Dr. Louis T. More, dean of the Graduate School, left the University in April, to set sail for England. It was his purpose to study there the unpublished documents of Sir Isaac Newton, which are now in the hands of the Countess of Portsmouth, a descendant of the noted and long-famed scientist. He also intended to do research work among the Newtonian documents in the library of Trinity College in Cambridge. He will reveal the fruits of his knowledge in a book which he is writing on Newton.

The dean has contributed much in the way of scientific publications. "The Dogma of Evolution" and "The Limitations of Science" are two of his most important publications. He contributed to "Humanism and America," a 1930 publication. As is revealed by the titles, his service to society has been to stimulate scientific study and to expose fallacies in the world of science.
