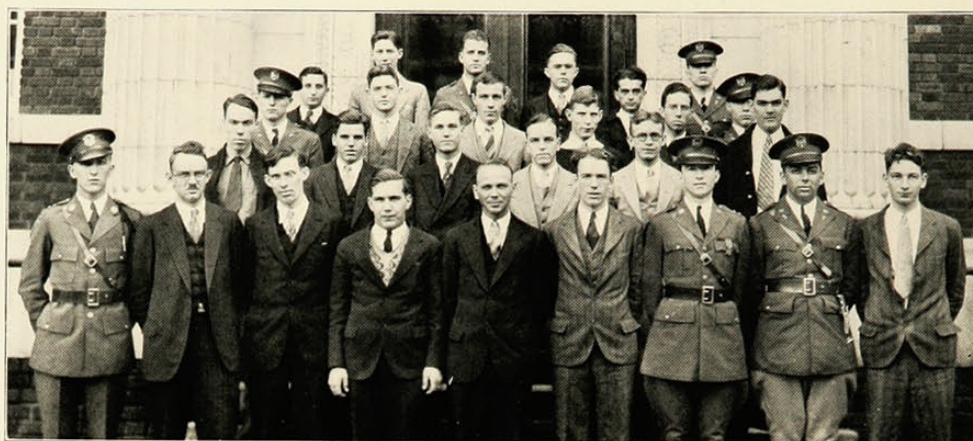

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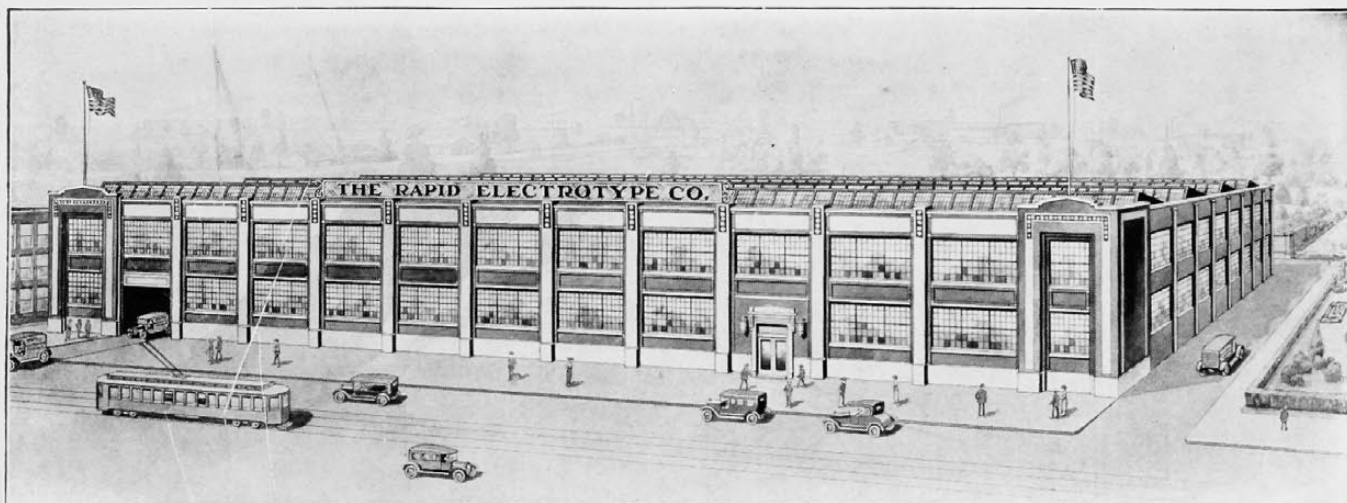
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DELTA ZETA

