During our University year 1930-31, we have seen the beginning of a new College of Education building which will be occupied next September. The most conspicuous feature of this building is the Annie Laws Memorial Wing which is established as a permanent headquarters for kindergarten work. It commemorates the life of a great educator interested in all types of organized work. In introducing her on one occasion, Dr. Louis A. Pechstein, now dean of the College of Education, said: "To few is given the opportunity to touch the life of a great city, to fewer still, the life of a nation. One comes here who has influenced for good not only her city, but also, along broad national lines, three major fields of education; training the girl for motherhood, the care of the sick, and the education of little children." It is fitting that such a memorial should remind us of the one who established three of our colleges.

Dr. Louis A. Pechstein has been on his sabbatical leave of absence in California. There he has received the distinction of being invited by Dr. Lewis Terman, internationally known psychologist, to conduct a seminar in Education at Leland Stanford University.