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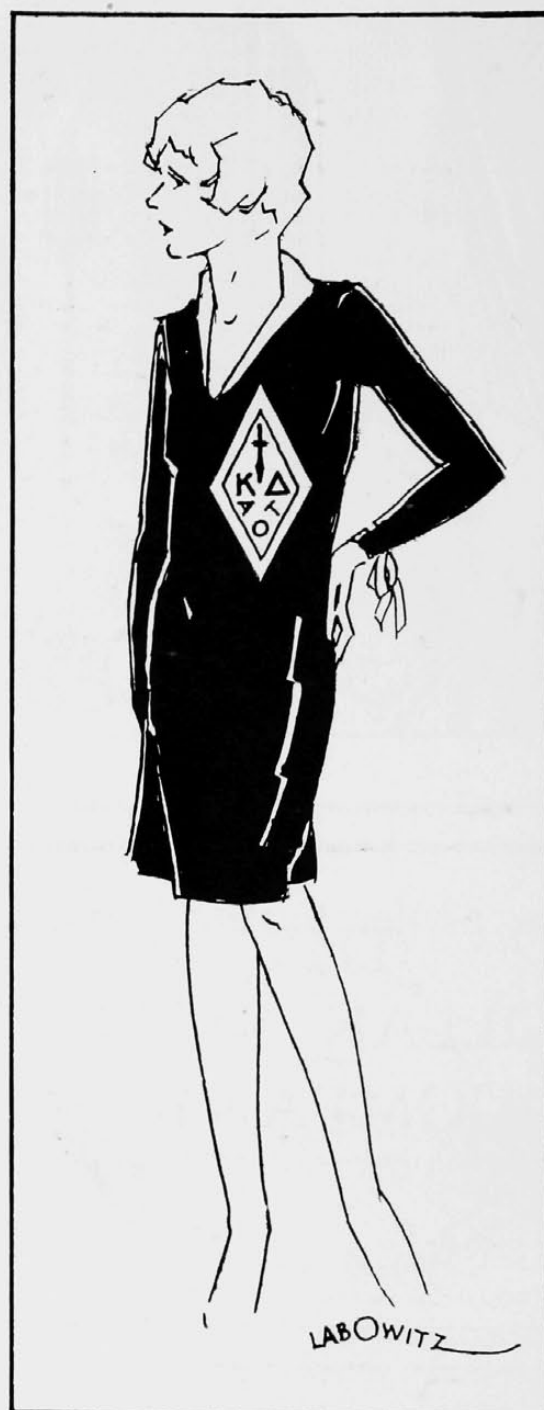
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The Sad, Wise Fool

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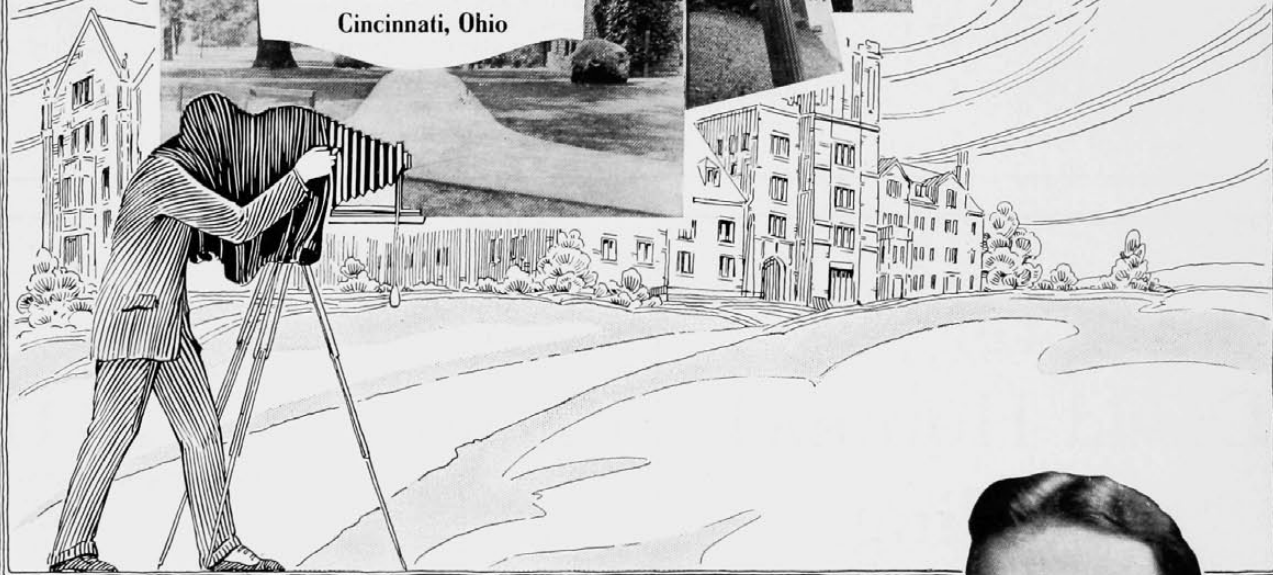
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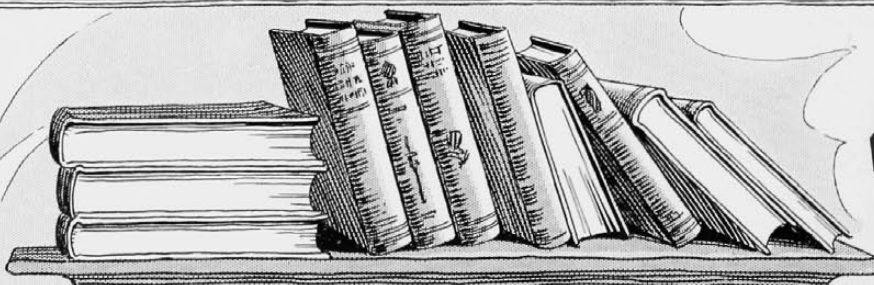
